Woodstock Bookshop for Sale

I have decided after much thought to sell the bookshop. When I first opened it at the beginning of May 2008 I had no idea it would still be here, almost twelve years later; that the bookshop would have hosted so many talks by writers and poets I most admire, and been shortlisted three times for independent bookshop of the year. I had no plans to start a poetry festival that ran for eight consecutive years and featured most of the best poets writing today. Most important, I had no idea of the many kind and wonderful people I would meet as customers in the bookshop. They have been the reason for the bookshop's success and will be what I miss most when I shut the door for the last time.

The bookshop has become, as a regular customer wrote to me following last year's poetry festival, 'a Woodstock institution', and is doing well financially. If there is anyone reading this who thinks they would like to own an independent bookshop and is interested in taking it on, do contact me. I would like if possible to sell it as a going concern, so please tell friends and acquaintances about it too. If no one comes forward I will shut the shop in late spring or early summer. There was a report today saying that independent bookshops are flourishing, and that is certainly our experience. A new owner, with energy and vision, could carry the bookshop forward into the next decade and I hope that will happen.

Bird-Aid trip to Park Farm, Chipping Norton

On 30 November fifteen of us paid a visit to Mike Kettlewell's farm, just outside Chipping Norton. Luckily for us the day turned from a foggy start to brilliant sunshine, though it stayed cold.

The point of the visit was to see what a difference regular feeding makes to our declining farmland birds. Park Farm has about 250 acres of mixed habitat: pasture, arable, woodland, a stream, and about 6km of hedgerow.

Mike has been putting out wheat grain, crushed barley, rapeseed, millet and linseed for the last 17 years! Currently he spreads 40 kilos a day.

How do you accurately count large flocks of birds? This was a new task for some of us. I have never before seen 50 or so linnets all at once, swirling up, commandeering a hedgerow tree, swirling again, settling on the ground to feast on the seed. We also saw yellowhammers, chaffinches, longtailed tits, great tits, robins, blackbirds, and of course the ubiquitous wood pigeons and rooks. Grateful thanks to those who lugged their telescopes along and then generously shared them.

This commitment, continuous since 2002, to helping our diminishing wildlife impressed us all, and the results were there for us to see. Mike had wide margins along his field edges, mature hedges with unrestricted trees growing out of them, and plenty of woodland cover. All this on a working farm, from which he has to make a living.

Many thanks to him and to the organizers, chiefly Judy Anders, for an enjoyable and instructive trip. Where better to round it off than at the Old Shed café, Banbury Hill Farm, conveniently on the way home?

We attend to our respective feeding stations around Stonesfield with a greater understanding of the impact it is possible to make. One of them yielded this on a 30minute survey done on one local site just after Christmas: over 100 birds made up of 10 different species, of which chaffinches and linnets made the largest groups, with yellowhammers coming third.

Parish Matters

- The clerk is ordering replacement litter bins for Church Street and by the village shop. No date for replacement has been given yet.
- The clerk has contacted PYE Homes and Blenheim Estate to request that they install a grit bin and dog waste bin on the Charity Farm development. No further update at this time.
- The clerk has chased up the hedge cutting around the small village hall car park. This is planned for January 2020.
- The risers/steps at the Glebe [going from Brook Lane towards the Scout hut] are being replaced this month.
- The cows on the Common have now been moved; we will consider having them again later in the year.

Spring Clean

Sunday 8 March is the proposed date for the annual village spring clean. The Parish Council will confirm this after the full council meeting on 15 January 2020.

WODC Art / The Common

A proposal for this art project is being put together and we hope to have details to share with the village in the next month or two.

Update from SAFER: Cllr Heduan

- After a delay with delivery, and a missing battery charger, we now have the new Speed Indicating Device (SID), mounting kits and Android tablet.
- The tablet has been configured to connect with the SID so that parameters and thresholds can be set up to display speeds and pictorial messages.
- The SID was set up on the War Memorial island last week to test out the parameters above and check the radar trigger distance, which is considerably more than the previous device.
- Initial tests at the War Memorial indicate the SID will be very effective in communicating speed and messages to drivers to change behaviour. Several members of the public were impressed by the display.
- We aim to affix a rotating bracket to the sign post on the island to enable the SID to service 3 directions from that location. Bracket to be fixed this week.
- Training of the SAFER team will now commence to operate the SID.
- A schedule of survey dates will now be produced for the SAFER team.
- A reporting template will be designed to communicate speed survey data to the PC.
- A campaign to recruit new members to SAFER will also start shortly.

West Oxon District Council District Digest

There is not a great deal to report following the holiday break.

A Draft Council Plan is under review and should come up for approval in the next week or so. This should not be confused with the West Oxfordshire Council Local Plan which was ratified earlier last year. The review concerns primarily internal procedures and in particular the responsibilities of Overview and Scrutiny Committees.

A proposal to apply Council Tax discounts for those who meet the criteria for care leavers up to the age of 21, and those who meet extra criteria aged between 21 and 25, will be put to Council shortly.

An attempt to prevent and discourage fly tipping by using Householders Duty of Care is to be considered. The imposition of a Fixed Penalty notice of £400 will be enforced, with an early reduction of £200 if payment is made within 10 days of the date of the notice. The initial draft base budgets for 2020/2021 will be given consideration later this month.

On the planning front, applications continue to be received and an overstretched department is coping without too much difficulty or delay. New and relatively inexperienced planning officers seem to be finding their feet, helped and advised by one or two very experienced senior officers. However, enforcement of conditions attached to successful applications is still a matter of some concern.

The atrocious wet weather recently is concentrating the collective minds of both Thames Water and the Environment Agency. They are each clearing drainage ditches and water courses to facilitate drainage without too much flooding. I hope that all our residents are successful in keeping the creeping waters at bay.

New homes' energy performance

WODC has welcomed Government plans to boost the energy performance of all newbuild homes. The Council has responded positively to a consultation on key proposals forming part of the Future Homes Standard which is being drawn up to ensure significantly higher energy efficiency requirements being incorporated into new homes from 2025. The consultation proposes changes to building regulations covering conservation of fuel, power and ventilation which are designed to cut carbon emissions from new homes by up to 80 per cent compared to current standards.

But while welcoming the proposals, Cllr David Harvey, Cabinet Member for Climate Change, believes the new benchmarks should be introduced more quickly than 2025 and also disagrees with Government plans to amend the Planning and Energy Act to restrict local authorities' ability to set higher energy standards for dwellings. He said: "Local planning authorities have, historically, developed and adopted local energy standards and these have driven developers to design and build to higher standards than those set out in building regulations. The ability for a local planning authority to future-proof themselves in the event of changes to Government's proposals is also important; each area has its own economic, social and

environmental characteristics which local planning policies will capture and build on." He added that a key example would be policies for the Oxfordshire Cotswolds Garden Village which will need to showcase new, innovative concepts and techniques for a truly sustainable development.

Use official waste carrier or face a fine

Government legislation stipulates that only authorised collectors can be used to take away waste that is not being removed as part of normal household collections, e.g. old appliances, waste generated from a DIY project or a house clearance. Collection services are often advertised on social media sites but the operators may not have the correct authorisation. If residents fail to check their collector's credentials, they themselves could face a fixed penalty notice of up to £400. The new fines have been introduced as an amendment to the Environmental Protection Act 1990.

Grants for community projects available

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Grant funding that supports the important work done by local community and voluntary groups in West Oxfordshire is now open for 2020-21 applications. The closing date for applications is **Friday 7 February 2020.**

The type of help that can be provided are services such as new boilers, repairs to boilers, loft or cavity wall insulation, access to a local and trustworthy repairs service and general advice on how to stay safe, well and affordably warm in your home.

Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire are providing free energy advice this winter to help people understand their energy costs and suggests alternative ways to make savings. Energy-saving advice sessions range from checking if you are eligible for the £140 Warm Home Discount, registering eligibility with the Priority Register for people in need, helping with supplier price comparisons and much more. On average, clients save £150 to £200 per year. Last year, we helped one family save over £3000.

In the next month we will be putting up a fence and gate between the bottom allotments on Churchfields and the Glebe [the area of land between Brook Lane and the Scout hut]. The fence is part of our constant battle against rabbits. Also, some people who are not allotment holders have started using this as a shortcut between the Glebe and Churchfields, some walking dogs and leaving dog mess on the allotments. There is not, and never has been, a footpath through the allotments, and before Churchfields B was opened up, the bottom of the main Churchfield allotments was fenced off. The gate we are going to put in will be securely padlocked but there will be access for allotment holders to have bulk deliveries made through the Glebe.

The rabbit problem is even more acute on the Woodstock Road site where the existing boundary fence is no longer fit for purpose. We are applying for a Blenheim Bursary to help us replace the fence. Unfortunately the cost and practicalities of bringing mains water onto this site means that we have to look at other ways of improving our water collecting capacity here. Many plots have installed their own water tanks and part of the Blenheim application is for additional water tanks.

There is an allotment rule that we are not allowed to sell any of the produce from our allotments - but we can give it away. One of the facts of allotment life is that we often produce more than we can consume and we have Roy Turner's permission to put a permanent stall up in the St James car park where we and anyone else who has more than they can use from their gardens can make Stonesfield produce available to villagers who are not in a position to grow their own. Good food, zero food miles, free.

There are some free plots available on the Woodstock Road site. If you would like to have a plot, contact me and we will show you around.

Stonesfield could make a really valuable contribution if we get on board with offers to site, plant and take care of new trees. We have two experts coming to talk to us and help us go into action with the right species in the right places. Please come and take part: there is no obligation to speak or volunteer; just listening and absorbing and maybe sharing some of the things you hear with a friend or neighbour will be valuable. Maybe this is something you could get your family interested in?

Future topics include: buying an electric car; work environments; repair café; clothing exchange; switching to green energy; internet useage; pensions and banks. If you have a particular interest in or knowledge of any of these areas, please get in touch.

If not me, who? If not now, when?

From your Parish Priest

[first, from his **January** letter] ...I do love what I do through the week. I love the fact that God has entrusted me with the care of others and that the church supports me and my family to do it. I find it is a great privilege that I have been entrusted with and it never fails to gladden my heart. Of course there are times when one's heart is saddened through losing friends who pass on or leave to take up another challenge somewhere else and I lose contact with them, but even then I can rejoice that I have known the individuals and that they have a new future in God, either in Heaven or somewhere else on the planet.

Life is ever changing, don't you think? So it is with my own life. You may have heard that I am retiring shortly from my duties here in Stonesfield and Combe. My last services as your Rector will be on 15 March 2020. So can I be a little indulgent for a moment and tell you all that I have been wonderfully blessed in being part of the communities here in the benefice. Our pravers. Bey's and mine, are that whoever comes to serve you in the future will enjoy vour friendship as much as we have: that the communities of Stonesfield and Combe will go on from strength to strength and that in a small way we have blessed you all by us serving you here.

February 2020

I sometimes let you know about my friend J.J.John and what he has to say. I have just received another letter I thought you might like to read:

'In the middle of the long reign of Queen Victoria there was a British Member of Parliament who was a Christian committed to defending those who were the victims of society. He found himself grieved by the heavy loss of life amongst British merchant seamen - often a thousand deaths a year largely caused by greedy owners overloading their vessels to the point where they easily sank. He knew of a simple invention that, if it was made compulsory, could prevent these 'coffin ships' from sailing and so, for ten long vears, he battled in the Houses of Parliament for the law to be passed. He eventually won in 1876. His name was Samuel Plimsoll and the invention couldn't have been simpler: an official, very visible and permanent mark on the side of a ship indicated the maximum load that the ship could carry. If this mark - it soon became known as the 'Plimsoll line' - disappeared below the surface of the water, the ship was illegally loaded and must not sail. Because these were the days when 'Britannia ruled the waves' the Plimsoll line came to be used universally and, thanks to its

existence, an uncountable number of lives have been saved.'

Now the reason that Plimsoll came to mind is because I have just revised my book on the Ten Commandments and I find in them a comparable standard for our lives. What Plimsoll sought to apply to ships was a clear, enduring, life-saving way of setting limits that, even under pressure, must not be broken. The Ten Commandments do the same: they are, if you like, the Plimsoll line for our existence. If we ignore them or let them sink below the waves of life, then being in some way drowned or shipwrecked is inevitable.

The Ten Commandments set out in ten clear clauses, few in words but infinitely wide in application, our Maker's limits for the great areas of our life. In these rules we find guidance on how we relate to God, how we are to use our time and how we relate to our families and to those we live amongst. Despite the fact that they were given in a culture profoundly different to any we live in today, the Commandments cover every aspect of human life. At one

level, the Ten Commandments are the simplest and clearest of guides; yet at the same time they have a limitless depth and breadth in what they cover.

In fact, the Ten Commandments serve a double purpose. They serve as a judge: they set out the limits for how we should live and inevitably, given the inclination of human beings to do wrong, they force those who consider them seriously to acknowledge their guilt.

So although the Ten Commandments are often dismissed as harsh rules that constrain who we are, the irony is that in fact they are liberating. In them we see God saying in effect that if we operate within these guidelines, we will flourish as we are meant to.

Let those guidelines be our maxim for the year to come. As always, D.F.T.W.

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
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
