

The Megalosaurus Society

We were delighted that so many enthusiastic prospective members attended an exploratory meeting of the proposed new local history society on Saturday 5 October.

We summarised the year's events which have led to us being invited by the Oxford University Museum of Natural History to form a society to partner with the Museum's local interests. We also explained the name had been chosen as the Society will owe its existence to the bicentenary celebrations and because Stonesfield is the most significant site in the world as the origin of the first scientifically described dinosaur -Megalosaurus - and also important for a wider range of other Jurassic fossils. The Museum is delighted with the choice of name and will provide us with speakers from time to time.

We invited the views of those present on the frequency of meetings, a wide range of local history topics of interest as well as dinosaurs, membership, and opportunities for fundraising. Over the next month or two, a Committee will be formed comprising Chair, Secretary and Treasurer and other volunteers who will be involved in membership, fundraising, selecting speakers and establishing an annual programme of events.

The Society's year will run from January to December with membership fees (£15 per calendar year) payable in January. In the first instance, we are planning to hold six meetings per year which will be a combination of talks and visits. Meetings will take place on the last Wednesday of the months of January, March, May, July, September and November.

Eating locally has a host of positive economic, social and environmental effects; supporting local food businesses leads to strong local economies.



Spring barley grown in the fields around Stonesfield is crafted into single malt whisky, with the addition of only two other ingredients: water and yeast. The barley is sown in early spring and harvested in August, by Michael and Philip Green and the team at Akeman Street farm. It then goes to Warminster for craft hand malting, and then onto the Cotswold Distillery near us, which crafts the Cotswolds Single Malt Whisky.

Thames Valley Police meets Neighbourhood Watch



Members of the Thames Valley Neighbourhood Watch Association recently met TVP Superintendent John Batty, Head of Community Policing Command for TVP.

Central to their discussion was the growing relationship between the two organisations with the aim of building safer and stronger communities. The Police view the NHW schemes as key partners in sharing crime prevention messages and keeping people aware of crime in their areas.

Police and community support

Scams and keeping safe

Here are ten golden rules from the Police to prevent fraud:

- Be suspicious of all offers and deals that are too good to be true.
- Don't agree to offers or deals immediately - insist on time to get independent or legal advice before making a decision.
- Don't hand over money or sign anything until you've checked someone's credentials and their company's.
- Never send money to anyone you don't know or trust, whether in the UK or abroad, or use methods of payment you're not comfortable with.
- Never give banking or personal details to anyone you don't know or trust. This information is valuable so make sure you protect it.
- Always log on to a website directly rather than clicking on links in an email.
- Don't just rely on glowing testimonials.
 Find solid, independent evidence of a company's success.
- 8. Always get independent or legal advice if any offer involves money, time or commitment.
- If you spot a scam or have been scammed, report it and get help.
- 10. Don't be embarrassed about reporting a scam. Because the scammers are cunning and clever, there is no shame in being deceived. By reporting it, you'll make it more difficult for them to deceive others.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

Decided at the meeting held on 2 October:

Parish Councillor Vacancies: There are two vacancies on the Council, and cooption to fill them will take place at the Council meeting on 6 November 2024. The Closing date for applications is 30 October 2024. Interested applicants should write to the Clerk at clerk@stonesfieldpc.uk, expressing their interest and giving a little detail about themselves. They must attend the meeting to be considered by vote.

Planning: Councillors discussed two applications, detailed below.

1. Permission in principle for the construction of one dwelling:

Land South of Evenlode Edge Brook Lane Stonesfield Oxfordshire

Ref. No: 24/02390/PIP – Council objects with the following comment:

The Parish Council objects to the application for the following reasons:

• The proposal is contrary to policy BC1 of the WOLP 2031 which states that proposals for development should be consistent with the strategy which includes conservation and enhancement of the Cotswolds Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). To grant permission for the proposal would set a precedent for building on the AONB. Any additional building in this area will spread the built environment into the AONB.

- The Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group carried out a survey to inform the plan which included the allocation of this area as green space – 569 residents responded of which 89% agreed or slightly agreed with the designation as green space because of the views over Bagg's Bottom and the Evenlode Valley. The emerging Neighbourhood Plan should be taken into consideration.
- The area is also a part of the Upper Thames Tributary and an environmentally sensitive area.
- A proposal to build on this area (1980s/ 1990s) was turned down by both the parish and district councils.

Neighbourhood Plan: SUSTO is looking for new volunteers; the current SUSTO members on the NP Steering Group will be seeing the Neighbourhood Plan through to its completion but are eager for new members to start.

Currently four sections of the Plan had been drafted, and a further 3 would be circulated shortly. There are 30 policies in the Plan, with 26 written, the remaining 4 are connected to the Village Character Assessment. The draft for this has now been received and the volunteers involved with writing those policies are looking at it.

The local green spaces are being considered; each one is being assessed using the Cotswold District Council toolkit. This is a lengthy process, taking circa 45 minutes per green space.

When all the PC members have read the draft and fed back in January, the aim is to get the plan signed off at the 4 Feb 2025 Parish Council meeting, triggering the Regulation 14 process. All administration of setting up, facilitating and processing feedback of the Regulation 14 consultation must come back to the PC. This will require more hours required for the Clerk.

The proposed Reg 14 start date is 14 Feb 2025, for a minimum of 6 weeks' public consultation. This will include hosting an exhibition with the highlights and summary of the draft, and refreshments.

All the above is subject to the West Oxfordshire District's Local Plan (2031). It was confirmed that the drafted plan conforms with the current Local Plan and will consider any changes in the new Local Plan (2041). Cllr Genny Early noted that WODC have notified an update on the timetable of the plan in November 24.

The Common: Pollarding of willows will be done around March - April 2025. There are 12 in total, six were pollarded last year.

Fencing around the alder trees before cattle arrive – this is currently delayed due to flooding.

Communication: Cllr Jess Huband has opened up communications with Blenheim Palace and she will be having regular

meetings with Merilyn Davies of the Palace, where she will voice residents' concerns directly. Any responses received will be reported back to residents.

Next Council Meeting: 6 November 2024 at 7pm in Stonesfield Primary School.

Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan

The Steering Group has been working hard over the last couple of months, building key policies and aims into the body of the Plan. These are based on the results of the survey we carried out last year, and will reflect your opinions and priorities as expressed in the answers to those questions. But they must conform to local and national planning policies, and we have been at pains to make sure they do.

One of the challenges we face is ensuring they conform to the policies laid down in the Local Plan. The current Local Plan is nearing the end of its term (2031), and WODC is working on its new Plan that will be in force until 2041. When WODC has a draft Local Plan for 2041, they will submit it for public consultation, probably early in 2025. We will check the policies we have drafted in our Neighbourhood Plan to see if they conform with the new Local Plan. If they don't, we will have to re-draft them.

Subject to the above, we expect our draft Neighbourhood Plan to be available for the public to read in early 2025. It goes first of all to the Parish Council for their approval, and then to the whole village for public consultation, probably as a display in the village hall over a couple of days, with a copy of the full Plan available online and as a hard copy in the library.

Climate Action Fund Scheme 4 November Deadline

West Oxfordshire District Council has launched its new Climate Action Fund grant scheme, designed to help small and medium-sized businesses in the district to reduce their carbon footprint and become more climate resilient. Supported by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) and the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF), the scheme offers financial backing for capital projects that promote sustainability.

The scheme offers grants ranging from £10,000 to £20,000 for capital projects that promote sustainability, cut energy use, reduce costs, and deliver lasting environmental benefits, such as making buildings more energy efficient or installing renewable energy systems like solar panels.

The Climate Action Fund is open to small and medium-sized businesses across West Oxfordshire, including those from the farming and agricultural sectors. Eligible projects must focus on capital improvements that promote sustainability. Examples include:

 Retrofitting buildings for improved energy efficiency, such as insulation, low-carbon heating, and smart energy controls.

- Installing renewable energy systems, including solar panels and battery storage.
- Supporting the transition to electric vehicles through the installation of EV chargers.
- Purchasing equipment to enhance waste reduction and recycling efforts.
- Implementing green infrastructure like living walls, green roofs, or water conservation systems.

Applications for the scheme are open, and businesses are encouraged to submit their proposals by Monday 4 November 2024, with all successful projects to be completed by 28 February 2025. News from West Oxfordshire Air quality

.....

Air quality in West Oxfordshire has improved significantly since 2005 when air quality management areas were declared for Witney and Chipping Norton. The District Council has now approved a new air quality action plan setting out current and future measures for the Council and its partners. This will include plans to improve access to walking, cycling and public transport in those towns where nitrogen dioxide levels were historically high – all measures to improve public health. The Plan will also investigate installing sensors to detect fine particulate pollutants in the air, which are increasingly

linked to respiratory and heart conditions. Air pollution particularly affects children and older people.

The Covid pandemic resulted in a significant fall in the level of nitrogen dioxide concentration, due to the sharp decrease in car use. Since restrictions were lifted toward the end of 2021, nitrogen dioxide concentrations rose but not to prepandemic levels. The continuing downward trend is thought to be due partly to people continuing to work from home, and partly to the increasing uptake of lowemission and ultra-low-emission vehicles.

From our County Council Trading Standards warning

In the wake of flooding and wind damage to properties, Oxfordshire County Council's trading standards team has warned people not to agree to offers of building work, home repairs or maintenance that come from a cold call.

They advise not to be afraid to say no, not to be pressurised into a quick decision and to check with others if the work really is required and what would be a fair price. People should also check first whether their insurance covers emergency assistance as most insurance companies will appoint their own tradespeople to carry out the work. If it is not covered by insurance, it might be tempting to hire the first person who offers to fix flood damage, but still it is strongly recommended to avoid door-to-door offers and to get alternative quotes from reputable traders. Cold callers may offer low prices but are likely to demand more money later, and can even be offering to do work that is completely unnecessary.

From our MP



I have been your new MP for Bicester and Woodstock for just over three months now, and it has been both busy and challenging! Like any new job, there is a lot to learn. Unlike most new jobs, you start from scratch. Thank you to everyone who has shown forbearance as I have set up an office and recruited a team so that we can aim to offer a high standard of support to our community. I am holding weekly surgeries in locations across the constituency, so if there are issues you want to raise with me, please do get in touch.

It has been a pleasure to attend a variety of events across the constituency, including speaking at Bicester Pride, dropping in at Woodstock's Mock Mayor event, watching Kidlington in their FA cup tie and meeting with local campaign groups to discuss water quality in the River Evenlode.

I have also held a dozen successful constituency drop-ins, where it was a pleasure to discuss a wide variety of issues with residents in many venues across the constituency. I plan to continue this so keep an eye out for any future dates near you!





Nature notes

A successful swift season

While swift colony success can vary both locally and nationally, this year was a very good year for Stonesfield at least, with a minimum of 18 nests located. These varied from established breeders to first-time prospectors that claimed sites for next year.



Both boxes and bricks were also looked at with the birds not entering, which is all part of the process.



On the outskirts of the village there is a very good chance of a colony forming with at least two of the ten nest sites taken quickly and plenty of swift activity. These were all the owners' own work and it shows what can be done with a provided call and effort – a brilliant achievement.

Pleasingly there are over 50 nest sites installed in the village now, so they've plenty to choose from. With swift conservation, the starting point is retaining what nest sites we have and building from there. In the last few years in Stonesfield we've done that.



Swifts should now be around the Congo basin area starting their winter where they can range widely, visiting several countries. It will seem like a long wait for their return to Stonesfield in early May.

From the Rector - Past and Present

This month begins dramatically for the church with the Feast of All Saints on the First of November, Once known as 'All Hallows' it follows the Eve of All Hallows. which has become the secular Halloween. All Saints recognises that the church is made up not only of people who are alive and worship God today, but also of people who have followed the way of Christ in the past, and are now part of the church in heaven (however we might understand it). Celebrations of the lives of those who had been martyred for their faith in times of persecution took place from the 4th century onwards, usually around Easter. But churches in Britain celebrated the lives of 'the faithful departed' on the first day of November, and in the 9th Century this date was adopted by Pope Gregory IV for the whole of the Western church. For me, All

Saints Day, which we celebrate here as All Saints Sunday (on 3 November this year), is a chance to recognise the preciousness of all human life. Those whom the church officially calls 'saints' offer us a beacon of inspiration and encouragement, as they lived out Christ's command to 'love one another, as I have loved you'. But they also serve as a reminder of the love, faith and generosity of people today.

If you were to make a list of saints today, who would you include? As a young man I was inspired by learning about 20th Century 'saints', and I have been moved by the memorial to ten 'Modern Martyrs' in Westminster Abbey. This includes Maximilian Kolbe who offered his own life to save a fellow prisoner in the Auschwitz-Birkenau camp; Manche Masemola, a young woman murdered for her faith by her own parents in South Africa; Dr Martin Luther King, the murdered US civil rights leader; Esther John, a young woman in Pakistan who lost her life for her faith; and Oscar Romero, the Archbishop of El Salvador, assassinated at the altar in a hospital chapel for his work on behalf of the poor.

Not all saints are martyrs, and not all Christians feel (or look) saintly, but God calls each of us to live out the command to love. In my work I meet so many people who do exactly that, and this month we remember both the living and the departed who have made God's love present for us and for others. Services to remember the departed, those whom we love but see no

longer, are held at St Laurence, Combe, at 5pm on 3 November, and St James the Great, Stonesfield, at 5pm on 10 November. Services to remember those who gave their lives in two world wars are held on Remembrance Sunday, 10 November at 10am in each church, and 10.45am at our War Memorials. Services to celebrate the love of God and the life which we share today are held every week, and everyone is always welcome.

Roman Catholic Worship On being humble

We are encouraged to be confident, assertive, to 'speak up for oneself', to 'speak one's mind', 'to 'say what you think': all positive behaviours that may support us through life. But what about humility, the quality of demonstrating humbleness? We are told that humility is 'the feeling or attitude that you have no special importance that makes you better than others; lack of pride' (Google Word Search), which in our age of self-promotion seems unappealing. Especially when you consider that humble is seen as 'having or showing a modest or low estimate of one's importance'; in other words: not worth noticing.

However, there is another perspective we could consider, that as modelled by Jesus:

'Have this mind among yourselves, which was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form he humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross.'

Philippians 5: 2-8

Matthew 23: 2-7 tells us 'Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted'.

With Christmas now not so far away and with Advent nearly upon us, it's a powerful time to think about that Son of God who chose to be born in a stable and to lead a humble life, with the ultimate humiliation of dying a criminal's death. We could reevaluate what humility can mean to us now in our modern lives, and how, without

abnegating ourselves, we can rethink the meaning of humility in our lives by how we value others.




