Tailor-made for Swifts

While one Swift needs a private plane to jet around the world, the feathered variety, Apus apus, which visits Stonesfield in the summer, flies itself the huge distance from Southern Africa to Britain every year to breed.

The birds fly via insect-rich wetlands to refuel on the way, feeding on the wing. They spend the summer with us, usually arriving at the beginning of May to known nest sites year after year, looking for the same partner. They like to find hollow cavities in buildings and build a flat nest of feathers and other material glued together by saliva.

As we become more concerned with our heating bills, so we seal up any gaps in our houses that a swift would see as fair game for a home. This shortage of nesting sites, along with the collapse of insect numbers, has led to

a decline in swift numbers of 60% between 1995 and 2000.

Stonesfield resident Paul Wren is determined to do something to help by encouraging residents to let him put up swift nesting boxes and swift bricks that can be positioned on most people's houses.

At present there are 38 boxes and bricks in the village, and Paul has set himself a target of 50, so maybe you can join his band of 'swifties'.

Stonesfield Tree Planters

The sun is up and the ground is thawing. The plan is to start at 10am along the Evenlode adding to trees we planted last year. Our timings are fluid. Today we have 50 trees to plant; preparations are complete but the trees and planters have yet to arrive. I have time to go round last year's trees checking progress - 4% of the planted trees have not survived. So far overall we have about a 5% failure rate - this is good as often the rate can be over 20%. As we meet up, we have six planters and one dog. Today's trees are from The Conservation Volunteers 'I Dig Trees' programme.

About 60% of our trees have come from the Woodland Trust. We choose a range of native trees that come in two hundreds. The trees are one year old and are grown in plugs with each species wrapped together. The roots are tightly entwined needing more freedom. Planting is straightforward as long as they aren't planted too deep.

25% come from TCV I Dig Trees. These trees are grown in soil and come to us bare rooted. The trees feel stronger but the roots have often been trimmed. The bonus of soil is that mycorrhizal fungi may well have established contact with the tree roots and started an essential long-term relationship. Last year we had five oak trees with heavily trimmed roots and remarkably all five have done very well.

About 15% of our trees have been grown in pots in the village, some from seed and others dug up from garden beds. The root systems on these trees have been the best. We also had 30 oaks from Blenheim and five wild service trees from Ditchley.

Planting is going well; Joey (our guard dog) has had a beady eye on pheasants and is taking care of a tree guard. Our 12-year-old (on an inset day) is showing great skill with an awl creating holes for the tree ties, without injuries.



Joey has Genny Early eyed up and I am fairly sure there must be a snack in Genny's pocket. Nearly done and Mike has lost his spade; eventually it was found and all trees planted on a sunny morning. Later, adding to the records, I find that we have planted exactly 1,400 trees. Two hundred to go!

Stonesfield Parish Council

From the meeting of 7 February 2024

Planning: We can confirm that we do not have an actual planning application for the Combe Road proposed development at this stage.

Updates: Cllr Sumner (District Council) advised the council that local nature recovery scheme workshops being held; Cllr Sumner to share information regarding this with the Clerk and information will be posted on the website when we have this.

The **Neighbourhood Plan** working group updated the meeting that their work is progressing well. The Clerk will apply for further grants for the Neighbourhood Plan group.

The **SAFER** working group's report was shared with the full Council; this will be placed on the website by the SAFER team. In this report information was shared that there is an opportunity to create safer cycle routes on the back of the Botley West solar farm. The Council would like further information regarding this from SAFER working group.

Stonesfield Buses: The Council supports the bus to the village and sees it as a requirement for the village. The Council asked Cllr Sumner (District Council) to seek more information on whether the bus service (S3) through Stonesfield will receive further funding.

Date of the next meeting: Stonesfield Primary School on 6 March 2024 at 7pm.

Following the meeting of Stonesfield Parish Council held on 7 February 2024, the Parish Council would like to share this statement:

There has been much discussion with WODC who have been extremely proactive in supporting the Council with getting to where we need to be with clarifications regarding a parish poll demand in the meeting on 7 February 2024. As advised at the meeting, we needed to check further with WODC whether the request for the poll could be upheld. It has now been confirmed that it cannot be upheld from this particular Parish Council meeting. The Council minutes will state that following checks with WODC the poll demand is noted but not granted at this particular meeting.

Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

As part of producing a Neighbourhood Plan for Stonesfield, the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group (NPSG) has produced a draft Housing Needs Assessment (HNA) for the village. It's a detailed document using data you provided in last year's village survey as well as National, County and District sources of information. The conclusion of the HNA is that the village, which is in the Cotswolds Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, does not require additional market housing. There is no need in Stonesfield, exceptional or otherwise, for any major developments, defined as developments of more than 10 houses.

However the HNA does recognise there may be a small shortfall of social/affordable housing which could be met via a small Rural Exception Site – up to 10 houses. The NPSG are looking at ways that this shortfall can be resolved, without accepting major developments of market housing.

In addition to the HNA we have also produced a detailed document for the Parish Council reviewing all the National and Local planning policies, AONB management policies together with the comments from the Public Inquiry Inspector for the Local Plan 2031 and the refusal of the Cala Homes planning appeal for their site on the Woodstock Road. We also include comments residents made in the Household and Individual village surveys last year.

The conclusion of this document is that there is no case to support major developments in Stonesfield. The words of Mr Normington, the planning appeal inspector in the Cala case, supply us with a precedent for addressing all threats of major developments: 'There is no convincing evidence whatsoever of a specific local housing need in Stonesfield which would give rise to justification of a development of the scale implied ... On close scrutiny of the development before me, I have found that it would cause significant harm to the character and appearance of the AONB.'

As noted in last month's *Slate*, there are three sites identified in Stonesfield in the new WODC Local Plan 2041 'call for sites', each of which would constitute major developments. The NPSG's strong recommendation to the Parish Council is that these sites should be vigorously opposed.

News from West Oxfordshire

Changes to Parliamentary boundaries



The Boundary Commission for England has completed a review of Parliamentary constituencies which will impact communities in the West Oxfordshire District at the next General Election. Changes to the Parliamentary boundaries mean that West Oxfordshire District will now form part of three constituencies rather than the current one.

Approximately 17,800 voters from West Oxfordshire will form part of the Bicester and Woodstock constituency and the District wards affected are Eynsham and Cassington; Freeland and Hanborough; North Leigh; Stonesfield and Tackley; Woodstock and Bladon. The changes do not affect the boundaries for any wards for council elections or National Police and Crime Commissioner elections and will have no impact on council services. At the next General Election all registered voters will be sent information on their parliamentary constituency

From our County Councillor

News from the villages and towns

Stonesfield: New road sign has been agreed and are to be installed to discourage vehicles using the narrow Witney Lane to Stonesfield.

Woodstock: Improvements to the Woodstock on-street parking scheme are being finalised by County Officers with many positive contributions from residents and local businesses. The hope will be adjustments/improvements will take place and be implemented in the next six months.

Reduced speed schemes: 30 to 20 mph reduced speed schemes to address pedestrian safety and reduce accidents on our highways have been agreed/approved in Woodstock and Sandford St. Martin. Tackley has its scheme up and running. Pedestrian safety measures already agreed

with the Town Council will be scheduled for implementation over the next four months. Glympton and Kiddington are the final villages to ask for a scheme and plans will be drawn up before decision-making later in the year.

Library/Hub: Discussions between OCC and WODC are ongoing with a commitment to finding and/or building a library/hub. More news to follow.

Combe: Flooding issues at/near Combe Bridge are being addressed with OCC and WODC Highways and Blenheim as landowners. Awaiting schedule of agreed works.

Household Waste and Recycling

OCC will no longer charge for small amounts of DIY waste. (This requires booking for up to 5 chargeable items or 1 piece of plasterboard.). The change will cost OCC £0.5m a year. A new recycling service for vapes has also been introduced at all Oxfordshire household waste recycling centres.

HGVs

A steering group of OCC councillors has been formed to inform the study of HGV movements in Woodstock and Bladon as part of a countywide study.

Bus fares

The £2 single bus fare cap has been extended to 31 December 2024

Review: Blood runs thicker

On Saturday 27 January, murder and merriment returned to Stonesfield Village Hall. The setting was the fictional village of Fieldstone where there was to be a launch event for a book about the late horror author, and famous local, Phoebe Fairchild. During the evening a killer struck, leaving Richard Watts (Mark Saville) mortally wounded.



With clues and red herrings abounding, the knotty problem for the detectives was to identify the killer. The assembled tables of onlookers tackled the task with relish, asking the remaining cast many questions in their quest for truth whilst simultaneously enjoying a sumptuous supper.

Three tables correctly identified Shelley Jenkins but only one fully understood her motives and therefore walked away with the prize.

Our thanks go to the Stonesfield Players, the whole cast and Gareth Meager (who wrote it and acted) for providing a great evening of entertainment and a real feast.

I'm a Reader

Pippa Gwilliam, 70, who lives in Cowley, has in recent years been a driver of the train in Blenheim after a long career with the BBC World Service.

'I was probably in the last class of infants to use slates and pencils to practise writing. My mother and aunt encouraged a love of reading in me by reading books and comics aloud *with* me rather than *to* me. '*Harold Hare*' was my weekly comic' says Pippa without hesitation even after more than sixty years.


Harold Hare was an upbeat animal with a likeable tendency to make mistakes, who first appeared in comic collections in the 1940s before proving so popular he got a magazine all to himself.

'I remember learning the word
"flabbergasted" says Pippa, 'when Harold
Hare got it wrong and said "gabberflasted".
This appealed to our family habit of
mucking about with words.'

'After we had finished book six in our *prescribed* school series we were allowed to go to the library and choose our own story books and I was one of the first in the class, thanks to my aunt. After that, there was no stopping me.'

'We left London to be near Folkestone where my father was commander of an army barracks. We lived at the end of an ex-manor house, most of which was the officers' mess. I spent a lot of time with the cook, who, apart from making toffee for me, also had a love of words. From him I learned that an alternative way to call someone a liar was to say they were a 'terminological inexactitudinarian', which I thought was wonderful and used it as often as I could.'

'When I was seven, in 1961, we moved to Nigeria for 13 months. Yabuka Gowon of Biafran war fame was one of my father's junior officers'. (Gowon became Nigerian head of state and presided over the 1967-70 civil war that was one of the deadliest in history with up to two million civilians and combatants killed.) Harold Hare would certainly not have approved and, fortunately, Pippa did not experience this. 'My aunt used to send me huge great parcels of collected Harold Hare which I would motor through as soon as they arrived, as well as Greek myths and poetry.'



'The two books that most affected me in my life are two of my A-level textbooks, Orwell's 1984 and Aldous Huxley's Brave New World (I studied Graham Greene's The Power and the Glory as well and this story of the whisky-loving, morally nuanced priest certainly gave me new perspective on Catholic priests after being raised in a convent boarding school!)'

'To this day I remain a bit of a grammar Nazi out of fear of Orwell's "Newspeak" – (the simplified and restricted version of English imposed on the people by the totalitarian government in Orwell's dystopian vision). I have an almost visceral reaction when people say or post things such as 'why use a word like 'utilise' when you can just say 'use.' The breadth of words is part of the glory of English and it is vandalism to reject a word because it's more complicated.'

Pippa still reads an eclectic mix of authors. She is currently reading 'Ink Heart' by Cornelia Funke, 'a cracking children's fantasy book about a man who can read characters out of and into books, and his daughter who discovers she has the same gift.'

I'm not sure Harold Hare would approve of that either!

Water testing

We are not always able to sample the river to test for pollutants if the levels are high; this has been the case for a number of months. We simply can't access the sites we test from safely so we will have to wait until the river subsides. The Evenlode Catchment Partnership (ECP) are finalising the analysis of all the 2023 data and the ECP Annual Water Quality report will be available in the coming weeks. We will report back on that in the next edition of the Slate. Our other local groups involved in campaigning continue to do great work including Windrush Against Sewage Pollution (WASP) and their blog is really worth looking at. They are challenging the new Thames Water CEO, Chris Weston, on the legal and illegal sewage dumping into our rivers.

Plastic

The Big Plastic Count is back - 11-17 March. This is a fun and scary activity but fundamentally is an investigation into our plastic usage to inform the debate and strategy on plastics. Almost a quarter of a million people took part in the Big Plastic Count in 2022. That revealed that almost two billion pieces of plastic packaging are being thrown away a week. This year you can help build even more evidence to convince UK ministers to lead the way at the global talks that could finally phase out plastic pollution for good. It does mean that we may have some creative menus in the next few weeks! If you're feeling creative and would like to join in the Ready, Steady, Cook challenge that is cooking for the Social, please let me or Julie know. You can cook at home or in the Village Hall and it doesn't have to be done on a Tuesday, if that doesn't suit you, as we have a freezer to store food ready to be reheated.

Calling crafters

During March our resident 'art and crafter', Claire, won't be with us, though she will be leaving Mould to help us.
Would you like to take on one (or more!) of the sessions? We have a fabulous bank of art and craft materials, and you can either plan your own session or follow guidance from some experienced crafters. Let Julie know if you'd like to give this a try. The children really do love the craft sessions, and get a lot of benefit from them.

Our environmental impact

We monitored our food use over two weeks and saved an amazing 60kg of food with a waste bag of only 6kg. An example of our chefs' creativity, and a gastronomic highlight was the discovery of what was variously described as 'broccomus' and 'broccamole', devised to use up a mountain of broccoli stalks, and proof that the answer is always more garlic! Emergency Food help

One of the aims of the Food Group is to support Stonesfield residents who are struggling to afford nourishing food. We are able to do this using the funds raised by the Community Cafés run alongside the Repair Café, and through other generous donations. We are currently able to offer food parcels. Where possible we work with Oxford Food Hub to repurpose surplus food. This not only stops perfectly good food going to landfill, but significantly helps us keep our costs down, so that any money we make can be channelled towards helping villagers survive the current cost of living crisis. The Village Hall generously sponsors the club room. We work on a pay-as-youfeel basis, that means you can contribute however you can to the success of our project: donating your time, skills, money, or something even more imaginative! We will have a menu with indicative costs on it so that you can gauge what to give, but

ultimately, it's up to you. The Library will be open and the repair team will be in the main hall too, so if you're having something fixed, please do drop in while you wait. It promises to be a busy morning and we look forward to seeing you there.

From the Rector: Resurrection

One of the enduring pleasures of living in the countryside is the sound of birdsong and, as spring approaches, the dawn chorus is a beautiful reminder of the wonder of nature. In churches and schools, hymns and songs like 'All things bright and beautiful' or 'Who put the colours in the rainbow' are enduringly popular, for good reason. But we are also aware of the challenges to our environment, the loss of nature, the decline in bird and insect numbers, and the effects of pollution. As a boy growing up in Sussex I caught a trout in a local stream, but we would be unlikely to find a fish like that in the Evenlode today.

With this in mind, I was thrilled on a recent visit to Cornwall, while walking on the coast path, to hear and then see a bird I had never encountered before - the iconic

chough, wheeling in acrobatic splendour above the cliffs with black finger-like wing feathers splayed before the wind which gusted from the sea. I saw about ten birds, in the air, on the rocky cliffs, and feeding in pairs in the fields beside the sea, using their curved red beaks to probe for grubs and ants. The chough, which looks like an overgrown blackbird but with long red beak and red legs, is a small crow. A few hundred years ago they were widespread and played a lively role in English heraldry and folklore. When Archbishop Thomas Becket lay dying, tradition has it that a chough walked in his blood, thus gaining its red beak and legs. Today three choughs and a royal lion remain on the crest of the City of Canterbury. But persecution and changes in farming around the coasts led to its slow disappearance. Few were left by the middle of the 20th Century, and by the 1970s they were considered to be extinct in England, with only small populations left in the far north of Scotland and Ireland. But as I discovered, the chough is making a remarkable comeback. A few birds were seen in Cornwall 2001 and now some 300 are present there, and this success story has inspired other introductions in Kent, Sussex, the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands. Farmers are adapting their use of the land to create chough-friendly habitats, and teams of volunteers are protecting these precious birds as they regain a rocky foothold along our coasts.

My brief encounter with the resurrected chough reminds me of Easter, which we celebrate at the end of March. Holy Week leads us through the story of Christ's entry into Jerusalem, his last supper with his disciples, arrest, trial, crucifixion and death, before his followers met him alive once more, raised from the dead, to lead the way to resurrection life for us. Please join us as we remember the events of Holy Week and as we celebrate the resurrection together on the last day of this month. May we, our communities, and all of nature be raised with him.




