

Survey for the Neighbourhood Plan

Your chance to have a say in the way Stonesfield develops

What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

Neighbourhood planning gives communities direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood and shape the development and growth of their community.

The Neighbourhood Plan will allow Stonesfield residents to participate in making the policies on which planning decisions are made. We need evidence upon which to base the policies. An important source of the evidence will be answers to the survey written by the Parish Council Steering Group.

What is the survey? The survey will ask you to say what sort of housing you think Stonesfield needs, what transport and other resources you value, and which green spaces you want to protect from development. The Steering Group will collect and analyse your answers and express them as policies in our Neighbourhood Plan.

What's it got to do with me? These policies will stand as your statement of how you want Stonesfield to develop: what sort of houses you say you need, how they should look, what land you would like protected, what infrastructure you think needs to be provided.

Your views are crucial. Without your responses to the survey, we cannot draft the policies. If we have no policies, Stonesfield will have nothing to offer when resisting inappropriate planning applications. Please make every effort to complete and return the survey, so we can

record your views and preferences and create a development plan for the village, now and for future generations.

Why does it matter? We are in the Cotswolds Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), which should protect us. In 2018 the community successfully fought off an application to build 68 houses on the Stonesfield Straight. But beautiful countryside and lovely views are seemingly no longer sacrosanct. The developers may well be back.

When will I get the survey? The survey will be delivered as a paper document to every household at the end of February. We would strongly encourage you to complete it online – it's very simple, and only takes about half an hour. Instructions for how to do this will be on the survey itself and in the *Slate* as well as on social media. Paper copies will also be acceptable. The deadline for completion will be 31 March 2023.

What happens next? When the draft Plan has been completed by the Steering Group the village will be asked in a referendum to approve it. Then, once it has also been approved by the District Council, it will form part of the Local Development Plan. All planning applications must be determined with regard to the Local Development Plan which will include Stonesfield's Neighbourhood Plan.

The more people who complete the survey, the more accurate the picture will be of how you want the village to develop. So please complete the survey, and encourage friends and family to do the same.

Defibrillators

Did you know Stonesfield has **two defibrillators in the village** which are accessible to members of the public?

The Parish Council would like to ensure that **everyone is aware** of this vital life saving equipment. Over the Christmas period we understand that the ambulance service mis-informed someone who needed a defibrillator that the nearest one was in a neighbouring village.



Our defibrillators are located at the **Village Hall** (outside the entrance doorway - accessible every day, all day) and at the **Pre-School** - 4 Glovers Yard, Stonesfield, Witney OX29 8PT.

Both defibrillators have pads for both adults and children and are suitable for ALL users. Both are registered with South Central Ambulance Service (SCAS). When you dial 999 they will give you the codes to



access the box. The parish council funds batteries and pads for both defibrillators to ensure they are ready for use if required. Please contact the parish council if you have any queries regarding the defibrillators or if you notice either are damaged at any point (they are checked and maintained regularly - at least once a week).

Untreated sewage discharges can be followed in real-time on the Thames Water Utilities website

Following the pressure from numerous community groups, such as the signatories of a petition, Thames Water Utilities developed a live monitoring system that advises the residents about every single discharge of raw sewage released from their storm overflow tanks straight into the rivers.

While this is a step forward, it is really disappointing to see that as of today all but one Sewage Treatment Works along the river Evenlode are or have been discharging raw sewage into the river within the last 48hrs; some for more than 100hrs already.

This campaign is not over!

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

Notes from the January meeting:

Scouts: Scouts representatives attended this meeting. They have the planning permission for a new Scout hut and fundraising to date has been relatively successful. Further monies are needed but work can commence. Scouts will be letter-dropping those nearest to the Scout hut to provide further information, and an update is included elsewhere in the *Slate*. The builder for the Scout hut is a local person. The steps at the Scout hut need to be made safer. The Scouts are looking into this as they own those steps. The council is supportive of the work that the Scouts are doing.

Botley Solar: It was noted that the Parish Council supports Bladon's response to the Botley West solar park, which was very detailed. A copy of the supporting document from SPC can be found on the website.

County, District & Parish Councillors' reports

County & District

- There is a £2 bus scheme in place for reduced travel. There may be a scheme for a reduced bus scheme for young people on the buses coming in.
- WODC Cabinet is touring. The clerk will liaise with Cllr Graham to see if we can host a cabinet meeting in the village later in 2023.

 The cabinet has decided not to have pavement licences - they will also refund fees paid in 2022 - which should encourage people back on to the High Street. This will be welcome news for our local and neighbouring towns.

Parish Council

- Residents are reporting blocked drains and potholes – the clerk is reporting these, as are our councillors. Residents are encouraged to report ALL blocked drains, potholes, highway issues via Fixmystreet – www.fixmystreet.com
- Neighbourhood Plan meeting held recently focussed mainly on the survey. The Community Trust are meeting with NP w/c 16 January.
- Graffiti at bus shelter the council are looking to clean this up.
- Overgrown hedge on Pond Hill is causing a problem. This has been reported to Highways.
- It is noted that the White Horse pub is on the market (as a pub) for £550k.
- Defibrillators the clerk confirmed they are registered with SCAS (Ambulance service) – there is a call-out for first responders. If any villagers are interested there is a first responder scheme that can be joined nationally.
- Playing Fields Association wish to buy a hedge cutter – they may potentially put a grant form to the parish council. The parish council could possibly use them

for hedge cutting providing costs are competitive and all necessary insurances and qualifications for those using it are held.

- There have been 4 incidents of vandalism on the SID at the war memorial. The SID will be moved to another location.
- The council heard from Susan Rudlin that the reverse advent calendar was a success. This is great news and the Parish Council thanks the team for organising this.

Financial matters

- There was a grant request from the Playing Fields Association for the sum of £1,932. Councillors approved to pay this grant in full.
- The council approved the precept % for 2023/24 at 2% against Band D council tax rates. This comes to an annual precept figure of £37,299 for our section of council tax.
- The council approved the proposed budget for 2023/24, which was circulated and discussed at the meeting.

Planning Applications

23/03472/HHD – Mr Mee, Middlecote, High Street, Stonesfield. Erection of single and two-storey front extension and conversion of garage to habitable space together with associated works. – NO OBJECTION from the Parish Council.

23/03434/HHD – Ms Armando Zozaya, 16 Busby Close, Stonesfield. Garage conversion and extension – NO OBJECTION from the Parish Council.

Council: Cllr Geraldine Lawrence advised that she is standing down as councillor at

the end of this term and will not be restanding at election.

Use it or potentially lose it! Bus Service S3 north of Woodstock, including both branches to Charlbury and Chipping Norton, was declared as non-commercial by Stagecoach. Since October 2022 it has been run under contract to the County Council. This arrangement will run until August 2024. This funding was obtained to give bus services which have suffered as a result of the pandemic a chance to return to commercial viability. Ultimately, the service needs more fare-paying passengers to use it for it to be a commercial success; the implementation of the Oxford traffic filter scheme may well generate additional usage but we will not know if that is the case until early 2024. We encourage people to use the S3 service and encourage others locally. If we do not use it, we could lose it!

2023 Stonesfield Parish Council meeting dates:

All at 7pm, usually at Stonesfield Primary School. 1 February / 1 March / April – tbc (due to annual elections) /10 May - delayed due to elections, may be later in month with annual Parish Meeting / 7 June / 5 July / no August meeting / 6 September / 4 October / 8 November / 6 December.

Elections: This year is an election year in Stonesfield. Elections take place in May but forms to get your name on the election list come out end March. ALL seats for the Parish Council are to be re-elected. We need you to represent your village.

Some of our existing councillors would like to sit again but it is likely not all - all seats need to be re-elected. If you are interested in becoming a councillor please come along to a Parish Council meeting, chat to an existing councillor or the clerk to ask questions about what it may involve.

Being a councillor is an unpaid role and does require a few hours of your time each month (including one evening monthly meeting) but it does not require any formal qualifications - just an interest in what's going on in your community.

You can make a difference in your village, your voice can influence District and County decisions, you can influence budget and how money is spent in the village and provide a voice for members of the village amongst many other things. Being a councillor is for everyone aged 18 and over. It would be great to have representation from some of our youngsters too.

To find out a bit more informally there are some **FREE zoom sessions** 'So you want to be a councillor?' These are arranged by the Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils. Each is a one hour session which sets out the basics of being a councillor, with the opportunity to ask questions as well.

The sessions are one hour long, *no need to book*, on 13 February 10–11am and 15 March 2–3pm.

News from West Oxfordshire

At the beginning of December WODC launched a **consultation on the plans for its budget** for the next financial year. Residents can take part in the consultation by visiting the Council's website at www.westoxon.gov.uk/budget Physical copies of the consultation questions will also be available in the council offices in Witney.

The Council has agreed a total fund of £200,000 to help with the cost of living crisis. Various support schemes have been developed in partnership with local communities who have been advising the Council on where they can provide the best support. WODC has opened up a grants scheme to financially support local groups helping their community through the cost of living crisis. 18 groups have been given funding. The Council is also running a campaign to help people understand what support is available to them both nationally and locally. Visit www.westoxon.gov.uk/costoflivingsupport to find out more.

WODC has completed the **purchase of the buildings and assets of Marriotts Walk** in the middle of Witney as part of wider plans to reinvigorate town centres across West Oxfordshire.

From our MP

Extracts from Robert Courts' Newsletter

......

Update on sewage pollution: When new homes are built, they must have the infrastructure that is needed to go with them, and that is never more important than when we are ensuring our sewage networks are able to cope.

I have been campaigning for some time to

link new homes to the provision of their corresponding, and needed, sewer upgrades, working alongside the Conservative Environment Network and colleagues in Parliament.

I asked in the House of Commons when the Government will review its plans to implement Schedule Three of the Flood and Water Act. Should this bit of existing law be implemented – rather than sitting on the statute book unused – it would remove developers' automatic 'right to connect' to public sewers.

This would mean that water companies would be able to object if the system was not able to cope – they would not simply accept what the developers did – and consequently would be able to require a financial contribution from developers. We, in turn, would get the upgrades to our water systems that we expect and would have a system that can cope.

Campaign win on reducing sewage pollution: Following my question in the House of Commons, I was delighted to see the Government's announcement to make sustainable drainage systems (SuDS) mandatory to new developments. This will significantly reduce both pollution and the risk of flooding for rural areas such as West Oxfordshire by:

- 1. Removing developers' automatic 'right to connect' to public sewers; allowing water companies to object if their systems are not able to cope.
- 2. Slowing down water flow into drains; for example, by using features such as grassed areas or permeable surfaces to reduce the risk of surface water flooding and helping improve our sewer infrastructure.

 I am pleased with the progress the Government is now making on this issue and I will be following its implementation closely.

Oxfordshire Community Land Trust

Crofts Court Community Share Offer has reached the halfway mark - help us with the next 50%.

The building is going well and the roof went on before Christmas, we're still on schedule to move in around June. Once residents have settled in, we hope to welcome many members and investors to come and see how community-led housing can really be of benefit.

As a reminder, Crofts Court in Dean Court, Cumnor Parish just west of Oxford is OCLT's first development that will provide 8 much needed community-led affordable homes for those on the Vale of White Horse Housing List and with a strong local connection. It is fully funded, with a grant of £904,000 from the Vale of White Horse BC and Future Oxfordshire Partnership, and a variable rate mortgage of £1.1m from Ecology Building Society.

Through Community Shares, with a forecast 3% return, stakeholders will help OCLT guard against future increasing interest rates, and will allow OCLT to generate a small income stream from the rents at an earlier date, and start bringing a

second site forward. Oxford is the second least affordable city in the country and these homes are desperately needed. Rents will be no higher than the Local Housing Allowance so those on housing support will be able to afford them. The homes will also be asset locked, so they cannot be purchased.

This is an opportunity for social investors and organisations to step in and take a stake in fairer, more sustainable housing for Oxfordshire, and to demonstrate that this form of community housing can be scaled up across the country! The trust is offering Community Shares at a value of £1, offered in multiples of 250, with a minimum investment of £250 and a maximum of £50,000. The Community Shares will carry a target maximum interest rate of 3%. We aim to raise £500,000 by 28 February 2023. Police statistics on Operation Holly

From 1–31 December, Thames Valley Police and Hampshire Constabulary's Joint Operations Unit made more than 700 arrests as part of Operation Holly, to stop drivers under the influence of drink and drugs.

737 arrests were made, with 451 of those in the Thames Valley alone. This is an increase of 24% compared to last year. Of the arrests made, 283 were for drink driving and 168 for drug driving. There was a 42% increase in arrests of those aged under 25 on last year, with the figure rising to 101.

Please help the police by challenging anyone you think may be about to drive having drunk alcohol or used drugs. Even the smallest amount of these can impact on driving. It's not worth the risk.

Neighbourhood Watch

Nearly two-thirds (65%) of us are worried about our home being broken into, yet there are simple, proven measures we can all take to halve our chances of being burgled.

At Neighbourhood Watch, we believe neighbours keeping an eye out for each other is key to reducing burglary, so we've extended the WIDE acronym to WIDE(N):

W: WINDOWS: Keep your windows locked I: INTERIOR: Put inside lights on a timer/

smart bulb

D: DOORS: Double or deadlock your doors

E: EXTERIOR: Put outside lights on a sensor

(N): NEIGHBOURS: Keep an eye out for your neighbours

I'm a Reader ...

Caroline Friend, 69, has lived in the village for 33 years. She has acted and directed with the Stonesfield Players, is a longstanding member of the Sustainable Stonesfield committee, and set up the Climate Emergency Group. She currently teaches English to foreign professionals.

Caroline's relationship with the library changed after a diagnosis of Graves' disease 18 months ago which left her seeing double, her everyday life drastically curtailed. Graves' is a thyroid autoimmune disorder that attacks the eye muscles. 'Objects intersected with one other resulting in multiple images. It was like I was in a Picasso. My eyeballs were pulled in different directions and became disobedient: I couldn't look up or sideways. It was very frightening.' The double vision was improved by use of a patch which means that although she still can't drive, she can read again.

Just before Christmas, Caroline had a cup of coffee with a nonagenarian friend next door and was intrigued by 'the mysterious green canvas bag of books that sat permanently by her chair'. The bag, her friend revealed, was her three-weekly 'fresh supply' from the Home Library Service. She urged Caroline to try it.

So Caroline emailed the service. 'They responded immediately. It didn't matter that my disability was temporary. I just needed to identify books and authors that I would like.' The books Caroline asked for included: *Becoming* by Michelle Obama, *Revenge* - the latest Rose Tremain, the *Rough Guide to Portugal*, something from the recent Nobel prize winner, Annie Ernaux, and everyone's favourite whale epic, *Moby Dick*, which Caroline defines as

the quintessential classic, i.e. a book 'you haven't read but know you should have.' She was impressed when the volunteer turned up at her door with most of her requests met.

Reading is a vital part of Caroline's life; the Home Library Service has been a real help, because she gets through a lot. She has several books on the go at once, to meet different needs.

'There's the novel I read for an hour when I'm eating supper. Currently it's William Trevor's *Elizabeth Alone*, which explores the lives of women in the early 1970s in hospital for hysterectomies.' Caroline was struck by the difference between then and now: fifty years ago, these patients were kept in hospital for weeks, giving them time to muse artfully about their existence. The novel's premise wouldn't work today where you can have a hysterectomy quicker than you can find a parking space at the hospital.

Before bed, Caroline has 'a completely different type of book. There needs to be no plot as I'm going to conk out after two pages. I read diaries, biographies.'

'On Saturday morning I read travel books with my tea in bed. Dervla Murphy (Irish madcap who travelled alone by bicycle all over the world) or Horatio Clare, the contemporary nature and travel writer. Weekends I will embark on a long walk and this reading is when I'm psyching myself into landscape...'

With this in mind, we are aiming to start the site preparation, access and groundwork in March 2023. This will inevitably lead to some temporary access challenges down the track, and we would ask for your patience whilst these are in place. The aim is not to restrict access too much for too

long, but for obvious reasons we may have to ask the village to find other walks from time to time.

We are committed to keeping everyone affected by the build as informed as we can. We will be updating our website with progress reports and any news, as well as putting articles in the *Slate*. From the Rector – A Chance to Prepare

In 1985, my mother died suddenly while I was travelling around India. I came home and quickly realised that I needed a job. I visited a friend who was a young monk at a Benedictine monastery just a few miles from our home, and he said, "I'll get you a job here". So I became a painter and decorator, maintaining the buildings of the monastery and the secondary school which they ran. I worked with two older men who were experienced decorators, who had been trained the old fashioned way, and I learnt so much from them. Their stories about their own training were fascinating, and often hilarious. One told me how, as an apprentice, he had spent months mixing wallpaper paste before being allowed to put any on to the wallpaper, then months again doing only that before he was taught how to hang it. For me, that experience of painting and decorating for several months was exactly what I needed at the time, and in practical ways it stood me in good stead afterwards. But the most important thing I learned was not the technique for getting a roll of paste-soaked wallpaper onto the ceiling without it ending up wrapped around my head, or the best way to gloss a panel door. It was the importance of thorough preparation. Without it, there is little chance of success. It should be self evident that proper preparation is essential for any task. We should not drive on a motorway without first learning how to manage a car at low speeds. I cannot begin to make a cake without checking that I

have the ingredients and equipment I need. No one should sit an exam without having revised the subject being examined.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, the 22nd of February. Lent is the church's season of preparation for Easter, but we often use this period of 40 days as a time to prepare our hearts and lives for the challenge and adventure of life which Easter represents. It is a time to take stock, to see what we need to learn, what habits we must let go of, which resources or behaviour we need to develop and practice so that we will be ready to live abundantly in the joy of the resurrection. Some people might use it as a time to become more active, others to shed unhelpful habits of body or mind. Often it is a time when we seek to be more prayerful, and to take seriously the spiritual side of our lives, and to get involved (maybe like we did once before) in the local church community, or in the work of a local charity. Lent is a reminder that we only get one go at life, and if we want to live abundantly, we should seize the chance God offers. Doing some preparation during Lent will ensure that when Easter comes, we are ready for the challenges and opportunities of life which await us, and can say 'Yes' to the abundant life which God has for us in Christ.

There are different types of time: clock or chronological time - that which we measure by the predictability of clocks, watches and our digital instruments; emotional or psychological time: the subjective time by which we measure events such as how we assess the last time we saw someone dear to us or will see them again: historical time: how we understand past events. But what about spiritual time? There's an inscription on a sundial which reads: 'I am a shadow, so art thou. I mark time, dost thou?' This invites us to recall that our time on this earth is relatively short, so how do we spend our time here? The Psalms tell us that 'You return man to dust and say "Return O Children of man". For a thousand years in your sight are but as vesterday when it is past or as a watch in the night'. Psalm 89 (90):4 In other words, spend your time carefully as it's not an infinite commodity. If we behave as if we have eternity to 'make things right', that there is 'always tomorrow', then we are losing the opportunity to focus on the things which really matter: the quality of our relationships with friends, family and work colleagues, our own inner emotional lives, the respect we show for our world, and above all our relationship with God. 

BLENHEIM

In January we began work on the replacement of our Orangery roof. This is a huge undertaking so necessary scaffolding will be visible from our Flagstaff area. What is exciting is that we are transforming the roof to how it would have been centuries ago and will be the most economical roof, of this sort, in the country. In the coming years we continue to deliver the vital projects that will see us hit our £40m restoration goal and requires another £4m spent in 2023, which will cover several other smaller projects and parts of the collection being restored.



You may have noticed that a large stretch of woodland is currently being felled and cleared along the Stonesfield Straight Road. We are currently carrying out some roadside health and safety tree work in this area which is necessary as a large proportion of the trees were failing ash trees, therefore we are thinning through the edge of the woodland and removing anything dying or dangerous to the roadside. We will then reinstate a fence line, hedge and replant with saplings grown from estate seed which will help to make this stretch of road safer from falling branches and dead leaves as well as give a little more light to the road.
