Try out the new Stonesfield Outdoor Gym!

The new Outdoor Gym is installed and ready for community use. Situated at the rear of the Village Hall and Social Club, it fits perfectly in a space that was being underused. While there are still some cosmetic upgrades to be completed (the grass needs to grow through the eco-grid flooring) the new equipment is top-notch and ready to go. As promised, there is a selection of cardio and conditioning machines that use your own body weight as resistance. These can be used by any ability and by any age group over 12, and there is a fitness machine for wheelchair users.

For the little ones, a children's double skier machine has been installed within the play area and is already being well used. Equipment is be used at your own risk, so for those like me with creaky joints, it is always worth taking medical advice before commencing any exercise – especially if you have not done much in a while!

The Stonesfield Playing Field Committee would like to thank all the contributors who have helped to make this project a reality. The fundraising expertise of Andrew Tacon really helped to drive the project to success, and the Committee received £2,000 from the Parish Council and £140 from the Masons. He secured a further £5,000 from Blenheim, £5,000 from the Community Trust and 25% of the total cost, capped at £6,250 from WODC. That meant we could commit to a £20k installation. Sunshine Fitness have provided us with a multi-ability and multigenerational outdoor gymnasium that the whole community of Stonesfield can benefit from. Go and have a go and enjoy yourselves!

The Evenlode needs us! Help us to find out what is really happening to the water quality of our precious River Evenlode – let's make the invisible, visible through citizen science.

The Evenlode WaterBlitz event will be happening from 1-4 July. We will be asking people to collect water samples and take quality measurements along the Evenlode, and report the results. Join us and sign up today by visiting our Events page www.freshwaterwatch.org/pages/events.

Taking part in the survey is free, easy to do and will help the work of the Earthwatch and the Evenlode Catchment Partnership. Free kits will be offered on a first come, first served basis. The survey will help us to protect the river better, both now and into the future. Rivers, streams, lakes and ponds provide numerous important benefits including wildlife habitats and for recreation. However, these water bodies face increasing threats from development, as well as from human waste pollution and fertilisers applied to fields; all of which can contribute to increased levels of unwanted nutrients in watercourses such as nitrates and phosphates.

You have seen how our river is in a sad state and not at all what it used to be. Join in and help to make a difference!

Community Speedwatch restarts

In June, SAFER's Community Speedwatch (CSW) volunteers carried out their first sessions of 2022 at Thames Valley Policeapproved sites throughout the village. As usual, the sight of the high-vis jackets acted as a deterrent for almost all of the drivers.

Further sessions are planned throughout the summer involving all the current CSW volunteers. Additionally, Thames Valley Police are giving a second speed gun to SAFER, on loan for 6 months, so that sessions can be more easily organised.

Some questions have been asked about why Stonesfield has a 20mph limit, and on Thames Valley Police's actions on receiving the data on vehicles exceeding the limit. Information on all this can be found on the village website at www.stonesfield.online/ category/safer/.

SAFER is also looking for more volunteers to help with CSW. Volunteers are asked to be available for at least one hour per month and will always work with at least two other volunteers. With the current number of volunteers, SAFER can run four to five sessions per month, but would like to increase that to two per week. Local heroes' avenue of trees at Blenheim

Blenheim Estate is inviting people to nominate their local heroes, to be recognised in an avenue of trees being created to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Nominations will be accepted until mid-July.

The avenue of 140 native sweet chestnut and rowan trees will include 70 planted in honour of individuals who have had a positive impact on their local communities. Their names will be displayed on a board beside the Jubilee Avenue, which will be planted along the entry road from Gorrel Doors into the heart of the Park, to the north west of the Column of Victory.

"The Queen's Jubilee is a momentous occasion and we wanted to create something that will eventually become part of Blenheim's history to celebrate," said Rachel Furness-Smith, Head of Estates. "We also felt it was important it should be directly linked to our communities and recognise the amazing things being done every day by unsung local heroes to help improve other people's lives. The Avenue will become a place to re-visit and watch grow over the years and will stand as a lasting legacy to those amazing individuals who are too often overlooked."

And I'll blow your house down

Georgie Steele – actor, story-teller, Stonesfield mum – was given a devastating diagnosis for her two young sons. Have you ever wondered, but never dared ask, what it was like to receive the news? How she was - or wasn't - supported by the professionals? How she copes? In her compelling new show *And I'll blow your house down*, Georgie has bared all – but has wrapped up the anguish in such a witty, self-deprecating, hilarious way that hearing the answers doesn't hurt; at least, not much.

They say that fairy tales appeal to children because they introduce them to things that are scary in a safe way. It's only a story! Well, that familiar tale about the three little pigs and the Big Bad Wolf is Georgie's way of taking us to the brink - to the place where the BBW has apparently leapt off the page and savaged her family. Can we bear it? In her riveting presentation that combines storytelling with physical drama, fiction and reality intertwine. Yes, it's heart-breaking, but it's also illuminating and deeply inspirational. She despairs, she rages – but we also see her hold her house together no matter what.

This one-woman show is original, unique, brilliant. It's definitely not a misery memoir: It's fast, funny, moving and ridiculous. You have to see it. No huffing, no puffing: just go.

Protecting your mobile phone bill

A malware strain called SMSFactory infiltrates Android mobile phones and hides so the owner is unaware. The malware sends premium SMS messages and makes calls to premium-rate phone numbers, undetected. One version is also able to extract the phone owner's contact list, spreading the malware further.

This kind of malware is being spread through malvertising, which uses adverts to send people to websites hosting malware; also through links on sites offering game hacks, adult content, or free video streaming sites. The malware is disguised as an app which people can download, but the app removes its icon from the home screen. It depends on people forgetting about the app on their phone, until they receive their unexpectedly large phone bill.

- Tips to avoid malware:

Meeting of 18 May

Election of Chair and Vice Chair

At the full Parish Council meeting on 18 May, Councillors elected Cllr Phil McArdell as Chairman and Cllr David Brown as Vice Chairman.

Parish Matters

Bins installed at William Buckland Way have been moved and reinstalled in a new location on PC land. A complaint was received from a member of public regarding the residue that comes off the newly installed bench. Genny Early is going to treat the surface to try and reduce this, but it is an expected part of the wearing process of this metal. Cllr Simon Powell is maintaining the grass / branches around the bench to ensure it is kept tidy.

Financial

The Clerk advised that preparation for the annual audit has commenced. This information will be published on the website once complete.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting was also held on 18 May, immediately after the full

Council meeting. Minutes with full detail and reports from organisations can be found on the website (stonesfield.online). There was good attendance from members of the public.

Chairman's report

During the year the Council had gradually returned to face-to-face meetings, even though the threat of COVID was still prominently mentioned in the press. The Chairman thanked the Clerk, Councillors and members of the public for attending despite the risk.

The biggest achievement this year was the implementation of the 20mph speed limit within Stonesfield. While the true benefit of this scheme could never be quantified, the Chairman believed that Stonesfield was a safer place because of it, and he thanked Cllr Mick Heduan, Paul Bates and the SAFER team for all their efforts in achieving this.

The other significant achievement this year had been the launch of the Neighbourhood Plan steering group (a sub-committee of the Parish Council), whose purpose was to develop the Neighbourhood Plan for the Parish of Stonesfield. This milestone would not have been achieved without the Sustainable Stonesfield team and also our sub-committee representatives, Wendy Gould and Simon Powell. There was a massive amount of work ahead, but a great start had already been made.

The White Horse saga continued. Thankfully the Parish Council had reregistered the pub as an Asset of Community Value, which had again been triggered, giving the pub group six months to put together another bid. The Chairman hoped that whatever the outcome, the village would get the pub back open.

The Council had also been pleased to be able to support financially, through grants, a wide variety of Stonesfield organisations like the Playing Fields Committee, Scouts, Primary School, Carers Café and the Repair Café.

Cllr McArdell thanked all Councillors for their work this last year and looked forward to another successful year.

District Council update

Cllr Matthew Parkinson (DC) & Cllr Natalie Chapple (DC) gave a report. Cllr Andy Graham had been made leader of West Oxfordshire DC on the day of the present meeting, and this was why he was unable to attend the Stonesfield Annual Parish Meeting.

A lot had happened in WODC over the vear, including aid project for Ukrainian citizens, introduction of hedgehog highways and introduction of electric charge points in the district. COVID had shelved quite a lot of projects, but WODC had supported many businesses to help keep them going. WODC were questioning Thames Water's actions over the years to improve biodiversity in rivers and prevent contamination. Cllr M Parkinson indicated the additional housing in Woodstock was almost a done deal on WODC land, but not at that moment, on Cherwell land. The Woodstock doctor's surgery was still on the agenda.

Parish meeting by Playing Field Representative (Frank Huddleston), Scouts (Ben Whitworth), Publishers of the Slate (Diane Bates), Village website (Paul Bates), the school (Harry Holland), Community Pub Group (Peter Smyth), Gardening Club (Cllr Wendy Gould), the Common (Richard Morris), Neighbourhood Plan (Parish Council working group) (Cllr Wendy Gould), SAFER (Parish Council working group) (Cllr Mick Heduan). All reports can be found within the minutes on the village website. The Parish Council thanks all those who attended and provided reports.

Meeting of 8 June Financial

The annual internal audit is now complete. The Parish Council considered the figures and accounting statements in the Annual Return to 31 March 2022 (Annual Governance and Accountability Return, AGAR) and approved them. The Clerk will send the AGAR forms to the external auditors. External audit is expected to be completed by the end of September.

Parish Matters

Old Jail – the clerk is liaising with solicitors to try to progress taking ownership.

Stonesfield Community Trust shared an update with the Parish Council. The Trust has £281,994.62 in the accounts at the moment; accounts are published on the Charity Commission website. Ongoing projects concern maintenance of properties, design and launch of new website, ongoing grants for education, disability and sport. The Trust is continuing discussions with a local landowner to provide more housing, continuing to review rents and to raise awareness of Stonesfield Community Trust and its objectives for Stonesfield.

White Horse Pub

The Parish Council recoded its formal stance on the pub, to confirm that it would like to see it remain as a pub.

It should be noted that the District Council has now published information on The Local Heritage Project: www.westoxon.gov.uk/planning-andbuilding/historic-buildings-andconservation/local-heritage-project/

Stonesfield Community Pub Limited sought the Parish Council's support under item 12 at this meeting. The Parish Council officially minuted that The White Horse pub should be included as one of West Oxfordshire District Council's nondesignated heritage assets (NDHA's). (The reason for this request was to establish documented evidence of this intention at this stage, such that it may be taken into consideration should any application for change of use be made before formal designation is possible.)

Next meeting

The date of the next full Council meeting is 6 July 2022, in St James' Centre at 7pm. (No meeting is planned for August.)

Motorbikes in the woods (added since the meeting)

Blenheim Estate and the Parish Council are aware of motorcyclists going in the woods between Stonesfield and Combe, and this has been dealt with by local Police Community Support Officers.

If residents see / hear motorcyclists in Stockey Woods, we encourage you to please report to the local PCSO, and report incidences as and when they occur. They can then visit the woods and this may deter the riders. The non-emergency number is 101.

Due to the village green application, we and Blenheim would not be able to put private signs up though to deter the riders, as is seen at the other woods locally.

Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan

Following our public meeting at the end of March, we now have a splendid team of volunteers who have stepped forward to help us create the NP. They are currently working on the questions that we will put into the village survey.

The survey falls into three broad sections: housing, the green environment, and everything else to do with our infrastructure (services, transport, education, recreation, health, employment etc). We will be asking you what you think about these various aspects of Stonesfield, what you want to protect and what you want to improve. The survey is projected to come out in paper form to every household in early Autumn, and will also be available online.

We must make it clear that this survey does not involve creating a wish list for Stonesfield. It is not asking you to give us a shopping list with a view to creating the perfect community. The survey can only cover aspects of Stonesfield that are relevant to Town and Country Planning issues. The questions will reflect this.

The objective for the Plan is to produce a set of Town and Country Planning policies for Stonesfield, which reflect the planning priorities of the residents and are consistent with national planning policy, the District Plan and 'other material planning considerations.' As such, the Plan will be a vital piece of evidence when planning applications or other alterations to the village are considered. But because the Plan has to conform to current local and national planning policy, we do not have a completely free rein to dictate our preferences.

In addition to the three groups of volunteers working on the survey, a fourth group is starting a character assessment of the village to go in the Plan. A character assessment describes the distinct appearance and feel of the built village. This group is looking for more volunteers to help. If you're interested, please contact us at the email below. West Oxfordshire District Council has new leadership – the West Oxfordshire Alliance consisting of the Liberal Democrats, Labour, and the Green Party, led by County Councillor Andy Graham.

The new cabinet has already risen to new challenges, including approval of funding for zero carbon housing in a disused playground in Chipping Norton, which will be sold at 20% discounted market value. Other zero carbon affordable housing projects are also being investigated.

We are pleased to confirm that the Council's £150 Energy Rebate Discretionary scheme went live on 6 June. The application window will be open for a 4-week period and **will close on 5 July 2022**. Help with energy bills: ACT BEFORE 5 JULY

West Oxfordshire District Council has opened applications for a discretionary scheme of financial support to help with energy bills. The scheme is for residents who were not eligible for the recent £150 council tax energy rebate. It has been designed to help those who need it most, including people on benefits, those living in shared accommodation and people on a low income. It covers people who are:

- Living in properties banded E-H who are on low incomes or don't pay council tax or for health reasons
- On low income who pay energy bills but not council tax
- Living in houses of multiple occupancy and on low income

• Living in emergency or supported accommodation.

The full list of eligibility criteria is on the Council's website, www.westoxon.gov.uk/ 150rebate, under *For residents not eligible for the scheme*, together with a link to the form to apply for the support. Applications can be made **until 5 July**. Those unable to use the website can telephone the Council for advice and support, on 01993 861000. However, the Council is encouraging people to apply online where possible to free phone lines for those who need them most.

Getting active together

YouMove is a new county-wide programme to support families with children on benefits-related free school meals to take advantage of a wide range of low-cost and free activities. The scheme is coordinated by Active Oxfordshire in partnership with district councils. The activities include swimming, badminton and a number of other community activities.

This County Council-funded initiative comes at a critically important time, with many Oxfordshire families hit hard by the cost-of-living crisis and post-COVID concerns about both physical and mental health and wellbeing. Being able to get active in a way that works for them will help families to enjoy quality time together, have fun and improve health and wellbeing.

l'm a Reader... David Stevenson (70-ish)

David and Lynn Stevenson moved to Stonesfield from Kent 15 years ago. 'We are in Stonesfield library about once a week. I've always used a library; probably,' he adds comically, 'because I'm too tight to buy books.'

.....

'I like detective and espionage novels -Raymond Chandler, Anthony Horowitz, Christopher Fowler's 'The Water Room' I read recently, which features London's underground rivers and a woman found dead in her cellar.'

David relishes fictional crime, but his career was on the right side of the law. He

joined the Civil Service straight from school and worked for the Inland Revenue and Customs and Excise; he worked through the introduction of VAT in 1972 and, when Britain joined the EU (then EEC), David visited companies making sure they were fully compliant with the new rules: ironic, in this Brexit era.

Currently David is reading the Mario Puzo classic, 'The Godfather'. 'I've been to where they got married, in Sicily but I've never seen the films or read the books. It's a domestic story really, with the odd bit of violence thrown in'.

'I've always read. I remember being scared to death by Dennis Wheatley's 'The Devil Rides Out', aged 12. (In brief, this book, set in 1930s London, sees the romantically named Duc de Richleau and Rex van Ryn sucked into a devil-worshipping cult and forced to chase villains to an abandoned Greek Monastery, where some soul swapping takes place in the fourth dimension.) This all sounds very much like a standard volunteer shift at Stonesfield library and perhaps this explains why David decided to join the library volunteer group last autumn. 'It's only a couple of hours a month', he says, 'I enjoy it'.

David is not only a devil-, oops sorry, *library*-worshipper but is also well known for his appearances in productions of the Stonesfield Players. He seems a natural on the stage, so I'd always assumed he had a long background in theatricals, but in fact, his first audition at his local theatre group in Kent was a suggestion by someone else. 'It was Aladdin; I was one of Widow Twankey's sidekicks, Flip and Flop. I think I was Flip.' What happened to Flop is unknown, but David has gone on to play some fabulous parts – including in Kent, the MC in 'Cabaret', Puck in 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' and a delightfully bombastic Toad in 'The Wind in the Willows' for the Stonesfield Players. I might be sticking my neck out here, but surely David could be Marlon Brando's Don Corleone? For, as the Godfather almost said: 'A man who doesn't spend time with his library, is not a real man'.

Stories of Stonesfield from the_past

Oxford University and City Herald Saturday 6 September 1845

'A Rural Scene. (From a Correspondent.) William Clare, an elderly and decentlooking agricultural labourer, of Stonesfield, appeared at the Woodstock petty-sessions, on Wednesday last, to his summons, to shew cause why he had not paid 8s. 6d. claimed of him as arrears of poor's-rates, due to the overseers of Stonesfield. The case was heard before Mr. Ricardo and Mr. T. Thornhill. The overseers of Stonesfield were the complainants.

In answer to the inquiries of the magistrates, as to why he did not pay his rates, the poor old man, with the tears trickling down his checks, told the following sad tale of distress: "Gentlemen, I am not able to pay it; for the last eighteen months I have only had now and then a day's work, and I am sure that my income has not been above 5s. a-week, to keep myself, wife, and my boy; out of this I have to pay 1s. 6d a-week for rent. My wife is nearly blind, and is very deaf; she at times is not able to wash my shirt for me. I always paid my rates till the last year, and should now if I was able. I did not want to be summoned, and I paid the overseer 2s. 6d. on account, which was the last sixpence I had, on purpose because he should not summons me. I told him I would pay him a little at a time as fast as I could. The harvest is just on, and I hope to get some work, and I will then pay it."

The overseer said, he summoned him because he was one who was in arrear when he took to the books. The magistrates inquired how it was that the parish insisted on the defendants paying? In reply, they were informed by the overseer that he was a Northleigh man, and as he was an out-oftown man they made him pay. His tale of woe the officers did not deny, and his being an out-of-town man appeared to be the only reason why he was about to be forced to pay rates for the cottage he occupied, and for which he paid 1s. 6d. a-week rent out of an income of 5s. a week, and out of which three persons had to supported. Clare asked for time to pay in, and was allowed a fortnight.

In many agricultural villages there are not cottages enough for the working classes. We know of several in which nearly onehalf of the poor are unable to find a home: they in consequence are driven into a neighbouring village, generally a larger one, in which one person is not the sole proprietor, and thus, in addition to other inconveniencies, such as having a distance to go to their labour, &c., they are rated, not because they are able to pay, but because they are 'out-of-town men.' In many villages in which one person is nearly or quite the sole proprietor, cottages are quite insufficient to meet the wants of the poor; although the population has increased, no increase of cottages has taken place, but, on the contrary, they have decreased.'

'Same day died (*11th inst. Ed.*), at the Rectory at Stonesfield, in this county, aged 18 years, Caroline, daughter of the Rev. Walter Brown, Rector of Stonesfield.'

Saturday 12 February 1831

'On Saturday last died, aged 46, Eliza, wife of the Rev. Walter Brown, Prebendary of Canterbury, and Rector of Stonesfield, in this county.'

Oxford University and City Herald Saturday 9 November 1833

'On Saturday last died, at Stonesfield, in this county, aged 59, the Rev. Walter Brown, M.A. late a Student of Christ Church and Rector of the above parish (patron, the Duke of Marlborough), and Prebendary Canterbury. M.A. April 87, 1727.'

Nature Notes: Six miles an hour is perfection

.....

Four miles an hour is too slow: the plants bend. Eight miles an hour is too fast: the plants break. Chris is carefully driving a large yellow digger at six miles an hour through the flower meadow. The digger bucket collects the dry husks and seeds of the yellow rattle plant to perfection.

Yellow rattle is described as 'the single most important plant you need to establish when creating a wild meadow'. It is semiparasitic, latching onto the root systems of grasses and then extracting nutrients and water. This stunts the growth of the dominant grasses, allowing a greater range of wild flowers to thrive. This year we have an exceptional flowering of yellow rattle; the steep hill down to Stockey Bottom is glowing light yellow. (I wonder if last winter's tobogganing over most of the slope helped the seeds into the soil?) By the time this issue of the Slate arrives the seeds will have dried, and when disturbed the seedhead will rattle. This was traditionally a sign that meadows could be cut.

Back in the barn Chris sieves the seeds from the husks, filling small packages with yellow rattle seeds. The packets whizz off in the post to help create another wild flower meadow.

Stonesfield Sustainability Groups

Stonesfield Environmental Group: Dipping our toes in the Evenlode

Paddling, dog walking, the duck race – some of the different ways of enjoying our river... most Stonesfield residents find the river one of their favourite places to be. The Stonesfield Environmental Community Action Group want to tell you what we have learned about our river and what we are planning to do – we hope you'll want to join us in trying to protect it.

Due to poor water quality, otters, kingfishers and other cherished wildlife are threatened. None of the 18 water bodies in the Evenlode catchment achieves 'good ecological status', according to current Environment Agency monitoring. We want to understand more about the poor state of our river, the role of raw sewage and waste water discharge and other sources of pollution that are damaging its ecology.

A group of us has done an online training course organised by Earthwatch on monitoring the quality of our river. When our test kits arrive, we can begin sampling at suitable sites on the river, at the same time every month. This means we will measure and record key pollutants – nitrates, phosphates – and we can also measure the clarity of the water. We will report back here on what we find.

We have found that a lot of groups are involved in this area. Perhaps you are already a member of one these groups (or another which we have not yet come across); if so we'd love to hear from you. We are navigating our way through this to find the people most appropriate to work with. Here are a number that we are now involved with:

- The *Evenlode Catchment Partnership* (ECP) facilitates collaborative approaches to support ecology across the catchment and ensure the River Evenlode can achieve good ecological status
- *Wild Oxfordshire* is a group of knowledgeable and experienced scientists, practitioners and communication specialists inspiring and empowering people to work together

effectively for nature's recovery across Oxfordshire

• *Earthwatch* connects people with scientists worldwide to conduct environmental research and empower them with the knowledge they need to conserve the planet. Science and data is at the heart of what they do, so their approach is evidence-based.

As we find out more over the next few months, we will post links to these groups on the Stonesfield Village website so you can check them out in your own time. If you want to get involved, a great start would be their Evenlode WaterBlitz weekend – see separate item on page 8. The Environmental Group meets fortnightly on Tuesdays on Zoom at 8pm. Whether you are already taking action, or would like to learn more and get involved – let me know if you would like to come along.

From the Rector: Gratitude

As late spring turns to full summer, I have been thinking about gratitude. Surrounded by birdsong, flowers in bloom and welcome sunshine, it takes no effort to feel grateful. But without the calming effect of the sun, we can easily be influenced by the negativity of the media, by rising petrol prices and the aspirational materialism of the advertising industry, and then for frustration, anger or disappointment to dominate our thinking. Whether or not we have faith in God, rumination on negative thoughts can rob us of peace and happiness. Teachers of mindfulness urge us to limit the tyranny of unhelpful thoughts, and to establish a pattern of positive thinking and thankfulness each day. St Paul, writing to the church in Philippi nearly 2000 years ago, made a similar suggestion, where he says, 'Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable -

if anything is excellent or praiseworthy think about such things'. But is this just sticking our heads in the sand?

Last month I quoted from the Book of Ecclesiastes, where it says that there is 'a time for everything'. There is a time for peace and gratitude, but what about our legitimate feelings of frustration and anger? As a student in London many years ago I listened to a talk by an elderly Austrian psychotherapist, who had been a pupil of Carl Jung. Vera von der Heydt was born in the 19th Century to a Jewish father and Irish mother. She witnessed two World Wars and moved to Britain to escape the Holocaust, having become a Roman Catholic in 1937, and then went on to have a highly influential career. She saw life's journey as a quest: 'Each day a new day, a new starting point; one finds, one loses; one knows, one does not know'. I heard her speaking about 'the roots of violence within us', and she made the point that whatever we have experienced, whatever has hurt or distressed us, we each have a responsibility to ensure that it does not spill out to harm other innocent people. There is a time to be angry, and a time to refrain from anger. In the gospels we read of the compassion of Jesus, of his gentleness and openness to people of all kinds. He was a man of peace. But at times he also showed his anger at corruption and at those who enjoyed wealth or privilege at the expense of others. He drove the moneychangers, who cheated the poor, out of the temple in Jerusalem, and he denounced the leaders who saw themselves as the children of Abraham, yet who enslaved their people with legalistic rules. There is certainly a time to be angry at the injustice which crushes life, which harms the vulnerable and the innocent, the people God made in love.

Despite the things which make our anger burn – and we could each write a list – gratitude and peacefulness is a blessing for ourselves and for others. As the life of the natural world explodes in a riot of growth around us, a deep thankfulness for life's many simple pleasures is one thing I know I must establish and cultivate.
