Samuel's Mountain Triathlon for new Scout Hut!

My name is Samuel and I am a Beaver with Stonesfield Scouts. We have now been without our hut for nearly 3 years. We are very lucky to have our hut near the woods where we can build dens and have the space near the hut for fires where we can cook and have marshmallows.

The new hut has started to be built and that's very exciting, but we are still raising money to complete the hut, we still need lots of things like electrics, plumbing, toilets and flooring. I wanted to help so with the help of my dad we have planned a 'Personal Triathlon' on 7 August. I am going to kayak 1 mile, cycle 1 mile and climb Snowdon which is a 10 miles walk in 12 hours, all this less than a week after my 8th birthday.

I go to the mountains a lot and have climbed mountains since I could walk. Since then, I have climbed more than 30 mountains using my own legs, the hardest climb I have done was the North Ridge of Tryfan when I was 5. I have been kayaking a few times with my dad and only got my own boat a few months ago. My dad will be in a boat alongside me as I kayak a lake next to Snowdon, then out of the lake onto my bike to the bottom of the Watkin Path



where I will start my 5 mile walk up Snowdon to its 1085-metre summit then 5 miles back down (dad won't pay for the train).

I am asking for sponsorship to my Just Giving Page so I can help raise money for the new hut and make sure the scouts have a base to last another 60 years, that lots of other children can enjoy just like my dad and I did when we were scouts at Stonesfield.

Temporary Closure of Pond Hill

In the interests of public safety, it will be necessary for Oxfordshire County Council to close the road and impose a 'No Waiting' restriction as detailed above to facilitate carriageway repair work.

A temporary Notice (T 14149 / RAG) is being made to implement the temporary closure and will operate **from 12 August** 2024. The anticipated completion date is 13 August 2024, 08:00 to 16:00 each day.

A Temporary Traffic Regulation Notice is being made to implement the temporary closure and restriction and will operate on the days shown above.

Please note that Notices for urgent works can last up to 5 consecutive days only.

Access will be maintained for emergency service vehicles and for those frontages within the closure area, subject to the progress of the works and liaison with the works supervisor.

Botley Road not reopening



Botley Road, which has been closed under the rail bridge since April 2023, will not now reopen in October as planned.

Oxfordshire County Council is extremely frustrated that Network Rail is postponing the replacement of Botley railway bridge at the end of this month and is unable to reopen Botley Road in October as a result. The council is in discussion with Network Rail to understand the implications of this.







West Oxfordshire District Council

District Councillor Report -June 2024

The work of the council and its paid officers covers the areas of planning, waste collections, maintenance, business support, grant-making, affordable housing, homelessness & supporting parish councils. The council is currently governed by an alliance of The Liberal Democrat, Labour and Green groups, and is now made up of 21 Liberal Democrats, 13 Conservative, 11 Labour and four Green Party councillors.

Part of my role, together with Cllr Tim Sumner, is to connect the four parish councils and the residents in the Stonesfield & Tackley ward with the help that residents need on all WODC matters, and others. It also involves supporting community groups, and connecting them with sources of help.

June Council highlights - I sit on the Overview and Scrutiny Committee. One proposal scrutinised, and since approved is the upgrade of the public open space CCTV cameras covering the areas of Carterton and Witney to high definition digital, together with the installation of five new cameras in Chipping Norton. WODC will join the Thames Valley Police CCTV partnership, transferring CCTV assets and operational responsibility to TVP under a 'single owner' model; and moving monitoring arrangements to a shared Oxfordshire hub.

Home Upgrade Grant (HUG2):

Funding was awarded in 2023 to Oxfordshire County Council to retrofit the homes of low-income residents living in energy inefficient homes, which will reduce fuel poverty and carbon emissions in Oxfordshire. Residents who could benefit from the funding should register their interest with the delivery partners: www.welcomethewarmth.org.uk/registeryour-interest

Move Together: Move Together helps people who are anxious, or have long-term health conditions and require support to move more and build activity into their everyday lives. The programme is for people who are 16+ years old, inactive, have a long-term health condition or disability, and offers access to a range of different activities specific to the individual's needs. See more information at www.getoxfordshireactive.org/movetogether. You can also call them directly on 01993 861564.

YouMove: This provides free or low-cost activities for families living in Oxfordshire. If your child or children are in receipt of

benefits-related free school meals, there is a fantastic range of activities to enjoy together, including during weekends and school holidays. In addition, YouMove is here for children in need of support; this includes refugee children and young carers. There is a 50% discount on all pay as you go activities at Better Leisure Centres, including during weekends and school holidays. It also includes a free access pass to Blenheim. Local biodiversity: Polecats are in the region! I found a roadkill polecat between Witney and Curbridge. Polecats were trapped pretty much to extinction at the end of the 19th century. It is great news that they are recolonising West Oxfordshire!

Biodiversity policies: Government guidance (17 May 2023) is that, as a public authority, town and parish councils must: consider what they can do to conserve and enhance biodiversity, agree policies and specific objectives based on their consideration, act to deliver their policies and achieve their objectives. I look forward to supporting the development of the Stonesfield Parish biodiversity policies and plans.

Community: Congratulations to the magnificent committee and new tenants of our community pub, the White Horse. This is such a great outcome after a long time and much work by the committee and villagers.

More news from West Oxfordshire

Cameras have been installed throughout rural locations in West Oxfordshire as part of the Rural Crime Partnership's work to combat fly-tipping using £156,000 funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley and the Home Office's Safer Streets initiative.

This area of work will be led by the West Oxfordshire, South Oxfordshire, and Vale of White Horse district councils and Thames Valley Police. New covert cameras, purchased with funding from the scheme, will be deployed in fly-tipping hotspots across local rural areas.

Matthew Barber, Police and Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley, said 'Fly-tipping is not just an eyesore, it can be a health hazard and also create a dangerous environment for wildlife and, when done on farmland, livestock and crops. I'm pleased that the funding we secured will support the installation of new covert cameras across West Oxfordshire, South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse to help tackle these incidents which blight our rural environment.'

The cameras are specially developed to tackle crime at rural outdoor sites, including fly-tipping, by using invisible 'No Glow' night vision LEDs.

The scheme will also see the placement of signs around known hotspots to deter flytipping, alongside the cameras to catch offenders. The cameras will be regularly moved around the district to tackle known issues.

I'm a Reader

As many Slate readers will know, I was diagnosed with incurable blood cancer myeloma last September after breaking two vertebrae for no good reason. Since then, I have had months of chemo, hundreds of procedures, another vertebra break, two colonoscopies (one on my birthday!), bought seven wigs and as many scarves, discovery of a second cancer in a large polyp in the bowel, two bowel operations (one emergency after freak internal hernia after the first op). All of which has meant a lot of time in hospital.

I am now in hospital again, having received a dose of hard-core, old-school chemo,

melphalan, and have had a stem cell transplant, from my own harvested stem cells. This requires up to four weeks in hospital, so I hope you will understand that I am therefore this month writing about books to take into hospital, focused on myself, for interview time has been short!

Of course, I've been far too ambitious with the books I thought I might read, or maybe I knew I would only dip in and out and wanted to have a book for every likely mood.

My Bright Abyss by Christian Wiman. He's a poet, a theologian *and* he too has incurable blood cancer. Looking one's mortality in the face, brings out the spiritual in even the most hardened; I've found reading this writer's poetic musings on pain, suffering and nature as solace, when I can concentrate (not often). I'm struck that his "meditations of a modern believer" seem a lot more romantic than my experience of living with cancer, which is all undignified eruptions from orifices. Wiman was writing about the soul, suddenly my long dormant piles were shouting for my attention.

What Katy Did at School by Susan Coolidge. A friend sent me this. 'What Katy Did' is the most famous in this series, set in nineteenth century Ohio telling the story of harum-scarum Katy Carr and siblings, getting into scrapes until Katy (appropriately enough) breaks her back and, as per wisdom of the time, spends months cooped up in bed and dealing, in a very human adolescent way with her life shrunk to four walls. I can relate. I read that one many times as a child, but never the school sequel. It's a comfort to meet up with old friends. 200 fun things to Knit by Victoria Lyle. I found this book in The Maggie's Centre – the building next to the Churchill Hospital which offers space and comfort for people with cancer to relax. There is a wide selection of flowers, birds and insects to knit. I like that they don't take long. I knitted a floral brooch for my friend's 'lucky' soft toy snail, Samuel. My friend has requested the frilly slug, little ambitions, but something to do.

Kafka's diaries – they are a dip in and out sort of read. The feeling of being in hospital is itself Kafkaesque. You wake up in a place and in a body that isn't yours. Like Gregor Samsa, who is the salesman who wakes up turned into an enormous insect, which leaves him, (understandably) feeling alienated and full of existential angst.

I bought this book at the excellent Kafka exhibition currently running at the Weston Library. As a man who suffered frequently both mentally and physically, the diaries are full of comforting miserablism. 'In peace you make no progress, in war you bleed to death' – no Disney schmaltz here!

Book Break's Break

Book Break is taking an August break and will start again on Thursday 5 September. Our continued focus has been upon the shared reading aloud and discussion of the novella, including, this year, one longer novel.

.....

Although little is known about the life of painter, Vermeer, in Delft, Tracey Chevalier writes convincingly of just how it may have been in Girl with a Pearl *Earring*. Told from the perspective of Griet, a maid in Vermeer's household, the narration is deceptively simple but effectively evokes life in 17th century Delft in the Vermeer family and in the imagined story behind the eponymous Girl with a Pearl Earring. Alongside the novel, we also looked at the paintings of Vermeer and gained real insight into the painting process. We were fortunate to be able to watch the streamed version of the Vermeer exhibition showing concurrently at the Rijksmuseum giving us a close-up view of those remarkable paintings.

A considerable reading challenge this year was Kazuo Ishiguro's *Klara and the Sun*, a topical novel in its futuristic vision of AI in everyday life. Set in the USA, Klara is a solar-powered AF (Artificial Friend) bought from a department store to provide company for Josie, a teenager with a potentially fatal illness. The themes of genetic modification and the role of AI in our lives are disturbing ones but the novel gave us a very readable way into the subject. We will be intrigued to watch the planned film version of this novel.

Perhaps our most satisfying read has been John Preston's *The Dig*. This tells the story of the 1939 excavation of a burial mound at Sutton Hoo which led to a remarkable, archaeological find which totally changed our view of the so-called 'dark ages'. Apart from the amazing discoveries made at Sutton Hoo, John Preston unearths the hidden aspects of the characters involved in the drama. It was intriguing to learn that John Preston was the nephew of Peggy Stuart (nee Preston), one of the archaeologists involved in the Sutton Hoo excavation. The film of the novel, which we all very much enjoyed, makes satisfyingly explicit what is implicit in the novel's characters.

As always, we are grateful for the use of Stonesfield Library as our venue throughout the year.

Stonesfield Gardening Club

The Gardening Club held a very successful Open Gardens event at the end of June, when we had 160 visitors visiting 11 gardens in the village. We are very grateful to those who opened their gardens, some for the first time, and to all those who baked cakes and sold teas. We now have lots of money to give to local charities later in the year.



We also went to the (rather soggy) school fete to sell what we had left of our plants, and, thanks to generous donations, we were able to benefit Chrissie's Owls directly.





Also in July we had a return visit from Chris Day of Buckingham Gardens. Having started his career over 40 years ago as an apprentice at a houseplant nursery, he brought along a wonderful display of different plants to show us. The general rule of thumb is that the bigger the leaf the more tolerant of shade a plant is, so a smaller leafed plant needs more light.

Over watering is the biggest cause of problems with house plants, so Chris suggests getting the soil moist then allowing it to dry so the roots can take up oxygen which they also need. Feed your plants too, best done from March to September.

No meeting this month, but September sees the return of another club favourite, Rosy Hardy, talking to us about perennials for pollinators.

We are very aware of our environmental impact and are proud of our achievements, including:

• Over 1 tonne of food was saved (approximately 30kgs each session). We do this by working with the Oxford Food Hub to use excellent quality food which would otherwise be thrown away and left to create greenhouse gas emissions. Often this food has been brought to Oxford from distant locations where it is grown, with implications for further environmental damage due to airfreight, water and energy used to produce the food or package and transport it.

- Encouraging our FaceBook group members to think about their food choices and providing information about how to reduce waste – for example using cauliflower leaves and stalks as well as the more usual curds! We also demonstrate this through our cooking.
- Very little food waste at the sessions. We provide delicious family friendly healthy meals, and very little is thrown away. One week we even sent some dinner home for hungry chickens!
- We encourage those who have takeaways to bring their own reusable containers or to treat ours as a loan, cutting down on plastic waste
- We have been lucky enough to receive several gifts of surplus, locally grown garden produce – thank you!

Both the Seniors' Café and the Social provide a great social space for neighbours to get together in addition to all the environmental benefits.



None of this marvellous work could take place without our team of volunteers who uncomplainingly clear tables, wash up, provide craft activities and of course cook. We could always use more help, so please consider joining our friendly group. Contact Julie for more information.

From the Rector - The Church Restoration Begins

Last year we were deeply moved by the generosity of many people in the village who supported our appeal for help towards repairs to our beautiful Church in Stonesfield. Church of England churches receive no financial support from the Government or the Diocese, but they are surveyed every five years and the resulting 'Ouinquennial' inspection report lists the repairs which are needed. Overall, St James the Great is in a good state, but the most recent report showed a number of repairs are needed to the roof, and to high level stonework, which led to our appeal to the parish. I am delighted that after careful planning with our architect and builder, the work will begin on the 19 August, and should be completed in November. At a recent site meeting, I was impressed and

moved by the care which is being taken, not just with the building, but also with the people who worship in the Church, and those who live and work around it. Everything possible is being done to minimise the impact of these repairs, and to ensure that St James is in first class condition in time for Advent and Christmas.

The church has not always been so well cared for. It is mostly a 13th and 14th century building, with the tower at its current height dating from the 15th century. In 1517 the Rector was reported for neglecting the repair of the church, and for having a woman in his house. In 1717 the church was said to be 'out of repair and in great danger'. The population of the village was smaller in those days, but church attendance fluctuated, partly through inactivity, and largely through the presence of strong and enthusiastic groups of nonconformists - Quakers, Methodists, and the Salvation Army. In the 18th century St James held just six communion services a year (today we have around 160!). Things were taken in hand in the 19th century, when repairs and improvements were made to the building (some paid for by the Duke of Marlborough) and parish clergy dedicated their time and energy to worship and activities in the parish. By the middle of the 19th century there were four Sunday services and daily services during the week, along with a flourishing Sunday School, evening schools and Bible classes.

We look forward to the completion of the important repairs to our Church. But we are aware that the other meaning of the word 'Church' is the community of people who worship within it. We are the church and we gather to worship together, bringing our whole lives, with their joys and challenges, into the presence of God. The church is a place of seeking and finding, of forgiveness, healing and restoration, of learning and of celebration, where we are fully known and refreshed by the love of other people and our experience of the love of God. Please join us!

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
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
