The picture shows students from the Abingdon and Witney agricultural college (who own the cattle) having just herded the four cows and their calves up Akeman Street onto Stonesfield Common. They will stay on the Common until January. The UK has 34 native cattle breeds, of which 14 are rare. These cows are Whitebred Shorthorns. They are among the 14 and considered rare according to the Rare Breeds Survival Trust.

The breed originates from the border country in the North of England and is a good choice for upland land management. They require little supplementary feeding, so are ideal for overwintering on the rough grazing of Stonesfield Common. The breed are considered to be docile, good mothers, and easy to manage.

When cattle are allowed to graze freely they select different plants, and even different parts of the plant, to nibble or browse. Over time, this selective eating by the animals creates a varied structure within the plants and the habitat. It is this that helps create the right conditions for a wide range of plants, insects, birds, reptiles, and mammals to exist. The weight of the cows ensures that flower seeds are pressed into the soil by their hooves, which will help germination in the spring.

These cattle are helping us manage the Common to maintain and enhance its Site of Special Scientific Interest status. I hope you'll visit the cows and be sure to follow the rules that are posted on the gates.

West Oxfordshire District Council

The Government has launched a new payment for those on low incomes who are unable to work while self-isolating.

West Oxfordshire District Council will be processing applications and making payments to those who:

- Have been told to stay at home and selfisolate by NHS Test and Trace, either because they have tested positive for coronavirus or have recently been in close contact with someone who has tested positive
- Are employed or self-employed
- Are unable to work from home and will lose income as a result
- Are currently receiving Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, income-based Employment and Support Allowance, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Housing Benefit and/ or Pension Credit.

Those who meet the criteria, and have been provided with an eight-character account reference from the NHS Test and Trace Service, will be eligible for a one-off payment of $\pounds 500$.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

Election of Chair and Vice Chair

Following Cllr Brown's resignation as Chair, Cllr P McArdell was unanimously voted in as Chairman.

Cllr M Heduan and Cllr D Brown stood for the role of Vice Chair. Cllr David Brown was elected as Vice Chair following a majority vote amongst councillors.

Stockey Woods

It was reported that Sustainable Stonesfield are pursuing getting village green status for Stockey Woods. The majority of parish councillors agreed that this was an important asset that we do not want to lose as a parish.

White Horse community pub

Representatives from the community pub group attended the parish meeting. Lots of discussion was had.

We were advised that the business plan and prospectus is almost complete and the group hopes that by the time this *Slate* is published the shares will be available to purchase. The business plan is a work in progress, but has been shared with the parish council.

The group confirmed that they are not asking the parish council to subsidise the pub, but discussions around the parish council taking a public works order loan were had. Concerns from the parish council regarding the loan were raised, as this would mean a likely increase in precept (council tax), and a direct cost to

the taxpayer in the village, if we took this on.

Cllr McArdell reminded the group that two months ago, when this was first discussed, it was made clear by the group that they required grants only and a parish council grant of £4,000 was given to the community pub group on this basis. We were advised that no further funding investments from the parish council would be requested. Last month, the public works order loan was floated again, which caused concern. Some councillors felt that the share offer allows members of the public to contribute, if they wish. Concerns were raised regarding the business case of the pub.

Cllr Baldwin was in support of the parish council financing some of the costs needed for the pub. He added that the group have not yet been able to have a structural survey. He felt the parish council should help keep it going. All other councillors were against supporting the pub group further from a parish council financial perspective. A vote was taken and councillors agreed not to pursue looking into ways of supporting the pub group financially any further. (Majority vote 7:1 against pursuing financial support.)

All councillors wished the pub great success and look forward to updates and seeing the share offer.

Reports from councillors

Cllr Brown asked Cllr Hudspeth if there are any proposals to look at the A40 following the terrible accident this week. Cllr Hudspeth explained there is funding for a bus lane on the A40, but not for making the road a duel carriageway. The District awaits the report following the accident. Safety can then be considered once the cause is known, if appropriate.

Cllr Bishop complimented the work of those working throughout COVID-19.

Cllr Heduan raised concern with 1 Farley
Lane planning application which was
discussed at a previous meeting with Cllr
Bishop. This property received approval for
planning (6 dwellings in the office
building) despite numerous objections and
concerns regarding the build, and asked for
feedback on this regarding the decision at
WODC. Cllr Bishop advised that people can
write to the District, but members of the
public cannot appeal the decision. The vote
at WODC was unanimous in favour of the
build.

Cllr Baldwin asked Cllr Bishop about how many emails he had received in support of the community pub. Cllr Bishop said he had received 75, but none expressing support of the parish council funding the pub.

Other business

The parish council agreed to pay 50% of the cost of servicing the church clock and also £200 towards churchyard grass cutting.

Cllr Lawrence confirmed that the defibrillator has been checked and the batteries are working. As a reminder, it is positioned just outside the Village Hall. Cllr Brown reported that Phil Martin is stepping down from the scouts. The scouts have plans for the build of the new hut and are out to tender. The fundraising is not as active at the moment while the community pub is fundraising, but the group would welcome any donations.

Cllr Baldwin advised that Stonesfield Mutual Aid is still active and explained that they still had some funds and that goodwill in the community is still there. If anyone is in real hardship the fund will assist them. Cllr Baldwin thanked those who helped previously for all of their support and councillors echoed this, and also thanked Cllr Baldwin for his work with Stonesfield Mutual Aid.

Cllr Gould noted that the flu clinics at the Village Hall went well.

Blenheim Estate

The Parish Council would like to say thank you to Roy Cox, Nick Bainbridge and team at Blenheim Estate for providing logs to block a gate in Stonesfield for us. Supplied and delivered free of charge after the parish clerk requested assistance.

Stockey Woods campaign

The County Council has appointed an independent inspector to hear the application to make Stockey Woods a village green, which is being contested by the Blenheim Estate. The public inquiry will start on 26 January and last up to eight days.

Sustainable Stonesfield, supported by the Parish Council, are fighting to get the woods declared a village green to ensure in perpetuity that residents of Stonesfield can roam throughout the woods as they have done for generations. In order to assist our cause, we are using expert legal advice. A specialist barrister will represent us, but that understandably comes at a cost.

In the August *Slate*, we asked people if they would be willing to pledge money to help our campaign. The response was amazing. We have written to all those who pledged money asking them to send their donation now, because we know the date of the Public Inquiry and need to instruct our Barrister.

From our District Councillor

Business is slowly returning to some semblance of normality, in these abnormal times utilising abnormal techniques. Webex and Zoom enable Council business to be enacted satisfactorily, although one important planning meeting had to be cancelled part way through because of a 'glitch'.

The District Council has updated its flood procedures and flood defence procurement contracts. It is hoped that this will help with any anticipated flood difficulties in future.

A new and comprehensive Equality Policy has been agreed. The Equality Act 2010 compels local authorities to comply with the Public Sector Equality Duty. This protects people from discrimination on the following bases:

Race; Disability; Gender; Gender reassignment; Sexual orientation; Marriage and civil partnership; Age; Religion and belief; Pregnancy and maternity.

The Act also specifies that public bodies must review and publish updated policies every four years. The West Oxfordshire policy also incorporates a clear definition of anti-Semitism which demonstrates a clear intention that no one should be treated unfairly.

In its report on revenue currently assessed for the budget, it was noted that our Budget position has been adversely affected by the pandemic to the tune of £1.8million.

Much time and effort has been expended by the whole Council and particularly its officers on the new Government White Paper - Planning for the Future; Pillar One - Planning for Development. This Government initiative has by no means attracted widespread support. As a result of criticisms by elected councillors, and the objections of our planning officers, a lengthy and comprehensive response has been drafted. This document is far too long and detailed to be easily summarised here, but suffice it to say, the District Council has raised a plethora of objections and suggestions in its response to Central Government. It is felt that, if the document were to be translated into law, vast tranches of the country, particularly in the southern part of England, would be obliterated under a sea of concrete. Also, the general effect would not alleviate the perceived housing need especially in the 'affordable' sector.

Plans for the Eynsham Garden Village, to be named Salt Cross, are being constructively developed. These plans are in conjunction with a comprehensive review of the necessary infra-structure and a transport strategy.

All this work is in addition to the day-to-day activity of a District council, and goes a long way to proving that the COVID-19 disaster has not shut down the business of looking after our residents and caring for their welfare. In this context, I should like to compliment all our officers, whether working in the office or at home, for their

dedication and enthusiasm. Especially for the considerable success in alleviating the hardship, both financial and social, caused by the difficult times in which we all live.

Much good wishes to you all – keep well and make as much happiness around you as you can.

The rise in confirmed COVID-19 cases is a fast-moving situation. On-going discussions are taking place locally, regionally, and nationally as regards the number of COVID-19 cases and a very close eye is being kept on trends and data. We will be ready to respond in terms of how any new system affects Oxfordshire.

For now, work continues with partners to send increased and targeted communications that call on people to follow preventative measures and government guidance so we can contain the situation and reduce the rate of infection. We need everyone to take responsibility for their own actions as families, individuals, colleagues, and neighbours. The only way we can drive down the number of COVID-19 cases is through collective action on the part of people.

COVID Secure team

To help ensure Government safety rules are being applied, a new COVID Secure team is now operating across Oxfordshire. Funded by Oxfordshire County Council's NHS Test and Trace grant, and delivered jointly across all Oxfordshire councils, the team's aim is to work with and support businesses to help them comply with the

rules and guidance that apply to them and to ensure good infection control measures are in places which the public access.

A new local focused COVID-19 contact tracing system for Oxfordshire will be launched, designed to support and compliment the national system. It will provide another layer of support to help control the virus and #stopthespread. Collectively, Oxfordshire's six councils will work to contact people that the NHS test and trace national system is unable to reach. People contacted will be advised to isolate, talked through how to access local support when isolating, and asked about details of their close contacts so these can then be followed up by the national team. The service will run seven days a week with calls coming from the council using a local (01865) phone number. Text messages will also be sent to people with mobile phones telling them to expect a call.

- The NHS COVID-19 app is available.
 Please download it if you can. The more people who use the app, the more we can keep each other safe and stop infection rates rising.
- If you have COVID symptoms, you must isolate for at least 10 days and get a test.
 Do not wait for a test or test result before self-isolating.
- The main symptoms of coronavirus are a high temperature, a new continuous cough, and a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste. Most people with coronavirus have at least one of these symptoms.
- If you have at least one of these symptoms, you should book a test by calling 119 or registering online at

- www.gov.uk/get-coronavirus-test. It is essential you do not go to A&E asking for a test.
- If you do not have COVID symptoms, please do not book a test. You could be taking a test away from someone who really needs it, such as a key worker. This is increasingly important as we head into autumn and winter, when more people will get colds and the flu.
- If another member of your household has symptoms, you must self-isolate. But you should only get a test if you develop symptoms yourself. Further guidance on self-isolation is available.
- If you have been in close contact with someone who has coronavirus and have been asked to self-isolate, you should only get a test if you develop symptoms yourself.
- If you have been abroad and are in quarantine, you should only get a test if you develop symptoms.

If you are self-isolating or in quarantine, then a negative test result does not mean you can end isolation early. The virus can take time to develop and so a test early on does not prove that you will not go on to develop the virus – you could still be at risk of spreading the virus to other people.

Sally Wainwright OBE

How many of you knew that Sally Wainwright, recently honoured with an OBE for services to writing and television, lives in Stonesfield? I recently did a count up of the awards she has won for her writing (21 of them, including 5 BAFTAs). Add to that the OBE and the Freedom of Calderdale, which she was awarded in March. It is an impressive list.

Most people know Sally best as the creator and writer of Last Tango in Halifax, Happy Valley (she's writing the 3rd series right now), and Gentleman Jack (just about to start filming the 2nd series). Her list of credits is long and includes Scott and Bailey, To Walk Invisible, At Home with the Braithwaite's, The Amazing Mrs Pritchard, and many others. If you had asked Sally what she wanted to do as a young girl she would have said write, and by the age of nine she would have told you she wanted to write for Coronation Street.

Sally was born in Huddersfield in 1963 and brought up in Sowerby Bridge. She read English Literature at York University and achieved her ambition to write for *Coronation Street* in 1994 after writing for *The Archers*. She remained with the soap until 1999 when she left to focus on writing original work. *At Home with the Braithwaite's* was the result and was nominated for several awards. Sally never looked back.

Sally's connection to Stonesfield began when she was living in Hounslow in the 1980s and driving a London bus, while she made her first attempts to break into TV writing (she would later immortalise this in *Jane Hall*). She lived in a shared house with, among others, Austin Sherlaw-Johnson, whose family have lived in Stonesfield since 1970. They married in 1990 and moved to Stonesfield in 1991.

Sally quickly became involved with the Stonesfield Players, directing Jean Anouilh's *Antigone, Skirmishes* by Catherine Hayes, and several one act plays for them, including her own *The Wrong Parents*.

In 1994, she and Austin moved north and returned to Stonesfield in 2001 with their two sons, George and Felix. Once again, Sally found time to direct two very good productions for the Players: *Airswimming* by Charlotte Jones and *Di, Viv and Rose* by Amelia Bullmore, which featured the last performance by Jay Miller.

She also directed a forty-minute version of Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* with Year 6 at Stonesfield School.

Sadly, these days Sally is so popular as a writer, director, and producer for television that she hasn't been able to take on a big project for the Players, although she was one of the judges for their Lockdown Play Writing Competition earlier this year.

Since 2000, with the exception of two projects (*Shakespeare Re-Told* and *The Canterbury Tales*), she has created and written all her own work. She was a producer on most of them and directed

episodes on Last Tango, Happy Valley, and Gentleman Jack.

What next? Well, she has several exciting new potential projects in the pipeline, all being created in Stonesfield.

We are still looking for new governors to join us in this important and rewarding work, especially, but not exclusively, those with finance-based expertise, so please get in touch if you are interested.



Stonesfield Primary School

With pupils returning after lockdown, our twin priorities have been catching children up academically while supporting their mental health and wellbeing. Staff have worked tirelessly to adapt our normal curriculum to ensure children do not miss crucial elements of learning. We have also prioritised our Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) curriculum for all pupils, establishing new routines and giving children a common language to identify and share their feelings and emotions. Our highly regarded Forest School also gives our pupils much needed time outdoors, enjoying and learning in natural surroundings.

During this half term, we have also worked with a company called Evolve. Using their pupil survey, Wellbeing Compass, we collected baseline data for our pupils in years 1 to 6 on six dimensions of wellbeing. The results were fascinating. Our scores were above the national average for Physical Activity and Diet, and in line with the national average for Emotional Wellbeing, Personal Development, and Brain Health. The survey highlighted sleep as an area to focus on - the national picture is that lockdown has disrupted routines and the survey seemed to suggest that a number of children were not getting enough sleep, were easily distracted, and found concentration difficult. Using resources from The PSHE Association, all children have now had lessons on the importance of sleep and what a good bedtime routine is like. The survey also enabled us to identify children requiring targeted support. Evolve have worked with pupils in small groups aiming to develop their confidence, self-esteem, and resilience. Our Special Educational Needs

Coordinator (Senco), Mel Carruthers, is also providing pastoral and nurture support for other pupils.

We recognise that ensuring our pupils have strong mental health will not be a short term fix – this is a priority we are committed to in the long term: developing compassionate, resilient, emotionally intelligent citizens to make our village proud.

Local History: Glympton House

4 miles North West of Stonesfield

There was a manor house here by the 16th century, if not earlier, and since the present house stands very close to the medieval church, it was probably on this site, although nothing now survives that is earlier than the 18th century. John Cupper and his wife, Audrey Peyto, and their descendants owned the property from 1547 to 1632.

The Wheate family acquired the estate in 1633, the parish was enclosed in the late

17th century, and a deer park was created around the house. William Wheate and either he or one of his successors had the house remodelled later in the 17th century. By the early part of the 18th century it had an H-shaped plan with north and south courtyards, each flanked on three sides by wings of the house.

In the first half of the 18th century either Sir Thomas Wheate, 1st Baronet or Sir Thomas Wheate, 2nd Baronet had the house remodelled with a Georgian elevation of seven bays. By the early part of the 19th century the western range of the old house had been demolished. When the 2nd Baronet died without a male heir in 1746, the baronetcy passed to his brother Sir George Wheate, 3rd Baronet, but Glympton Park became the dower house of his widow, Mary.

George Henry Barnett, the nephew of Sir Jacob Wheate, 5th Baronet, inherited Glympton Park in 1846. In 1849, Barnett removed the east and west wings from the main front, re-faced the main front in Bath stone in mid-18th century style, and added an Italianate kitchen block on the east side. Barnett moved the main entrance to the west side and gave the new entrance a Tuscan porch. Glympton Park remained in the Barnett family until Benjamin Barnett sold it in 1944.

Alan Paul Good, the Anglo-Irish head of a successful engineering company, bought the house in 1944 and had grand plans for remodelling it. Failing health compelled Mr Good to relinquish his position as managing director of the Brush-ABOE group in 1952, and he died in South Africa in 1953 aged 46.

In the following years, the house had a number of owners, some for very short periods. For example, in 1988 Alan Bond, an Australian businessman, purchased Glympton, but was forced to sell a year later when his business empire collapsed.

Glympton Park's current owner is a trust created by Prince Bandar of Saudi Arabia. Prince Bandar bin Sultan, former Saudi ambassador to the US, bought the estate in 1992. Prince Bandar has transformed the house and estate since that date, buying another 500 acres of land and various houses within the estate, including the old rectory and Ludwell farm cottages. He has reconstructed the house, laying out new gardens, replanting the park, establishing a pheasant shoot, and developing the farm.

Help feed our farmland birds

Ever seen a Yellow Hammer or a flock of Linnets? These glorious farmland birds are disappearing, so our charity and its many volunteers provide supplementary feed from November to May to reduce their decline.

Some 'red-listed' species are familiar 'farmland' birds such as House Sparrows and Skylarks, but many people are unaware of the challenges they face. Even species such as Chaffinches started to decline in 2012. So it's never been more important to act now and do all we can to conserve these precious specialist birds.

Remember Bird Aid? We have now relaunched as Farmland Bird Aid Network, an independent charity. Our hope is to help see thriving populations of farmland birds in our countryside, able to support themselves naturally. In addition to feeding wheat, millet, and rapeseed daily, we recommend:

- Boosting seed food by providing uncut areas, a wide mix of crops, stubbles or seed-rich wild bird cover crops
- Creating thick, thorny nesting cover in hedges or by retaining areas of scrub, gorse or brambles
- Cutting hedgerows on rotation every three to five years

We now have over 20 sites across West Oxfordshire — many near Stonesfield. We are looking for a few more volunteers to help us feed once a week or fortnightly. You could help at Southill Solar Farm or Kingswood Break — both beautiful sites, a short cycle or drive from Stonesfield.

An Englishwoman from New York

Blenheim Art Foundation has a solo exhibition of the British artist, Cecily Brown, running until 3 January 2021. This is composed entirely of new works created in response to the Palace.

Cecily Brown was born in London, studied at the Slade School of Art and then moved to New York in 1994 where she continues to work. She is credited as a central figure in the resurgence of painting at the turn of the millennium.

The exhibition includes a series dedicated to the hunt and a number of battle paintings that evoke Blenheim's military history. The exhibition closes with Brown's largest painting to date, titled *The Triumph of Death*. It was painted in four parts that were assembled for the first time onsite at Blenheim Palace. Completed in 2019, the work offers a poignant and prescient visualisation of a society in crisis.


80th Anniversary of Blenheim Palace's Top-Secret WWII Spy Role

Blenheim Palace is celebrating the 80th anniversary of its top-secret wartime role as the headquarters of MI5. In 1940, the birthplace of Sir Winston Churchill became the temporary location of Britain's secret intelligence agency, after its London offices were destroyed in the Blitz.

A series of pre-fabricated huts were set up outside the Palace, the Great Hall was filled with filing cabinets, and the Long Library became a typing pool. Part of the Palace's upper floor was also transformed into a communications centre, which included a translation service and reference library. As many of the records held in London had been lost, the work done at Blenheim to rebuild their intelligence documents was so vital to the country's wartime role, Churchill would call on virtually a daily basis to see how things were progressing. He reportedly also sent chocolates and cigars when specific projects were completed, and visited the site on at least one occasion.

Security surrounding the estate was extremely high and staff, who were mainly women and mostly staying at Keble College in Oxford, were dropped off by bus at the Woodstock gate entrance to Blenheim where their passes were checked. They were then transported up to the Palace, where they were checked a second time before heading into the Palace's Great Court, through a third checkpoint.

Antonia Keaney, Blenheim Palace's social historian said, 'Everyone who worked at Blenheim Palace during this time was sworn to secrecy, and many of the staff did not speak about their vital roles to anyone. We were fortunate enough to interview some of the ladies for an archive several years ago, and some of them had only recently revealed what they did during the war to family and friends. One of the women said if the Germans had ever found out we had lost virtually every possible contact for their spies, we would have undoubtedly lost the war.'



One of the last surviving former MI5 staff members is 95-year-old Cynthia Boot, who was just 17 at the time, and too young to join the Forces. Even today, very few people are aware of her secret wartime role. 'We had to sign the Official Secrets Act, and after that we never said where we worked, we always just said we worked near Oxford,' said Cynthia. 'We were allowed to say we were at the War Office,



but we weren't allowed to say what we did, what we saw, or how anything worked.'

MI5 did not leave Blenheim immediately the war ended as they had nowhere to go. The Palace was not officially handed back to the Marlborough family until 1948.

Stonesfield Gardening Club Front garden 'lockdown' project

We always liked the circular bed in Bob and Nel Hain's front lawn, but once we moved in, we wanted to give it a more allyear-round interest.

After nearly 11 years of thinking about it — on and off — we agreed on a knot-garden design that would give some structure through winter and more planting space to put seedlings and cuttings produced in the greenhouse every spring. With no idea of what was about to happen throughout the world, we started measuring up in late February.

We removed the turf and stacked it in pieces tidily out of the way, dug up the bulbs and sorted them ready for putting back later: aconites, snowdrops, crocus, anemones, hyacinths, tulips, and dahlias. By the end of March, we had put in the edging around the new bigger circle and marked out the design with box hedging (finished off mid-April, despite lockdown restrictions, when more plants were delivered).

After a fair bit of watering and bulb replanting, the hedge had its first clip and the home grown flowering plants could go in. Reclaimed bricks went around the edge, but it took a while for us to decide on pebbles to fill the remaining gaps; these were delivered and moved via the wheelbarrow into final position in mid-June.



This is not at all how I was told to design a garden; instead of clearing everything out and starting afresh, it has evolved over time with input from all the family – much more fun! Many thanks to all the passersby for your words of encouragement from a safe two metres away over the hedge.

Having enjoyed looking out over the colourful display through the summer, at the end of September, many of the flowers are fading away, but the hedging now has space to get growing! The project has provided a focus of normality for us whilst school and work were disrupted and I really appreciate how lucky we are.

Parish letter

November is traditionally a time for remembering and remembrance – we remember and give thanks for those who gave their lives for us in war, and we also remember family and friends who have died and are no longer with us. Our services on 8 November, as detailed at the end of this letter, provide a means of doing this corporately.

Remembering can be a useful launch pad for taking stock, assessing where we 'are' now in our lives, and looking forward.

As we think ahead and consider the ups and downs of life, the challenges so many of us face, and also the opportunities for change, new priorities and appreciation of all that is good, perhaps the prayer below will be helpful. It was written by the Scottish theologian John Baillie and

originally published in 1936 in his book: *A diary of private prayer*.

Teach me, O God, to use all the circumstances of my life today that they may bring forth in me the fruits of holiness rather than the fruits of sin.

Let me use disappointment as material for patience.

Let me use success as material for thankfulness.


