Sustainable Stonesfield

SUSTO and the Parish Council fight CALA appeal

When we took up our four-day residence in WODC's Council Chamber on 2 April, we entered a strange new world. A world where, according to CALA, people who go for walks in the countryside are called receptors; if they are walking in the AONB, they are called sensitive receptors. If they look at the view while they are walking, they are 'sensitive receptors having a sequential kinetic experience'.

The way our village develops is 'morphology'. The arable field on the edge of our small rural village is a 'periurban site'. Our hard tennis courts are 'all weather pitches on an urban playing field'.

It was a world where, if you build 68 houses on the edge of the village, you are not changing the character of the landscape: you are simply softening the edge of the village and moving the boundary out a bit. Where building the houses supplies jobs for the builders, which justifies building them, even though they are ruining the AONB. Where, if you offer a slim belt of trees which take twenty years to mature and even at full height will be lower than the roofs, you have effectively screened and integrated the development. If you put a short, narrow footpath through it, going from nowhere to nowhere, you are offering a recreational activity for the village – this, despite the fact that the development is on a busy road out of the

village in the 'wrong' direction for anyone who would want to take a walk.

It is a world where adding 68 houses with parking spaces for 135 cars to a rural settlement with already seriously congested roads and overburdened water and sewage facilities will ENHANCE the village, and enliven it. Where new residents on the edge of the village will walk half a mile with their toddlers to do their weekly shop in our little village store – and back again with their shopping bags, perhaps via the pub and the garage, to revitalise those services. Or they will go by one of the 3-weekly buses into Witney and return two hours later, in the middle of either Monday, Tuesday or Friday.

In this world, we only consider whether there is a need, not whether there is an absence of need. Apparently, they are different. We think that by offering properties costing upwards of £350,000, we are addressing a need for affordable housing. We think that if we build the houses in Witney instead, where there are shops and services galore, the new residents will not contribute to the life of Stonesfield by coming to shop in our village, or use our library; and that this is a more serious impact than the damage done to our country's priceless landscape, and Witney is therefore to be rejected.

In this new world, Stonesfield appears as an ageing community with a diminishing workforce and an increasing need for social care. We struggle to run any of our groups and societies for lack of volunteers; without an injection of young blood, we will eventually atrophy and die out completely, possibly before the current Local Plan has run its course in 2031.

As we emerged from the council chambers, blinking in the Spring sunshine and taking in the blossom, we asked ourselves whether this strange new world bore any relation to reality . . .

There will be one more day's evidence heard on 16 May; the decision is expected in July.

We now wait to see what happens and what the Inspector decides, which could be several months, but if unsuccessful in stopping this ill-conceived carbuncle of a development it won't be from want of trying.

CALA appeal (2)

Having witnessed part of the planning appeal by CALA Homes for the careless and excessive development proposed for the Woodstock Road, thanks and appreciation are due to the Stonesfield SUSTO/Parish Council team and others who so well represented the views of Stonesfield residents.

It struck me that the appellant's agents spoke coldly from their heads, but our team spoke warmly from their hearts. Enduring one lengthy witness statement from the opposition, I have never heard so many words spoken when so little was said.

These outsiders – CALA Homes and their lawyers – know little and care nothing for the vitality and quality of life we enjoy in this village, never mind the wellrehearsed details of protection for the AONB, the scale of development, respect for the unique marriage of old stone villages and the surrounding landscape which makes the Cotswolds special, lack of employment opportunities, pressure on the school and pre-school, narrow byways and roads, absence of genuine consultation on local need, and the proposed unaffordable 'affordable' homes. This standard, pattern-book development, which takes no account of vernacular architecture, could be anywhere. It is unwanted and totally out of place in Stonesfield. I hope the planning inspector agrees.

Stonesfield Common

Over the years I've occasionally walked up past Highfield and on towards Charlbury, to look for farmland birds, and there's always the chance of a surprise, such as a couple of Peregrine sightings. This winter was a little different. Having been made aware of the Wychwood Project Bird Aid, I went to Highfield crossroads to see what was around.

Instantly Yellowhammers were visible on the hedgerow tops, eventually the count reached 30, all coming to the seeded area. Linnets were present in good numbers, 35, and a few Chaffinches, again all coming to the seed. Similar numbers were seen in subsequent visits, emphasising how important this project is for farmland bird survival over the winter period. In addition, there were 304 Skylark up there, the biggest number I've seen in the county.

The Wychwood Project Bird Aid, feeding in various locations, is a great project and is well worth locals taking an interest in.

Birdlife at Highfield and Bird Aid Breaks Records

Skylark and Yellowhammer Numbers Soar

Bird Aid is a West Oxfordshire initiative that works closely with the Wychwood Project to help feed our threatened farmland birds during the 'hungry gap' from January to early May. Bird Aid particularly targets help at three key farmland bird species: yellowhammers, skylarks and linnets.

These birds used to be able to feed on seeds in the stubble fields over winter before the land was ploughed in the spring, but the modern practice of immediate ploughing after harvest now makes it much harder for flocks of these birds to survive the winter.

Over the past 15 years Bird Aid, led by Louise Spicer, has organised 12 feeding stations on farms in Charlbury, Chipping Norton, Over Norton, Hailey, Stonesfield and Crawley.

Bird Aid would welcome more bird watchers to help with the surveys from November to end of March. The charity is also keen to hear from farmers or landowners who could provide a feeding site. For further information on how to get involved please contact: judy.anders66@gmail.com.

A half dozen of us are giving time and energy to this project but more are needed to complete the next phase, starting Community Speed Watch. If more came forward each individual's contribution need be less than a couple of hours per person per month. The support of the Parish Council and the TVP means that the necessary equipment and safety gear will be provided.

There is much more traffic passing through our Stonesfield than there was just a few years back. More cars mean less time and less space for each vehicle. Let's take responsibility for our own roads, paths, and bridleways by assisting SAFER in ensuring that courtesy and consideration take precedence over timetables and schedules for those passing through this village.

Stonesfield Spring Clean

Huge thanks to the 40+ volunteers who joined the village-wide clean-up on a sunny Spring morning on 24 March, with further thanks to the additional 15+ Stonesfield Scout Group Beaver, Cub, Scouts, (and their leaders), who also tidied up the Playing Field and Play Park.

Thanks also to Ben and Sam Tomlin for opening up the SSSC early for us, providing refreshments and facilities. And to Richard and Julie Grime, who very kindly drove around collecting up all of the bagged rubbish (and the fridge!).

Over 20 bags of rubbish was collected (in addition to 10+ bags of recycling), with a number of other larger items (including a fly-tipped fridge, numerous tyres, and car parts) moved to a central point for collection by WODC the next day.



The Annual Parish Meeting

The council confirmed they would hold the Annual Parish Meeting on 13 May at 7pm in the Village Hall. There will be a usual full council meeting from 6.30 to 7pm before the APM for normal business. All members of the public are welcome.

Town & Parish Council Elections Update

Cllr S Powell, Cllr D Brown, Cllr D Baldwin and Cllr P McArdell are confirmed as uncontested re-elected councillors. Cllr Jim O'Brien will re-stand as a councillor to be co-opted on at the next meeting in May. There are two other parties potentially interested in the vacant positions at the moment.

CALA Appeal Update

Cllr David Brown provided a written report to councillors ahead of the meeting. This report is provided within the minutes which are posted on the website. On 16 May the CALA inquiry resumes, updates will follow as we have them.

West Oxfordshire District Council District Digest

With the elections now imminent, things have been relatively peaceful at District.

The proposed motor museum on the airfield at Enstone has been deferred pending further information. The Development Committee was evenly divided in spite of the new architect's plans, Sir Norman Foster no less. Huge representation from the neighbouring villages highlighted the perceived objections, mainly to do with fears of massive increases in traffic flows.

Thames Water was again the subject of criticism for inadequate infrastructure for sewage. Highlighted were problems in Finstock and Stonesfield.

Problems caused by single-use plastics were debated with various suggestions being referred to Cabinet/Council for consideration.

Provision of electric charging points for

electric vehicles and their siting was the subject of debate with the County's plans to incorporate them in street lighting columns being welcomed.

The West Oxfordshire department reaponsible for trees owned by the Council explained and amplified the policy for tree management and preservation.

The appeal enquiry into the refusal to permit building 68 new houses on the Woodstock Road in Stonesfield is ongoing. The barrister employed by the prospective developer quoted many facts and figures without much regard for either accuracy or veracity. However, the speakers from Sustainable Stonesfield were positive, accurate and strong in their rebuttals. Both Jim Astle and David Lines presented their arguments with great force and, hopefully, clear understanding on the part of the Inspector. The Enquiry reconvenes in May. When you receive this, the District and Parish council elections will be only days away. Please remember to –exercise your right to vote.

From your Parish Priest

I first wrote this letter to you in 2015 but it seems quite fitting for us today in 2019.

We have just had St George's Day on 23 April and I wondered if you thought about it or considered what it might mean to us as a nation. I ask the question because we are coming up to our general election date and we will all be asking ourselves what sort of UK do we want to see for ourselves and our children.

Lots of people in England will relate to what we believe England ought to stand for. The political parties, particularly the UKIP party will want to emphasise being British and having what they would consider selfdetermination.

I know lots of people who are worried about what it means to be part of a sovereign state rather then

being part of a Federal Europe. I understand that the received wisdom to unify different groups of people is to have a common currency first and then unifying laws. That's what happened in the USA. They had a common currency and then a federated union. Better people than me understand these things. But it seems to me that it's what people believe about how we should respect, care for and behave that is much more important. Surely that's how families operate! It's not the fiscal or the rules of the house, which are important I grant you, but the compassion and the shared standards, the values and commitment to those values that bind people and families together.

As a nation we have a patron saint who serves as an example regarding the qualities that are supposed to cement us together. So who was this St George? St George was a soldier of the Roman Empire, from the then Greek-speaking Anatolia, now modern-day Turkey, and is venerated as a Christian martyr.

George was born to a Christian family during the late third century. His father was from Cappadocia and served as an officer of the Roman army. His mother was from Lydda, Judea (now Israel). She returned to her native city as a widow along with her young son, where she provided him with an education. The youth followed his father's example by joining the army soon after coming of age. He proved to be a good soldier and consequently rose through the military ranks of the time. By his late twenties he had gained the title of tribunus (Tribune) and then stationed in Nicomedia he became a member of the personal guard attached to Roman Emperor Diocletian.

In 303 Diocletian issued an edict authorising the systematic persecution of Christians across the Empire. George was ordered to participate in the persecution but instead confessed to being a Christian himself and

criticised the imperial decision. An enraged Diocletian ordered his torture and execution. But did you know that St George is shared as a patron saint around the world!

St George is the patron saint of Aragon, Canada, Catalonia, China, England, Ethiopia, Georgia, Greece, Montenegro, Palestine, Portugal, Russia, and Serbia, as well as the cities of Amersfoort, Beirut, Ferrara, Freiburg, Genoa, Ljubljana, and Moscow, as well as a wide range of professions, organisations.

Perhaps we might be on to something here. instead of the Euro or the court in Brussels it could be something much more understandable. It could be Christian love and ideals that should bind us together. What do you think? Maybe our vote should go to the person who best exemplifies those virtues on the seventh!"


