Our Neighbourhood Plan

Would you like to have a hand in shaping the way Stonesfield develops over the coming years? Do you have opinions on the sort of housing the village needs (or doesn't need): where it should be, who for, and what it should look like? What about our green spaces and views: what are your favourites, and do you want to help protect them from inappropriate development? Are there adequate sports facilities? enough buses? And what about our pub!

You can make your voice heard with our Neighbourhood Plan. A steering group made up of members of the Parish Council and SUSTO are holding a **public meeting at 7.30pm on 28 March in the village hall**, to describe the point and scope of our plan, and to answer your questions. We'll be explaining how you can get involved and how



we'll put the plan together based on the evidence we gather from you.

This is a community project; it's your chance to say how you would like Stonesfield to grow and what you would like it to look and feel like in 15 years time. The plan is a powerful tool in shaping the way our village grows: if it is passed, it forms part of the statutory development plan for the area, alongside the WODC local plan. So we want you to take this opportunity to have your say.

It's important that everyone has the opportunity to get involved. We want everyone to be consulted and given the chance to speak up. That's why we're starting with this meeting. We'll follow that with an in-depth survey in the summer, asking you what you'd like to see in the way of our natural environment (green spaces, biodiversity, agriculture etc), housing, and sustainability (shops, pubs, transport, health, education, sport, employment, infrastructure etc). We will collate the evidence and draft the plan based on your views. Without your views, there is no plan.

To get things started we'd like as many people as possible to answer five questions, see form on **page 21**. Your answers will help us shape the questions in the full survey in the summer.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council (SPC)

We hope that everyone is well and we look forward to what we hope is a better year in 2022 with regards to Covid.

Bench: The Parish Council is hoping to have the new bench (which has been commissioned using S106 monies from the art project) installed before Easter in the village, exact location to be determined but either near the Common or on Brook Lane. This is later than originally planned but will be just in time for the (hopefully good) spring weather.

OCC Budget: Oxfordshire County Council reported that the OCC budget has been set with an emphasis on investment in adult and social care. Climate change is also a major part of the programme. OCC reported that OCC and Cherwell District Council are separating due to the differing demands of officers. The partnership commenced three years ago but has now entered the separation process. It should not impact on Council budgets this year.

Youth support: OCC reported that there will be four youth workers in the District. Cllr Andy Graham would like to know if anyone can identify areas for youth that may need support. The Clerk noted that there is a purpose-built and little-used youth building in Woodstock which needs utilising and shuttle buses between villages are being considered. If anyone in the village has any suggestions, please get in

touch with Cllr Andy Graham or the Parish Clerk who will pass on information.

Bus services: There is an OCC consultation document regarding bus services on 'Let's Talk Oxfordshire'. It is important to try and retain our bus services; rural areas may be cut first so residents are encouraged to take a look and comment.

20mph speed limit: The Council looks forward to seeing the roll-out of the 20mph speed limit for Stonesfield which is the first village in the division to take up this scheme. This is a great initiative on which SAFER (a Stonesfield Parish Council working group) has worked very hard to achieve and which should benefit the village as a whole.

Planning applications: There was no objection to application 21/04033/HHD (Replacement of existing rear dormer) Home Close, Simon Warr.

Neighbourhood Plan update: At its January meeting the Council voted unanimously in favour of appointing the SUSTO steering group as a formal advisory sub-committee of the Parish Council in order to conform with Section 122 of the Local Government Act 1972. We envisage further members of the community becoming involved in this. It should be noted that finance for the Neighbourhood Plan will be held by the Clerk of the Parish Council with the budget being set by the Parish Council as a whole. Please watch the *Slate* for regular updates from the group on behalf of the Parish Council.

The Common: At its February meeting the Council approved the purchase of alder trees to plant along the riverbank on the cricket pitch.

Wildlife: People are encouraged to create holes in their hedges and fences etc. in order to encourage hedgehogs. More information on West Oxfordshire's Hedgehog Highway Campaign can be found at www.westoxon.gov.uk/ hedgehoghighway.

Frank Hall: The Parish Council has approved the installation of a brass plaque on the war memorial in recognition of Frank Hall who looked after the war memorial for over 40 years and ran the Poppy Appeal for the village.

Queen's Jubilee: Councillors discussed options for marking the Queen's Jubilee and the Queen's Green Canopy (tree planting initiative) in the village. The Village Hall may coordinate an event and/ or various celebrations and many ideas are being discussed. Stonesfield Open Gardens will take place during June. Oxfordshire Community Foundation is championing arts funding for the Jubilee with a focus on arts-based initiatives such as theatre. visual arts, library and museum activities. If groups can suggest ideas that the village might like to support, they should contact the Village Hall Committee as soon as possible. The Council is considering options to mark the occasion and is looking into the possibility of producing an aerial photograph of the village which would be on display in the village as well as being available for purchase.

Next meeting: The date of the next full Parish Council meeting is 2 March at 7pm in the St James' Centre.

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Signs of a safer Stonesfield take shape

On 17 February 2022, works started to replace all the speed limit signage in the village, reducing the limit from 30mph to 20mph.

In November 2018 a community-based survey was launched in the village to deal with the concerns of residents worried about an increase in excessive speeding in Stonesfield. The outcome of that survey was that the majority of respondents (70%) wanted to see changes in the village to improve road safety, with a clear majority wanting to see the speed limit reduced from 30mph to 20mph.

The Parish Council Working Group known as SAFER was established in the Spring of 2019 and developed a strategy to work with OCC Highway to make Stonesfield safer by reducing the speed across the whole village to 20mph. Moving to 20mph has taken over three years in the planning and lots of supplementary improvements in the village have been implemented along the way.

The new signage will take a few days to complete and the SID devices will be reprogrammed to cover the changes. Thank you for your patience on this journey and the continuous support for the SAFER team who have worked very hard to make this happen.

Finally, OCC has a plan to reduce the speed within all villages in West Oxfordshire to 20mph should they desire it. To achieve this, the SAFER team is sharing its best practice with neighbouring communities to avoid them having to 'reinvent the wheel.'

News from West Oxfordshire

Kerbside recycling collections: WODC advise that, due to more people working from home over the last couple of years, kerbside collection services are under greater pressure and it is necessary to introduce some minor changes.

- Due to extremely low demand, kerbside collections of engine oil and car batteries will cease.
- With regard to cooking oil which hitherto has been left in bottles on the kerbside, residents are now being asked to add small amounts of this to their food caddies in order that crews can focus on emptying recycling bins, boxes and caddies.

Residents will still be able to take car batteries, engine oil and excess cooking oil to the household recycling centre at Dix Pit for disposal. Additionally, garages and other outlets which sell car batteries are usually willing to accept old batteries.

Neighbourhood Watch

E-scooters: E-scooters are growing in popularity and their sale is being actively promoted by major high street and online retailers. Neighbourhood Watch has been advised by the police neighbourhood team that privately owned e-scooters are restricted for use solely on private land and with the permission of the landowner. It is illegal to use a privately-owned e-scooter on pavements, cycle paths or roads at present unless the correct MOT, tax and insurance has been obtained. Under current UK law, e-scooters are treated in the same way as motor vehicles so pavements and cycle paths are strictly off limits; in turn, for road use, they must meet the same requirements as cars and motorbikes. Trials are taking place in several parts of the UK, including Oxford, where members of the public are able to hire and ride a rented e-scooter. - Acting in a manner that causes or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress
- When someone does something that most people would say is unreasonable
- Something causing a nuisance or annoyance
- A harm-centred approach

I had the pleasure of accompanying our Year 5 and 6 pupils on their recent residential trip to Kilvrough Manor in South Wales earlier in the month. Over the last two years our children have missed out on so much: trips, visits, experiences, rites of passage - the sheer pleasure of jumping on a coach and going somewhere exciting. Having postponed a residential trip back in November with less than 48 hours' notice, I am sure that a lot of fingers and toes were crossed in the week leading to it. Nature notes: Friends who lurk in the damp and dark

Forking the overwintering green manure into the soil, it was a surprise to find three 'brown centipedes' together in February (one of our commoner centipedes) just four inches below the surface. A gentle fork and the reason was clear: the remains of a slug. Centipedes are most active at night and with venomous front claws hunt slugs, so are most welcome as long as they don't harm the leopard slugs (another friend in the organic garden).

Nearing the stone path, two 'common rough woodlice' scurry into the dark of a stone crevice. Another friend in the organic garden, their role is feeding off decomposing plant material, particularly wood, and recycling it back into the soil.

Centipedes and woodlice are both terrestrial isopods and don't have a waxy cuticle so are prone to drying out.

If you have a woodpile or outdoor plant pots there will be woodlice that scurry out of the light and into the dark. The female breeds up to three times a year hatching the eggs into a marsupial pouch; then the young stay with the mother for a couple of months.



One of the vernacular names for woodlice is 'stinky pigs'. If you get close enough to a colony you might catch the scent of rotting fish and - here's the crazy thing - they don't urinate and do excrete waste through their exoskeleton in the form of ammonia gas. They can roll into a tight ball or can roll onto their backs and play dead. Once the danger has gone, the 14 legs get to work flipping themselves back over onto their legs and hurrying away into the damp shadows.

Hare Coursing

I'm prompted to write about this after several comments posted on Nextdoor concerning dead hares seen locally and cases of suspected hare coursing, so here is a little history and some background.

Soon after the Norman Conquest, the Forest Laws were introduced to protect the beasts of the chase, banning taking wild animals for food, or wood for fuel and housing, or enclosing land as that would inhibit the hunt for the nobility. This was extremely unpopular as it meant the local population could not continue with their previous way of life, although later Common Rights were enshrined in to law.

One of the other parts of the law stated only nobles could own greyhounds. This would ensure that the sport of hare coursing remained in the hands of nobility. To get round this, men cross-bred greyhounds with other sighthounds to introduce lurchers, known as 'poacher's dogs'.

By the end of the nineteenth century hare coursing was at its peak as a working man's sport until it was superseded by greyhound racing in the 1920s. However, it continued to have a high profile in some areas with, for instance, the Waterloo Cup, competed for over three days in Lancashire right up until 2005, when the 2004 Hunting Act came in to force. This made hunting with dogs illegal.

There are three types of hunting for hares:

• Hare hunting uses packs of beagles, harriers or basset hounds, followed usually on foot. There are 71 hare hunts in existence, which continue through the practice of trail hunting, in much the same way as fox hunts.

- Hare poaching is trespassing on private land to catch hares for food or 'fun' and uses dogs in the same way as hare coursers.
- Hare coursing is where a pair of dogs are set to compete against each other to see which can turn and catch a hare the quickest. Coursing will often now involve single dogs with the winner being the one with most kills, with gambling on the results.

The 2004 Hunting Act drove coursing underground and has become the cause of much criminal damage in the countryside, as well as inflicting grave damage on the hare population. A recent survey in Yorkshire reported repeat offences on farms of damage to crops, fencing and hedges and livestock. Farmers also report being physically and verbally abused by the gangs responsible.



New laws have now been set out by the government to update the 1828 Night Poaching Act and the 1831 Game Act which both banned trespassing in pursuit of game. They will be amended to introduce unlimited fines and up to six months' imprisonment. New offences will be introduced – trespass with the intention, or going equipped to trespass with the intention, of using a dog to pursue a hare. On conviction, the court will have the power to regain costs for the police of kennelling seized dogs, as well as disqualifying the owner from owning or keeping dogs.

The National Farmers Union is pleased that after years of campaigning there may at last be a real crackdown. The RSPCA says that as well as being cruel to hares, the dogs are often badly treated and are abandoned as soon as they are no longer of use.

It has been estimated that there are fewer than half a million brown hares in England and they are now listed as a priority in the UK Biodiversity Action Plan. It is to be hoped that the new law will go some way towards protecting them.

From the Rector: Clear out!

In March last year, my wife and I were busy sorting out the contents of our London Vicarage flat in preparation for moving to Stonesfield. Although we had only been there for six years, we had accumulated plenty and we wanted to grasp the opportunity to let go of unused and unwanted things before it was all boxed up and brought to the Rectory here. Week after week we toiled in evenings and spare moments, filling bags and boxes for the charity shop, for friends or for the church dustbins. It felt like an appropriate way to spend Lent, the forty days of preparation before Easter, and in tune with our deeply rooted habit of spring cleaning.

I have often used the idea of a spring clean or clear out as a way of explaining Lent to children in schools. Clearing out a pencil case, a drawer, a cupboard, a bedroom, the loft or garage, are practical activities which we can all understand, and recognise as satisfying or necessary. How pleasing it is to find what you need in a tidy garage, room or drawer, rather than searching hopelessly for it in an overflowing box room or dark attic. Some things which we clear out are dangerous and must be removed for that reason: leaking tins of paint or chemicals, out of date food or medicines, broken glass or other dangerous objects which need to be removed for everyone's good. But most of the things we might sort out are not bad they may have a value or a purpose in the right time and to the right person but they are in the way, making it hard to find what we really need. They are simply unnecessary or misplaced. They can be reorganised, sold or donated.

Perhaps it is the same with our lives, as in Lent the Church encourages us to examine ourselves in preparation for Easter, the great feast of the resurrection of Christ from the dead. Sorting out our lives is easier said than done, of course, but the same principles apply. Is anything dangerous or harmful? These things should be carefully removed: habits and practices which cause hurt to others or to ourselves. Sometimes their removal can be difficult - we may need advice or guidance about how to be rid of them. Many other things may simply be cluttering up our attempt to live well - and these can be the hardest to deal with - things which are not bad in themselves but which prevent us from living life to the full, or from achieving the things we desire. Our work,

hobbies, friendships and habits can all be good, but they can also prevent us from achieving what we need or want if they are out of balance. The Church has always encouraged self-examination in Lent, looking carefully at our priorities so that we may do the right things, in the right proportions, for the right reasons. If we consider our lives honestly, what is preventing us from doing these things which should be our priority? How can we change this?

For those of us with faith, even a little faith, or a desire to explore faith, it is important that we can use this opportunity to re-establish or re-affirm the priority of prayer, worship and Christian study in our lives too, ring-fencing time on Sundays and at other times in the week, for our faith to flourish. I commend to you the opportunity to do this by attending our weekly Lent Groups on Thursday afternoons or evenings, and the morning worship we offer on Sundays, Wednesdays and during Holy Week and Easter.

Whatever you are sorting, spring cleaning or clearing out this month, I wish you a happy and life-changing Lent.

Roman Catholic worship Where are you going?

Where are you going? That's one of life's big questions. For some people the answer is very clear: get a job, manage my career, find my life's partner, maybe have children, be secure, and above all – be happy. The assumption is that the latter be happy - is inevitably delivered by the former: job, partner, children, security, but, alas we know, all too well, that is often not the case. Partners leave, children grow up, the job or career changes and maybe life feels less secure. Thus, the question remains, where are you going?

Lent, which commences on Wednesday 2 March, helps us to begin to answer that question. Lent is that six-week period before Easter that helps ready us for that momentous change of Easter. Lent is a replication of Christ's 40 days of fasting in the desert before his three years of teaching.

Then Jesus was led by the Spirit out into the desert to be put to the test by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, after which he was hungry, and the tester came and said to him, 'If you are Son of God, tell these stones to turn into loaves.' But he replied, 'Scripture says: Human beings live not on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.' The devil then took him to the holy city and set him on the parapet of the Temple.
