

It is now eight months since The White Horse was purchased by its current owner and the pub remains closed.

A locked gate has been installed to prevent access to the garden. A traffic cone placed to discourage entry to the courtyard. A sign erected to prohibit "unauthorised vehicles" from the car park. Cushions piled and blinds drawn to shield the interior from prying eyes. The building falls into disrepair. The garden is overgrown. Water has flooded the entrance hallway. The hanging wooden sign has rotted and fallen off, and slates are dropping from the roof.

As far as we are aware, no adverts have been posted for a tenant, for a manager or for bar staff; and the premises licence remains in the name of the previous owner. It is clear that The White Horse is unlikely to reopen in the foreseeable future under its current ownership.

Stonesfield Community Pub Ltd has emailed the current owner, Jonathan Bowers, on three occasions with an offer to purchase The White Horse from him on behalf of the village but, at the time of going to print, we have received no response.

We shall be holding a public meeting at the Stonesfield Village Hall, OX29 8HA, on **Saturday 2 October at 5pm** to discuss our options for securing the future of The White Horse for the benefit of the community.

Most successful Roman Villa open weekend

September 11 and 12 proved to be the North Leigh Roman Villa Volunteers' most successful open weekend to date. Saturday saw over 250 visitors to the mosaic, while Sunday achieved the highest attendance on a single day of 330 since the volunteer group started. This made for the busiest weekend at the Roman villa yet, over one third higher than the best previous weekend.

Among these visitors were 26 volunteer cleaners drawn from Friends of North Leigh Roman Villa, who helped Laura Mountford of English Heritage to clean and conserve the mosaic. One family party involved in cleaning said: "We all

thoroughly enjoyed helping clean the mosaic today and wanted to thank you for the opportunity to be involved".

In conversation with the dozen local volunteers staffing the site over the weekend, visitors remarked on the great opportunity to handle so many different Roman artefacts and added: "You've changed the way I think about the Romans." "Thank you for making these dry stones interesting."



This was possible because as well as North Leigh Roman Villa volunteers, the event welcomed volunteers from Tackley Local History Society. They helped set North Leigh villa in the wider Roman context of this part of Oxfordshire, and to provide details to visitors of the newly unearthed villa in Tackley, which has its own mosaic. Specialists from English Heritage were also present explaining artefacts and coins from the Roman era. The event also featured on Radio Oxford, via a live interview with John Perkins from the Tackley group.

Another first was the use of a contactless card terminal for donations, alongside cash donations. So far, in addition to the Blenheim Bursary award announced in the summer, visitors in 2021 have donated over £400 towards improving the site.

Cumulatively, since the North Leigh volunteer group began in the summer of

2019, more than 3,250 visitors have now seen the mosaics at the site.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

From the meeting held on 1 September:

It was noted that the posts at Blacks Gate have been installed by Blenheim. We understand these were installed for safety reasons.

Parish maintenance: Ian Hedges has started work on the fencing on the Common and he will look at fixing the kissing gates. Clive has also painted and repaired some of the benches.

SAFER: The parish council working group has enough funds to purchase the loaned SID and therefore further Parish Council funding is not needed. Contributions to funding have come from Stonesfield Garage, several residents as well as the County Councillor's priority fund.

Grants: Councillors agreed to approve a grant for the Playing Fields Association at £2,000.

SAFER

Purchase of second SID: Stonesfield residents have raised the £1,200 required to purchase the second Speed Indicator Device (SID), currently on loan. This included donations from David Miller of Stonesfield Garage and Cllr Andy Graham's priority fund, enabling the Parish Council to make the purchase of the SID.

The second SID has been on loan to SAFER from the supplier Morelock, a leading-edge traffic systems and signage company, since December 2020. The SAFER team regularly relocate both SID units, replenishing batteries and downloading speed data. This data forms part of a monthly report to the Parish Council. Securing the second SID unit, at a considerable discount, enables SAFER to continue providing feedback to drivers on their speed through the village and collect data on traffic volumes and excessive speeding.

The SAFER working group and Stonesfield Parish Council thank residents for their generosity and support enabling the continuity of operating two SIDs and helping us reduce excessive speeding in the village.

Long Hanborough PC Chair Visit:

Penelope Marcus, Chair of Long Hanborough Parish Council, met up with Mick Heduan and Paul Bates mid-August to find out about SAFER and Stonesfield's strategy to improve road safety in the village. Penelope has just taken over as Chair and wants to learn from the best practice achieved in Stonesfield. During her visit Penelope was given a demonstration of a SID and how they are used effectively to reduce speeding. Penelope is also planning to reduce the speed limit in Long Hanborough to 20mph and will be setting up speed surveys with OCC Highways to produce baseline data from which planning starts. SAFER will continue supporting Long Hanborough by sharing information and procedures as part of sharing road safety best practice in West Oxfordshire.



Village Travel Network: VTN project meetings resumed recently following a short break over the summer. During this period potential routes and track were identified by the original seven communities who are forming the network. I am pleased to announce that Fawler is joining the VTN project with the aim of improving cycle safety for students who attend school in Stonesfield and Woodstock. The VTN website www.vtn.org.uk has been launched and will contain maps of the agreed safe routes emerging from surveys and mapping work. If you know routes that could be used to link Stonesfield, Wootton, Glympton, Woodstock, Bladon, Long Hanborough, Combe and Fawler please send your suggestions to m.heduan@stonesfieldpc.uk.

Community Speed Watch resumes

(CSW): Thames Valley Police have announced that Community Speed Watch surveys can now resume operating within pre-pandemic procedures. SAFER is keen to get CSW off the ground again and are seeking volunteers to join our small team to run surveys in the village. We would normally run two to three surveys a month with each taking about ninety minutes. Thames Valley Police - changes to front counter provision

Thames Valley Police have made changes which affect front counter services across Buckinghamshire, Berkshire and Oxfordshire.

Thames Valley Police is working to adapt to the different ways in which people contact the police, to meet the changing needs of the diverse communities we serve and to make necessary savings. There will continue to be good geographic coverage of front counters across the Thames Valley if you need to access one.

The force is retaining front counters at Milton Keynes, Oxford, Reading, Slough, Aylesbury, High Wycombe, Abingdon, Banbury, Newbury, Loddon Valley and Maidenhead. There will be some changes to opening hours.

Front counters at Amersham, Bicester, Bracknell, HQ South in Kidlington, and Witney have now closed. These counters had been temporarily closed since March 2020 due to the global Covid-19 pandemic. If you usually attend one of these front counters, you will need to seek alternative ways of contacting us either online or by phone. You can access several of our services on www.thamesvalley.police.uk/.

Our non-emergency number is 101. In an emergency always dial 999.

Public Consultation

As advertised in the Oxford Times newspaper on Thursday 9 September 2021, Oxfordshire County Council is seeking your views on the proposal to introduce a 20mph speed limit throughout Stonesfield village, replacing the existing 30mph speed limit in its entirety.

The proposals are being put forward following road safety concerns raised by local residents and the Parish Council, with extensive local engagement carried out and traffic speed surveys undertaken at key points on the highway network in the area.

Details are available to view on the Council's new consultation portal www.letstalk.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ stonesfield20mph2021 at County Hall, New Road, Oxford, OX1 1ND between 9am and 4pm Monday to Friday.

Nature Notes: Scattered gold

'Thou humble flower with tattered leaves I love to see thee come and scatter gold.' John Clare 1832

The path into the garden is changing, our native flowers have been encouraged to grow. The unexpected stars have been a teasel, birds foot trefoil, an almost white meadow clary and a clump of flowers now about five-foot-tall partially blocking the way in. Initially getting past was easy, then the golden flowers came out attracting a myriad of insects from the neighbourhood both day and night.

The plant has been a native following the last ice age and is the national flower of the Isle of Man. Seven species of beetle, twelve species of fly, one macro moth and seven micro moths feed exclusively on ragwort.



Ragwort is a major source of nectar and pollen into the early autumn for thirty species of solitary bee, eighteen species of solitary wasp and thirty insect parasites. In all 177 species of insect visit ragwort for nectar and pollen. The problem is that ragwort can be poisonous if enough is eaten by grazing animals; for a horse to be

fatally poisoned it has to eat between 5 and 25 % of body weight. Living plants are very rarely eaten, it is the ragwort that gets into hay and forage that can be a problem. The seeds of ragwort are heavy and drop almost entirely around the plant. You can have ragwort plants on your land/garden but must take action if 'it poses a threat to the health and welfare of grazing animals and the production of feed and forage'

The project at Knepp estate, rewilding over 3500 acres for more than 15 years, has agreed with DEFRA to control ragwort on the fifty metres of land on its borders. They leave the ragwort to grow on the rest of the estate and the free ranging horses, cows, pigs and deer have had no cases of poisoning - check it out www.knepp.co.uk/home

We need to be mindful and careful with ragwort so it can scatter gold without harm.

Hot stuff

Chutney (*chatni* in Hindi) originated in India and can be traced back to around 500BCE, the word *chatni* meaning 'to lick'. During the period the British were in India, they brought the concept of chutney and curry back home and over time mango chutney came to be regarded as the 'standard British chutney'. However, it seems that the British may have been rather late in appreciating the delights of chutney - this method of preserving fruits and spices was adopted by the Romans so perhaps chutney was once a traditional element of Stonesfield cuisine!

Here are two alternatives to the 'standard' from 'Edible Gifts', a useful book by two

New Yorkers, Claire Clifton and Martina Nicholls, which was published in 1982.

Orange Chutney: This goes particularly well with soft white cheese and 'country' bread, and with cold roast chicken or other poultry.

4 large oranges; the juice of an orange; 2 large cooking apples; 4oz stem ginger in syrup; 4 tabs currants; 1 fresh chilli, chopped; 1oz salt; freshly ground black pepper; 12oz soft brown sugar; half a teacup of honey; white wine vinegar or cider vinegar to cover.

Peel the oranges, remove the pith and pips, slice the flesh and finely chop the peel. Core and chop the apples. Drain and chop the ginger. Put the oranges, apples, orange juice, ginger, currants, chilli, salt and pepper into a saucepan. Cover and simmer until the oranges are tender. Add a little more orange juice if the mixture seems to be drying out. Add the sugar and honey and sufficient vinegar to cover the fruit. Mix well and boil gently, stirring from time to time until the mixture thickens which should take about an hour. Ladle into sterilised jars and cap with plastic lined lids.



Yvonne's Hot Apple Chutney: This recipe was provided by someone called Yvonne(!) who grew up in South India. It is very hot and an ideal accompaniment for curries.

2lbs of Bramley or other cooking apples; 2 tabs salt; 1 whole head of garlic, peeled; a 1-inch piece of fresh ginger, peeled; 5floz vegetable oil; 2 tabs mustard seeds; 1 tsp fenugreek seeds; 15 peppercorns; 2 tsps cumin; 1 tsp chilli powder; 1 tsp turmeric; 3 or 4 fresh green chillies, seeded and chopped; 5floz vinegar; 16oz sugar.

Peel, core and slice the apples, sprinkle them with salt and set aside. Finely grate half the garlic and ginger and then finely slice the remainder. Heat the oil, put in all the ginger and garlic and fry until the garlic just starts to brown. Add the mustard and fenugreek seeds, peppercorns, cumin, chilli, turmeric and chillies. Fry gently for a few minutes and then add the apples, vinegar and sugar. Stir well and cook on a low heat for about 30 minutes. Cool and bottle.

Provided they are bottled and stored appropriately, chutneys will keep for several weeks so they are a good solution for surplus fruit and will be welcome gifts for 'foodie' friends.

An Outdoor Gym for All

We are very lucky in Stonesfield to have access to such a beautiful green space and facilities for football, cricket, tennis, and not forgetting the play park for the Under 12s. Coupled with the regular activities at the Sports and Social Club, it makes the playing fields a well-used and vital community hub. The Playing Field Committee drives to make improvements that benefit our whole community.

One of our committee members put forward a proposal that would benefit the health and fitness of all our residents; the provision of a 'free to use' outdoor gymnasium. A plan was hatched to start looking at equipment and funding options for the provision of an all-weather, multigenerational and multi-ability outdoor gymnasium for the 1,700 residents of Stonesfield, to be sited on the Playing Fields with open access for all residents

including children, older residents and those with additional needs.

Local Community Impact: Stonesfield residents have no immediate access to a gymnasium. Outdoor gymnasiums are hugely popular worldwide, they promote good fitness and well-being for the whole community. Not only do they improve fitness, they can reduce crime, anti-social behaviour and strengthen community links through activity. Outdoor fitness equipment is perfect for parks and green spaces. There are 3 core exercise types vital to the health of the community: cardiovascular, strength training, stretching / flexibility. It provides so much more than just a 'free to use' fitness solution.

Park gym equipment can be used free by young people, adults, seniors, people with disabilities, personal trainers and bootcamps. It offers a full body workout



with a range of equipment to get the heart rate up and your muscles working.

Teams benefit from access to an outdoor gym near playing fields. They can warm up or cool down before a football match or as part of an enhanced fitness training programme. The Strikers have already expressed keen interest in using such a facility. Young people can get outdoors and challenge themselves on the gym, using equipment that allows you to set the level of difficulty and resistance. Finally, where a gym is located adjacent to a playpark, parents can exercise whilst supervising their children.

The Way Forward: Once established the gym will be maintained by the Playing Fields Committee, with equipment and installation provided by a specialist company. The vital task now is fundraising, we have been quoted £25,000 for the provision and installation of the range of equipment we would like. The committee is working hard to source funding from local organisations such as West Oxon District Council. We have just successfully secured a grant of £5,000 from Blenheim Bursary so we are on our way to making this happen. Over the next few weeks, we will drive forward with our fundraising by creating a crowdfunding page, and we hope the local community gets behind us. An Outdoor Gym for All is the goal and together we can make it happen. Look out for updates in The Slate and on the Stonesfield Facebook and Nextdoor pages on how you can contribute and make a difference that benefits all Stonesfield residents.

From the Rector:

In October, the life of parish churches up and down the land is dominated by the wonderful experience of Harvest Festival celebrations. There can be few occasions which are so warmly evocative of the life of the church in popular culture and imagination as these services and events, in which the golden memory of our (or other people's) childhood experience is blended with Vicar of Dibley images of children heaping vegetables around the altar, the harvest loaf lovingly positioned in pride of place, and women and men, fresh faced from work on the farm or the allotment, singing the joyful harvest hymns we have always known. Amazingly, much of this charming scene is still true in Britain, and is, for many people, their experience of the Parish Church at its very best. Harvest Festival is part of our cultural heritage, and one of the points in the year where less regular churchgoers might come into church too, especially with their children or grandchildren. In rural churches and also in urban ones, and in services in schools and halls, toddler groups, school children and regular churchgoers sing "Cauliflowers Fluffy", "All good gifts around us" and "We plough the fields and scatter," while bringing their gifts for a good cause - food for sharing at the local foodbank or homeless shelter, or monetary donations to feed hungry people we will never meet, as an expression of our gratitude for what we have been given.

The last time I was a priest in a rural community at Harvest time was twentyfour years ago in Herefordshire, when I remember celebrating the harvest in one of our parish pubs, and also a Harvest Supper where one of the women serving the meal delighted in shouting out, "The Vicar wants stuffing!" to the amusement of everyone in the hall. I have greatly enjoyed riding and walking beside combine harvesters in recent weeks, and have greatly enjoyed the generous produce of local allotments, neighbours' gardens, and hedgerows, and I am looking forward to this year's celebrations very much - the All Age Worship Harvest Celebration in Stonesfield on 3 October and the Harvest Festival Service and Lunch at Combe on the 10th.

Thanksgiving for the bounty of nature, and the productivity of human skill and labour on farms, as well as in the fishing industry, is an ancient feature of religious celebrations. In Judaism, temple worship used offerings of grain and oil as well as animal sacrifice, and these elements are still included symbolically in our weekly worship in church, where we share bread and wine as tokens of the life of Jesus who is called both 'Bread of Life' and 'Lamb of God.' Thankfulness for our daily bread, and for so much more, is at the very heart of our worship, and our gospels are full of the beautiful images which Jesus drew from the farming and fishing communities around him, such as the Parable of the Sower. But not far below the surface, both in our scripture, and in worship, are the powerful Christian themes of Justice and of Love, and it is these which lie at the heart of our Harvest celebrations too. Thanksgiving for what we have received cannot be separated from the call for justice in our world today, where many still go hungry while the insatiable appetites of richer nations like ours drives the destruction of forests, and pollution of sea and land, to produce meat or palm oil, and to transport exotic foods from poor communities to our supermarket shelves. Thanksgiving for what we have received also inspires us to reach out in love to people who are less fortunate than ourselves, and whether we give a tin of baked beans or a large donation to charity, Harvest Festival allows us to express our gratitude both to God and to other women and men for enabling us to enjoy food security and such overwhelming bounty. I wish you all a very happy Harvest time.






