Village Survey on its way

At last! It has finally arrived: your chance to say how you would like Stonesfield to grow over the coming years.

In the first few days of March, the Village Survey will be delivered to every household in the village. In it you will be asked what developments in housing, transport, infrastructure and the environment you would like to see - for yourself, and for future generations.

Why now? And what happens to your answers?

A Parish Council steering group is preparing a Neighbourhood Plan for Stonesfield. Once approved by village residents and the District Council, it will form part of the West Oxfordshire Development Plan. All planning applications must be determined with regard to the Development Plan. The Neighbourhood Plan will therefore give Stonesfield residents a chance to influence the policies on which planning decisions are made. We need evidence upon which to base the policies. An important source of the evidence will be your answers to the survey. The steering group will use your answers in drafting the Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan.

What's it got to do with me?

Your answers will stand as your statement of how you want Stonesfield to develop.

- The government is pushing for more houses: what sort do you think we need, and how should they look? What infrastructure do you think is needed to support them?
- The environment is under threat: which green spaces would you like to protect? Do you care about the state of the river?
- There is a danger the S3 bus service could be cut: do you want to keep it?
- Would you like dedicated cycle paths?
- Would you welcome back the pub?

Voluntary Transport Scheme: suggested donations

Sadly, as for most organisations, our costs are going up and so with regret we will have to raise our suggested donations slightly from 1 March. Stonesfield Voluntary Transport Scheme has been providing lifts to medical appointments since 2007 – that's 15 years. For trips to local GP surgeries, our suggested

donations have largely remained unchanged since 2009. Since then we have greatly extended the list of places our volunteer drivers can take you, including the Oxford hospitals and those in Banbury and Bicester.

The new suggested donations have mainly risen by £1-2, and are still rather less than the cost of a taxi. This covers travel both there and back, including waiting while you are at your appointment, and the suggested donation will always be made clear at the time of booking.

With the cost of living being a hot topic, now's the time to travel for less than £2! It's true. You can take a single journey and never pay more than £2. If your current ticket cost is less than £2, don't worry: it'll stay the same price!

The Bus Fare Cap Grant scheme is a Government-funded scheme running on most single (including Child and Student) bus journeys across England and has been extend to 30 June 2023.

Buy your £2 single ticket on the Stagecoach Bus App or on the bus using cash, contactless or Apple/Google Pay. It's that simple!

Villager Community Bus



I have been wondering whether it is worth mentioning in the Slate the Villager community bus which goes to Witney every Monday, Tuesday and Friday. It arrives in the village at 9.45am, and leaves Witney again at 11.55am from Sainsbury's and 12 noon from the Buttercross. It is sponsored by Oxfordshire County Council.

Tree planting milestones and green corridors



With the support of the Ditchley Trustees and Robert Hobill, who farms the land, the Stonesfield tree planters have planted 68 trees up the footpath from the Ridings, past Ruddy Well and up towards New Barn Farm. This includes some wild service trees generously donated by Ditchley

Estate. The service tree is rare and an indicator of an ancient woodland. Its autumn berries can be used to produce alcohol and until the mid-nineteenth century, supplied pubs. The common name for the tree is 'chequers', giving the name to pubs and inns, and also the Prime Minister's country residence.

We have now planted 337 trees around Stonesfield. Also walking up the Oxfordshire way from the bottom of Laughton Hill, you can see the progress being made with the skill of hedge laying.

We are in advanced discussions with Fawler and Charlbury to improve green corridors reaching out from Stonesfield to Fawler. These will involve planting a wide range of trees for birds and insects to improve the habitat, working in partnership with our neighbours. The corridors will be on Blenheim land farmed by the Stobo family, and we are grateful for their continuing support.

Dumb Waiter, and Celebration from the Stonesfield Players

The Dumb Waiter

Sally Wainwright (creator-writer of Happy Valley and Gentleman Jack) directed a chilling production of Harold Pinter's *The Dumb Waiter* at the end of January in Stonesfield Village Hall. It was as ominous as it was funny, a perfect embodiment of Pinter's 'comedy of menace' writing style.



We were immediately unsettled by the atmosphere, a singular beam of light casting shadows across a dingy basement. Sally's pacing of the performance kept us tingling with anticipation as the play began with an extended non-dialogue scene, allowing us time to analyse the setting, for the hall to drift away and the basement to absorb us all. This eery claustrophobia was mirrored seamlessly by the performances of Adrian Hunter (Ben) and Mark Saville (Gus) who played two hitmen becoming increasingly tense as they wait for the details of their next assignment. They balanced the high tension and the lighter, comedic moments so naturally, their acting wouldn't have seemed out of place in the Pinter theatre itself.

Ben's exasperation with Gus's restlessness was palpable, ensuring the audience was gripped throughout. Hunter made a menacing Ben, unpredictably brilliant, going from aggressively flicking through

his newspaper and arguing over kettles to a calm and measured final acceptance when his task is confirmed. This range showcased Hunter as a professional performer and the same applies to Saville. In contrast to Ben's hardened exterior and assertiveness, Saville played the teaobsessed and inquisitive Gus. His anxiety was portraved marvellously as he applied an awkward, jittery physicality, emphasising his vulnerability. His unravelling at the lack of answers, teamed with his flawless comic timing endeared us towards Gus immensely, making it a real heart-in-mouth moment when we found the task all along was for Ben to kill Gus. Overall Sally Wainwright created an ideal balance of pace, humour and thrilling anticipation... but we were left with one burning question; to light the gas, or to light the kettle?

Celebration

Rebecca Sherlaw-Johnson created an immense buzz in the village hall with her original play, *Celebration*, in memory of the esteemed member of the Stonesfield Players, Steve Searle. The play revolves around an am-dram group, organising a memorial performance for their friend. I bet you any amount of money that there was no straight face in the house during this nostalgic comedy, where the cast reminisced over the plays that Steve was involved in over his thirty-year stint with the players.

Teamed with two musical numbers and a slick choreographed dance, *Celebration* was an unforgettable visual spectacle which oozed fun and affection. Taking on the organiser of the group was Gareth Meager (Hugo) who had exceptional comic timing, while maintaining a sensitivity which was necessary for such a topic.

Alison Richards also deserves a mention for her contagious positive energy, tempting even the most shy members of my friends and family to clap along with her. Rebecca's script contained brilliant self-awareness, with Mark Burniston's character Max, who played an overbearing thespian, trying to bag each role for the memorial performance. His hilarious shamelessness poked fun at am-dram itself, something Steve Searle would have certainly laughed at. Overall, Rebecca's play let off a firework in the Stonesfield village hall, showering colourful light and joy over all of us.

The so-called 'Playford Dances' were collected and published by John Playford from 1650 onwards, and country dancing was popular between 1650 and 1800. In the 20th century folk dance and song saw a revival, inspired by the work of Cecil Sharp who collected and published folk music, country dances and Morris dances. Today there are thousands of English Country Dances for a caller to choose from, including Playford, Contra (from New England) and contemporary. Pink Ribbon Walk



The Breast Cancer Now Pink Ribbon Walk 2023 event is due to take place on Saturday 13 May, starting and finishing in the grounds of Blenheim Palace.

Money raised from the Pink Ribbon Walk series continues to make a huge difference in developing services for those whose lives are affected by breast cancer and into critical research into the disease. None of this would be possible without local community support of the event.

They are continuing with the route modified from 2022 to keep more distance within the grounds of Blenheim Park. The entire length of the 10-mile route is within Blenheim Park. Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

Notes from the 1 February meeting:

Old Jail / Lock up: The Council is still trying to obtain legal ownership. In the meantime it will deal with the weeds at the site.

Roads etc: The Council continues to ask residents to report drain issues, pot holes and overgrown areas via Fixmystreet (www.fixmystreet.com), as this is the best way to call out District and County Councils.

The clerk has asked OCC for permission to put a sign up next to the directional sign for the Village Hall, to include the Social Club.

The clerk has raised with OCC and Thames Valley Police the issue of frequent accidents at Ditchley gate and the A44 junction at the Duke of Marlborough pub. It has been requested that it is monitored, as this is not in the village but does affect us.

Neighbourhood Plan: The Parish Council has received a grant of just over £5,000 to assist with funding of the Neighbourhood Plan. The Council welcomes this and the NP group have items allocated to use this money.


Planning Applications:

4 Limbeck Way - Stonesfield - no objection or comment.

The Cottage at the Cross - Council supported the roof repair work but objected to Stonesfield slate roof material being changed to replica, as this goes against the heritage of the area. As a Council we expect this work and all remedial work on properties with Stonesfield slate to be repaired using Stonesfield slates. This issue was taken back to WODC.

News from West Oxfordshire Voter ID - What you need to do for



the May 2023 elections.

From May 2023 if you want to vote in person, you will be required to produce an accepted form of photographic ID to prove your identity before you will be issued with

a ballot paper. This change will apply for the local elections on 4 May 2023.

The most commonly used IDs include:

- Passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country
- Photographic driver's licence
- European Economic Area (EEA) photographic ID Card
- UK Biometric Residence Permit
- An identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (PASS card)
- · A Blue Badge
- · A concessionary travel pass.

You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you. For more information visit

www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID or call the helpline on 0800 328 0280.

If you do not have one of the accepted forms of photo ID, you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate, which can be obtained free of charge from West Oxfordshire District Council, or online at www,voter-authority-certificate. service.gov.uk. Anyone applying must already be on the electoral register. For more information please call 01993 861410 or email elections@westoxon.gov.uk.

Voter Authority Certificates do not have an expiration date and can be used in future elections, so are worth keeping if you apply for one.

The deadline for applying for a Voter Authority Certificate for elections in May 2023 is 5pm on Tuesday 25 April 2023. The ID requirements will not affect postal votes, so if you want to vote by post you can apply via:

West Oxfordshire's four-year plan

West Oxfordshire District Council has approved its new four-year plan which sets



out how the Council will deliver for residents, and what it will be focusing on to improve West Oxfordshire.

Its five broad priorities are:

- 1. Putting residents first
- 2. Enabling a good quality of life for all
- 3. Creating a better environment for people and wildlife
- 4. Responding to the climate and ecological emergency
- 5. Working together for West Oxfordshire

Under each priority is a set of actions which are based on the feedback from residents gathered in a consultation during Summer 2022. The Council will be setting an action plan to deliver on the goals and will report back on progress at regular intervals to the public.

From our MP, Robert Courts Sewage pollution

Like other residents, I have been increasingly angered by the number of sewage releases being conducted by Thames Water from Witney Sewage Works.

Following reports of frequent, unacceptable discharges taking place over recent months, I wrote to Sarah Bentley, CEO of Thames Water on two separate occasions to reaffirm my strong opposition to any sewage releases. In these letters, I called for Thames Water to take urgent action to start the much-needed local infrastructure upgrades to resolve these long-standing issues that residents in West Oxfordshire have been facing.

I welcomed Thames Water's recent confirmation following my campaign that expansion works to increase capacity at the Witney Sewage Treatment Works by 50 per cent will begin this month, and reach completion by March next year. I was also encouraged to receive further confirmation of investment to sewage treatment works across West Oxfordshire.

While recent progress being made locally by Thames Water to address these issues is encouraging, I will continue to hold Thames Water to account on delivering these infrastructure upgrades over the coming weeks and months.

In the context of sewage pollution, Robert Courts refers to the Government's Water Action Plan, which includes the following action points:

 record fines to make polluters pay, with fines ring-fenced to go into infrastructure improvements

- the largest ever criminal and civil investigations into sewage discharges, as a result of increased monitoring
- the Storm Overflows Reduction Plan which already aims to: 'set stringent new targets to protect people and the environment. This will require water companies to deliver the largest infrastructure programme in water company history.'

Botley West Solar Farm

I recently met representatives from Blenheim and PVDP (Photovolt Development Partners) about their plans for a Botley West Solar Farm.

This is a planning application that will, because of its size, be decided not by the local Council but by a panel of Planning Inspectors and later the Secretary of State for Energy, Security and Net Zero. It is your views, as residents, that must be heard.

Phase two of the consultation will be launched in Spring 2023, with more detailed design proposals being provided for consideration. Please do make sure to complete this, and you can do so either online at www.botleywest.co.uk or by email to info@botleywest.co.uk. This will ensure that your voice is heard directly.

It is of paramount importance that residents engage with the consultations to ensure their views are heard and taken into account.

I will be following these plans very closely and will continue to engage with Blenheim and PVDP on this.





Why buy when you can borrow?

In these times of rising prices, why buy books when you can borrow them from your local library?

Author Sathnam Sanghera, writing recently in The Times, said that he was puzzled about why the nation rallies to the cause of free school meals but appears indifferent to the fall in the number of libraries; down 14% in the last decade. Amanda Spielman, the head of Ofsted, recently stated that 1 in 4 children leave primary school unable to read fluently. This year's tests showed that 175,000 children across the nation did not meet the expected reading standard at the end of primary school. Reading is such a vital life skill; enjoyment of reading is one of the biggest indicators of future success.

Sathnam Sanghera goes on to say that he often hears the view that computers have made literature and the humanities redundant. Many people seem to believe that all children need now is to learn about computers, coding, science and maths

from the internet or textbooks. Yet the educational experts Sathnam spoke to were unanimous that the capabilities children need to develop are social skills, problemsolving, emotional intelligence, language skills, cultural appreciation and art. In other words, the best way to beat the robots, algorithms and the speed of computing that have replaced jobs is to become more human – and what are libraries if not repositories of human experience?

Before the pandemic, research showed that 380,000 primary school children did not own a book. Well, thankfully at the moment in Oxfordshire we have 43 county libraries, and one of them is in Stonesfield. You don't need to buy a book, but you do need to use our library. The cost-of-living crisis is affecting County Council budgets as well as our own. Economies are having to be considered. The number of people using our library is dwindling in comparison to what it was before the pandemic. We have thousands of children's books in their own special area, where parents can sit and read to or with children. By being/becoming a member you can help support Stonesfield Library for all to enjoy. Take a few books home, return them for new ones and introduce your child to the magic of books. I'm a Reader...

An appreciation of Tony Scott, (Lt Col (Retd) Anthony J Scott, MBE), the dynamic and dedicated founding Chairman of the Friends of Stonesfield Library volunteer group, who died on 4 January this year, aged 83.

Current chair, former RAF pilot Mike
Pollitt, explains how Tony came to be the
driving force behind the group that saved
Stonesfield library from council cuts, over
ten years ago. 'When Oxford County
Council produced a list of rural libraries at
risk unless the communities could cover
fifty per cent of the existing opening hours
through volunteers, we pressed ourselves
forward to be the first library to open in
this way. The Friends of Stonesfield
Library was the first group to be trained, in
December 2012. Tony took the lead.'

Tony, a former infantry officer who served in many parts of the world, including Belize and East Africa, also had experience of organising volunteers as Chairman of the Staffordshire Regiment Museum (his former Regiment). Tony came up with the blueprint of the 'rules of engagement', as Mike puts it, or the 'partnership agreement' that is, to this day, the template for all the libraries kept open with volunteer support.

(The reassuring thought that our humble village library is managed by a scheme devised by the armed forces has always been underscored by the fact that the Group Library Manager for Oxford County Council is Anne Manwaring, obviously renamed Captain Manwaring in my mind after the Arthur Lowe character from Dad's Army.)

Tony was, in demeanour, a military man – as Mike says: 'he yomped around the village at a pace, even if it was just to collect his paper from the shop'; he was also very kind, even to those less ruthlessly well-organised. I remember being very late for my library shift one time, not because I'd forgotten I was on duty that Thursday, but I hadn't realised it was Thursday. He could not have been more gracious about it, even though he had to cover my absence.

Tony loved books, knowledge and communication. He was a great raconteur – one might not get much re-shelving done on a shift with Tony, but one would hear a lot of entertaining anecdotes. Charlie, the youngest of Tony and his wife Rachel's three children, says that friends used to enjoy timing the length of his responses to obscure questions. The record, apparently, was 27 minutes when Tony was asked if Napoleon had haemorrhoids at the Battle of Waterloo.

Charlie talks fondly of Tony's eclectic book collection at home: *Boy's Own Manuals*, sci-fi, murder mystery... alongside ancient history and whole shelves dedicated to the National Geographic, travel biopics and word play. He loved poems, sonnets, haikus and limericks. Books kept him young and with a remarkably progressive outlook'.

Tony was, perhaps, therefore, a living embodiment of the library he worked so hard for – a vast array of interests collected in one welcoming place. As one of the 'ever-presents' of library volunteers, John Poucher, puts it so aptly: Tony and I had few things in common. He was a military man; I was an ageing hippy. We discovered mutual enjoyment in reading. Me, by way

of *Just William* and he by *Rimfire* westerns. I immediately acknowledged his rare abilities as the Chair of our group. There might be jokes, there could be meandering, but each meeting took its allocated time and ended with a clear purpose, mutually agreed. And then Tony would buy me a pint.'

Back page of Stonesfield Festival Programme, July 1986

Local History: Broughton Castle

17 miles north of Stonesfield



The original medieval manor house, of which much remains today, was built in about 1300 by Sir John de Broughton. It stands on an island surrounded by a three-acre moat. Across the small bridge lies the parish church of St Mary the Virgin, surrounded by its historic cemetery.

The castle was greatly enlarged between 1550 and 1600 by Richard Fiennes, transforming the medieval manor into a house in the Tudor style, significantly expanding the building. King James I stayed at Broughton Castle on several occasions.

During the 17th century William, 8th Lord Saye and Sele, played a leading role in national affairs. He opposed Charles I's efforts to rule without Parliament and Broughton became a secret meeting place for the King's opponents. During the Civil War William raised a regiment and he and his four sons all fought at the nearby Battle of Edgehill. After the battle the Castle was besieged and captured.

Following the end of hostilities, reconstruction work needed to be undertaken to repair damage inflicted by Royalist cannon. Lord Saye and Sele had evaded signing Charles I's Death Warrant and was able to make his peace with the Crown after the English Restoration.

Arms and armour of the Civil War period and from other periods are displayed in the Great Hall. Visitors may also see the gatehouse, gardens and park together with the nearby 14th century parish church of St Mary, in which there are many family tombs, memorials and hatchments.



The gardens are delightful; the Ladies' Garden is particularly beautiful in summer, boasting a variety of roses and borders stocked with perennials and shrubs.

In 2021, Time Team excavated a Roman villa on the site, recently discovered by metal detectorist and amateur archaeologist, Keith Westcott. Previously, a lead-lined sarcophagus containing the burial of a wealthy Romano-British woman was discovered and partly investigated in the 1960s.

Broughton Castle is the family home of the 21st Lord and Lady Saye & Sele, whose family name is Fiennes, the ownership of the Castle having remained in the same family since 1447.

From the Rector - Get ready!

Throughout the year it is a great pleasure to open a window first thing in the morning and listen to the birdsong which greets us. But in March, the singing of birds at dawn takes on a whole new dimension, and glory. Nature's great event is beginning, and birds everywhere are getting ready for it - finding mates, marking territory, announcing themselves as spring erupts all around us. The dawn chorus begins in March, and is perhaps a little earlier each year, but goes on for the next two months, reaching its peak in April and May. So profound is this event that Simon Barnes, in his book Rewild Yourself, reckons it is the 'single biggest wildlife miracle that we have in Britain'. Birds are responding to the lengthening days, and to the emergence of sources of food after winter which spring promises - new shoots and plant growth everywhere; warming soil and gentle rain allow the hatching and awakening of the insects which will feed them and their young once nesting and egg laying begins. Birds, in their energetic and musical preparations, singing, feeding, mating and nest building, are getting ready to make the most of summer, and of life in its fullness.

In the church, March falls in the season of Lent, and this time of five weeks before Easter has often been understood as a time to reflect on human failings through fasting and prayer. But Lent has a lot in common with the great dawn chorus of the bird kingdom. It is a time of preparation for a great outpouring of life, a time to sing and to work so that we can harness, enjoy and be part of the life which is already around us and is coming in its fullness. Lent is a time for us to get our lives ready for the dramatic Easter event, a time to make mental, physical and spiritual preparations for our annual remembrance of the love of God which the death of Christ on the cross declares, and the resurrection of Christ which lifts up our humanity to share with him the life of God. shape human communities in accordance with the will of our loving Creator. There is much to do, so that when Holy Week and Easter come, we will be ready to say a heartfelt 'Yes' to the abundant life which God offers us in Christ.

I wish you a very constructive and effective Lent. The church is open each day, so please come and use it as a place to pray and to feel the presence of God, to seek God's guidance and strength. And please join us on Sundays too as we make our heartfelt preparations for the great feast of Easter.

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
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








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
