I teach the building structures classes at the Illinois Institute of Technology (IIT) College of Architecture, including statics, steel design and concrete and masonry design. I became interested in the pub when I read about it in the New York Times back in 2020. I bought a few shares and have been following the story ever since. At about the same time that the community was able to acquire the pub, IIT requested proposals for study abroad class for the summer of 2024.

I began to consider a study trip to the UK including a stop at the pub, but I didn't have a clear idea of what we would be doing. After meeting with a few of the committee members including Susan Rudlin, Pete Smyth and Mark Saville (who was our main point of contact) I began to understand the problems of the current building including running a pub within the building. Using this information, I was able to better define the purpose of the trip so that I could complete and submit my proposal to IIT.

The students visiting The White Horse pub in May 2024 were fourth- and fifth-year architecture students at IIT. The basis of the class is to give the students experience working with a building owner or client on an architectural problem. Questions such as: What does the client need? What are the limitations of the building? What are similar pubs doing? All needed to be answered before we could start formulating ideas for the White Horse. The White Horse pub is not our client, and we are not the architect for the pub but we are approaching the problem in that way. Many of the students have never worked in an architectural office so this is a new experience for them. To further complicate matters, as Americans, we don't know much about pubs.

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## Aspiring architects (from pl)

The students initially documented the building by measuring and drawing the floor plans, elevations, and sections through the building. The students also had the chance to talk with a few members of the pub committee including Claire and Mike to understand the physical limitations of the building and the ideas that the committee has for improving the building. We were inspired by the inclusive community emphasis for the pub and we were invited to attend one of the community dinners at the village hall. We realized that the pub will become a community house, a community dining hall, a performance space, a study space and a café as well as the traditional use as a pub.



To answer the question, 'What is a pub?' the students and I had to embark on an academic pub crawl. The students visited a few other pubs in the area (The White House in Bladon for example) and pubs in and around London (The Swan in Clewer and The Prince's Head in Richmond for example) to gain a better understanding of the use and programming within a pub. The students measured and drew these pubs and looked at building area, kitchen sizes, seating counts among others and reviewed each pub's target clientele and weekly schedules such as theme nights.

We quickly discovered that quiz night and Aunt Sally may mean a lot to The White House, but not so much to the Prince's Head. Also, The Orangery at Blenheim is radically different than the Woodstock Social Club both architecturally and programmatically. The takeaway being that there is no ideal or typical pub. They all must respond to their location and clientele in order to thrive.



Using the drawings made of The White Horse, the ideas from the committee, and the case studies of the other pubs the students are currently looking at options for improving the building. These will range from minimal changes to major changes such as saving only a few walls. As part of their research, the students discovered the interesting dynamic in the UK between historic preservation and accessibility. They will address these two issues differently in the final options. The final report for the class will present the options in a schematic manner. We may return to the project in more detail in a future class or design studio.

## Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

We held an open meeting in the Village Hall on 24 June to update you all on the progress of the Neighbourhood Plan. Although the Slate deadline for the July issue means that we can't tell you how many people came, or what questions were asked, we can tell you that we gave a PowerPoint presentation bringing you up to date with all the work we have done so far and what we are doing next.

We shared examples of the policies we have drafted (based on data compiled from your responses to last year's survey). We also showed you excerpts from our Landscape Assessment and our Housing Needs Assessment. These two documents are now in the library and on the village website at www.stonesfield.online/ neighbourhood-plan, where you can also find a copy of our PowerPoint presentation.

Finally, we indicated our likely time frame for completing the draft (early 2025) and the procedure for the subsequent submission to the Parish Council, the village consultation, submission to WODC, then examination by the Inspector. A more detailed explanation of this process will appear in a later Slate.

## White Horse AGM



Thank you to everyone who attended our AGM on Monday 20 May. What a difference in mood from last year's meeting, when we were sombrely but resolutely digging in further in our fight to save the pub! This year, as in 2023, over 100 people filled the hall to hear the latest news, but this time the updates were about tenants, finances and potential opening dates following the community's acquisition of the pub last September.

To summarise, the Chairman reported the tenancy agreement was in the final stages of negotiation. The financial report covered the period before the purchase of the pub but, as the Treasurer reported, subsequent costs relating to the purchase, repairs, refurbishment, process and compliance have been covered (just!) by the funds raised through grants, shares and the popup pub. The Chairman also acknowledged the immense voluntary efforts from across the community that have been equally vital in bringing the reopening of the pub within touching distance.

The existing committee was re-elected with the exception of Julie Curran, who was standing down. Julie was thanked for her tremendous work over the years. A new committee member, Mike Moore, was proposed and seconded.

A Q&A session covered many queries from the community, including future building

improvements, increased disabled access, governance of the tenants, future funding, grant applications, a reopening of the share offer, and communications.

The committee would like thank the community again for their support, and we wish Craig and Barbara every success in the reopening of the White Horse.

## Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum celebrates 10th Anniversary

Oxfordshire's military museum celebrates its 10th Anniversary with new exhibitions, events and objects.

Many objects from the museum collection go on display for the first time. New objects on loan to the museum include Bond memorabilia and film props - such as a pair of Sean Connery's shoes worn in Never Say Never Again - while recently acquired SOE weapons and equipment illustrate the work of real WW2 spies. A new trail, 'We Need to Talk About War', asks visitors to think about the difficult questions that war poses. A special 10th anniversary display will also open from 1 June to 1 October: a look back at some of the museum's most significant moments and stories, as well as a showcase of the museum's favourite objects from past displays.

## Young carers

## Politics & local affairs

## **Stonesfield Parish Council**

Report from Parish Council meeting, 11 June:

Chair: Cllr Phil McArdell was elected as Chair of Stonesfield Parish Council. This was a temporary appointment. (Election of Vice Chair was deferred until Council vacancies have been filled post-election; the Council has 3 current vacancies)

**District Council:** Cllr Genny Early introduced herself and gave some background on the District Council; the full report is published on the village website. Genny welcomed the news that the White Horse pub would open in mid-June. The Council also acknowledged this and wished the pub luck on the opening.

Cllr Early was asked about what is happening regarding river quality in the area. She would take this away for further updates and would report back to the Council.

**Financial:** The first stage of the internal audit of the council had been completed with no concerns arising. It would now go to a second stage with an external audit.

A grant request for £1,000 had been received from Playing Field Association. Council approved this grant request for the full sum, towards playground costs.

The Council was appointing a Responsible Finance Officer (RFO), Cherie Carruthers, and she would start on 1 July. This was part of the recruitment which Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils was supporting. New clerk hours would be reduced accordingly. The vacancy for a new clerk would be advertised shortly. The current clerk would finish at the end of July, but the June meeting would be her last meeting.

**Planning:** Councillors discussed the current planning applications:

24/01357/HHD extension – Deeplands, The Ridings, Jordan Blair – No objections from the Council.

24/01299/HHD extension – Dene View, Roslyn Holmes – No objections from the Council.

The Council confirmed that it **does not** have a planning application from Manor Road, Combe Road proposed development at this stage.

## West Oxfordshire District Council

**WODC's telephone services:** WODC has reported a significant increase in the use of its online services and improvements in customer satisfaction following its trial of new hours for its telephone call centre customer services. In September 2023 the Council reduced its telephone service hours from 9am to 2pm, in place of the previous 9am to 5pm. It reduced the opening hours in quiet afternoons and increased operators on the phones during busy lunchtimes. At the same time the Council invested more into its online services and maintained a 9-5 office to people who need to speak to someone in person.

Over the last three years, the volume of customer calls received by the Council has declined by over 37%, and the use of online forms has increased by 350%.

## **General Election – 4 July**

Since the electoral boundary changes, Stonesfield is now within the Bicester and Woodstock constituency and is no longer part of the Witney constituency.

The polling station will as usual be in the Village Hall, Field Close, Stonesfield OX29 8HA, and will be open between 7 am and 10pm.



You do not need to take your polling card but you will **not be able to vote unless** you show photographic

**identification**, such as a passport or driving licence, to the polling station staff. A full list of the types of accepted photographic identification is shown on your polling card, and it does include an older person's bus pass and a Blue Badge. ## **Oxfordshire County Council** Home Upgrade Grant (HUG2)

In 2023, the County Council awarded Home Upgrade Grant (HUG2) funding to retrofit the homes of low-income residents living in energy inefficient homes; up to  $\pounds$ 38,000 per property.

During the 2023-24 financial year, despite a number of challenges, 65 homes were upgraded across the county, including 15 in West Oxfordshire. Although this was fewer than originally planned, 31 homes are already being upgraded in the second year of delivery, toward completing an additional 150 upgraded properties before the scheme closes in March 2025.

There is capacity for a few more households, so if you could benefit from the funding, please register your interest with the Council's delivery partners: https://www.welcomethewarmth.org.uk/ register-your-interest.

Please note the scheme will close to new applications at the end of October, and for properties requiring planning permission (e.g. listed buildings or homes in a conservation area) at the end of July, so the opportunity to apply is time-limited. The eligibility criteria for HUG2 funding are as follows:

- · Home owners or private renters
- Annual household income of £39,000 or less OR in receipt of means-tested benefits
- EPC rating of D or below (free survey can be completed if necessary)
- Not heated by mains gas.

## From our MP

This is the last report to Stonesfield from Robert Courts as our MP, due to the electoral boundary changes; see General Election article on p15. Robert Courts will continue as one of the Parliamentary candidates for Witney.

#### A40 and rail improvements

Robert Courts has been concerned about the condition of road transport on the A40 between Eynsham and Oxford, and of rail services on the Cotswold Line, focusing on Long Hanborough station. He has raised with Mark Harper, the Secretary of State for Transport that the A40 improvements should include not only the building of the Eynsham Park & Ride, but also better connecting roads and an eastbound bus lane.

#### **Special Educational Needs**

Following the County Council's decision to cut funding for essential special educational needs services (SEND), Robert Courts joined with other Oxfordshire MPs to urge the Council to reconsider. As a result the service funding will be restored.

#### Solar farms

While acknowledging that more solar farms are necessary to ensure food security, the Government has pledged to protect farmland. Applications for solar farms on fertile farmland should not be a first resort, and applications should prioritise previously developed, brownfield land. Developers should avoid the best quality farmland, and the overall impact of several applications in the same area must be taken into account. These provisions are effective immediately and will apply to all current and future applications. Steps have been taken to make it easier and cheaper to install solar panels on top of warehouses, farm buildings, factories and car parks.

## **Progress on drains?**



The rain on Sunday 26 May highlighted the desperate state of the drains on Laughton Hill and at the Boot Street junction.

Gardening Club members were replanting the pots at the Boot Street junction when the rain started and within 15 minutes water was bubbling up out of the drains. Within 20 minutes, the whole of The Tap area was flooded and water was pouring down Laughton Hill. The rain stopped after 40 minutes and the drain on Laughton Hill was gushing water.

As well as reporting via www.fixmystreet, Oxfordshire County Councillor Andy Graham was informed, as he had previously taken up this case. Within two days Paul Wilson, Operations Manager for Oxfordshire Highway, had responded to say 'As you may imagine, we are still dealing with a backlog of drainage enquiries since the very wet winter, however I can advise that we have a crew booked in for 4 July to try to resolve the drainage issues on Laughton Hill.'

Paul Wilson has photos and understands these are long-standing issues that have been 'resolved' before. I just hope that this time resolving actually means curing, but as this has been going on for years it may take many more visits!

This protects vehicles from key-cloning, key theft and hacking, through a unique pin code. Thames Valley Police recommend adding extra security features for high-performance vehicles. ## I'm a Reader

Originally from Melbourne, Janet Kettels, 53, runs a healthcare communications agency. Her clients include Alcon (eyecare) and Verso Biosense (a Femtech start up). She has lived in Stonesfield for 10 years with husband James, a musician and audio production specialist. She is often seen walking their Bernese mountain dog, Holly Golightly, who you shouldn't confuse for a large and fluffy rug when the rather large hound is relaxing at The White Horse.

'I love crime novels. Not true crime, it upsets me. I read Ian Rankin when I first came to the UK in1998. Now it depends on my mood, sometimes I like something silly, like Agatha Raisin. I read many Christies. I enjoyed '*Slow Horses*', the Mick Heron series.'

'I studied Pharmacy at Monash University, Melbourne. I was reading chemistry books all the time and my respite was murder. I studied chemistry to spite my physics teacher. My father's friend ran a rubber factory in Bangkok. I worked there one summer, aged 16, and discovered I just loved the connection between manufacturing and commercial. I'm an engineer's daughter and granddaughter; I was brought up surrounded by mechanics, but I knew I'd be going into healthcare, as I loved biology.'

Janet's favourite crime novel is, '*An Instance of the Finger Post*' (1997) by Iain Pears. Set in 17th century Oxford, a murder story is revealed from the contradictory points of view of four different and unreliable narrators. The English Civil War has just ended, the situation is volatile and conspiracies abound. The book is peppered with real figures – the philosopher John Locke, scientist Robert Boyle and even a reincarnated Jesus – as historical fact, mediaeval philosophy and emerging science combine in a thrilling read. (This sounds great, must add to my list!) Janet says: 'It really made me stop and think. I knew the theory about thinking from other people's perspective because my mother brought me up well, but this really made me understand. Each narrator's version of events is written like a separate novelette. You think you know what's going on, but then by the fourth story you are totally confused.'

'When I was a child, I read the *Famous Fives*. My mother made me plough through the Austens...and that other moor one...' My interviewee grapples for the name. 'The Brontes?' I suggest. 'Yes, they're the ones!' says refreshingly irreverent Janet. 'My mother was a primary school teacher, she wanted me to read the classics.'

Unfortunately for Janet's mother, in the Australia of Janet's childhood, schools were very egalitarian; spelling was optional. 'Our class was given the choice of studying '*The diary of Adrian Mole*', or '*Macbeth*'. I was the only one who voted for *Macbeth*.'

Nowadays, Janet strikes a balance between high art and easy reading; 'Not that long ago I gave myself permission to give up books that didn't grab me. I'll never read another Booker Prize winner, because they are *always* miserable.'

'As a teenager, I went through a phase of reading historical romance, sweeping dramas, across Europe and the Middle East. Like many Australians, I always knew I wanted to travel, I just didn't realise it was going to be for the rest of my life. Librarywise, at least it's been a culture shock; unlike Stonesfield Library, in which people often shelter to avoid the rain and cold, Janet has quite a different association 'we didn't have air conditioning at home, so on boiling 40 degrees days, we'd head to the library for delicious cool.'

- Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, a subgroup of the Parish Council, who for the last two years have tirelessly gathered evidence and worked to formulate our Neighbourhood Plan.
- **SAFER**, a subgroup of the Parish Council, who assist with road safety issues and Community SpeedWatch.
- **Common Working Group**, also a subgroup of the Parish Council, whose members work hard to keep Stonesfield Common from becoming overgrown.
- Litter pickers, led by Jess Huband, keeping our environment beautiful.

- Friends of Stonesfield Library (FoSL) Volunteers keeping our library open.
- **Playing Field Association** looking after our sports fields and children's playground.
- **Sports and Social Club Committee**, founded in 1994 and kicked off with a buy-a-brick campaign!
- Food Group, Seniors' Café and Stonesfield Social – see following article by Kate Winstanley for a fascinating insight into their origins.
- **Repair and Community Café** run by Mike Sofroniou and Susan Rudlin. This very popular event helps household

items get a new lease of life, with the added bonus of lunch or cake provided by the Food Group while you wait. This event would be impossible without the time and skills offered by the repairers, who can fix furniture, computers, clothes and all electrical items, as well as sharpen your knives and garden tools.

- **Community Café** on non-Repair Café days, hosted by the Village Hall for individual charities including Chrissie's Owls.
- Stonesfield Players have been running since 1953; which is 71 years of our residents writing, acting, producing, directing, set designing and more. Not only have they put on incredible shows, but previous members who joined as children have benefited from the confidence that performing gave them: most notably Rupert Friend but also Sheilagh Martin, who became a standup comedian, and Ed Atkinson, a successful artist. Sally Wainwright (well-known writer of Happy Valley and Last Tango in Halifax) has done plays with the Players since the 1990s and is still a strong supporter.
- Scouts, Cubs and Beavers, providing fun, knowledge and confidence for our young people.



• **Football Teams** from youths to seniors – started over 100 years ago, they have been using the Stonesfield Playing Field since the land was donated by the Hunt Family. A new addition, Hunt's Paddock, alongside the main field was brought into use by the efforts of the Playing Fields Association.

- **Stonesfield Tennis Club**, established for over 100 years.
- **Cricket Teams**, coaching and match experience.
- Stonesfield Community Trust, providing affordable housing.
- **Baby and Toddlers Group**, a social group for the very young and their parents.
- **Upholstery Club** for developing new skills.
- Folk dancing, for fun, exercise and tradition.
- **Charity events** on the playing field, including bike night pop-up pubs.
- Stonesfield SeptembeerFest Volunteers, raising money for charities including Cancer Research UK, BBO Wildlife Trust and Stonesfield's children's playground.
- Youth Group currently being considered as a new group for younger residents.

Every day of the week sees clubs and groups in Stonesfield providing education, fun, fitness, social interaction and support for our residents. Young and old alike, there is something for everyone.

The impact of the volunteer contributions to these activities is immense: it is immeasurable in hours or days, because it is years of dedication that are attributable to making Stonesfield such a happy place to live.

## Volunteer Focus - The Food Group

In our small community, Stonesfield offers up a very wide range of activities for different groups. I want to highlight the great work of our volunteers in delivering two very popular and vital community activities. They both have community support and kindness at their very core, and are about bringing people together.

#### Seniors' Café

The Seniors' Café started as a response to community requests for a venue for older residents to get together and socialise. It has a group of around 12 people who come regularly, and is a friendly group. Hot drinks and homemade cakes are served in a welcoming atmosphere.



There are two regular volunteers (Claire Renshaw and Julie Curran), and other helpers drop in when they are able. A rota of expert bakers keeps the supply of cake coming. Our regulars enjoy the opportunity to get together, share news, laugh and inform each other on local issues, as well as highlighting the current scams that might catch them out (there has been talk of toyboys!) We also discuss other things the group would like to do, like trips and perhaps a walking group, so we are very much in our aspirational phase with plenty more to achieve.

The Café provides a lovely environment to engage with friends: new visitors are always welcome and the term 'senior' is fairly flexible. We look forward to welcoming new members on Tuesdays, at 3-4pm.

#### **Stonesfield Social**

The Social was born out of a wish within the Food Group to do something to support neighbours when inflation was at its highest for 40 years, and fuel prices particularly had rocketed. We feel we have more than met the agenda of providing a warm space – we had no idea how much more the Social could offer when we began with a trial session in December 2022. We are currently receiving funding from Oxfordshire Community Foundation and West Oxfordshire District Council, which supports our running costs.

Every week in term time we offer stimulating craft activities for children, a place to meet old and new friends and a chance for young parents to relax as well as a warm space and a free meal. 'I love that I don't have to cook, or even choose what to cook!' has been voiced by more than one tired parent. The age of participants ranges from newborn babies to people over retirement age, and it's a great way for the generations to mix. Our social seating arrangement means no one sits alone and you will not leave without speaking to someone you didn't know before. We are building connections in our community. Our Facebook group has 75 members and we post our menus ahead of time, cater for



those with food allergies and have a 5-star food hygiene rating.

We even offer a takeaway service, for those who can't make it to the Village Hall or who find the atmosphere too lively. We encourage customers to bring their own containers or to treat ours as a loan.

For every Social, volunteers make a healthy two-course meal (with meat and veggie options) based on produce which has been donated by the Oxford Food Hub. The Hub (which supports community groups) sources food from shops, restaurants and other food suppliers, and it is often simply surplus to requirements, and nowhere near its 'best before' date. Meals are always accompanied by a salad or crudites and we offer fresh fruit as a dessert.

On the rare occasions that there are leftovers, we can freeze additional portions to be distributed in emergency situations. We estimate that we have cooked over 3,000 meals and saved over one tonne of food from going into landfill and emitting greenhouse gases.

There is a rota of about 10 cooks, which generally means they cook about once a month. People can cook at home, or in the Village Hall and as we have a freezer they can even cook ahead if that works for them. Some cooks enjoy the 'Ready, Steady, Cook'-style challenge provided when Julie returns with an interesting combination of ingredients from the Hub; others prefer a little certainty!

We have around 20 volunteers who help with preparation, table laying, washing up and clearing as well as the important duties of hosting - explaining why we are passionate about saving food waste as well as connecting neighbours. We have welcomed the younger members of our community who volunteer as part of the Duke of Edinburgh Awards Scheme. We also provide a bank of signposting information about money advice, mental health and local events.

The success of the Seniors' Café and the Stonesfield Social highlights the importance of volunteering, the selfless commitment of each volunteer to give back to the community in which they live. Personally, I would not underestimate the benefits of volunteering to the volunteer. I've met people I would never otherwise have met and have the satisfaction of knowing I'm part of a community that cares on a large and small scale. Our volunteers bring hard work, kindness and a smile to the activities and help make Stonesfield such a great place to live.

#### Be smart, buy your tickets safely.

Thinking about buying tickets for your favourite band, sport or festival?

Things to consider.

Is the event being advertised as 'sold out'? How did the seller get the tickets and do they really have them for sale?

Beware of sellers who want to meet you at the event! Where is the company's office?

Is it a real office or a 'virtual' one? Search online and see what comes up.

**Does the company have a UK landline?** The website must have a standard rate number for customer service.

#### Are there customer reviews?

Check online to see what others are saying about the website.

#### Ask questions.

Questions can be as simple as when will the tickets be dispatched' and what type of ticket you are buying'. If you're unsure, ask before you buy.

#### Read the terms and conditions.

Always read the small print, particularly on unfamiliar websites.

Football ticket reselling is largely illegal. If you're buying football tickets, be aware that it's illegal to re-sell most football tickets. Clubs may refuse you entry if you have bought someone else's ticket.

Pay for tickets by credit card.

The card issuer will be responsible for refunding you if you don't get the ticket. (as long as the price of the single ticket is more than  $\pm 100$ ).

#### Is the payment page secure?

When paying online make sure that the payment pages are secure. Look for a padlock symbol in the address bar and https' in the website address.

We support neighbours who are struggling with the cost of living, and use donations to provide this help. All our activities are free to Stonesfield residents, and we only ask that people donate if they feel able and want to do so. We can now receive card payments from anyone who would like to donate to us that way at the Café or the Social. Our costs are low but we do have expenses for things we can't get from the Oxford Food Hub, and for items like craft materials.

We have received our first summer glut donation! We were so delighted that the slugs had spared an excess of lettuce from Brook Lane and made it into a delicious healthy salad. If you find you have more produce than your household can deal with, please get in touch – we love zerofood-mile food as much as rescued food.

## Seniors' Café

This takes place on Tuesday afternoons in term time from 3-4pm in the Village Hall Clubroom. All are welcome, and being a Senior is self-defined! There is a warm and welcoming atmosphere and it's a wonderful place to welcome old and new friends. There are always hot drinks and usually home-made cake (there is always cake!)

## **Stonesfield Social**

Tuesday evening is Social evening, in term time, where a group of creative volunteer cooks work wonders with surplus produce. We get most of our ingredients from the Oxford Food Hub who receive donations from supermarkets, small shops, restaurants, and food suppliers which they then donate to community groups. The standard of produce is fantastic – think Isle of Wight heritage tomatoes, beautiful



purple aubergines and top-quality bread! Everyone is welcome; we have guests of all ages and household types, which means it's a real mix of village residents getting together to save great food.

If this sounds like something you would like to get involved with, please contact us. We need cooks and helpers to run the Social, so there's a role for everyone, whether you like to be a creative cook, chat with guests, or keep behind the scenes stacking the dishwasher. And more for the Seniors' Café. You don't have to commit to every week; we can accommodate your availability and you can even help for just part of a session if that works for you. Our motto is 'neighbours helping neighbours', and we'd love to invite you to take part.

#### **Our environmental impact**

We continue to save in excess of 30kgs of food each week, serving 70 portions of healthy food to our guests. The food we save uses energy and water when it is grown, and there is a further impact on the environment when it is packed and transported. If it was not used, it would end up in landfill, where it would cause further environmental damage by creating greenhouse gas emissions.

## Stonesfield Environment Group

We have just completed our water sampling for this month and are waiting for the publication of the current year's data on levels of nitrates and phosphates in the Evenlode. These results are collated from the data collected by the citizen scientists working in and around the river. This report should be out soon and we will share it with you when we can.

We've mentioned before that our efforts are enhanced when we work with other groups, and in this light we are coordinating with other groups along the Evenlode on our next set of sampling data; that of the riverfly population. We need to establish the baseline levels of these populations so that we can identify when there is some deviation, and alert the Environment Agency if and when that happens. We have been talking to the folks at the Nature Recovery Community Action Group and also our neighbouring villages of Fawler, Finstock and Charlbury on their plans for nature recovery.

When we aren't busy with the above, the Tree Planters have been out checking the trees along the Stonesfield straight and working to identify new sites for additional planting. You might also see us out litter picking by the time you read this.

As ever there is much to do, so please let us know if you'd like to get involved.

### From the Rector: Abundance

July begins with our General Election on 4 July. The opportunity to vote for an incoming government may be a very limited democratic act, but it is precious. So many countries are controlled by unelected leaders in repressive regimes, where press and the media are silenced. Millions of people across the world are afraid even to voice criticism of their leaders, let alone work for a change of government. Even where there are democratic elections, money buys votes or political support, while election outcomes and democratic processes are undermined through abuse of social media and misinformation. As Christians, we pray for all those who will represent us in the next Parliament, that they will act with wisdom and integrity in the interests of all people, especially the most vulnerable, and will

protect the world God made, our precious home.

July also sees the opening of the Olympic Games in Paris on the 26th, the XXXIII Olympiad. They will feature 32 sports at 329 events, with 10,000 athletes representing more than 200 countries. Ten million tickets will be sold and up to a billion people will watch on television. The Games will cost billions of euros, but in our fractured world, they are a beautiful sign of hope and international friendship. The Bible has very little to say about sport, although St Paul compares the discipline of the Christian life to the training of an athlete at the games. In the ancient world, sport emerged from the need for military training and combat, from competition between individuals and communities, from physical prowess relating to work (such as swimming, rowing or sailing, lifting or running), and from the sheer exuberance of human playfulness. Sport today is enjoyed as entertainment, as a hobby, and as a way of staving healthy. Whether we are watching or participating, it is a great way to meet people, and to learn about teamwork, losing and winning. It connects us with our physical nature, reduces stress, and builds resilience.

We thank God for these Olympic Games, which show that competition can be peaceful and respectful. We pray that the Games will be safe. We also pray that they will inspire the next generation of sportswomen and men, and encourage many millions more of us to use sport and physical activity to take pleasure in our bodies. As human beings, our physical, mental, emotional and spiritual sides are wonderfully interwoven. Perhaps the greatest benefit of the Games is the inspiration and enrichment they bring to lives across the world. For me this is very much in the spirit of Christ, who said, 'I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.'

## **Roman Catholic Worship**

Some reflections (part21) by Pope Francis on John Chapter 15, 1-8

Pope Francis offers his further reflections on John, Chapter 15 (from his sermon at Holy Mass Casa Santa Marta (Domus Sanctae Marthae), Wednesday of the Fifth Week of Easter, 13 May 2020). Pope Francis' themes are about our bearing witness to faith, our mutual relationship and dialogue with Jesus, and the importance of steadfastness (remaining in the relationship).

'And it comes to my mind to say, what is the need that the tree, the vine has for the branches? It's bearing fruit. What is the need - let's say a little boldly - what is the need that Jesus has for us? The testimony. When he says in the Gospel that we are light, he says, 'Be the light, so that men may see your good deeds and glorify the Father' (Mt 5:16), that is, witness is the need that Jesus has for us. To bear witness to his name, so that faith, the Gospel grows by our testimony.

This is a mysterious way: Jesus glorified in heaven, having passed through the Passion, needs our testimony to grow, to proclaim, for the Church to grow. And this is the mutual mystery of 'remaining'. He, the Father and the Spirit remain in us, and we remain in Jesus.

It will do us good to think and reflect on this: to remain in Jesus; and Jesus remains in us. To remain in Jesus to have the sap, the strength, to have the justification, the gratuitousness, to have fertility. And He remains in us to give us the strength to the bear fruit (John 15: 5), to give us the strength to witness with which the Church grows. And one question I ask myself: what is the relationship between Jesus remaining in me and I remaining in Him? It's a relationship of intimacy, a mystical relationship, a wordless relationship. 'But Father, but this, let the mystics do it!' No, this is for all of us. With small thoughts: 'Lord, I know you are there: give me strength and I will do what you tell me.' That intimate dialogue with the Lord. The Lord is present, the Lord is present in us, the Father is present in us, the Holy Spirit is present in us; they remain in us. But I have to remain in Them.'

I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in me that bears no fruit he cuts away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes to make it bear even more. John 15 1-3
