Vaccinations are under way...

The news that the first local people – those over 80 – are now receiving their COVID-19 vaccinations is undoubtedly the best news for a very long time.

In Stonesfield we are unusual in that residents have a choice of three local GP surgeries. At the time of writing (mid-January), the most elderly patients are being given their vaccinations not at the surgery itself, but at regional centres.

Patients who normally go to Charlbury surgery are being invited to Carterton Health Centre and Woodstock patients are going to Islip Village Hall. The first Long Hanborough patients went to the Windrush Health Centre, Witney, but vaccinations are starting at the surgery itself (although please note that these arrangements may change again). It is expected that vaccinations will be given at the other surgeries as soon as that is possible.

As well as the special priority groups like those in care homes and the frontline workers, all three surgeries are working progressively from the most elderly, downward through the age tiers according to the Government's vaccination rollout plan.

The GP surgeries are contacting eligible people directly to invite them for vaccination. They are all asking people **NOT to contact** the surgeries to ask when their appointment will be available. If you need transport for your vaccination, please see the article on the Stonesfield Voluntary Transport Scheme, this issue, page 4.

Covid news: Stay at Home

Since 6 January, in accordance with the law, you must stay at home. You may only leave your home for the following reasons:

- To shop for food and necessities, for yourself or a vulnerable person.
- To go to work if you are a key worker, critical to national infrastructure or absolutely cannot work from home.
- To seek medical assistance or avoid risk or harm. This includes fleeing domestic abuse.
- Attend education or childcare, for key workers, key workers in training, and vulnerable children.
- Exercise once a day. This can be done with your household or one other individual. You should not leave your local area.
- To provide support, care or assistance to a vulnerable person, or to your support/ childcare bubble.

All schools will be shut from Tuesday 5 January. Vulnerable children and children of key workers should continue to attend school. Children receiving free school meals will continue to receive these during lockdown. More devices will be provided to support online learning.

You cannot meet other people socially indoors, unless you live with them or are part of a support bubble.

This is not an exhaustive list. Please see the official guidance at www.gov.uk/ coronavirus where you can find the rules in full.

I know how difficult this lockdown will be for so many. Please let me assure you this was an absolute last resort, as it should have been. However, if we do not act now, there is a real risk of the NHS being overwhelmed, as reflected by the Covid Threat Level rising to 5. We now all have a collective responsibility to do what we can to protect the NHS and save lives.

Woodstock Rd closure: 25-26 Feb 2021

To facilitate carriageway patching works, OCC will close the Woodstock Road, from the war memorial up to just before the Combe turning, and impose a 'No Waiting' restriction.

The diversion will direct cars from the village to go through Combe and past the Akeman Street farm to rejoin the Woodstock Road beyond the roadworks.

The temporary closure will operate from 25 Feb from 9:30am to 3:30pm. The anticipated completion date is 26 Feb.

#backthewhitehorse Campaign Update



The community in Stonesfield and surrounding villages, as well as supporters from a number of countries around the world, enthusiastically backed our fundraising campaign to save The White Horse. We were able to open purchase negotiations in early December, but the selling agent notified the Stonesfield Community Pub committee on 12 January that the owner has decided to accept an offer from another party.

This was very disappointing news for everyone who has supported this campaign, particularly since the owner wrote to us last summer to say that he would sell to the community if we could meet his asking price. Thanks to the extraordinary generosity and goodwill of all our members, that is exactly what we did. We also met all his requirements during negotiations. This meant not only offering the full asking price, but also committing to complete the contract paperwork as quickly as possible and absorbing the significant building repair costs identified in our surveyor's report.

We do not know who the new owner is. We would very much welcome it if he or she opens The White Horse again to run as a proper village pub. If that is not their intention, we stand ready to discuss the possibility of still bringing it into community ownership or if needed to challenge vociferously any application to convert it into a residential property.

For now, our next steps are to try to make contact with the new owner to learn more about their plans. We thank everyone who has supported us so far and hope you will still back us as we continue to try to save our White Horse.

Community Face Covering Tree

As you know it's been a long journey for me with making face masks for the Stonesfield Community Face Covering Tree. It started with my Mum (85) having to visit the hospital and worrying about Covid, so I made her some masks. So, in June I was making Masks non-stop with any spare fabric I had and giving them away by hanging them outside on the 'Tree' (fence) outside my house. The line was replenished twice daily until October, people had kindly left donations of fabric, thread, elastic and money. I decided to donate all the money to NHS Oxfordshire Hospitals Charity (respiratory unit, Churchill Hospital).

Then in October, I had to slow down as I was exhausted, as I am also a 24/7 carer in my home and my family deserved more than ready meals every day. So, from October I started asking for donations of at least £2 per mask and only put them out on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Then in late November I introduced 'FESTIVE MASKS' which I did up until the last weekend before Christmas, then finally called it a day.

I had made over 3000 masks and had even been gifted some from other people. A total of £2,550.00 was sent off to the charity and today I received a lovely Thank you card and certificate from them, telling me that with Gift Aid we as a community had raised £2,932.50.



I can't thank you, the Community of Stonesfield and surrounding areas, enough. What an achievement we have done, making something out of this terrible time we are in.

Can't explain how doing all of this has made me feel, it's been a fantastic journey is all I can say. I have also received so many thank you cards, flowers and chocolates that it's been overwhelming and I'm not afraid to say I have shed a tear or two.

However, due to demand, masks are still available from my doorstep for a cash donation of your choice, just leave it in the Loyalty Box.

My fabric stash is now so big that my husband has fitted me up with a craft room (something I have wanted for 20 years, but never got around to doing), so no more donations of fabric please, though it has been wonderful with all the support received.

David Lines - my dear friend

2021 started with the sad news that David Lines died on New Year's Day morning. With great stoicism he'd been fighting prostate cancer for a number of years.

Over the years he lived in Stonesfield he contributed to many community organisations and activities. David would be the first to say that he didn't make much of his schooldays in London. He made up for what he lacked in formal qualifications throughout his life, eventually becoming a senior manager at the Halifax bank, then in OCC. He used his managerial abilities and his financial acumen when he became a Stonesfield Primary School governor. He brought the same skills to Cecily's Fund as a trustee, and to the village Tennis Club, successfully winning Lottery funding for a third tennis court.

David was an invaluable member of the Sustainable Stonesfield committee fighting the CALA planning application, analysing housing figures and ensuring our communications were to the point. Anyone present at the Public Inquiry will never forget his impassioned speech, cutting through the developers' legal and planning mumbo-jumbo and getting a rousing round of applause.

David loved his home county, Cornwall, although he was born over the Tamar in Plymouth. He had a passion for all things relating to the industrial revolution, especially Brunel, one of his great heroes. Coming from Plymouth, another hero was Drake, and throughout his life David sailed all sorts of different craft. I'm privileged to have sailed with him on numerous occasions. There was nothing so enjoyable as sailing across Plymouth Sound and up the Yelm to have a pub lunch before racing back home on a broad reach, or more frequently gently drifting back because the wind had dropped and putting the world to rights. He was good at that.

David got involved with the Stonesfield Players, initially helping build sets and doing the lighting, but then he adapted Nevil Shutes' No Highway, performed as a radio play in the St James Centre to great acclaim. This started a whole new activity for him – writing. The next radio play, The Shadow of the Desert, was his own work showing another hero of his, Lawrence of Arabia, during his time in Plymouth after the war. At the end of last year he finished writing another radio play with Rebecca Sherlaw-Johnson, In Our Defence, to be performed later this spring in his memory as an online radio play.

Finally another of David's heroes, this time musical – Stan Getz. David was a great lover of jazz and for him there was only ever one saxophonist – Stan – despite me suggesting other sax players were available. So, it was no surprise that David took up playing the sax. He played regularly with The Village Idiots, and many will have fond memories of him playing and MC'ing at the Septembeerfest.

This is my personal reminiscence of David, but many others will also regard him as a great friend, he was that kind of chap. Stonesfield will miss him – he was happy to chat to anybody and everybody and lend a helping hand – so generous. Our thoughts are with Jenny, his sons Andy and Jonathan, and his grandchildren.

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Very nearly a prize...

Definitely a prize - an OBE!

A newcomer to Stonesfield, John Liversidge (a retired police officer) has been awarded an OBE for his extensive work for Thames Valley Partnership in supporting victims of domestic abuse. Here are some details of the work he's been involved with:

The TecSOS project, part of Vodafone's 'Mobiles for Good' initiative, is active in almost every police force across the UK and in several countries overseas. The technical device behind it, supplied to high-risk victims of domestic abuse, provides an immediate response in times of crisis and emergency.

John and his team developed the Bright Sky App to provide advice and support to victims of various types of abuse (e.g. domestic abuse, sexual abuse, forced marriage). The App is available to download for free and enables victims, or those concerned for potential victims, to identify their risk and find local help and support. The TecSOS device has been provided to over 20,000 people in the UK alone, with almost every activation meaning a life is saved.

Thames Valley Police

... has issued a warning to motorists following an increasing number of thefts of catalytic converters. These contain precious minerals from which criminals are profiting. Offenders most commonly target parked Toyota Prius, Toyota Auris, Honda Jazz, Honda Civic, Honda CRVs and Lexus RX400 vehicles. There are a number of steps you can take to try to protect your vehicle's catalytic converter:

- If it's bolted on, have the bolts welded shut
- If parking in a car park, try to park against a wall and/or not at the end of a row
- At home, park in a locked garage or as close to your property as possible
- Mark the converter with a forensic marker.

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Please speak to your vehicle's manufacturer to establish what locks and guards are available.

Road safety

I have become increasingly concerned by the behaviour of everyone using our village roads and the attitude of some relating to other users. Everyone has a right to use the roads equally under the law. However, that does not override the duty of care and common sense which keeps us all safe, nor does it override common courtesy for others. There seems be a dangerous attitude of self-entitlement emerging that will most likely lead to accident, incident and injury. I really hope no worse... Drivers, cyclists, walkers and other road users need to modify their behaviour to manage risk for themselves and others.

Having been a villager for many years, I have driven, cycled, motorcycled, walked, ran and stumbled on these roads; there is now a very different environment from when I arrived. The increase in houses and people has changed the environment, with increased traffic and little investment in infrastructure, all leading to a sharp increase in risk.

All I ask is for greater consideration for others and especially that everyone takes responsibility for their own behaviour and safety. There is no comfort in blaming others, after being injured or worse, when you can manage your own risk. We all want a safer Stonesfield – for that, we must all take responsibility for ourselves.

Stonesfield Playing Field Association CIO – Tractor Appeal

The playing fields in Stonesfield are managed by the above charity run by local trustees and volunteers. The facilities are extremely well utilised, hosting the Strikers and the men's football and cricket clubs.

The tractor that is used for ground maintenance was donated many years ago and has done fantastic service. However it is now over 50 years old and lacks a cab which make winter use a test of endurance. The trustees have therefore decided to look for a replacement and have been advised that a reasonable budget would be in the region of £24,000.

The charity's financial position is not such that it can make this purchase out of its own funds, although through a combination of grants and own reserves the trustees have currently raised £14,000 towards the likely cost.

Stonesfield Parish Council

From the January meeting

Cllr Hudspeth circulated his report ahead of the meeting. He also discussed the drive to push for 20mph on some of our roads, including Stonesfield. The SAFER team have also pushed for 20mph limits.

The Covid situation is rapidly changing; we are currently in a national lockdown. The vaccine is being rolled out – see front page for details. **People must wait for the surgeries to contact them.**

Legal – It was agreed that we would push through the land transfer to the Playing Fields Association. We are trying to get that done as soon as possible.

Precept / Budget – The budget was circulated for 2021/22 ahead of the meeting. Councillors considered an increase to the precept following the finance committee meeting in December. Cllr Baldwin opposed the precept figure on the basis the increase should be higher. All other councillors voted in favour of the increase. The precept (budget) will increase to £33,993 per year. This equates to approximately a 5% increase per Band D property.

It was noted that there was excess surface water in the Ridings Close. The clerk has contacted 'Fix my street'.

Criminal damage on Ollie Stobo's land – The PCSO has had damage reports. Councillors would like to meet him on site when Covid permits. Members of the public are reminded to keep to footpaths.

Cllr David Baldwin reported that Stonesfield Mutual Aid ran the reverse advent calendar programme which was very successful (40 boxes donated). Thanks to the village for their contributions. Separately, some fundraising and gifts were gathered and given out, distributed along with approx. 50 food parcels from the Chippy Larder. People really needed these and it went very well. Approx. £400 worth of £50 emergency grants were also given during the Christmas period. More people will need to be supported ongoing.

Cllr David Brown advised that David Lines has sadly passed away. This is a big loss to the village. Our condolences are with his family.

Other news from the Parish Council:

Loneliness – Do you know your neighbours?

There are many people within our area who live alone and may be lonely. That's not to say that everyone who lives alone is lonely of course. Many people who live alone have great friendships and social connections. Some do not and some people in a busy household can sometimes feel lonely. Some people are very scared of the whole Covid situation and may appreciate a friendly chat. Please look out for people who may be lonely or scared and if you cannot help please contact Stonesfield Mutual Aid so that we can make contact with them (confidentially) to check they are OK.

If you are able to help, starting a conversation could make all the difference. You can knock on the door and stand back (due to Covid), telephone or pop a note through their door.

We can provide advice and small emergency grants if you find yourself unable to meet an essential bill. Do not delay contacting if you need help, don't think you do not deserve help. Lots of people who are normally OK are finding themselves in temporary need. MANY people in the parish and surrounding areas are struggling as the Covid situation continues. West Oxfordshire news

Broadband: More than 10,000 rural homes and businesses in West Oxfordshire now have access to ultrafast full-fibre internet, providing them with some of the fastest broadband speeds in the world. This milestone for the District has been delivered by rural broadband provider Gigaclear, in partnership with WODC and the Government's broadband agency Building Digital UK (BDUK). Many of these properties were part of the **Connecting West Oxfordshire Project** which has seen WODC and BDUK invest £3.1m between them with Gigaclear adding a further £5m. The remainder were delivered by Gigaclear commercially.

Hanborough Station: WODC's Cabinet approved the £15,000 funding which will come from the unallocated Housing and Planning Delivery Grant and will be used to match-fund a £15,000 contribution from Oxfordshire County Council. The aim is to see a range of improvements introduced to boost its importance as a key transport hub, reducing pressure on the A40. The Hanborough Station Sub-group, part of the North Cotswold Line Task Force, is hoping for additional trains between Hanborough and Oxford.

An NHS Covid-19 testing centre has been built in Witney to improve support for residents. The building is situated in the Woodford Way car park and is expected to remain for at least three months. The site will operate from 8am-8pm. It means that around 80 longstay car-parking places will be out of action. However, all short-term parking will remain in place for shoppers. Alternative long-stay parking is available on levels 7 and 8 of the nearby Marriott's Walk multi-storey car park and Zone G of the Woolgate car park, while the Council will make provision for an additional 75 long-stay car parking spaces at its Woodgreen and Elmfield offices.

Electric vehicle charging points: Six car parks across the District will be part of the first phase of the Oxfordshire Park and Charge project. They will provide a total of 35 charging points capable of charging 70 vehicles. Installation work is expected to start in the spring with the project set for completion by the summer. The car parks set to install charging points are Woodford Way, Witney; Back Lane, Eynsham; Black Bourton Road, Carterton; Hensington Road, Woodstock and New Street, Chipping Norton. WODC will also create five charging points at its offices in Woodgreen, Witney.

From our District Councillor

Another and even stricter lockdown! Absolutely necessary as the infection figures are rising and the death rate is breath-taking. But not all gloom and despondency - Covid-19 vaccinations have started to roll out in our two villages. At the time of writing, 9 January, the Woodstock surgery team is hard at work in Islip injecting patients from its surgery lists who are elderly and deemed vulnerable. Reports I have received today congratulate the teams for their efficiency, speed and welcoming atmosphere. Having experienced it myself, I can only endorse these comments. Well done all of you at Woodstock Surgery!

WODC has urged local businesses to be patient with regard to the grants available as a result of the lockdown. So far, some £1,059,264 has gone out to 642 businesses in our area. A further £38,340 has been given to 45 pubs which have suffered closures. Now, because of the latest restrictions, businesses in the retail, hospitality and leisure field can claim a one-off grant of up to £9,000 per property. Although a goodly proportion of this money comes from central government, an unexpectedly large amount has been culled from West Oxfordshire's reserves. That this is possible is primarily due to the good housekeeping policies of the Conservative majority's policy of wise and considerate local government. One only has to look at Northampton's plight to see the dangers of excessive expenditure without wise investment. Our District Council has managed to preserve all services without loss and maintained all grant facilities for our residents.

Council is in the process of publishing a revised affordable housing planning document which will go out for public consultation shortly. The consultation period will last for 6 weeks.

Preparations for the Budget for 2021/2022 are progressing apace. Hopes are high that all facilities and opportunities for our residents will be fully maintained for the coming year.

May I, on behalf of all my colleagues and friends on the Council, wish you all well in the coming days. Life will not be as we know it, nor as we would wish it to be, but I know that in the final analysis we will pull through. We must all hunker down and follow the national guidelines. This will add as much strength to the fight against this horrid disease as possible and will ensure that the wonderful work done by our scientists is successful.

Keep strong, keep safe and keep smiling.

Oxfordshire County Council

Our partnership with NHS Test and Trace has been improving through the autumn. I will continue to lobby to have real time information so that we can reduce the spread of the virus at an earlier stage. OCC is working with the local NHS team and City/District colleagues to manage how the vaccine will be administered to residents across the county. I would like to caution, however, that even after the rollout of the vaccine is underway, the threat from COVID-19 still remains real. We are therefore continuing to underline the need for people to follow protective measures to minimise the risk. These include washing your hands, covering your face and increasing ventilation in enclosed settings, and maintaining a social distance from others where possible.

We are in the process of setting the budget to go before Full Council 9 February.

The parking situation in Woodstock needs to be addressed, I will work with the Town Council, District Council and other key partners to find a solution. This is not just about the centre of Woodstock as there is displacement parking on other local roads, with visitors to Blenheim also parking in and around Brook Hill and Old Woodstock. All these areas need to be considered if there is to be more enforcement. The solution will not be easy and will not please everybody, but the current situation is not sustainable.

Nature Notes

Redwings and Fieldfares

These birds are two beautiful thrushes. We see them as primarily wintering birds but they are also very rare breeding birds in the UK.

On still clear autumn nights during migration, Redwing calls can be heard in varying numbers heralding the onset of winter.

Our wintering Fieldfares are from Scandinavia, Finland or north west Russia. Redwings that breed from Scandinavia to east of the Ural Mountains winter widely in Western Europe.

Cold spells can see them move into gardens where apples placed on bushes, hedges or on the ground near cover can see them returning daily until the weather eases. It is also worth noting that the Blackbirds you see in the garden feeding on those same apples may have come from Norway and the Baltic region.

Bird migration is a truly amazing thing.

Winter Wildlife Tips


Winter flowering shrubs such as viburnums, lonicera and mahonia provide vital nourishment for bumble bees and other pollinators. Hollow stalks like sage, dead nettle, allium, fennel, goldenrod will be home to insect eggs and larvae during the winter so don't tidy them out of your garden. Wood piles are important habitats for beetles and other insects that are the bottom of the food chain and scrubby areas of the garden provide refuge for small mammals and amphibians who need shelter from predators (especially cats).

In general, if you maximise the biodiversity of your garden, you will have a healthy predator/prey web which means that the critters you don't want around (e.g. aphids) will be taken care of by their natural predators (e.g. parasitic wasps). If you use chemicals to kill aphids, the wasps will be killed too.

Looking ahead to the spring, your lawn doesn't need to be carpet-perfect (unless you are a bowling or golf club!). If you leave the moss it will keep the moisture in your lawn so you don't have to water it so often. If you don't cut it so short and allow clover, daisies and dandelions to flourish you will be providing welcome food for pollinators.

Cabaret Mechanical Marvels

27 February – 18 April

An exhibition featuring modern automata with intricate mechanisms and humorous scenes celebrates the fascinating world of the automata and showcases exhibits from some of the UK's finest contemporary automata makers.

The collection illustrates the creative interplay between simple mechanisms and skilled craftsmanship. Each automata is a masterpiece of creative thought and execution as the cams, gears, cranks, and other simple machines combine in a moveable sculpture that moves a character through a short, often humorous, story.

Containing hands-on interactives, pushbutton electrically operated automata, original artefacts, video footage of the automata artists at work, and visitor workshop programmes, this exhibition is a fun-filled educational entertainment for all.

Local history: Kiddington Hall 4 miles North West of Stonesfield

Kiddington Hall is a large Grade II listed manor house built in 1673, and in the 18th century Capability Brown laid out the gardens.

The hall and its adjoining orangery are listed Grade II on the National Heritage List for England, and Kiddington Park is also listed Grade II on the Register of Historic Parks and Gardens.

The house is built of pale, honey-coloured Cotswold stone. The entrance and staircase lead to five main reception rooms, a Rococo-style drawing room; a morning room; a richly decorated dining room with twin columns and carved marble fireplace; a library with its Neoclassical friezes; and a panelled billiards room that overlooks the gardens. The main 18th-century staircase leads to two bedroom suites, seven further bedrooms and three bathrooms on the first floor. The back stairs lead to the second floor and 10 attic rooms.

The Reverend Thomas Warton, a fellow of Trinity College, Oxford, who was rector of Kiddington for 20 years and poet laureate from 1785, pictures the coming of spring on the estate in his April Ode with 'swallows skimming the village green and rooks swarming in the oak trees round the manor house'. Estate owner Sir George Browne provided the real-life inspiration for 'Sir Plume of amber snuff-box justly vain' in Alexander Pope's The Rape of the Lock.

In 1840 the estate passed to Mortimer Ricardo, youngest son of the political economist David Ricardo. In 1850 he commissioned the architect Sir Charles Barry to remodel the house in his trademark Italianate architecture style, build a new stable courtyard adjoining the hall to the north, and create formal terraced gardens to the south and west, overlooking Brown's park. Barry rebuilt the house so completely that no external trace of the original building is visible. He also built a magnificent new stable courtyard adjoining the hall to the north and created formal terraced gardens to the south and west, overlooking Brown's park.

Beyond the Victorian orangery to the south, a gate leads to the square-towered 14th-century church of St Nicholas, where stained-glass windows commemorate the former High Sheriff of Oxfordshire Henry Lomax Gaskell and his wife, Alice, whose family lived at the Hall from 1855 to 1953.

In 1950 Lawrence Robson, founder of accountancy company Robson Rhodes, rented Kiddington Hall, and then bought it in 1953. On the death of Sir Lawrence in 1982, his son Maurice Robson, a City financier, inherited the house. In September 2009 Maurice placed the entire Kiddington Estate on the market for £42 million after the hall was at the centre of a bitter divorce battle between him and his wife Chloe.

Jemima Khan bought Kiddington Hall in Autumn 2010 for a reported £15 million. The property had nine bedrooms, five bathrooms, five reception rooms, an orangery and tennis courts and there are three further houses and cottages, a farm, woodland and lake on the estate. Since it was purchased it has undergone a major refurbishment.

The remainder of the estate, encompassing 1,600-acres plus several farms and houses was sold separately. The park encloses the Hall, gardens and pleasure grounds which are surrounded by pasture and woodland, with areas of meadow flowers added recently. There are clumps of mature trees and single specimens, including several mature cedars. The whole is dominated by the serpentine lake formed from the River Glyme. Part of a ha-ha survives, which runs south-east down to the lake from the main terrace. A further lake, formed in the mid-20th century, lies to the north of the footbridge across the north end of the main lake. The landscape park and its remaining features are undergoing sympathetic maintenance to what would appear to be Brown's design for the park.

Although footpaths run close to the house and lake, the house and grounds are not open to the public.

News from Blenheim Palace

Beehive: Blenheim Estate is building its own natural beehives to help protect dwindling colonies of wild bees on its 12,000-acre estate. Its Rural Team are creating the hives from wood from their timber stacks, many with rot or holes in, which mimic the types of sites wild bees would naturally choose to nest.

As a large estate, much of Blenheim's woodland and grassland has remained relatively untouched for centuries. This makes it a haven for native bee species, which can forage on the estate's extensive natural flora and wildflowers.

Bursary: A £50,000 Blenheim Bursary is available to all charities and organisations based within a 20-mile radius of the UNESCO World Heritage Site. Grants will focus on six main areas: wellbeing and outdoor activities, education, creation of green spaces, supporting community infrastructure, communal projects and charity work utilising outdoor spaces. The bursary scheme is part of Blenheim's ongoing commitment to more than double its charitable contributions to the community within 10 years.



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
