Any one of us might need support from our village at some point, and the pub team, along with our wider community, want to help.

The 'Reverse Advent Calendar' initiative has been very much appreciated over the last two years and we'd like to ask for your help again. We're hoping to encourage as many people as possible to become community champions by using our reverse advent calendar guide to create a festive food parcel that can be delivered to a household in need.

It's easy to get involved: simply wrap an empty box - ideally in festive paper - leaving the top open. Then from now until 17 December, add the items suggested daily on the calendar, or an alternative of your choice, that can be served cold if necessary (avoiding nuts/alcohol please). It's also fine if there are more or fewer items in your box – everything will help and be gratefully received.

Charlbury Christmas Trees – an update for 2022 season

The good news is that we will be opening this year to sell Christmas trees. We will be open weekends in December (as advertised on page 4) from 9am to 4pm. We hope that you will add your annual visit to Charlbury Christmas Trees to your diary.

For this Christmas, we still have plenty of trees 7/8 foot and above to choose from and to have cut. However, our younger trees, and there are plenty of them, have still not made quite enough growth to be cut this year. This means that, as in 2021, we do not have sufficient trees growing up to 6/7 foot that we can cut.

For Christmas 2021, for many reasons a challenging year for all, we made the decision to open. This involved us being able to meet the demand for trees up to 6/7 feet high. We did this by sourcing pre-cut trees from a well-known and well-respected supplier with whom we had a long-standing relationship, a supplier with some high-profile clients.

For Christmas 2022, we have reviewed our 2021 operation. Our aim each year has been to enable us to open, as we know that a visit to Charlbury Christmas Trees has become an integral part in the run-up to Christmas for many families. But we are also aware that we need to make the best offer possible for our customers and that a key criterion for our customers will be the freshness of the trees bought.

For this year we have done further research. And we believe that we have found the solution that will allow us to provide trees that we can guarantee are very freshly cut, nearly as freshly cut as ours.

We have made contact with a Christmas tree grower in the Vale of Evesham who has agreed to supply us. We have visited the grower and have been shown his trees. Not only will he supply us, but he has agreed that we can visit during the week prior to each of our opening weekends to select and cut trees to sell.

So we will be open this season and will have trees of all heights for sale. We hope that you will pay us a visit. You can enjoy your annual wander around the plantation and view the trees we have for sale and hopefully you will find the tree that you want to take home.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

Update from 2 November meeting.

Septembeer festival: Plans for this to take place in 2023. The group are raising funds for the Stonesfield play park, Cancer Research and Berks, Bucks, Oxon wildlife trust. Advanced fundraising taking place. The council supports this event.

Cllr A Graham reported to the council: Budget setting for OCC is in process – looking for savings of around £50 million. £30 million of this is a direct result of inflation. £20 million is as a result of lack of government support for adult and social care.

OCC working with Oxfordshire community foundation asking people who do not need £400 energy rebate to donate it to help those in need.

OCC hosted '20 is plenty' national conference. Roll out in Fawler shortly. Wootton is joining soon and Bladon will also be joining the scheme shortly. Woodstock likely to join the scheme in 2023.

WODC allocation of £100k and a youth champion for the DC in place to represent the youths in the District.

WODC £200k has also been put in place to support larders and similar organisations.

WODC rural prosperity fund has been set up. £750k has been put aside to support rural initiatives. This is to help support farmers and village shops with diversification amongst other things. The cabinet meetings are now touring, held across District. Members of the public are welcome to attend. It will be in Woodstock in January.

Town shop in centre of Witney will now be handling queries for Council tax and benefits predominantly.

Local plan process has commenced. Waterways Day is on 18 Nov. The council is bringing Thames Water and campaigning groups fighting for cleaner water together. It is at Woodgreen in West Oxfordshire for those that would like to visit.

Cllr Geraldine Lawrence reported that footpaths at bottom of Combe Road seem to be attracting anti-social behaviour. This has been reported to police.

Financial matters: The parish council agreed to pay:

- £200 for the war memorial plaque in memory of Frank Hall
- costs to cover 50% of the church clock repair
- a contribution of £200 towards the church burial ground grass-cutting costs which we had budgeted for
- costs of £50 for a wreath for the Royal British Legion.

The council will be budget-setting over the next two months.

Planning Applications

22/02751/HHD – Middlecote, High Street, Stonesfield. There is no objection to this planning application.

Cost of living crisis: Council

discussed support the council can offer in the community during the cost of living crisis. Susan Rudlin is ready to help push out information on the reverse advert calendar but we do not have a list of those who need at the moment. We do not need to know names but would be keen to know numbers of those who might need support. Discussions will continue.

Next meeting: The date of the next full council meeting is 7 December 2022, St James' Centre at 7pm.

Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan

With invaluable help from our volunteers, we have now created the survey. As I write, it is being tested on a sample audience, to check that the questions make sense and elicit answers that we can tabulate and analyse. The answers to the questions we are asking will tell us what you think about future developments and various aspects of our physical environment: what you care about, what you want to protect, what you are prepared to see changed. The survey has to read well, engage your attention, and take no more than 30 minutes to complete. All this needs careful preparation before a final version is released.

The survey will be circulated as a paper document to every household, but we will be encouraging you to complete it online if at all possible. We want to avoid distributing it over Christmas, so we have decided to delay its delivery until February. There will be a piece in the February *Slate* telling you what to expect and how to fill it in.

We hope everyone will see this survey as a vital piece of community work and do their bit by completing it. Your answers will enable us to write a Neighbourhood Plan that will help to preserve the Stonesfield you care about for future generations.

News from West Oxfordshire

Cabinet meetings, where key decisions are made for the local area, in public, will continue to tour into 2023 to make it easier for people to take part in local democracy and have their say. Cllr Andy Graham, Leader of the Council said, 'The Cabinet meets once a month in public and makes key decisions that affect the whole district as part of the operation of the Council. We want that process to be open, transparent, and easy for local people to see democracy in action.

'We will be holding Cabinet meetings across West Oxfordshire over the coming months, which we hope will encourage more people to become involved and feel more like we are here to serve them. I encourage local people to turn up and be heard when the meetings are in their area. We look forward to seeing people there and will be ready to talk to people about what matters to them. This is your Council.'

From our County Councillor

I am now in full recovery mode having had open heart surgery which, as you know, kept me out of service since mid August. Health is and must be the number 1 priority for us all and that could not have been brought home to me more.

The good news is that I will be up and running as your county councillor from November resuming the duties I took on for the whole of Woodstock and surrounding villages.

The latest news is the Lib Dem-led alliance at County Hall continues to roll out the 30mph to 20mph reduced speed scheme to villages in Combe, with The Bartons with Bladon, Wootton, Woodstock awaiting approval.

I will resume chairing the working group I set up to address the home-to-schools transport policy review in November and December with a report and recommendations for improvements.

I have been working with Tackley Parish Council over the railway crossing which was temporarily closed as a result of Network Rail deeming it unsafe. A resolution to ensure access to the bridleway for pedestrians and equestrian riders is moving forward and I have been involved in bringing the parties together to get a resolution.

Flooding continues to be an issue in certain areas of the division and I am supporting a catchment area study with landowners, the County and Parish Council in Tackley where there has been a long history of flooding in the village, and have ensured flood mitigated measures have been put in place.

I will be following up on initiatives to improve the surfaces outside the shops in Stonesfield but this relies on co-operation with the shop owners whom I have met, with a member of the Parish Council, to further the safety and improved maintenance of that area.

Boundary Commission proposals

On 8 November, the Boundary Commission issued revised proposals for new Parliamentary constituency boundaries in the South East region. Below is an extract from that proposal which relates to the proposal for a new constituency for Stonesfield.

'3.158 The initial proposals for Oxfordshire were broadly well received, with a number of constituencies receiving very few representations. The Green Party, the Labour Party, and the Liberal Democrats all supported our proposals in Oxfordshire with no amendments, and the Conservative Party made a counter proposal impacting just one ward.

3.159 There was, however, significant opposition from a number of individual

respondents to the proposed Bicester constituency, principally from five wards of West Oxfordshire district that we proposed including in the constituency. Responses from these wards (Eynsham and Cassington, Freeland and Hanborough, North Leigh, Stonesfield and Tackley, and Woodstock and Bladon) stressed their ties to the nearby town of Witney, and a corresponding lack of connections to Bicester in neighbouring Cherwell district. Despite this sentiment, only one counterproposal, from Oliver Raven (BCE-85388), provided an alternative that attempted to address this concern. This counterproposal proposed a rotation of wards around the county, with the objective of reuniting the three wards of Eynsham and Cassington, Freeland and Hanborough, and North Leigh with the Witney constituency. This subsequently led to knock-on impacts in the form of alternative constituency pairings of population centres, namely Bicester and Thame, Henley and Didcot, and Kidlington and Abingdon.

3.160 The Assistant Commissioners investigated a number of potential alternatives within Oxfordshire to try and address these concerns of electors living near Witney who were proposed to join the Bicester constituency; these alternatives included both Oliver Raven's counterproposal and their own alternatives. Ultimately, however, they determined that any changes necessary to facilitate this would be too disruptive to every other constituency within the county, which were well-received or uncontentious.

3.161 In recognition of the local authority crossing that was the source of much of the opposition to the proposed Bicester constituency, the Assistant Commissioners felt that including the name of a settlement within West Oxfordshire in the constituency name would better reflect the extent of communities within the constituency; they therefore proposed that the constituency should be renamed Bicester and Woodstock, but retain the boundaries as in the initial proposals. We agree that this would be a more appropriate name for this constituency, giving recognition to the West Oxfordshire wards included, and therefore accept this recommendation.'

The consultation on this proposal **ends on 5 December**. The public are invited to view and comment via www.bcereviews.org.uk.

After this final consultation has closed, the Commission will analyse the responses and form its final recommendations. These will be submitted to Parliament by 1 July 2023.

Botley West Solar Farm

Photovolt Development Partners (PVDP) is proposing a new solar farm in the west of Oxfordshire called Botley West Solar Farm (Botley West), stretching from Wotton to Cumnor. Botley West could deliver 840 Megawatts of power to the National Grid, enough electricity to power approximately 330,000 homes. Construction could start in Summer 2025.

A public consultation on proposals for the solar farm will be held **up to and including 15 December 2022**. During that time you can send your thoughts via an online feedback form (on the website), email, phone or post.

From our MP

(extracts from Robert Courts' Community Newsletter)

EV charging points: Good to see the new central government-funded electric vehicle chargers up and running in Eynsham. The Government is funding 280 EV charging points across our county, including at five sites in West Oxfordshire: Witney, Carterton, Eynsham, Chipping Norton and Woodstock. This project has given our area a huge boost in improving EV infrastructure and supporting our transition to cleaner vehicles.

Increased fines for illegal sewage

spills: I welcome the plans announced by the Environment Secretary to raise the civil penalty for water companies who pollute the environment by 1,000-fold - from £250,000 to up to £250 million.

Increasing the financial penalties which the Environment Agency can hand out without going through the courts will ensure quick and strong action can be taken against water companies that illegally pollute our environment.

The Environment Agency must take advantage of these new powers to hold water companies to account and make sure the polluter pays for the environmental harm they cause.

These proposals represent a further step forward in our campaign to end harm from sewage pollution and protect the health of our local rivers.

Defence Select Committee: Following the recent reshuffle, I am no longer the Minister for Aviation & Maritime at the Department for Transport. I wish my successors the very best. I am honoured and delighted to have now been elected to the House of Commons Defence Select Committee by colleagues. At this critical time for the UK's defence and security, I am looking forward to scrutinising the Ministry of Defence and working to improve the UK's defence policy.

Thames Valley Police

As part of Thames Valley Police's commitment to give the public an insight into its work, the force has released statistics on its activity over the six months 1 April to 30 September 2022.

.....

This period saw the force undertake one of its largest and most significant operations in its history, with more than 2,500 police officers and staff policing the committal service in Windsor of Her Majesty The Queen. Over the six months, the force policed high-profile Thames Valley events including Royal Ascot, Henley Regatta and Reading Festival.

Over this time, the force, which protects communities across Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire, received almost half a million contacts from the public, attended almost 500 incidents a day and made 15,000 arrests; 30% of these arrests related to domestic abuse.

I'm a Reader ... Ella Thornburn, 17

I'm a Reader has met several Stonesfield library users now, across a broad span of ages. This month, it seemed an interesting idea to talk to someone who used to come to the library often but hasn't been for several years. Is there still something for them at the library? Let's find out.

Ella Thornburn, 17, in the first year of her A Levels, taking English Literature, Drama and Art, loves reading but is more likely to use her school library, and so hasn't been in the village library for a long time, even though it is on the doorstep.

She was excited and nostalgic to return. As we walk through the door, the bright light welcoming us in, away from the dark and dreary afternoon, a broad smile appears on Ella's face; 'I remember sitting in the children's bit and hunting with my friend for Jacqueline Wilson books!' she says, animatedly. 'My favourite was *Hetty Feather;* I fancied myself a young writer. Hetty is a Victorian orphan who is forced into service, but wants to write also, even though she is uneducated and destitute. She is defiant and fights against her fate.'

We are here to see if Ella will easily find a book in Stonesfield library that she would enjoy reading, even though the collection is quite small (albeit perfectly formed); is there still reason to visit, when you are no longer brought in by an adult after a trip to the playground?

'I always used to spy on the adult section,' says Ella, 'because it had bigger and better books.'

What Ella is looking for today, is something 'well written, but not too

intense, as I'm already reading lots of classics for school'. Her eves fall on the crime section, and one particular book, by Peter Lovesey, called The Stone Wife. 'The cover looks ominous,' says Ella, approvingly - of a photo of a large Victorian red brick mansion, seen from a side angle from the ground, the house almost overpowered by a brooding black cloud in the sky and a dark hedge that looks like it will soon outgrow the house. 'I don't know what's going to happen, but it doesn't look pleasant,' grins Ella. 'Not that you should judge a book by its cover.' It is, it turns out, about a murder that takes place over a medieval carving of Chaucer's Wife of Bath (who had five husbands and a lot to say about how badly the 14th century treated women). The detective discovers that the carving starts to have a malign influence on his life ...

Ella also likes the look of Anne Enright's *Actress*; this novel explores a motherdaughter relationship, where the mother is a (fictional) twentieth century legend of stage and screen. Ella wants to go to drama school, performs in several local companies (including the Stonesfield Players) and is currently co-writing a play, so this book, by the Booker prize-winning Irish author of *The Gathering*, seems very appealing.

The conclusion of our experiment is that Ella didn't need to spend very long in the library to find a book she would like to read. We didn't even look at non-fiction or biography. Ella plans to come back and one day perhaps there will be a copy of her play on the shelves.

Nature Notes: Spiders come out to play

Autumn is the time of year for spiders to get active and mate. They are seen more often and the various webs shine in the morning dew. The male house spider rushes about in search of a mate and can end up in your bath. If he is lucky he mates and if he is really lucky she doesn't eat him.



I spotted a small, 10mm, long spindly legged spider half way up the stairs. Just as the corner of the wall meets the ceiling. The random threads forming a web were hard to see. Spiders can teach us stillness and patience. Day one, no movement and nothing happened. Day two still no movement, I wondered if everything was all right. Day three the spider, a 'daddy long legs spider', was in position and a small bundle was in the threads of the web...looking like another spider. Day four, the spider was gone. Daddy long legs spiders are common and easy to see once you get your eyes ready and your duster kept away. They can shake the webs as a defence mechanism and are very agile.

Spiders are deeply rooted in the human psyche from fascination to repulsion. No insect (spiders are not part of the insect class) occurs so widely in comics and films. Our relationships with spiders is intriguing.

Local history: Oxford Chronicle and Reading Gazette Saturday 12 January 1861

'Frost Amusements. - Put out in the open air conical wine or rummer glass, and notice the vagaries and forms the ice will assume - no two days alike; one day filled with air bubbles; another, the enclosed or condensed air assuming the forms of dirks and daggers and round-headed pins. The surface this day level, to-morrow, even though the weather be calm, raised into mimic hills and mountains. The expansion too of the ice, ten to twenty per cent., perhaps more, according to the strength of the frost, showing in miniature the effects of frost, how it might, in its destructive power, even rend rocks. Its utility is seen in pulverizing and drying the soil, and in the making of slates, as at Stonesfield, in this county, where the stones sent up by pit shafts in summer, are in winter, by the strength of frost, spilt into slates.'

Suit worn by Winston Churchill goes on display



A 1950s grey pinstripe suit worn by Sir Winston Churchill has gone on display at his birthplace, Blenheim Palace. The suit was made by British fashion retailer Austin Reed and includes a label dated *16/9/53

RT Hon Sir Winston S. Churchill K.C.G. It is on show as part of an exhibition dedicated to the 'greatest Briton' and his lifelong association with the Oxfordshire UNESCO World Heritage Site.

The suit, which was purchased at auction, is accompanied by a two-page letter confirming its authenticity and stating it was given by his wife, Lady Churchill, to a Mary Williams in the 1960s.

The future Prime Minister and wartime leader was born at the Palace on 30 November 1874. His father, Lord Randolph Churchill, was the youngest son of the 7th Duke of Marlborough. His mother, Lady Churchill, was at Blenheim with her husband attending a St Andrew's Day ball when she unexpectedly went into labour.

As well as being his birthplace, Blenheim is also where he proposed to his beloved wife Clementine in the Temple of Diana during a summer rainstorm.

He is quoted as saying: 'At Blenheim I took two very important decisions: to be born and to marry. I am content with the decision I took on both occasions.'

Churchill is buried, alongside Clementine, in Bladon churchyard on the edge of the estate.

Our November meeting was a bumper one, with a visit from Chrissie's Owls as well as a talk.

We kicked off the evening with Chrissie coming to thank us for our donation to her charity, and bringing with her Ben, an Indian Eagle Owl, to say hello. He was obviously very interested in what was going on in the hall, twisting his head this way and that, while Chrissie told us what a busy year they have had. Eighty (yes, 80!) owls have already been rescued this year,



but, with bird flu about, they are unable to release any back into the wild for the time being.

Jane Ellis and Genny Early then told us all about their charity, Farmland Bird Aid, set up twenty years ago to help farmland birds through the 'hungry gap' which has been created by changing farming practices. Ploughing directly after harvesting instead of leaving stubble over the winter, cutting back hedgerows earlier, cultivating tight to the field boundaries are all examples that have reduced the amount of natural bird food available in the winter. Farmers and volunteers are now helping to redress this balance with supplementary feeding as well as sowing bird seed crops, allowing hedgerows to grow bigger and leaving wider field margins. Local farmers are clubbing together to apply for the latest agricultural subsidies available for these nature friendly actions.

Locally, there are 50 people feeding birds on a regular rota on our farms and footpaths, over 20 sites. Yellowhammers and linnets are now seen in large numbers up the Oxfordshire Way towards Charlbury – look out for them when you next walk up there! From the Rector – The Birth of a Child

Although I spend most of my time on parish business, I also have the role of Vocations Advisor in the Diocese of Oxford, as did Rev Roy my predecessor. This is all about encouraging people to think about the ways in which God may be calling them to service in the church, either to 'ordained' ministry, or to 'lay' ministry. Ordained ministry means becoming a Deacon, a Priest or a Bishop, while Lav ministry can cover a wide range of responsibilities such as preaching, teaching, youth and community work, as well as pioneer work in new housing areas. Both Ordained ministry and Lay ministry can be full-time or part-time, paid or unpaid. Most women or men who are ordained (and often called 'clergy') eventually take on responsibility for a parish, as I have here. The role is properly called 'Parish Priest' in the Church of England, but we may be known as Vicar or Rector. These mean the same today, and are just historical titles. But not all Church of England clergy have responsibility for

parishes. Many are called 'chaplains' and work in prisons, schools, hospitals, hospices, universities, airports and stations, industrial areas, in the armed forces, and even in Parliament.

As a young man I spent two years as a lay minister working with students, and for a large part of my ordained ministry I was a university chaplain in Oxford. In those roles, it was exciting to see young people preparing for adult life, with all the drama and anxiety it entails. But the great beauty and privilege of working as a parish priest is the opportunity to be part of the whole cycle of human experience, from birth through to death, and all the things which happen to us in between.

The cycle of the Christian year, which remembers the life, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth, echoes the cycle of our own lives. At this time of the year we celebrate the birth of Jesus, a boy born in a troubled community, whose parents fled as refugees to a neighbouring state until it was safe to return. In him we see the joy and promise and worry which a new baby brings, which in the case of Jesus was especially poignant, given the prophesies made about him. We see the thrill and the strain of parenthood as Mary and Joseph began to understand the ways in which their son was special, and yet normal too. They must have wondered, as all parents do, what sort of life he would live, and prayed for his safety - not knowing just how extraordinary his life would be, the manner and time of his death, or the way in which this tiny baby would, as an adult, have such a profound effect upon the world and upon its people.

This Christmas, as we celebrate the birth of Jesus, whom we know as the Saviour, we

recognise God's presence in our own lives too - knowing and loving us from before we were born, all the way to the eternity for which we were created. Jesus was born to share our life, to bring God's peace to our lives and to our broken world, to reveal God's love even in the turmoil and hurt of human existence, and to call us to know God ever more deeply.

I wish you all a very happy Christmas, and hope you will join us in church for our Christmas celebrations.
