Triathlon triumph



On 7 August, Samuel completed his personal triathlon in Snowdonia to raise money for the Stonesfield Scout Group and the new scout hut.

We set off at 8 am on a slightly revised route due to the weather. We decided to reverse the kayak leg that we had originally planned, and started at the other end of the lake. We paddled all the way back and ended up landing at our campsite due to the strong winds. This change of direction meant we were kayaking upstream but on a downwind, and with a reduced distance of half a mile. This was due to the choppy water conditions and Samuel's training all being done on the calm Cherwell and Oxford canal. He very quickly completed the kayak leg in eight minutes, which was quicker than the support vehicle could get back to get photos of him landing.

Samuel then quickly dashed back to the tent to get changed into his cycling and walking gear, and set off on his bike. The reversed kayak route put the bikes' starting point at just over 2 miles from the walking transition, and added a steep hill climb out of the campsite. Samuel tackled the cycle like a champ, completing the leg in under 20 minutes in a light drizzle.

Then came the walk. The Watkin path is the most scenic route on Snowdon. The route starts in a wooded area and follows a river that goes from waterfall to pool continuously for a mile, and is a great wild swimming spot in the summer. But despite being August, we were not in summer climbing conditions. The winds started light while we remained in sheltered valleys for the first two miles, but it rained on and off for the whole day.

By 10.30 am, we were in 30 mph winds and pushing towards a very cloudy summit. Once in the clouds at around 700 metres altitude, we had very little visibility, at times less than 10 metres, but Samuel pushed on, knowing that if we were still walking uphill, we still had some work to do. We summited Snowdon at 12:15pm, in 40mph+ winds, only four and a quarter hours after first setting off. It was an incredible effort from 8-year-old Samuel.

The mountain was quieter than normal that day and the café and train were shut due to winds being forecast for 50mph gusts later in the day. With that in mind, we quickly sheltered for lunch and made a slow walk down. Samuel completed the entire challenge in 7hrs 27 minutes. Two days later he was back climbing mountains in much sunnier conditions, as we saw out the rest of our trip.

A new society!

There has been a great swell of interest in the various events in Stonesfield this summer to celebrate the bicentenary of the naming of Stonesfield's own dinosaur, Megalosaurus.

In some of these activities we have worked with the Oxford University Museum of Natural History, which is building partnerships with local groups who have an interest in their own fossil history and in the Museum.

Age UK Oxfordshire's Homeshare Service

This service from Age UK Oxfordshire carefully matches older people who are looking for help or companionship at home (the Householder), with another person who can lend a hand, and who needs affordable accommodation (the Sharer).

In return for the accommodation the Sharer gives the Householder up to ten hours of their time each week in a combination of companionship and practical help.

Each Homeshare match is individual, and is carefully agreed. It may include some cooking and light housework, help with computers and technology, maybe some shopping or gardening, spending time together over a meal or cup of tea as well as occasional trips out. The reassuring presence of another person in the house overnight is often an additional benefit for the Householder. A Homeshare match does not involve any personal care.

Monthly fees are payable to Age UK Oxfordshire by both Householder and Sharer and cover the costs of the safety checks, the setting up and facilitation of the match, and the provision of regular, ongoing personal support. The Householder pays from £150 per month, the equivalent of £5 day. The Sharer pays £200 per month. The fees help Homeshare Oxfordshire to operate as a sustainable scheme, so more people are able to benefit.

A Reluctant Farewell

It was cold, wet and foggy with vestiges of snow on the ground when I first encountered the warmth of a Stonesfield welcome. Walking down Brook Lane in 1993, after viewing a house in Churchfields, I met Marion Hall. She assured me that leaving the green, leafy Cheshire Plain for the beauty of a Cotswold village would prove to be a decision neither Anne nor I would ever regret. She was right!

Our thirty-plus years here, amongst many I can call friends, have been the happiest period of our lives – full of memories, smiles and laughter.

Being concerned that boredom might follow the intense activity of a busy English Department and a National Examination Board, we both joined a variety of societies and clubs in the village - the Church family, the History Society, the Stonesfield Society, Meals-on-wheels, the village choir and several others. The Friday Club was a small group of ageing but enthusiastic men who tried to keep the Church Yard tidy and develop a path to the Old School. I can clearly see in my mind's eye the picture of Frank Hall, surrounded by us all also leaning on garden tools, recounting vivid tales of the Ox and Bucks in France after the invasion and then in Palestine. George Dawe always provoked laughter with his many stories, especially the one of how he had set himself on fire in his own greenhouse. John Clifford and Rov Hyde aided and abetted it all with their own Army and Wartime escapades.

Lunch Club became a major part of our lives for the next twenty-plus years, after Anne and a small group of committed ladies founded it to give older, less active villagers some social interest and a super cooked lunch. Day trips and interesting visits and talks became a highlight of club proceedings. A list of well over 40 volunteers, all willing to give time and energy for the benefit of the village, ensured its dynamic development, to the extent that Oxford County used it as a bench mark for excellence.

That I eventually became involved in local politics was due to the eloquent persuasive powers of Avis Ushaw, whose Chairmanship I followed on the Parish Council. When Derrick Millard became ill, I was again persuaded, this time by Barry Norton, to stand for the District Council. Stonesfield and surrounding villages elected me and this led to seven years of great interest and frenetic activity.

All this leads up to my saying a most heartfelt thank you to all of Stonesfield for making our time here the best and most colourful time of my life. Stonesfield is a jewel amongst villages and its residents are blessed living here within its friendly, welcoming embrace.

To you all, my gratitude is immense and it is with some deep regret that we now leave and give ourselves up to the joys of Ducklington, to live adjacent to our daughter. To all who remain - enjoy and take care of a very special place.

Soldiers of Oxford Museum, Woodstock

Marking the Woodstock-based museum's tenth anniversary and commemorating 110 years since the start of the First World War, Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum is currently hosting a Great War art exhibition, and is running an art competition for young people over the summer, which will culminate in its own Journeys through War exhibition this October.



Now taking entries, the competition is open to children and young people from ages 7 through to 18, and will be divided into three age brackets: 7-10 years; 11-14 years; 15-18 years. Prizes will be awarded for the top entries from each category.

The museum is looking for entries that are inspired by the museum's own collections and tie into the theme of Journeys through War. These could take the form of art portraying a glider pilot's flight to Normandy on D-Day, the journey made by the many evacuees that came to Oxfordshire during the Second World War, or even the journeys made by carrier pigeons used to send secret messages during wartime.

Submitted work can take inspiration from museum collections from the First and

Second World Wars, but could take in more recent events or even earlier conflicts. The deadline for entries is 29 September 2024, with more information and an entry form available at www.bit.ly/summerartcomp.

Stonesfield Parish Council

New Councillors: At the Parish Council meeting on 14 August, the Council welcomed two new Councillors: Ursula Rice and Claire Renshaw, and Jess Huband was co-opted to fill the remaining vacancy. Cherie Carruthers was introduced as the new Responsible Finance Officer (RFO).

Council sub-groups: The meeting received reports from the District Councillors (Cllrs Genny Early and Tim Sumner), and from the Parish Councillors concerned with the Neighbourhood Plan (Cllr Simon Warr) and SAFER (Cllr Mick Heduan). These sub-groups and the Common working group were reconfirmed as working groups under direction of the Parish Council.

Neighbourhood Planning

The Neighbourhood Plan is continuing to take shape as each of the strands of work is moving towards a conclusion. The Steering Group was mindful that the new Government planned to revise some of the planning laws, which meant redrafting the National Planning & Policy Framework (NPPF). Consultation has been launched on changes to the NPPF, which it is hoped will enable a new document to be published in Autumn 2024.

We have been through the proposed changes and the protections for Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, such as the Cotswolds AONB in which we are situated, are unchanged. This will mean that the Housing Needs Assessment we undertook and the various policies that we have drafted for the Plan will not alter.

However, the emphasis on building more homes across the country has meant that most local authorities will need to meet much higher targets for building homes. West Oxfordshire District Council will now have an annual target of 889 homes per year; an increase of 62% from the previous target of 549. This will impact the rewriting of their Local Plan, with which our Neighbourhood Plan will need to be consistent.

A public consultation in late 2023 on where new homes should be built in the District strongly favoured building in existing towns rather than villages, as they have all the facilities, employment and transport links. Major building development (10 houses or more) in villages in the AONB, under the new NPPF, would still need to demonstrate exceptional need and public interest for that settlement.

The Housing Needs Assessment we undertook did not demonstrate a need for more market housing in Stonesfield. However, there was a small need for some social housing. This could be located to minimise harm to the AONB and protect the landscape and scenic beauty; National and local planning policy requires that great weight be given to these protections.

Citizens Advice

As newly elected Councillors, we had an introductory session with CA in Witney. In the 2023-2024 period, they helped 8,620 people on 33,261 issues. In the Stonesfield and Tackley ward specifically, they served 95 individuals and opened 116 cases. They assisted clients in the Stonesfield & Tackley ward to increase their annual income by £75,810, and were able to get over £14,000 of debt written off. Fifty-two percent of clients have a disability or long-term health condition and the primary issue was help with Universal Credit claims and appeals. Equality and diversity training

All district Councillors were invited to undertake equality and diversity training. The session was a useful prompt to think about how to make sure that all voices are heard.

Overview and Scrutiny Committee

One item we are reviewing is our current waste services. WODC has contracted with

Ubico for waste collection, street cleansing, grounds and other ancillary services since 1 April 2015. The key performance metrics of missed bins and container deliveries have improved.

As the service has stabilised, the service will focus on more strategic elements in the coming months, which include looking at greening the fleet and transitioning away from standard fuel vehicles. Ubico has put a zero-emission Dennis Eagle eCollect through its paces, making collections from homes across the district and collecting over 94 tonnes of rubbish over a 2-week period to show the electric collection vehicle can perform in a large rural district.

The introduction of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) starts with local authorities in 2025. EPR will see waste producers (for example manufacturers) paying for their portion of waste services rather than citizens paying through general taxation. DEFRA is overseeing this new approach to waste funding in the UK and has already begun collecting from producers. EPR is likely to have a significant positive impact on WODC's waste budget.

Botley West Solar Farm

Oxfordshire County Council has notified WODC that archaeological trial trenching for the Botley West Solar Farm commenced on 12 August. This is necessary to understand the archaeological potential within the area of the proposed solar farm. There will be machinery on site starting in the Vale of White Horse, but moving north through West Oxfordshire shortly afterward and the trenching is to be complete by the end of 2024. The presence of machinery and activities on site may create concern, but the trial trenching is

part of the necessary survey work to be undertaken by the developer. It does not represent the start of development and is not related to the construction of the solar farm itself.

Biodiversity

Verge management and cutting — I have been contacted by residents with concerns about the timing of cutting verges, removing flowering plants before they have set seed, and the impact on insect populations. The approved WODC Nature Recovery Plan 2024-2030 (https://www.westoxon.gov.uk/media/nvtbkoob/nature-recovery-plan-2024-to-2030.pdf) has an objective to: 'Promote and showcase wildflower grasslands and good verge management for biodiversity for Town and Parish Councils and other land owners'. We aim to work out management plans that are appropriate for different areas.

Community Infrastructure Levy

West Oxfordshire District Council is holding a public consultation on the introduction for the first time of a Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) to help fund new and improved infrastructure across the district.

CIL will complement existing Section 106 developer contributions, which apply to larger development schemes and which mitigate the impact of the development they apply to directly. CIL will be applied to smaller developments that are not generally subject to Section 106 contributions.

WODC Leader Cllr Andy Graham says that introducing CIL will help to ensure that new developments are supported by the right investment in supporting infrastructure. A proportion of the money received through CIL will be passed directly to the local Town or Parish Council within which the development is taking place so that decisions on how the money is spent are taken locally.

The public consultation will be open between 2 August and 27 September. For more information and to contribute to the consultation, go to www.yourvoice.westoxon.gov.uk/en-GB/projects/cil-dcs.

A message from Thames Valley Police expresses thanks for local people's cooperation and patience with their security operation before, during and after the summit held at Blenheim Palace on 18 July. TVP really appreciated all of the patience and support shown to officers, staff and volunteers before, during and after the summit.

Scams

Thames Valley Police are urging people to be vigilant for a number of different type of scams currently being used to make money. One is the use of advertising online, including pop-up advertisements and on social media, promoting opportunities for lucrative home working. The truth is that there is no job opportunity, and the scam is persuading people to pay for goods or services upfront and then those don't appear. TVP warns for caution when being asked for money in advance, or being told money can be made from playing games or by introducing more people to the scam. They advise people not to respond to a mobile number (beginning 07) or to a web-based email address such as @gmail or @yahoo, as genuine businesses usually have a landline phone number and/or their own email address.

Another type of scam is the courier scam, where a person buying something from you might claim they are too busy to collect an item and says they will use a courier who'll bring you the money. All you need to do is give them your bank details to pay the insurance, which can put your money or identity under threat.

There are many other approaches. If you become the victim of a scam, call your bank immediately using the number on the back of your bank card and report it to www.actionfraud.police.uk/reportscam, or phone 03001 232040.

Antisocial behaviour

A new Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) Mediation Service for Thames Valley is being introduced for residents of Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Milton Keynes. Mediation helps to resolve neighbour and community disputes that, if left, can escalate and cause significant harm and distress. Often these disputes don't meet the criminal threshold and can't be resolved by one agency alone.

Anti-social behaviour often occurs over time rather than in a single incident, and can include graffiti and vandalism, flytipping, littering and dog fouling, threatening behaviour and excessive noise. Problems in these areas should be reported to the West Oxfordshire District Council, Thames Valley Police or the housing provider.

If you feel that no one is dealing with the anti-social behaviour problems you are experiencing and you have already reported them to one of these bodies, you can request a new review of the case through an ASB case review or Community Trigger. Your case can be reviewed if you

have reported three separate incidents of anti-social behaviour in the last six months.



From the Rector - Life Learning

Despite the decades which have passed since I left school, September for me will always be associated with the start of a new academic year. It has been a privilege to have been involved with education throughout my life, and I am more aware than ever of its importance. We never stop learning, even if we put plenty of distance between ourselves and the experience of school or college days. Our generation has had to learn far more and more quickly than any of those before us, as technological change is occurring exponentially. Roman Catholic Worship Obedience

We often have ambivalent feelings about obedience: on the one hand we can consider obedience as giving up some of our autonomy or independent agency. On the other hand, obedience to the laws of the country and acceptance about informal customs and practices, are generally seen as important and worthwhile.

In the New Testament, the focus on obedience is seen as a way to show love for God and a sign of salvation. Jesus emphasised the importance of obedience in one of his last messages to His disciples, saying, 'If you love Me, keep My commandments' (John 14:15), 'He who has My commandments and keeps them, it is he who loves Me' (John 14:21), and 'If anyone loves Me, he will keep My word' (John14:23). Jesus also says, 'You are my friends if you do what I command' (John 15:14).

Jesus is offering a path to salvation for us if we accept what He requires us to do and believe in Him. This form of obedience of love can liberate and set us free from the weight of our past. This obedience to God's Will could be interpreted as the greatest expression of our free will as we are choosing a particular path to the exclusion of other options; it takes courage to be obedient.
