Following successful implementation of the 20mph speed limit, SAFER, the Parish Council road safety working group, is recruiting volunteers to join its Community Speed Watch (CSW) team. We are looking for individuals to help run speed surveys in the village as part of our efforts to keep local roads safe, reinforce the new limit and change driver behaviour. You would be part of a team supporting an important initiative that will directly influence speed reduction and help enforce the lower speed limit.

Under the direction of Thames Valley Police (TVP), local CSW teams across West Oxfordshire villages regularly run local surveys to remind drivers of the speed limit and to report excessive speeding direct to TVP who will then make contact with the driver.

Matthew Barber, Police and Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley, said: 'I want to embed Community Speed Watch as a core part of Thames Valley's response to road safety. The work that the volunteers of this scheme do is vital to the wider strategy to keep everyone safe on our roads.'

As a CSW volunteer, you would receive full training, be issued with personal protective equipment (PPE) and be covered by Stonesfield Parish Council's insurance. You would be part of a team running speed surveys in the village. We will build on the existing SAFER initiative and restart the regular surveys that took place prior to Covid-19 restrictions. Our aim is to relaunch CSW surveys after Easter and we will be running regular sessions across the village. As a volunteer, we would ask for 2-3 hours of your time on a monthly basis.

WODC opened a donation centre on 9 March to enable residents to bring supplies to support the people of Ukraine. Donations may be delivered to Carterton Leisure Centre where staff are on hand to coordinate deliveries. The collection point is signposted on site and is open 6am-10pm Monday-Friday and 7am-5pm Saturday and Sunday.



There is an urgent need for the following: dried food (long-life items only); bottled water; first aid supplies; toiletries and sanitary items; warm clothes and underwear; sleeping bags (but not duvets or pillows); children's toys. People are urged to only bring items which appear on

this list as these are deemed to be 'much needed' by organisations on the ground.

## Platinum Jubilee celebration for 2022 and beyond

How's this for an idea? And it is just an idea; I'd love to hear from others, far more creative than I am!

This June sees HM The Queen celebrate her Platinum Jubilee. To mark this occasion, I had the idea of creating a Jubilee Circular Walk in and around our lovely village. It would be a lasting, permanent reminder that the current residents of Stonesfield embraced its sense of occasion. I'm sure many of us will celebrate the long weekend in some way, but it would be great to do something that we can all continue to enjoy long after the dancing and fun has stopped!

The walk could be either 2 or 3.5 miles with benches placed strategically around the route: somewhere to sit and rest, or to watch the world go by and chat with passers-by.

The shorter route, which is about 1.8 miles, would be:

Starting at the Church:

- The heart of the village. We already have a bench here, but we could add a plaque marking the start of the walk.
- Next, down Church Street and Brook Lane:
- A bench could be placed at the top of the climb down to the river for people to sit, relax and enjoy the stunning view over the valley. It would need landowner approval.
- Down the hill towards the river, turn right and through the woods, coming out onto Witney Lane. Turn right, and back up Laughton Hill:

- Next resting place is the Tap. There is already a bench here and we could highlight the importance of the Tap for Stonesfield by including it in the Jubilee Walk.
- Up to the White Horse:
- Stop off to eat your picnic under the tree on the 'Green Triangle'. It would be great to have a circular bench around the tree for people to rest. Maybe a planter here too, on the corner of the green, facing Pond Hill.
- Continue down the hill, turn left into Longore, and follow the road round to Greenfield Road. Turn right onto the Woodstock Road, pass the war memorial and return to the Church.

For those who would like a longer walk, a loop can be added after coming through the woods. Once you have been along Witney Lane to Laughton Hill, go straight across the road and up the track towards Charlbury. Turn right at the top and continue along the Ridgeway for about a mile. Turn right and head along the footpath towards The Ridings. Turn right to come back into the village as far as The White Horse and re-join the walk at this point. This extra loop makes the walk about 3.5 miles.

At each resting point perhaps there could be a plaque with a QR code linked to the Stonesfield website to uncover local historical information.

The concept has been warmly received by the Parish Council. However, to create this lasting circular walk there would be some costs involved. It would be good to hear from any local companies or individuals who would be happy to help with sponsorship. Offers of help designing maps, creating QR codes, and writing the stories would all be very much appreciated. Or perhaps this has got your creative juices flowing and you can build on the idea?!

It would be wonderful to create something for future generations to enjoy for years to come. Hopefully it would be something that people of all ages could enjoy and those from within the community as well as further afield would be encouraged to take advantage of it.

## Stonesfield Parish Council (SPC)

From the meeting held on 2 March

## County Council and District Council updates

Bus services will be retained in their current form, initially for the first six months of the financial year from April. Usage is down and so the service needs to be used more in order to keep this service beyond the six-month period. Oxford is one of the first cities in the UK to have approximately 100 electric buses; this news was welcomed. A bus lane will be introduced south of Woodstock in order to fast-track buses into Oxford. The Clerk asked if Cllr Andy Graham (OCC) would share any transport plans with the Parish Council; these would be published on the website when available. It was noted that Charlbury runs a car share scheme which Stonesfield residents are welcome to join.

#### Queen's Jubilee/Green Canopy

It was suggested that a circular Jubilee Walk be created around the village with the provision of benches and information plaques (and possibly QR codes) at various points along the walk. This suggestion was welcomed by the Council and is being considered.

Councillors resolved to permit the planting of three fruit trees on Longore and will contribute 50% towards the cost.

A request was made that the village should remember and honour its war heroes; this was supported by the Council and details and information would be placed on the Parish Council website. Cllr Graham suggested that this may be something which could be included in a future exhibition at The Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock (The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum.)

#### **Financial matters**

Councillors resolved to approve the grant request of £500 for the Stonesfield Repair Café and wished the organisers well with this venture.

#### **Oxfordshire County Council**

#### From our County Councillor

**Budget:** The Oxfordshire County Council budget was passed in February and its focus is to increase investment to support some of the most vulnerable residents in our county including SEND provision, adult social care, and youth and children's services. Other priorities to receive boosts are climate emergency, buses, traffic enforcement and road safety. The budget also addresses some major projects including replacement of the Kennington Bridge and projects in the Didcot area.

Bus services: Bus services continue to be under financial strain with passenger numbers down on pre-pandemic levels. Following calls on the Government to extend pandemic grants, additional funding was announced. However, bus companies will still face a potential cliff edge in six months' time unless passenger numbers begin to rise or the Government steps in again.

Bid to electrify buses: OCC has made an ambitious bid to electrify the fleet of buses in Oxford in cooperation with the bus companies. If successful, the bid could see 159 electric buses operating in the Oxford area which would avoid the emission of 9,200 tonnes of carbon each year (the equivalent of about 6,000 cars.)

Oxford Zero Emissions Zone (ZEZ) pilot scheme launches: A pilot scheme to test out the technology that will be used for the Zero Emissions Zone has begun in a small area of central Oxford. The full ZEZ will come into force in 2023, subject to a public consultation.

**Standing in solidarity:** On 8 March, there was an uplifting gathering of some

100 people in Woodstock as the community came together to stand in solidarity with the people of Ukraine. There was a minute's silence for those who have lost their lives and loved ones, a rapturous minute's applause to show appreciation and some inspired speeches. I was proud that people turned out from neighbouring villages including Bladon, Stonesfield, Tackley and Combe, to demonstrate the need for action on this humanitarian catastrophe. Olena Seminog from Ukraine, an Oxford academic, gave an impassioned plea for medical supplies and Cllr Elizabeth Poskitt spoke, on this International Women's Day, of the courage of women. The evening finished with pledges of temporary homes being offered by people and donations of money to Save the Children and the Red Cross. Every bit counts. Think WIDEN burglary prevention campaign: Research by Neighbourhood Watch shows that two thirds of people worry about their home being broken into yet there are simple proven measures that everyone can take to reduce their chances of becoming a victim of burglary by up to 50%. The Think WIDEN campaign was launched in March to highlight simple measures which can be undertaken in any home on a variety of budgets. NW's belief is that neighbours keeping any eye out for each other is key to reducing burglary and its WIDE acronym has been extended to WIDEN:

W for Windows: Keep windows locked

I for Interior: Put inside lights on a timer/ smart bulb

**D** for Doors: Double or deadlock your doors

**E** for Exterior: Put outside lights on a sensor

**N** for Neighbours: Keep an eye out for your neighbours

#### Nature notes: Springing into song

From March to late June our feathered alarm clocks are at it again, establishing a territory and singing to attract a mate. The lengthening daylight switches male songbirds into breeding mode; many birds only live for a year or two so a good performance at the dawn chorus is essential. The dawn chorus peaks in early May.

Choose a day when the air is cool and still – bird song has been shown to carry twenty times further. The chorus is best in the half hour before and after sunrise - wrap up warm. For the birds this is not a good time to feed and the darkness gives some protection from predators – so karaoke starts the day!

Early birds are usually our local natives: the robin, blackbird, song thrush and dunnock. Smaller birds join in once the cool of the night has eased: the sparrow, great tit and wren. Wrens have the loudest sounds for size of any bird; listen out for the trill which is always in the wren's song.





As this issue of *The Slate* comes through your door, the natives should be joined by the warblers returning from winter in warmer parts of the world. First to arrive should be the chiff-chaff by mid-March, joined soon after by the blackcap and willow warbler, and by the time garden warblers arrive I invariably have to revise the songs they sing. If only they behaved like the robins, standing on a branch and singing as you pass close by.

As the light and warmth strengthen, food becomes easier to find, hungry birds move off and the chorus diminishes. The fittest best-fed males produce the strongest songs and are more likely to attract a mate.

The first day of May is 'dawn chorus day' and it is worth looking out for organised events. Time and space with nature strengthens our mental wellbeing – much needed at this moment with the horror being inflicted on our European friends in Ukraine.

## Encouraging wildlife in your garden

We felt we wanted to take some steps to restore the wildlife that had been disturbed when our house was built and we wanted to give something back. Hopefully we've made some improvements and perhaps you might like some of these ideas.

We have installed two bat boxes in the oak tree, put up a double house martin hotel on the front of the house and three swallow cups in the barns. We now have a robin box and a tit box in the trees behind the house, and I've pushed a couple of old flower pots into the hedge ivy; they are popular for nesting.

We already had some owl boxes but will be adapting them to make them more suitable for barn owls. Soon we will have three boxes for swifts as well, with swift calls on a speaker to attract them. I have yet to see how that will work!



The bird feeders are very busy and it's entertaining to watch the various squabbles that ensue. Chaffinch, goldfinch, siskin, greenfinch, great tits and blue tits, robin, blackbird, sparrows, thrush, starling, green and spotted woodpecker

occasionally as well. Plus, all the corvids, pigeons etc.

We've planted another 30 metres of mixed native hedging – this really encourages a wide range of birds, butterflies and other insects. For flowers and berries, we have planted a large cotoneaster, a sweet chestnut and crab apple trees.

We also leave an area of grass untouched and last year I planted lots of moon daisies. They looked lovely along with the clover and lots of other wild plants, and the bees loved them. The area also attracts a wide range of insects which are very beneficial in lots of ways.



The pond has a good clump of frog spawn and we disturbed a sleeping newt when we moved some blocks the other day, and gently rehomed it. The log piles are starting to decay nicely, giving a great home for insects and worms if the wren activity is anything to go by. I also feed the birds in the field with Farmland Bird Aid.

Busy times, but well worth it. Who needs the telly! Roll on the spring and the return of the swallows, swifts and house martins.



#### From the Rector: Easter People

This year Easter falls squarely in the middle of April, and after the challenges of Covid over the last two years, we are looking forward to a Holy Week and Easter which are as normal as possible. Not that there is anything 'normal' about Easter. The death and resurrection of Jesus, which we remember and celebrate at Easter, has always been impossible for some people to understand, while for others it has been transformative, changing the way we understand ourselves, the way we relate to others, the way we act in our community, and our relationship with God.

Our faith is an Easter faith, and we are an Easter people. Each Sunday we celebrate the resurrection. Every communion service retells the story of Jesus' death. Without the events which we remember at Easter, Jesus would have been just another ethical teacher. Judaism, like other religious

systems, had already done a good job of explaining how human beings should live together. Respect for others and the care of the vulnerable, including strangers and foreigners, was clearly taught in the Jewish scriptures, and God was rightly understood to be a creator who was both just and compassionate.

Jesus was not the first or the last innocent human being to be killed. Human history, past and present, is filled with such cruelty, and the war in Ukraine has reminded us all of humanity's terrifying capacity for violence and murder on a massive scale. Christians did not claim that the human suffering of Jesus was unique. They believed that he was an innocent man being killed, but also that he was God, who had willingly entered into our human experience of rejection, violence, and death. We ask, 'Where was God? ... when our child died? ... when my brother was killed by a knife? ... when my mother died so young? ... when innocent people were robbed of life by bombs and missiles in Ukrainian hospitals or shelters?' The Christian answer to that question, the big religious question, is that by sharing our death on the cross he is present in all our suffering, in all our loss, in all our desolation. God with us.

We might be comforted to know that God cared enough to suffer with us. But the first Christians believed that something extraordinary happened next. They dared to suggest that the same Jesus, who had shared our death, had been raised to life

again - to a new life for eternity. They saw him, believed that God had raised him from the dead, and were baptised so that they could share his eternal life. The Easter faith is a resurrection faith which believes emphatically in new life, in light out of darkness and life out of death. We are familiar with the death and life cycles of the natural world, where winter changes into spring. But Christians made Jesus' 'life coming out of death' the heart of their faith, declaring that, as God shared our death in Jesus, so those who are baptised into him will share his life for eternity.

Ever since, belief in the resurrection of Jesus has empowered Christians to work for resurrection everywhere, and to live sacrificially, so that healing, new life, and transformation may come for others. A great many of the people who make such a difference in the world are motivated not by self-interest, but by their Easter faith. So please join to stand with all who suffer, and to celebrate the victory of life over death, in church this Easter. Choose life! Come to church!

#### The journey from Lent to Easter

If Lent is the beginning of a journey that leads to Easter and our salvation, and thence to God, how do you prepare for that journey? For Catholics, that preparation is prayer, abstinence and almsgiving. In other words, we try to focus on our relationship with God through prayer; abstinence as self-denial helps us move away from the material to the spiritual and brings us closer to Jesus in his 40 days of fasting. And alms-giving is important as it brings us to God through generosity of heart and spirit. However, as we journey on our pilgrimage to Easter, we are often tempted away from our aspirations, but as St Paul said in 1 Corinthians 10:13: 'No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful and will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but will provide you the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it'.

Julian of Norwich, that wise and understanding woman wrote; 'God did not say: you will not be troubled or that you will not be tempted or that you will not be distressed. But he did say: you will overcome'. We might struggle on the journey, wonder if it's worthwhile and sometimes wish we hadn't started at all, but Psalm 137 (138) reassures us that: 'On the day I called, you answered me, O Lord.'
