#### Stonesfield celebrates 500th Slate

Stonesfield residents and friends assembled at the St James' Centre on 29 February to celebrate the 500th issue of *The Stonesfield Slate*.

Richard Morris had arranged a display of the *Slate*'s archive which included every issue since the *Slate* was started by Gordon Rudlin in December 1976. Additional memorabilia on display included newspaper cuttings, letters, awards and the famous bird box originally used for *Slate*'s wildlife surveys and later for receiving entries to the *Slate* (it was located in the Post Office at The Cross).

This was an opportunity to thank all the people who had been involved with the *Slate* over the years. This includes the bundlers who sort the 900 copies into delivery routes and hand them to the 30+ distributors who ensure a copy is popped through your letterbox each month. A number of copies are also mailed out to a variety of organisations including the Bodleian Library, who believe the *Slate* to be one of the longest running local magazines. Some exresidents of Stonesfield also receive a copy by post.

The occasion was also used to mark the change of publisher. Richard presented Jenny and Simon Haviland with a framed Stonesfield slate (a real one) in recognition of their service as publishers since 2004. Richard also presented Diane and Paul Bates with 'Provisional Plates' as they became the new publishers from January 2020.

A final thanks goes to all the people who provided cakes etc for people to enjoy.

## Blenheim backs Coronavirus online Help Hub

Blenheim is supporting a West Oxfordshire online service that is being created to offer support along with practical advice and guidance for individuals who find themselves isolated as a result of the Covid-19 Coronavirus. The Help Hub has been set up by Ruth Chaloner and is a free, online service offering emotional and practical help for both medically at risk and older people who have either chosen, or been instructed, to self-isolate.

The Help Hub aims to provide a free service for as many people as possible by listening, supporting and helping where it can. Ruth, along with a team of fellow volunteer therapists and individuals, will offer their time for free 15-20 minute support and help sessions for residents across West Oxford via Skype, FaceTime or phone.

The Help Hub website, designed by Blenheim's Innovation Team, has been created with the potential to be 'templated' to allow it to be easily replicated throughout the country, should groups of volunteers wish to provide this service in other cities and regions. Without

Blenheim, this service in West Oxfordshire would not be possible.

In addition to building and hosting the Help Hub website, Blenheim is also calling on more qualified/trainee therapists and individuals to offer their support and expertise to Ruth and her team of volunteers.

## Stonesfield Parish Council (SPC)

At the last meeting, Jess Huband gave an update on the Spring clean: with about 50 volunteers, it went really well. There was a lot of fly tipping particularly along the Ridings and near Green Lane, including oil which has been reported.

The Parish Council will consider the purchase of litter pickers' equipment. The Council sends huge thanks to Jess Huband for taking the lead on organising the Spring Clean.

A SAFER report had been circulated by Cllr M Heduan ahead of the meeting, and can be found on the website. The Parish Council now has a Climate Emergency Working Group.

The next Council meeting will be on Wednesday 8 April 2020 at 7.30pm, in Stonesfield Village Hall. The date planned for the Annual Parish Meeting is 13 May 2020 at 7.30pm, following a Council meeting at 7pm.

## Community Speed Watch restarts

At the end of 2019 SAFER took delivery of a Morelock 'Speed Indicating Device' (SID) for use by the SAFER Community Speed Watch team. Now all the team have been trained in the monitoring and recording of traffic speeds, in line with Thames Valley Police guidelines.

Between 1 February and 2 March, traffic was monitored on four occasions at a range of locations in Stonesfield; one having been cancelled due to poor weather. Each Community Speed Watch session lasts around 90 minutes and the speeds of over 300 vehicles were checked. Of these vehicles, six were recorded as exceeding 35mph in the village and their details passed on to Thames Valley Police. Reports of activities are also provided to the Parish Council at their monthly meetings.

Over the coming months it was planned that these checks would take place weekly, subject to weather conditions and availability of volunteers. In view of Covid-19 these have been postponed.

SAFER is looking for more volunteers who are able to give their time to support Community Speed Watch surveys. This amounts to roughly 2 hours a month, but SAFER is very flexible and would appreciate any realistic offers of help.

Additionally, SAFER has been reporting faulty / damaged signs, roads marking and ongoing hazards to Oxfordshire County Council, with some limited success in getting rectification. SAFER will continue to pursue OCC; however the Transport Team have restricted budgets so progress is positive but slow.

SAFER volunteers would like to thank Stonesfield residents who stop and express their appreciation of Community Speed Watch and the impact it has on slowing down traffic in the village.

SAFER is a Stonesfield Parish Council working group made up of some Parish Councillors and other volunteers who live in Stonesfield. A link for volunteering, can be found at www.stonefield.online/safer.

#### Stonesfield Community Trust

Speaking on behalf of 'the people who founded the Community Trust', I'd like to tell you we did indeed foresee what it could do. We were following the lead of the Quaker Ebenezer Howard, who founded Letchworth Garden City in the late 19th century and started the garden city movement. We believed that owning some of its own land, housing and rents would empower it to achieve real good for its citizens, and so it proved.

We supported the Toddler Group, housed the Pre-school, helped disabled residents adapt their homes to be more liveable, helped primary school pupils whose parents couldn't afford for their children to go on school trips, and so on. Stonesfield was the first successful community trust since Letchworth - indeed we invented the term 'community trust' to describe it - and it has since been imitated by scores of communities, from Cornwall to Scotland. Stonesfield is now famous as the pioneer of a movement that has made a real contribution to remedying the British national housing crisis. We have every reason to be proud of what has been achieved.

## West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC)

#### From our District Councillor

The West Oxfordshire District Council Budget has been accepted and passed by the recent full Council meeting. As I wrote last month, the decisions taken result in West Oxfordshire remaining the second lowest taxing authority in England. This, whilst retaining all services and facilities, including free parking (the envy of many in adjoining areas), full retention of the system of grants and allowances. Council tax itself will undergo a rise of £5.00 at Band D.

The various discussions on the Budget, always interesting and sometimes fraught, were this year conducted in an atmosphere of cordiality. The Labour Group voted in favour of the package. The Liberal Democrats, however, voted unanimously to abstain. The eventual decision was for what most councillors viewed as an excellent and well-balanced proposal.

This Budget for 2020/2021 has taken as its theme the welfare of residents in the District and the preservation of all that is commendable in a local government financial statement. Further and more detailed information can be accessed on the West Oxfordshire website.

By the time you read this, Easter will be almost upon us. May I wish you all the very best for the holiday period in the hope that our dreadful wet weather will be past and we can look towards a good summer.

#### **Other WODC news**

#### Office closures

The WODC Town Centre Shop and main reception (Elmfield) in Witney; also the Burford Visitor Information Centre will all remain closed until further notice. Many of the tasks people usually do in person can be done online at www.westoxon.gov.uk and all council services are still accessible by telephone - on 01993 861000. Payments can be made using the 24-hr payments line on 01993 861045.

#### May Bank Holiday

The early May Bank Holiday is being moved to Friday, 8 May to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE Day. In our present circumstances (note from Editor) it seems unlikely that street celebrations will be possible but anyone contemplating organising events should consult the District Council to check for any necessary licences.

#### **Budget**

In late February, West Oxfordshire District Council confirmed that the council tax for 2020-21 will rise by £5, which is within Government guidelines. This means the charge for the average Band D property in the District will be £104.38 or £2 a week, making it the second lowest rate of council tax among shire councils in England.

The meeting noted that almost 500 affordable homes had been delivered in the District in the last year. Grants to the community and voluntary sector will be maintained at current levels, along with free car parking, while new priorities such as tackling climate change will also receive investment.

## Businesses rates and changes in the Budget

West Oxfordshire businesses are being advised that the business rates bills they received in mid-March do not take into account changes announced in Wednesday's Budget.

Chancellor Rishi Sunak revealed a range of discounts for retailers and hospitality and leisure businesses, including pubs, for one year as a result of the potential impact of the Coronavirus.

The changes are set to be introduced on 1 April but have to be ratified by Parliament, and as a result, eligible businesses should continue with the current payment schedule until they receive further instructions. They will then be reimbursed by the Council in due course.

For retail businesses with a rateable value of under £51,000 the discount will be increased to 100 per cent and expanded to include hospitality and leisure businesses for 2021. Pubs with a rateable value below £100,000 will enjoy a discount of £5,000 rather than £1,000.

#### Citizens' Advice

In mid-March, West Oxfordshire District Council was expected to approve the award of a contract to Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire to continue providing the district with expert support services. Citizens Advice will continue to provide residents with advice and support on behalf of WODC on a range of issues, from budgeting and financial support to help with application forms or employment guidance.

#### Single-use plastics

WODC has adopted a set of principles and a new '12 Ways' campaign to minimise the use of single-use plastics, much of which ends in the countryside, waterways and the sea. The Council is to eliminate single use plastics from its own offices and services, and is encouraging residents, businesses and contractors in the wider community to minimise their use. The Council is also keen to develop staff and community volunteering groups to collect litter and minimise plastic pollution in parks and open spaces. Recycled plastic materials should be promoted as an alternative.

Below are 12 ideas on how to reduce single use plastics

- 1. Say no to plastic straws and cutlery
- Bring your own reusable mugs for drinks
- 3. Bring your own reusable water bottle
- 4. Get the free Refill app to find places to refill your water bottles
- 5. Use a reusable bag for shopping
- 6. Take your own containers to supermarkets for deli items, fish etc
- 7. Buy items such as fruit and vegetable loose rather than wrapped in plastics
- 8. Consider purchasing items (such as washing power) in bulk, using reusable containers from refill stations
- Swap plastic bathroom products for alternatives e.g. bamboo toothbrushes, shampoo bars
- 10. Ditch cling film and bring lunch in a reusable container
- 11. Give up chewing gum and cigarettes
- 12. Switch to doorstep milk delivery in reusable glass bottles

#### SCRAP campaign to stop fly-tipping

WODC operatives are regularly called to investigate and clear unsightly rubbish that has been dumped illegally, often on farmland or roadsides. The SCRAP Campaign, created by the Hertfordshire Fly Tipping Group, will be run by WODC online to raise awareness of the issue and inform residents and businesses about the law and their obligations around flytipping.

This will include guidance for residents on how to dispose of their waste correctly and how to report a fly tip, while highlighting the penalties if caught fly tipping.

## From our County Councillor Budget

I am pleased that the budget I outlined in *The Stonesfield Slate* for March, was passed unanimously. It was an 'investment budget' to reduce neglect, ill-health and social isolation, following resident and business consultation.

Funding for children and adult social services will increase by £30 million next year, including an extra £8.1 million from the government. The budget also includes investment in infrastructure across the county, such as an extra £50 million for new and existing schools over ten years.

The County Council also proposes to spend £30 million in 2020/21 from its capital budget on repairs to roads, bridges, drainage and footways across Oxfordshire's towns and villages, with major schemes scheduled in Banbury, Abingdon and

Witney. The budget also provides for climate change initiatives, including support for sustainable travel such as improving park and ride services on the A40, and the replacement of over 50,000 streetlights with energy-efficient LEDs. All budget proposals have to consider the climate change agenda and how the County Council will meet its carbon neutral target by 2030.

#### **Dementia-friendly Council**

Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) plans to develop further awareness, understanding and support for vulnerable residents and staff who are impacted by dementia.

The number of people with dementia in the UK is expected to rise to 1 million by 2021. About two in every 100 people aged between 65 to 69 have dementia, and this rises to one in five for those aged 85 to 89. Oxfordshire has an ageing population and the number of residents aged 85 and over is forecast to increase.

This means that more people in Oxfordshire are likely to be affected by dementia, either by having a diagnosis themselves or through someone they know with the condition. More people may develop dementia while still in employment; others will be combining work and a busy lifestyle with being a carer for a person with dementia.

OCC aims to help people who live with dementia to stay independent and live well in their communities for as long as possible. The Council's plans are part of a wider Alzheimer's Society initiative that aims to create a network of four million Dementia Friends across the country.

#### **Stonesfield Gardening Club**

Our March meeting was an interesting and entertaining talk from Timothy Walker entitled 'How to be a 21st Century Gardener'. He stressed how important the soil in our gardens is. We cannot change, only improve, it and that the best way to do this is by having our own compost heaps and using a general fertiliser (such as organic 6X) in February or March. It's important to choose the right plant for your soil: try British native plants and plant carefully with a good soaking, with the aim of not having to water very often, if at all.

On the hot topic of growing in peat-based composts he showed evidence that plants grow perfectly well without it. In fact, although gardeners always get the blame for the use of so much peat, it is sold in Ireland as fuel and it is that which accounts for much of the use. This has recently been outlawed in order to allow peat bogs to recover as they are such good carbon sinks. On pesticides, we were advised not to use them but to consider predators if we need to control pests in the greenhouse, otherwise let nature take its course!

We have no formal meeting in April but our annual plant sale will be held at Four Acres in Pond Hill on Saturday 25 April. This date is subject to government restrictions so look out for further notices. SGC will look for ways to hold this sale but help you stay 'contact free'.

In the meantime all members are encouraged to get seed sowing!

#### A slice of Stonesfield history: The Sleeping Policemen Club

I offered to pay for a sleeping policeman which they accepted! I informed Douglas Hurd who promised to come for a drink to the village's first sleeping policeman.

Alas, the sleeping policeman could only be constructed to the council's design. The design would have to be lit and its dimensions were such that in Boot Street it was longer that the width of the road!! I accepted defeat and the club stopped meeting in 1991 as did the monthly *Slate* entry.

#### Lent: Our journey to Easter

Lent, as we all know is a 'period of fasting and abstinence' to prepare us for Easter by partially sharing Christ's own 40 days of fasting in the desert. By briefly denying ourselves something that we like and enjoy, we are symbolically shedding some of the material weight which holds us back from fully engaging with the true purpose of Easter. However it is also possible to see Lent as another form of pilgrimage, if we consider that pilgrimage is defined as: 'a journey or search of moral or spiritual significance. Typically, it is a journey to a shrine or other location of importance to a person's beliefs and faith, although sometimes it can be a metaphorical journey into someone's own beliefs. A pilgrim (from the Latin peregrinus) is a traveller (literally one who has come from afar) who is on a journey to a holy place.' Wikipedia

Lent could be our inner journey towards the deeper meaning of how our redemption was achieved by Christ's sacrifice for us on the Cross. Further, our own 'journey or search of moral or spiritual significance' of this inner Lenten pilgrimage could be a reflection upon how we are going to change our lives in response to, and in recognition of the impact of Easter with its message of universal salvation. And never has it seemed more urgent, with the Coronavirus sweeping the world to such devastating effect, that we have some sort of greater

meaning in our lives as we face these uncertainties.

#### Parish letter

This month many people will enjoy a long weekend, known by all and sundry as the Easter Weekend (10-13 April), which begins on Friday, generally known as Good Friday, and continues through Easter Saturday, Easter Day (Sunday) and Bank Holiday Monday.

But how many people nowadays know and understand the origin and the significance and the implications of Easter?

Easter is the greatest and oldest feast of the Christian Church, when the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, after being crucified, is celebrated.

Whatever people may think, or not think, of Jesus Christ, He was, and is, an established and acknowledged historical figure, whose life and death and resurrection are all recorded in various manuscripts as well as the Bible.

The Cross of Christ, by which is meant the crucifixion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is the focal point of history, when God in Christ fulfilled His plan of Redemption.

The recording of history is reckoned and referred to in terms of the years up to the time of Christ as B.C. (Before Christ) now called B.C.E. (Before the Common Era), and A.D. (Anno Domini, the Year of our Lord) now called C.E. (the Common Era).

On one occasion Jesus declared: 'God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through Him.'

The Cross of Christ is also a crossroads for every person born into this world, at which he or she makes a choice, either to accept and believe in Christ as our only way to be made right with God, or to reject Him and thus turn our back on His free gift of forgiveness and eternal life.

At His trial, before Jesus was crucified, the judge (Pontius Pilate), finding no fault in Jesus, asked the leaders of the people and the crowd, 'What shall I do with Jesus who is called Christ?' And they shouted, 'Away with Him! Crucify Him!'

On one occasion when Jesus asked His disciples, 'Who do people say that I am?' They responded with various suggestions of what people thought, so He then asked them, 'But what about you? Who do you say that I am?' And Peter responded: 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.'

When St Thomas met the risen Jesus face to face his response was 'My Lord and my God.' The question for each one of us is: 'What will you do with Jesus Christ?'


