How many of us would be prepared to be constantly on call, available in the middle of the night to rescue an injured bird? This has been a way of life over a good many years for Chrissie Harper, who runs our local wildlife rescue centre, Chrissie's Owls.

This dedication has recently been recognised with several awards. Last year she was awarded a European Enterprise Award for the best animal welfare charity of 2021 in Oxfordshire. This year two more have followed: a Southern Enterprise Award to the most dedicated animal welfare champion and a Corporate LiveWire Innovation and Excellence Award.

Unfortunately, while these awards are lovely to have and recognise the wonderful work

that Chrissie does, they do not come with any financial prizes.

So far this year the charity has rescued more than fifty birds, mostly barn owls and tawny owls. These are often road casualties, as well as young chicks who have fallen from nests and been unable to help themselves. The aviary at a local farm currently houses six tawny owls, fourteen barn owls and a red kite. They are kept for a month to recover or grow a bit, then the hatch of the aviary is left open for them to come and go at will, while still being fed. The tawny owls generally leave quickly, while the barn owls enjoy Chrissie's hospitality for a bit longer.

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

Remembering Rev Roy



Roy and I were unlikely close friends, the vicar and the born atheist, but Roy wasn't defined by his religion nor I by my lack of it. We lived across the road from each other and walking our dogs together was really just an excuse for a good chat. We disagreed about some small matters like Brexit but agreed on the important things. Even the most serious of discussions were interspersed with jokes and we never fell out.

I think he must have been born with a bucket list long before anyone had ever heard the term. He always had projects and goals - become a vicar, get degrees, learn to fly a helicopter, write a novel. Without seeming to be driven by his goals, or caring what anyone else thought about them, he just got on with achieving them.

I had no experience of Roy as a vicar and though he might have found the committee side of his job irksome at times there was no doubting his ability to be kind and caring where it mattered most. At the same time he was genuinely concerned about the big issues facing the church as a whole, particularly attracting new people to come.

Roy's emphasis in religion seemed to be the social rather than the miraculous and he felt that the church buildings were a village asset and should be used in lots of different ways by the village.

Roy retired and left the village and then came Covid and we didn't see each other for a long time. Then a few months ago he knocked on our door and came in and helped finish the Christmas cake. It was as though we had just seen each other the day before and if it had been ten or twenty years it would have been just the same.

I know that anytime I want I can think of Roy, large as life, standing beside me.

'Still praying on people Roy?' I ask. A tap on my shoulder, light as the wind, silent laughter, 'stupid boy Pike' he replies. Now that is miraculous.

Steve lived life to the full, enjoying adventure holidays with Lynn and friends, and spending precious time at home with the family.

Many of us will remember him as an actor in the Players. No-one who watched Steve perform in a panto wearing fishnet tights, a basque, high heeled shoes, outrageous makeup, and a wig, will ever forget that he was our Dame, our distractingly funny fool who always had a wry joke to make about life, and who always brought a smile to our faces.



He was such an asset to the Players not just because he acted with feeling and conviction, but because he gave so much good humour to the production. Long-term residents, unwanted pets and alien species which cannot be released, are kept at home with Chrissie. Among them is Thea, a Eurasian eagle owl, who had been living in a garden for six months, scaring everyone to death, until Chrissie was called in to take her away! She also has Icarus, rehomed from a friend, a male eagle owl, who is now 30 years old.



Chrissie hasn't always kept owls, but she has always been a country girl. A varied career has seen her go from farm hand to dog trainer, to employee at Solid State Logic, to chinchilla breeder and shop manager at Batsford.

A chance visit to a friend with a barn owl would start a life-long passion. Twenty years ago, she started showing her owls at country shows and taking them to schools, as well as doing presentations to local groups. "They used to fight over me on the WI circuit!" says Chrissie. Having seen her present her owls to the gardening club we can well imagine.

The advent of Covid, unfortunately coupled with Bird Flu, has inevitably made life very difficult, as the charity relies solely on donations and fees from shows and visits. Thanks to our 902 shareholders and everyone who's generously supported our campaign, we remain determined to secure its future for the village. last pub. Only through committed community support and our viable alternative to run the pub, will we be able to prevent a change of use planning application (if/when it comes).

To this end, the BacktheWhiteHorse campaign team is organising several events in coming weeks, so that the local community can get together and show that we still want to see the pub open and thriving. (Spoiler alert, there may be beer involved!)

- 11 September the 'pop-up White Horse'. For one night only, the village hall will take on the role of the village pub and since there is no longer a sign over the door, what better name could we choose? The bar will be open, thanks to the fantastic support from the team at the Social Club and all are welcome! We are hoping some of our local politicians and media can make it and repeat the backing they have given us.
- 17 **September** cake sale outside the village shop. We are hoping to recreate the great success we had in 2020, when American broadcaster ABC news was on hand, and we raised £1,000 for the campaign.
- **24 September** the return of the car wash. Another success from 2020 and a chance to spruce up the motor after the dusty summer or just laugh at the team getting soaked.
- 1 October our very own White Horse (mini) beer festival. Again at the village hall with beer, food and music. What better way for the village to come together and prove that we want our pub open again?

By attending these events, the village will be sending a strong message. Even though

we have made a purchase offer, we still need to raise a lot more funding. Shares are on sale at our website www.backthewhitehorse.com, still at £50 per share, or you can donate or sponsor an event if you prefer. We have a long way still to go to the target we need to buy and run the pub successfully and we must be realistic that this campaign may have to run for years. Many rural pubs have stayed shut for years only to be rescued by their community once the property developers have finally given up. Summer Swordsmanship Returns to Blenheim Palace

Bravado, swordsmanship and performance all combined as the 'Art of the Duel' returned to Blenheim Palace during August. Experienced and talented stage-fighting actors dazzled visitors with their re-enactment of classical two-person combat. Duelling's codes, traditions and gory details were all covered in the displays.



Between the 17th and early 19th centuries, duelling was a common way of settling disputes between members of the aristocracy. The performances included a particular focus on the young John Churchill's 1671 duel with Sir John Fenwick, with the action-packed displays exploring the art and awfulness of duelling.

Oxford Station redevelopment



On 17 August the Department for Transport confirmed it has awarded

£78.6m to Network Rail to support the redevelopment of Oxford station and railway, helping provide a bigger and better station, more services for passengers and freight, and improved journey times for passengers in the future.

The key changes include:

- The introduction of a new track and platform.
- A new western station entrance that will be built next to Botley Road.
- Improvements to the nearby road network and replacement of Botley Road bridge.

The track work to create three high-speed crossovers at Oxford North Junction will take place over four weekends in September and October 2022. This will mean that there will be no services in or out of Oxford on 10 and 11, 17 and 18, and 24 and 25 September, as well as 1 and 2 October.

The work to replace the bridge is scheduled to take place between 29 July and 6 August 2023. During this time Botley Road will be closed to through traffic and there will be no train services in or out of the station.

Help with the cost of living

At this time when we cannot fail to have noticed the rising prices of food and particularly fuel, Age UK Oxfordshire has compiled a checklist of the various grants which are available to help. There are eight different schemes from various sources, which are not all widely publicised and Age UK Oxfordshire welcomes this opportunity

to spread the word to any who may find it useful.

From the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP):

- £300 Pensioner cost of living payment. This is a one-off payment coming in November-December 2022 and will come automatically if you receive a Winter Fuel Payment and were born on or before 25 September 1956. If it is not paid automatically, you may need to apply by calling 0800 731 0160.
- £200-300 Winter Fuel Payment is paid automatically if you were born on or before 25 September 1956. In case of problems call 0800 731 0160.
- £150 Disability cost of living payment. A further one-off automatic payment due in September 2022 to those receiving one of the following benefits on 25 May 2022: Attendance allowance, Personal independence payment, Disability living allowance, Constant attendance allowance, Armed Forces independence Payment, War Pension Mobility supplement or Scottish Disability benefits. Regulations on this are still being written. Any problems: call DWP on 0800 731 0122.
- £650 Cost of living payment this is for those on means-tested benefits (Pension credit, Universal Credit, Income Support, income-based Jobseekers' allowance (JSA), income-based Employment and support allowance (ESA) and is paid automatically in two instalments. If you receive a tax credit and have already received a £650 payment, you cannot access this payment as well. For problems call 0800 731 0469.

From your energy company:

- £400 Energy Bills support scheme for all electricity customers, paid automatically as credit to your account or by voucher, between October 2022 and April 2023. In case of problems, call your electricity provider.
- £150 Warm Home discount, issued automatically between October 2022 and April 2023 by your energy provider as credit to your account, if you or your partner get the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit. Call your energy company for details.

From your District Council:

• £150 Council Tax rebate for properties in bands A-D, provided you or your partner are named on the bill. The rebate is paid automatically to direct debit customers between April 2022 and April 2023. Other customers will be sent written details of how to apply. In case of problems, contact WODC on 01993 861000 or visit www.westoxon.gov.uk/council-tax-and-benefits/.

Finally, the Government has provided an extra £500 million for local support via the Household Support Fund, which will be extended from October 2022 to March 2023. The Fund will be administered by local councils in England and further details are available from them.

Great Big Green Week

The heat and lack of rain this summer can't fail to bring climate change to the forefront of everyone's thinking. This year's Great Big Green week is from 24 September to 2 October. It is an opportunity for organisations and communities to come together to tackle the crisis and protect the environment. The theme this year is energy. Easy wins for the community to tackle this in small ways are:

- Change to LED lightbulbs where possible.
- Cut out harmful chemicals in cleaning products.
- · Improve insulation at home.
- · Swap to a green energy provider.
- Plant an appropriate tree in your garden.
- Switch short journeys to cycle journeys, share cars or use public transport where possible.
- Extend the life of clothes repair or pass on to someone else who can use them (or charity shop).
- A classic but probably one of the easiest & quickest changes to make, turning the thermostat down by just 1 degree and can cut your bills by over £50 a year.
- Shorter showers under 4 minutes is ideal!
- Turn the thermostat down slightly and use a timer so the heating is only on when you need it.
- Air dry clothes to reduce the energy (and cost) of tumble-drying washing.

- Turn it off! An easy one turn off lights, switches and appliances when not used.
- Eat more seasonal and local food and share food you might otherwise throw away with neighbours or the local larders / foodbanks (Witney has a larder which is open to all at The Amos Room, Methodist Church, High Street, Witney).

Dog Fouling

Please can all dog owners pick up dog waste (from their own dogs!) when out walking and place the bagged waste either in your own bin or one of the multi bins in the village. As a reminder, in England and Wales you can get fined £80 - with a maximum penalty of £1,000 (e.g. if your case goes to court) for not picking up dog mess. The UK dog fouling law, and related fine, does not apply to registered blind dog owners.

With local elections taking place in May 2023, West Oxfordshire residents are being urged to check their electoral registration details or risk losing their chance to vote on decisions that affect them as the Council starts its Annual household Canvass to check everyone's voting details are up to date.

Recent home movers in particular are urged to check their details. The Council will be contacting households via post in the coming months with information on what the householder needs to do to make sure their details are accurate. Improving Service Delivery

WODC is to change the use of its buildings in Witney to improve service delivery for residents and transparency when making local decisions. This will improve accessibility for residents by moving more services to the easily accessible Welch Way offices in the centre of town. It will also include the installation of a new system for viewing council meetings online and make the buildings more efficient.

Seeking commitment from Thames Water to reduce pollution

The Council is calling on Thames Water to do more to stop raw sewage being pumped into local rivers by increasing the capacity of sewage treatment works and also provide more transparent monitoring of sewage discharge.

The Council has asked Thames Water to move faster to increase sewage treatment capacity and will work closely with Thames Water, the Environment Agency and other key local organisations such as Windrush Against Sewage Pollution, and other community groups to achieve these aims. Specifically, by December 2025 to have increased the capacity of each sewage treatment works so that they can not only meet current demand but also what will be needed in future. The capacity increases should take account of future housing growth, rather than just increasing capacity to catch up which is the current approach.

Reducing Childcare Costs

I welcome the recently announced package of measures to reduce the cost of childcare for parents, boosting the number of childminders and driving up the take up of childcare offers to help parents with rising costs.

A consultation will be launched to look at increasing the number of children that can be looked after by each staff member in early years settings, which could reduce the cost of childcare by up to 15 per cent, or up to £40 per week. We are also increasing awareness of existing childcare offers, to boost take up by families.

Update on Salt Cross Garden Village

The Planning Inspector has responded to West Oxfordshire District Council on the Area Action Plan (AAP) for Salt Cross Garden Village, paving the way for the plan to be approved and setting the scene for the development to progress. The AAP, developed through extensive consultation with local communities, sets out the framework for how the Salt Cross Garden Village should be a landscape led development, taking into account key factors such as affordable housing, protecting the environment, active travel and business growth. A full public consultation is anticipated to take place shortly.





I'm a Reader...

Jane van der Ploeg, 66

When I ask Jane if she minds her age being divulged, she laughs cheerfully: "I've just got my state pension and my bus pass, I'm officially an old lady! I find this strangely liberating ... I'm not sure why." This means it is sixty years since Jane bought her first book, an occasion she remembers well. "My mum's brother in Herefordshire gave us one pound between the three of us sisters; it was old money, so we had six and eight each. The book was My Naughty Little Sister which was divine. I was always reading; my mother took me to the doctor, because I wasn't sleeping, complaining, 'she just goes under the covers with a torch and reads.' The doctor wasn't too worried."

Jane and her daughter Lauren (who has previously featured in these pages) set themselves a target to read a book a week back in 2018 and are still going. Jane has kept an assiduous handwritten record of all her reads in a notebook, and, as aidemémoire, records her views on each one. Necessarily, these remarks are short, and, consequently, sometimes comically damning: 'OK', 'twee', 'a bit pedestrian' and, 'mmm, not sure', nestle among the 'brilliant', 'loved it' and 'guilty pleasure'.

Jane's favourite authors are John Irving, Sebastian Faulks, and Margaret Atwood. However, I was particularly interested to learn, one afternoon in the library when I was volunteering, that Jane is a recent convert to the graphic novel*. She has worked for years as an English as a Foreign Language Teacher and it was an Italian male student who recommended, *Pyongyang: A Journey in North Korea* by Guy Delisle. "It completely changed my view of graphic novels; I thought they were

all like Spiderman and Batman, but my student explained they are half-way between prose and cinema. *Pyongyang* gives you a sense of the starkness of North Korea, that you possibly wouldn't get from a novel."

Jane's father was in the army, and so, as a child, she moved around frequently - Germany, Northern Ireland, Kenya and the slightly less glamorous Preston. They were in Berlin in August 1963, when President Kennedy made his famous 'Ich bin ein Berliner' speech. Her father pointed out that JFK had a daughter about Jane's age. Three months later the President was assassinated. "My sister and I were playing under the table when we heard the news on the radio...everyone was saying what an important man had been killed, I just thought of him as, 'that little girl's dad'."

Jane moved to Stonesfield in 1983 and has accordingly been regularly visiting our library for 39 years. It was smaller, with no children's room and before *that*, Jane remembers visiting a mobile library in the same spot. Was that still worth visiting? "Abso*lutely*" she says fervently, "we were young, not much money, the library was great."

*After note: volunteering at the library is a great opportunity to talk books with others in the village, why not sign up?

Local History: From the Oxford Journal - Saturday 25 October 1851

'Accidental and Fatal Accident - An inquest was held at the Marlborough Arms Inn, Stonesfield, on Tuesday, the 21st inst., by James Westell, Esq., coroner, on view of the body of William Lovegrove, of Old Basing Hants, labourer, aged 17 years, who died from injuries received on the Oxford, Worcester, and Wolverhampton Railway, at Northleigh. By the evidence it appeared that the deceased was employed on the above railway, and was on a certain waggon, which started and jerked him off between the wheels and the rocks, driving him for about 16 yards under the wheels, and was afterwards rolled out. His left arm and one of his legs was broken, and his head and body severely injured. He was immediately taken to Stonesfield and Mr. Abel Davis, of that place, started with him in a cart to the Oxford infirmary, but deceased died after getting two miles on his journey. Verdict - accidental death.' (Buried in Stonesfield on 22nd October 1851, Ed.)

Stonesfield Gardening Club

A challenging time in the garden for the last few weeks!

I'm sure we've all been watering as little as possible, while not wanting to lose precious plants or produce from the garden. Suzy Boardman says she has been watering at the allotment (those allotmenteers in Churchfields with the foresight to have water installed!) but has not done the blackberry, which has been very happy without. Our raspberries have been in many years and have deep roots, but I think the yield is down as they have not been irrigated.

Valerian (self-seeded in all our gardens, but none the worse for that) and Verbena Bonariensis are both happy in the dry.

Trisha Williams advocates Nandina Domestica, the Himalayan bamboo, which tolerates most conditions it seems. Also rosemary, Grevillea and some grasses.



Plants with grey foliage are naturally happy in dry conditions, my Perovskia always looks good as does cat mint and Eryngium, the sea holly. The RHS recommends Helichrysum, which is usually sold for containers. Mediterranean plants like lavender of course are always happy being baked.

For flowers the RHS recommends Cistus, Halimiocistus, Fremontodendron (climber), tree lupin and Spanish broom. I recommend we all takes notes of what has survived this summer and let everyone else know – knowledge is power!

The Evenlode: A team of our volunteers took part in sampling the river as part of the Evenlode WaterBlitz in July. The data from all the groups that took part was collated and the results show high levels of Nitrates, Phosphates and poor ecological status at sampling sites: More details at: www.freshwaterwatch.org

We will continue to sample the river using these tests but we are also investigating what other kinds of testing we could do that might give us more insight, this could include E.Coli testing and measuring the levels of invertebrates to give a more detailed picture of the state of the river. We will report back when we have more information.

We are excited to share with you the attached infographic of our water quality summary report for 2021-2022. The incredible data collected is now the biggest contributor to water quality monitoring in the catchment and is showing that sewage effluent is the main cause of poor water quality in the Evenlode. From the Rector:

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of Rev Roy Turner, our former Rector, after a very brief illness. Roy's funeral was held at St Laurence, Combe, on Tuesday 16 August, followed by cremation at North Oxford Crematorium.

The following words are based on the eulogy given by Rev Canon Andrew Wingfield Digby at Roy's funeral, with thanks to Bev Turner, Rachel, Hannah and Jonathan.

Roy was born in Yorkshire on 10 December 1951, one of five children. He dreamed of joining the RAF but was discouraged from doing so by his father. But he never lost his love of flying, and flew a helicopter into Combe churchyard to deliver his daughter Rachel for her wedding. More recently he has made new friends at Enstone Flying Club. After school he became a qualified heating and ventilation engineer, then a salesman, and ran his own business,

Agathos Group. Family was always a central theme of his life. He married Bey in 1980 and they had four children. Sadly, their second child, David, was born with a rare genetic condition and died aged 9, having been cared for latterly at the Martin House Children's Hospice in Boston Spa. This period of Roy's life had many challenges, but Roy's faith never faltered. In due course their journey led them into the Anglican church, and Roy was ordained in Christ Church Cathedral in 2000, becoming curate at Woodstock and Bladon, then serving as Vicar at Brize Norton and Carterton, and finally as Rector of Stonesfield and Combe.

Roy said the best decision he ever made was when he was 16 and at a Methodist youth weekend, he gave his life to Jesus Christ. For the rest of his life Jesus was at the centre of all he did. He knew that what Jesus said in John 14 is true: 'I am the way, the Truth, and the Life; no one comes to the Father but by me'. Initially his Christian faith led him into music and he was part of a Christian Gospel group called 'Faith' which recorded, and toured the country. He met Bev through the house church they were attending and their love bloomed as he taught her to drive. Following David's death, Roy and Bev became involved with their local Anglican church, and Roy began to sense a calling to ordination in the Church of England. Theological studies at Mattersey and Sheffield University prepared him for ministry after moving here to Oxfordshire.

Roy's life has been cut short too soon and too suddenly, just as Bev and he were making great plans for retirement. He will be remembered for his great kindness, his encouragement and friendship. He was an immensely genial man to whom people warmed instantly. But he might then surprise you with a Yorkshire turn of phrase – 'Spraggie' was his affectionate name for children and grandchildren. 'Pass the gravy' became 'Can you pass the Royal Navy'. He could also surprise his hearers in the pulpit, where a magic trick might illustrate a sermon.

Roy's friends and family have been reeling from the suddenness of his passing. Grief and loss with so little warning is very hard to cope with. But believers do not grieve without hope. The day Roy died is the day he went to Heaven to be with the Lord he loved and served since he was 16. He would entirely agree with St Paul when he wrote in Romans 14: 'If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord, so whether we live or die we belong to the Lord'.

So on what basis can we be confident now that Roy is indeed in Heaven? He has been a great husband, father and grandfather, he was always great company, he was an accomplished and enthusiastic musician singing children's songs and even taking part in a Kids Praise production. He had a great sense of humour and had a gift for making others smile and laugh. The family has recently enjoyed celebrating Bey's retirement at Sandbanks, and no doubt he was on great form as the family gathered together. By any estimation the man we are thanking God for today was a good chap, and I have not met anyone with a bad word to say about him. But his manifest decency is not the reason for our hope. His

favourite hymn was 'Great is thy faithfulness', which has been sung at all of the great occasions in Roy's life. His hope of Heaven is based on the faithfulness of God, not on his own faithfulness or merit. He knew deep in his heart that there was no shadow or turning with God; he knew that all he needed God's hand had provided; he knew and experienced pardon for sin and a peace that endureth...so he has bright hope for tomorrow.

At this funeral and thanksgiving service he would be disappointed if I did not close by urging anyone who has not done so to do what Roy did 54 years ago and welcome the Lord Jesus into your life as Lord and Saviour. His last words to me were 'Andrew, the Lord has numbered my days'. His untimely death is an opportunity for all of us to do business with God before our days too are numbered.

Rest in peace my friend and rise in glory.

It's never too late

Do you worry about being late? Lateness and preparation are surfaced in both the Old and New Testaments, reflecting the agricultural nature of those Iron Age cultures, but with a slightly different focus. In the Old Testament it is recognition that there is delay and lateness as we are told in Exodus 9:32

But the wheat and the spelt were not ruined, for they ripen late. We can take from that an understanding that disasters might occur and we think 'all is lost' but much may be saved or redeemed.

However, we see that redemption is made manifest in the New Testament as the tone shifts to preparedness for salvation: Luke 12:40 exhorts us to be ready 'You also must be ready for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect'. Again, Matthew 24:36 tells us 'But concerning that day and hour no one knows, not even the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but the Father only'.

If we put those two themes of lateness and preparation together, we see that a coherent message for us emerges: we might be late, but we can also and always be ready to accept the Lord.

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
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








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
