

A Sad Day for Stonesfield



Vandals had cut down all the Remembrance wreaths around the war memorial in Stonesfield and scattered them throughout the village like frisbees.

The church service on Remembrance Sunday in the St James's Church at 10am was extremely well attended, notably by our local Scouts and Guides. After the service the Scouts led the congregation to the war memorial where a further service was held by our minister Linda Soderberg and attended by scores of parishioners. Eleven wreaths were laid in front of the memorial after the two-minute silence at 11am. After the service the wreaths were securely attached to the railings around the memorial by Roger Evins, our local farmer and a former Royal Navy veteran who organises the British Legion collection and poppy sales in our village.

The following morning it was discovered that the wreaths had all been cut down and thrown about the village. Fortunately, all but one of the eleven wreaths have now been recovered. Vandalism by those who do not understand the sacrifices made during the war and subsequent conflicts by members of our armed forces to protect the freedom that we all enjoy today.

The Megalosaurus Society

We had a very useful exploratory meeting with prospective members in October and subsequently everyone in the Society was invited to a special event arranged for us at the Oxford University Museum of Natural History. The museum curators shared their newly-designed exhibits on world wildlife and ecosystems past and present, the new exhibition *Breaking Ground* which focuses on Stonesfield's *Megalosaurus* and its other fossils, and invited us to contribute our thoughts on how future displays could be developed.

We are currently working on a varied programme of local history topics for 2025. The Society will hold six meetings per year, a combination of talks and visits, which will take place on the last Wednesday of the month in alternate months starting in January. Down the drains

As you may remember, SAFER, on behalf of the Parish Council, have been badgering Oxfordshire County Council to tackle the blocked drains on Laughton Hill and at the Boot Street junction.



We can report that some progress has been made as, on Saturday 9 November, work was taking place on Laughton Hill drains. In conversation with the work crew they revealed that the drains were 60% blocked with limescale and they were using an ultra-high-pressure jet to remove it. Some bits were coming away in fist-sized lumps... no wonder that backup and flooding were an issue. Only time will tell if this work has cured a long-standing problem.

Apparently work on the Boot Street drain can 'only be done at night' so we also wait to see if progress is made there as well.

Temporary road closure - Witney Lane

Temporary Traffic Regulation Notice – S14 Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984

A request has been received from Thames Water for a temporary road closure for **both pedestrians and vehicles** to apply to a length of Witney Lane, whilst essential boundary box installation works are carried out.

A temporary Notice is being made by Oxfordshire County Council to implement the temporary restriction and will operate from 27 January up to and including 29 January 2025, 24 hours per day. Please note that Notices for urgent works can last up to 5 consecutive days only.

Wild Oxfordshire - Hedgerow Highways

Hedges are a vital part of our local nature, providing shelter and resources for many species of mammals, insects, and birds. They're crucial wildlife corridors that allow safe travel between isolated habitats – woodland, grasslands, ponds.

Hedgerows provide endless benefits for biodiversity. They connect populations and allow relocation to better habitats. Over 100 priority species utilise hedgerows for many reasons: birds and small mammals nest in them, bats use them as foraging grounds and navigational markers, and reptiles hide in the long tussocky margins associated with them.

November to March is the best time of year to plant new hedges. First, acquire your roots. In Oxfordshire we recommend planting Blackthorn, Spindle, Buckthorn, Guelder Rose, Hawthorn, Wild Privet, Cherry Plum, or Hazel. Plant 4 or 5 plants per metre, about 25cm apart using the slit planting method, ensuring all fibrous roots are completely buried in the soil. You can watch a demonstration of this method by expert Nigel Adams on our website: www.wildoxfordshire.org.uk/guidance/hedgerows-guidance. Aftercare for hedgerows is crucial. Keep weeds and grass away from the plants for the first 2-3 years

to give them plenty of space to absorb moisture and light. Thoroughly water the plants during dry spells. Compost can be very helpful to maintain vigour; there's competition for nutrients between such closely situated plants. Trim annually in the first 3 to 5 years to encourage bushy growth. Once the hedge is fully established (in approximately 5 years) you can trim every year or every two or three years but make sure you don't trim it to the same place every cut. More detailed aftercare information is available on our website. Good luck with your new hedges!

Politics & local affairs

November Parish Council Report

Co-opted Councillors

Two new Parish Councillors were co-opted, taking the council to a full cohort of members.

Philippa Lowe and Laura Bate were coopted at the last meeting. The PC welcomes them both and looks forward to working alongside them.

Hedges and trees

The Parish Council have received several complaints of overgrown or encroaching hedges on public rights of way. Would all home, landowners and tenants please ensure their hedges are well kept and cut back, allowing for easy access to footpaths and roads.

Anti-social behaviour

Increased incidents of anti-social behaviour have been reported to Thames Valley Police, these range from destroyed safety signs at the Common, speeding vehicles through the village, smashed wing mirrors and keyed cars, ruined and strewn poppy wreaths on Remembrance Sunday. The Parish Council hope to have a representative from TVP at future meetings.

Planning

Two applications detailed below, one objection and one support.

1. Installation of three air conditioning compressor units to side elevations.

(Retrospective) Richmond, The Ridings, Stonesfield

Ref. No: 24/02628/HHD

Object: The Parish Council are concerned about the amount of noise generated from the units and the lack of neighbourliness as the units are in close proximity to the adjacent house.

2. Single storey extension to existing garage to form two additional garage bays.

As our draft NP nears completion, we thought you'd like to read about the recently added Character Assessment. This has been compiled by a professional, using data gathered by our band of volunteers who walked every street making notes on the buildings, materials, features and views; it describes the existing character of the village in the context of its development over time.

The Assessment seeks to define what it is about Stonesfield that is distinctive: its positive aspects but also areas where improvement would be desirable. It feeds into other sections of the Plan where policies are framed to shape future planning decisions on how that positive distinctiveness might be preserved and enhanced.

The description of the village is divided into four sections: the historic core focused around the Church, the Cross, High Street and Boot Street; Churchfields and Laughton Hill; later 20th century expansion to the north and east; and our rural surroundings. The prevalence of drystone walls, slate roofs and old cottages is matched by descriptions of post-war developments.

The slate industry is picked out as being of high historic interest to the village, having shaped not only the unique vernacular of the building materials and forms, but also the surrounding countryside and paths with their legible traces of chipping banks and mounds.

The glove-making industry is also described, of which Glover's Yard bears witness. And some key features are noted: post boxes on Boot Street, Churchfields and the Cross, all of which relate to former post office locations; solid stone slab stiles at the entrances into the church yard; the village lock up; the village taps (did you know there are three?); St James' Centre which occupies the old village school building; and any evidence of former pubs eg in Boot Street.

Finally, and very importantly, it lists the many views out from the village; these make Stonesfield such an enchanting place to live in and walk through, and are rightly earmarked as worthy of protection.

The Character Assessment could form an initial point of reference for anyone contemplating development in Stonesfield and is a valuable part of our Neighbourhood Plan. A printed copy of the Assessment will be in the Library in December and also online.

Thank you to CSW volunteers

SAFER would like to thank all the volunteers who gave up their time in 2024 to run Community SpeedWatch sessions. We look forward to their help when CSW restarts in 2025. During 2024 Stonesfield Community SpeedWatch passed details to Thames Valley Police, for follow up, of over 100 drivers who were exceeding the speed limit, the fastest being 53mph. These drivers will have received warning letters from Thames Valley Police.

We are looking for more CSW volunteers for 2025 so if you want to help (as little as an hour a month) please contact us.

It was heartening to read in his latest Road Safety Strategy that Matthew Barber, Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner, 'will look to enhance the CSW initiative, empowering and educating the public, informing policing activity and ultimately reducing speeding within communities'. Additionally, that 'Thames Valley Police will seek to bring justice to those who recklessly and dangerously risk the lives of others on our roads'.

At the same time, he highlighted that 'the Fatal Four remain the biggest risks on our roads so enforcement and education must continue to focus on distraction (particularly mobile phone use); tackling drink and drug driving; excess speed; and the use of seatbelts.'

News from West Oxon District Council

Electric vehicles

WODC has agreed to purchase at least three more electric vehicles to support the services it delivers to residents as it continues with plans to decarbonise its fleet in response to the climate emergency. Their arrival will bring the total number of electric vans used across the waste, street cleansing and ground maintenance service, up to six. They will be powered by fully green electricity at the Council's depot.

The Council has also agreed to invest in an ultra-narrow vehicle which will be used to improve kerbside collections from properties in the hardest to access locations and will also be upgrading its vehicle charging infrastructure to be able

to run more electric vehicles in future. In addition, the Council has put forward plans to procure, or lease, a further six vehicles, including four food waste vehicles and two heavy vehicles which could include those powered by electricity as part of its fleet replacement strategy.

Your views count

WODC is asking for residents' views on how it spends its money before it decides its budget for the next financial year. Despite the financial strain, the Council is committed to minimising the impact on services. Recent efficiencies have been achieved, such as saving £125,000 in customer services whilst still being a topranked council, and also boosting recycling revenues by £300,000 through renewed contracts.

From our District Councillor Safer cycle routes in Oxfordshire

How many of us would choose to get on our bikes more if it was easier to get from village to town to city? How many of us would like to take our children and grandchildren out for a biking adventure, seeing the sights of nature through the seasons? Do you want to find safe cycle paths that are low-traffic or traffic-free for families to explore, seniors to enjoy, children to cycle to school or for your commute to work? At the Safer Cycling event held at the Corn Exchange in Witney on 24 October, over 40 people attended a presentation of the Oxfordshire Online cycling map, which can be found at www.shorturl.at/QaTRO. The map, put together by Oxford City Councillor Emily Kerr and Robin Tucker, Co-Chair of the Coalition for Healthy Streets and Active Travel (CoHSAT), showed that such routes do exist, but there is still a lot of work to be done to create joined-up safe cycling routes.

The map's creators are asking us to zoom in on our local area and see if we can add in routes. There are particular gaps around Carterton and Burford, where we know there are some safe routes (though not enough) that could be added to the map. If you don't have the link above handy, you can simply Google 'Oxfordshire safe cycling map'.

Emily, Robin and Kath Cochrane from Witney's own Windrush Bike project spoke with expertise and conviction about the need for routes that truly enable us to use our cars less, helping reduce congestion and pollution as well as benefiting health and happiness for all ages. Kath also talked about the work of the Windrush Bike project, including delivering safe cycle training and refurbishing bikes, which can then be supplied to people who might not otherwise have access to them.

A discussion then took place where the audience's ideas ranged from the need for more bike racks to the need for cycling routes to be brought into the responsibilities of National Highways, rather than the charity Sustrans. It was also pointed out that Oxfordshire County Council is funding Local Cycling & Walking Infrastructure Plans (LCWIPs), the latest

of which will look at Woodstock and Carterton, and their surrounding villages.

Stonesfield Gardening Club

We welcomed Adam Kirtland last meeting, who came to talk to us about the different bulbs we can grow each month.

January brings us snowdrops, a somewhat difficult bulb to grow successfully, which he recommends buying after flowering 'in the green' as an easier way of increasing stock.

February for crocus, those colourful little jewels that are so welcome in a winter garden, and narcissus in March. More commonly known as daffodils, they are mostly scented and come in various shades of yellow and white. Good for pots as well as naturalising under trees.

Adam suggests his favourite, tulips, as the bulb to grow in April. Plant them as late as possible in the year, when the soil has started to go cold and cram them in to pots for a dramatic display.

May is for fritillaries, grown in grass or gravel or anywhere quite damp. I know from experience they spread very well in a gravel drive! In June the allium family come to the fore, with huge flowers for insects that then gracefully become lovely seed heads for birds. In July you can enjoy lily flowers, but Adam reminded us that lilies are toxic to cats.

Dahlias are the flower for August, which you can leave in the ground well mulched or lift each year. Crocosmia come into their own in September, planted in late spring and divided every 3 to 5 years when they have finished flowering.

October for nerines, and he suggested the unusual *oxalis versicolor* for November.

The year is rounded off with *cyclamen coum* in December, wonderful for naturalising.

Adam had a stunning presentation full of beautiful photographs and came armed with a box of bulbs to sell afterwards. A delightful talk from someone who only seriously got interested in gardening during lockdown!

Our meeting this month is our annual social (and membership renewal) with quiz and mulled wine, 7.30pm at St James' Centre on 9 December.

From the Rector - Christmas Joy

Much of the news over recent months has been gloomy. Wars, natural disasters, politics and the economy, as well as stories of human wrongdoing and failure, can easily dominate what we read and hear. The media tends not to report the many positive things which happen, but we all need good news to inspire us.

For Christians, the season of Advent which begins on Sunday 1 December and the Festival of Christmas are a source of enormous joy and hope. Whatever difficulties we face, whatever failures we see in the world, in the church, and indeed in our own lives, the message of Christmas is of life-changing joy, and world-changing hope. The birth of a child to homeless parents, who had to flee their own country as refugees, seems an unlikely beginning for such a profound message.

Jesus grew up to become a preacher and teacher, and was put to death in Roman Palestine early in the first century. But as Christians we believe that this child and man was God's own humble presence in the world he made, God 'incarnate', taking on human life, loss, feelings and troubles, bringing the life of God into our world. Preaching a message of repentance and transforming love, rejecting the authority of institutions but embracing the poor, the vulnerable and the excluded, he met our humanity at our point of need.

The birth of Jesus, like a light coming into the darkness of the world, is a declaration of God's desire to be with us, and to remain with us come what may. His birth gives us hope in life, hope in death, hope in God, now and forever. His birth helps us to see all human life as precious and beloved, and to see ourselves as deeply loved too, chosen to welcome God's own Son through the compassion and integrity with which we live, speak and act. May Christ be born in each one of us, and may God fill our lives with love, joy and hope. Please come to join us in Church as we celebrate the joy and hope we share this Advent and Christmas.


