#### **Community Café**

We will be running the Community Café on Saturday, 2 December at the Village Hall with tea, coffee, cake from 10am and a light lunch served from 12 noon until 2pm.

We're working in collaboration with Oxford Food Hub to repurpose surplus food. This not only stops perfectly good food going to landfill, but significantly helps us keep our costs down, so that any money we make can be channelled towards helping villagers survive the current costof-living crisis. The Village Hall generously sponsors the club room.

We work on a pay-as-you-feel basis, that means you can contribute however you can to the success of our project: donating your time, skills, money, or something even more imaginative! We will have a menu with indicative costs on it so that you can gauge what to give, but ultimately it's up to you.

The repair team will be in the main hall again, so if you're having something fixed please do drop in while you wait. Our Parish Councillors will also be there showcasing their work over the past year, so if you have any burning questions about what they do please come along and ask them. The Stonesfield Sourdough Bakers will be selling freshly baked loaves with proceeds going to the Food Group and there will be an opportunity to sign up for all things sourdough, including upcoming sourdough baking classes if you're interested.

It promises to be a busy morning and we look forward to seeing you there.

#### The Social gets social!

We're just getting going, but we hope to provide you with our weekly menu in advance, plus any updates that you need. Come and ask us about allergens – or just say Hi!

**Weekly socials** The Social continues to provide delicious, healthy, free food to all the community on Tuesdays between 5pm and 7pm, at the Village Hall. We have had some fun with themed evenings – including Halloween, Diwali and St Andrew's day!

Takeaways are available, and we ask that you support our planet-friendly ethos by bringing your own reusable container if possible. Why not pick up a takeaway for a neighbour?

The last session before Christmas will be on 12 December. We will be taking a break until 9 January 2024.

We have a wonderful team of volunteer cooks, bottle washers, front of house, crafters and more. We're so grateful to those who give up their time to be neighbours supporting neighbours. We are a little light on savoury cooks so if this is your forte, please get in touch! We like to have 2 savoury cooks per session if possible, so you don't have to cook as much as you might think. You can cook at home or in the Village Hall kitchen. If you'd like to help, even if it's only once in a while, please get in touch with Julie (see below).

We are averaging one or two small caddy bags of food waste per week – which is amazingly small given that we are serving around 70 portions. We source much of the food from the fantastic Oxford Food Hub who rescue surplus food from restaurants, small suppliers and supermarkets, which would otherwise go to waste. Recently, we have noticed vegetables imported from Kenya, Egypt and Peru – how sad if they had been flown here just to finish up in landfill, creating greenhouse gases. The quality is incredible, we have been inspired by it to make wonderful dishes such as Teriyaki noodles with chicken or Quorn, and a Tuscan-inspired sausage and bacon casserole. Our puddings are fab, and we always serve salad, crudités and fresh fruit!

**Christmas craft boxes** We are thrilled with the craft our younger guests are encouraged to produce, and hope that we are inspiring some future artists! We would like to provide shoebox-sized craft boxes as a Christmas surprise for them and invite anyone who would like to donate new or good quality second-hand craft materials to contact us. Monetary donations to purchase craft materials would also be appreciated – please get in touch if this is something you would like to contribute to.

**Seniors' Café** Meet friends old and new, have delicious homemade cake and a lovely cup of tea – all on a Tuesday from 3–4pm in the Village Hall. All on the same planetfriendly basis as the Social.

**Emergency Food help** One of the aims of the Food Group is to support Stonesfield residents who are struggling to afford nourishing food. We are able to do this using the funds raised by the Community Cafés run alongside the Repair Café, and through other generous donations.

We are currently able to offer food parcels. If you, or someone you know, could benefit, contact Kate Harris on 01993 898781 or via email at kateharris58@yahoo.co.uk.

#### **Cows on the Common**

It's that time of the year again when cows will come back to the Common. They will be there from December through to March next year, grazing back the long growth from the summer to allow the wild flowers to come through in the spring.

When cattle are allowed to graze freely they select different plants, and even different parts of the plant, to nibble or browse. Over time, this selective eating by the animals creates a varied structure within the plants and the habitat. It is this that helps create the right conditions for a wide range of plants, insects, birds, reptiles, and mammals to exist. The weight of the cows ensures that flower seeds are pressed into the soil by their hooves, which will help germination in the spring. In this respect cows are much better than sheep, who are much more picky about what they eat and therefore not as beneficial to the health of the Common.

These cattle are helping us manage the Common to maintain and enhance its Site of Special Scientific Interest status. I hope you'll visit the cows who are generally very docile, and be sure to follow the rules that are posted on the gates. This is a polite way of saying please keep dogs on leads and pick up poo.

# Politics & local affairs

#### **Stonesfield Parish Council**

Following meeting on 1 November 2023

**SAFER / Signage:** Matters arising - The council discussed street signage and liabilities. The parish council is speaking with OCC in conjunction with our working group to establish liabilities and decision making.

**The common:** One of the fence lines needs repair work. We need to provide some hardcore to shore up the fence and also replace some posts. This is being worked on to be completed next spring. Thanks to the neighbouring farmer who will cut the hedge line and is working with us to help resolve.

**Parish matters:** It was reported to us that the steps near the Scout hut are damaged. The clerk will liaise with the Scouts.

**Neighbourhood Plan:** Cllr Warr shared the Neighbourhood Plan report and advised that the landscape assessment first draft is due in November. FAQs are now on village website.

**Field on Combe Road towards Combe:** This has been purchased by a local resident. The plan is for it to be left for conservation.

**Stonesfield Players storage:** There are ongoing discussions on storage for this local group.

**Local plan** (Cllr D Brown): Cllr Brown has gone through the local plan and the

council has reviewed the response and submitted.

**Stonesfield dark sky village:** Just a reminder that the village is in the AONB. This is why we have no street lights. Houses are encouraged to minimise outside lighting to help maintain the wildlife that the dark sky supports.

**Remembrance Sunday:** The council again will purchase and place a wreath for Remembrance Sunday.

**Children's play area:** The council is in early discussion with the Playing Fields Association with regards to potentially taking this area into the parish council as a council asset, to help secure future funding for maintenance etc as this is a valuable amenity and widely used by the village.

**Policy documents:** Reminder that the website holds all parish agendas, minutes, policy documents and is updated regularly.

**Neighbourhood Plan** 

As the year draws to a close, we thought it might be useful to offer an update on everything we've done during 2023 towards creating a Neighbourhood Plan.

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In March we conducted a village survey, giving everyone in Stonesfield over the age of 16 the chance to say what they liked about the village, what they wanted to protect, what they would like to see improved. The response was magnificent: 62% of the total number of households replied, and 699 people also responded as individuals, which represents 45% of the eligible (over-16) population. Typically, surveys get a 20% response; ours was much higher and therefore more representative.

We have analysed the responses (a full report is on the Stonesfield website www.stonesfield.online) and we are now writing policies based on the data. Remember: as we have said many times in writing and at our public meetings, the Neighbourhood Plan is not a wish list: it is a statement of Stonesfield's policies regarding planning issues: what further development would be appropriate, what infrastructure is needed, the protection of green spaces and footpaths. The District Council is obliged to take these policies into account when considering planning applications. Luckily, there will be a section of the Plan called 'Aspirations', and we will be able to include some of your 'wish list' there: a cleaner river, more buses to Witney and Chipping Norton, cycle paths etc. Luckily, we already have our pub!!

We have commissioned a professional surveyor to write a Landscape Assessment: a report on the parish landscape (which falls in the Cotswold AONB), and how the village looks as you approach it from its surroundings. Volunteers are working on a history of the village and on a Character Assessment: a report on how the village looks within; its buildings, streets and views out towards the surrounding countryside. We are also starting to create a Housing Needs assessment, so that we have an up-to-date independent record of what housing is actually needed here.

We hope to have a draft Plan towards the end of next year. It then has to go to the Parish Council and WODC for approval, and then to an Independent Examiner. When WODC and the Independent Examiner have approved the draft Plan, it will be the subject of a whole-village referendum.

The Neighbourhood Plan steering Group wish everyone a very Happy Christmas and a productive New Year.

#### **Crossing the floor**

In September I made the choice to join the Labour Party, or as a friend of mine put it, crossed the floor... So far it is the best move I have made in my time in local government. The welcome has been fantastic and the difference in attitude towards key areas of the local communities has been eye opening. I had always thought of Labour as a little bit too big nationally to be able to focus on local issues, but I couldn't have been more wrong. There is a great knowledge within the Labour Councillors in the West Oxfordshire Group and beyond.

One of the key issues that attracted me to the Party is affordable housing, no I mean actually affordable, not the ridiculous term that now regularly whitewashes developers' presentations and submissions.

Of course, no one wants more development, however there is a 'need', and they will come whether we like it or not. So, if it's inevitable, why don't we make the best of a bad situation and get what we want and need rather than what the developers want? Whilst restrictions on developers mainly come from national government there are things a planning authority can do.

In my view, instead of going outwards, we should go up. I'm not talking high rise skyscrapers here, but simply two- or threestory buildings that make up flats or apartments whilst still aesthetically remaining in-keeping with the surrounding area by being made to look like houses. There are many successful examples of this already within the district with fantastic green space communal areas. Flats or apartments can offer truly affordable options for all walks of life and can be used as social housing too.

But it's not just about what we build, but also about where we build it. All these Frankenstein-like bolt-ons to communities puts pressure on the local services, meaning the existing residents, and indeed the new residents, suffer the consequences. For me, the solution could be a new village. This would be able to accommodate many homes and would likely take up no more space than if you were to add the houses to existing settlements, but with the added benefit of not disrupting an established community, draining their already limited resources and, of course, the proper infrastructure such as sewage works, etc. would have to be built with the houses rather than relying on existing and already over-stretched facilities.

These are just some of my ideas to combat a fast-growing monster already raising its head within our district. I hope to continue trying to find ways to make West Oxfordshire a better place to live with the help of my new Labour Party colleagues.

#### **News from West Oxfordshire** Recalculating housing targets

Due to a revision in the way the Council is able to calculate housing targets, WODC can now demonstrate a 'five-year housing land supply' which will mean it has greater control over the planning process. WODC's adopted Local Plan recently passed its fifth anniversary and because housing policies need updating, the Council is now able to calculate its housing land supply using the Government's alternative 'standard method'.

Carl Rylett, Executive member for Planning and Sustainable Development, said, "Revising our calculation ... allows us to concentrate on making swift progress with our new Local Plan, setting a new housing target to 2041 and identifying a pipeline of suitable sites, supported by the right investment in infrastructure." For West Oxfordshire, this is much lower than stated in the current Local Plan. The result is that the Council can now demonstrate a 5.4-year supply of deliverable housing sites, meaning it has a greater degree of control when determining speculative planning applications for housing.

### The right homes for the right people

WODC is taking proactive steps to meet the growing demand for more tailored and

affordable housing in the district. Through its housing register, WODC found that over 2,000 households in the district are in need of affordable housing, and to address the issue, committed itself to delivering 274 affordable homes each year up until 2031. However, in recognition that every resident has their own unique needs, the Council is going to look for various ways they can offer affordable housing that suits the individual needs of everyone. This will include exploring the possibility of developing their own affordable homes on council-owned land, offering more rental and shared ownership options, and ensuring a broader range of home sizes for families. To support its ambitions to boost the district's supply of affordable housing, the Council will build on its relationships with partners such as Oxfordshire County Council, Cottsway, Oxplace, and Homes England, as well as seeking new relationships with other organisations. This collaborative approach will be an opportunity to combine resources and expertise, so that different methods of creating more affordable housing can be explored, Furthermore, in partnership with Cotswold District Council, a specialist expert will be recruited to grow these partnerships, and provide the knowledge and experience needed to successfully lead a team in investigating the possibilities for how both councils can deliver more affordable homes.

#### **Consultation on future costs**

WODC has launched a consultation aimed to help inform its budget plans for the 2024/25 financial year and beyond. It wants to sensibly manage the impact of increased costs and reduced Government funding while also delivering on the priorities of the district. The survey will ask residents about where they would like the council to prioritise its spending over the coming years across the wide range of services it delivers for local residents. Only 10% of the council tax collected is spent by the District Council, with the rest being passed to the County Council, Parish Councils, and Police and Fire services. Residents can take part in the consultation online by visiting www.westoxon.gov.uk/ budget or they can get a physical copy of the survey from the Council office in Welch Way in Witney. The survey will be open from 13 November to 18 December.

### Four local authorities set to take greater control of Council services

Four neighbouring local authorities (WODC, Cotswold DC, Forest of Dean DC, and Cheltenham Borough Council) are set to take greater control of council services. The four Councils will receive recommendations to be considered by each council following a review of their jointly owned company, Publica.

Established in 2017, Publica has provided a range of council services ranging from customer services and planning to backoffice functions like IT and finance. Since 2017, Publica has delivered a number of efficiencies and savings but due to the pressures and the local aspirations that the councils are focussed on, an independent review was undertaken to look at whether Publica's company model was still able to meet the current and future needs of its council owners.

The final report completed by consultants Human Engine recommends that a significant number of locally focused services should move back from Publica and return to being under greater control by the councils. This would leave Publica delivering a range of back-office and customer services for the councils.

If the recommendations of the Human Engine report are approved, each of the four councils will then work in partnership to create a phased plan for the transfer of services.

WODC will consider the Human Engine Report recommendations at its Executive meeting on 15 November.

#### £220K boost to Westhive Community crowdfunding pot

Further to last month's article, the Westhive programme has received an additional £220,000 over two years, earmarked for projects that will improve local facilities and help support communities. To be eligible, WODC is particularly looking for projects such as the remodelling of a community building to create a village shop, upgrading a kitchen in a village hall to allow it to operate as a community cafe, or soundproofing a meeting room so it can also be used by young people for band practice. Eligible projects could see pledges of up to £20,000 from the Council, or up to 50% of their crowdfunding targets. In line with the Council Plan, the Council will be encouraging submissions of projects that champion environmental sustainability, support those who are most vulnerable in our communities, and those that face exclusion, whether due to mental health, physical or mental disability, or financial hardship. There will also be a focus on projects brought forward by or designed to meet the needs of young people, as part of the Council's commitment to empowering young voices.

#### WODC welcomes new Executive Member for Planning

Cllr Charlie Maynard has joined WODC as the Executive Member for Planning and Sustainable Development after Cllr Carl Rylett stepped down from the Executive for personal reasons. The portfolio for this role on the Council's Executive includes, among other things, responsibility for: Local Plan, Government planning policies and guidance and ensuring planning policies meet 2030 requirement

#### Local group hits out at MP's 'complacency' on Climate Change

Local activists, the Robert Courts Watch group www.robertcourtswatch.com (RCW) have hit out at the complacency shown by their local MP at Witney Eco Forum's 'Evening with Robert Courts' last September. The event, chaired by the Bishop of Oxford, Rt. Rev.Steven Croft, and facilitated by former BBC environment analyst Roger Harrabin, attracted a packed audience to St Mary's Church – indicating that Witney cares greatly about our climate.

Robert was questioned by community leaders about diverse aspects of climate policy. He accepted that climate change is of 'epoch-defining' importance, that it is man-made, extremely threatening and caused by our emissions from fossil fuel use, that there is real consensus across Britain that action is essential, and that the scientific consensus, in particular the reports from the Committee on Climate Change, are correct.

But Robert Courts Watch were disappointed at the MP's complacency. RCW spokesperson Hugo Kerr said that while repeatedly describing Britain as 'world-beating' on this issue, Courts showed little sense of urgency, tolerating gradual progress and declaring that change could 'take a generation'.

Hugo Kerr said: 'Robert Courts suggested that we 'wait' for free-market technological innovations rather than using direct state intervention to accelerate change. He was unspecific about concrete action and fell back on 'plans' and 'road maps'. Our MP offered little in the way of real change in real time, for example in respect of onshore wind, low-carbon housing, private jets, licensing of new oil and gas, or making polluters pay.

Robert said he supported recent diluting of net zero targets. But the loudest and most prolonged applause of the evening was when the facilitator suggested our Prime Minister could be using climate change as a wedge issue to fracture consensus for partisan electoral purposes.'

## Review: Stonesfield Players' double-header

Both these plays began during Covid lockdowns. They finally came to production when lockdowns seem almost historical. Both were inspired by facts and historical records.

The elderly women - Constance in the first play, Rita in the second - portrayed convincing old-age movements, reflective reminiscing, sorrow or regret or defensiveness about missed opportunities and lost dear ones. And in both plays, it's clear that memories are sometimes distorted or inaccurate...



The Private Collection seemed to have two entirely separate stories which took a while to come together as one narrative. The stage set was ingenious - the use of gauze curtains and different lighting to depict the realm of memories was very effective; the characters moved subtly across the boundary into and out of Constance's active recollections to snippets of opera recordings, in themselves a memory for Constance. Her regular napping enabled the dialogues and relationship of her remembered younger self and the RAF pilot Miles to develop. The minimal props were used to good effect. Young Constance looked remarkably similar to her older self. And Miles' words and expressive way of speaking reminded me clearly of their author.

*Can You Hear Me Mother* brought back to life the awful effects of Covid lockdowns loneliness, inability to visit ANYone, despair at being refused proper funerals, the need somehow to 'keep busy'. Rita's bewilderment with the technology that saved her from total isolation, her varying tones of voice, her softening through reading her father's letters (nice touch to broadcast them), her put-downs to neighbour Stacey followed by concern for her well-being - she was the heart of that play.

Another high quality, thought-provoking evening's entertainment from the Players. Stonesfield is indeed lucky to have them.

#### l'm a Reader

Journalist and cosy crime author, Flic Everett, 53, has never been to Stonesfield, yet she played a small but significant part in our recent history, that, now The White Horse is safely in community hands, deserves an airing.

For my friend Flic it was who, inspired by the struggles of the committee and the village to save the pub, wrote the very supportive feature about it for The Daily Telegraph.

'I live in a very small hamlet, and I would love to have a local pub, we have to drive for miles. The people of your village coming together for the sake of the community was a really great story of triumph against the odds – I was so happy when I heard the good news and can't wait to visit!'

When Flic makes the trek from her home near Oban to the sunny Cotswolds, she will not only visit the pub, of course, no, the library will be another must-see destination. Not only is she a book lover, she owes her very existence to libraries.

'My parents met in Didsbury library in 1968. My mother was drifting about choosing books. My dad was a student at Oxford, back home in Manchester for the holidays, writing an essay in the library.

My mum saw him and ran out on to the street and into a phone box; she rang my grandma and told her she'd just seen the man she was going to marry. Surprisingly, rather than telling her not to be silly, like a normal person, my grandma immediately got on a bus to the library and hid herself behind a pillar to take a look at him ... and she approved! Meanwhile, my mum hatched a plan and asked to borrow his pen. She wrote him a note asking if he thought it was too forward for a woman to ask a man on a date. He said it was not and I'm not surprised he responded positively – she was the perfect '60s dolly bird with fluffy blonde hair and huge blue eves. Six weeks later they were engaged, and two years later I was born. They have recently celebrated 55 years of marriage, and my mother still takes a cake into Didsbury library for the staff, on their wedding anniversary!'

After such a start, it is perhaps not surprising that Flic grew up loving libraries: 'I used to hide in the school library in case I got embroiled in a game of rounders. I used to love the art books and listening to the school librarian telling me about her experiences as an evacuee.'

Perhaps this memory helped inspire Flic's new books, a murder mystery series, set in wartime Manchester, starring a feisty young newspaper reporter turned amateur detective called Edie York ("in wartime it was quite easy to give a woman a job where she would be involved"). The first, *Report* of a Murder, is an evocative portrait of life in wartime, well researched, full of twists, and fast paced. Flic's biggest writing inspiration is *The Pursuit of Love* by Nancy Mitford: 'a novel set in the aristocracy of the 1930s; it has humour, tragedy, pathos and wit. I want to have that effect on people. JK Rowling, writing as Robert Galbraith, also inspires me, she writes mysteries and crime which she manages to combine with emotional heft.' It's a lot to aspire to, but somehow Flic pulls it off!

Oliver Spacey came to talk to us about the *Mysteries of Mistletoe,* clad I may say in a very fetching pair of red dungarees adorned with hand printed mistletoe berries and leaves. Not only that, but we were treated to refreshing cups of mistletoe tea – made with the leaves thankfully, as the berries are poisonous. The tea is very popular in Europe where it is regularly drunk as a cure for hypertension.

Mistletoe has a long history, being sacred to the Druids who thought of it as a cure for the barren and an antidote to poison. Like so many ancient beliefs regarding plants, mistletoe's possible use in medicine is currently being researched further.

Banned for many centuries due to its link with a pagan religion, mistletoe was another of our Christmas traditions that became popular in Victorian times.

As a parasite, it can only grow on other plants, favouring fruiting trees in this country, particularly apple and lime. It provides berries for birds, who have developed an immunity to its toxins.

As our climate warms it is found further and further north, as it is not happy in cold winters. It used to extend no further north than Northampton, but that has changed recently. There is currently a research project underway called MistleGO that is looking at how much mistletoe there is in the country and where it can be found.

Our last meeting of the year will be our members' social event on 11 December, featuring one of Suzy Boardman's fiendish quizzes and mulled wine to help the thinking process. Members are asked to bring along plant based (not necessarily vegan) snacks – test your ingenuity!

#### From the Rector - Christmas Lights

In the middle of November I sent messages to my friends in Delhi wishing them a Happy Diwali, and Rishi Sunak and his wife and daughters lit lights to celebrate the festival at Downing Street. Another festival associated with light, the Jewish festival of Hanukkah, begins on the 7th of December and then each day another candle of the eight-branched menorah candlesticks will be lit, in celebration of the rededication of the temple in Jerusalem in the second century BCE. Other faiths also have festivals when light is used to express joy and celebration, such as the Islamic festival of Eid at the end of Ramadan. In April this year Trafalgar Square was adorned with lights for the capital's Eid celebrations.

For Christians, Christmas is the time when we remember the light of God coming into

the world, in the birth of Jesus to Mary. Fragile life nurtured by loving parents in difficult circumstances is a symbol of peace and a message of hope. It should inspire the people of the world to step back from violence, injustice and ruthless exploitation, and turn to the way of peace. As a child myself, one of the regular preparations for Christmas was watching my parents try to make the Christmas tree lights work - they were fragile and failed easily, so each year bulbs had to be bought and swapped around until the illuminated miracle of the decorated tree came to life. Today LED lights have made such challenges a thing of the past, but the lights with which we decorate our homes, schools, town centres or places of work still have the same meaning - they tell us that God's light is in the world - that God's coming in Christ has brought us salvation. Christmas means God's life in ours, the light of God's eternity in our human life, and in our communities. At our Christmas services, as well as celebrating the message of the angels, the devotion of the shepherds and the wise men's gifts, the first verses from St John's Gospel always have pride of place:

'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.' I wish you all a very happy Christmas please come and join us as we celebrate together the light of God in the birth of Christ our Lord. And may the message of Christmas strengthen each of us to live in love and peace.

#### Roman Catholic Worship Christmas – Light in our Darkness

'The Son is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For in him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through him and for him.'

Colossians 1:15-21

Irrespective of our religious persuasion, Christmas exerts a very powerful influence over our lives. At this time of the year, everywhere we go we can see signs and symbols of Christmas. Even though we might ignore the religious and spiritual element, we can't ignore Christmas. We tend to focus much more, these days, on Christmas rather than on Easter. Christmas has been colonised so commercially that the deep spiritual, redemptive message can be very blurred, but it's still there.

Christmas is an enduring message of hope that 'things will get better'; not necessarily in the material sense. In the dark days of mid-winter, the lights, jollity, gift giving and shared meals give us a sense of joyousness that can help sustain us. For Christians, the joyousness is also strongly related to the forceful reminder that this Christ child was born to save us all: Jesus brings light to our darkness. He was born, lived and died as the ultimate act of giving, so that we may not live in spiritual darkness.

'Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. And here is a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. And all at once with the angel there was a great throng of the hosts of heaven, praising God with the words: Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace for those he favours.'

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


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
