If you have been along to the Stonesfield Social on a Tuesday night, you will have experienced a real 'Stonesfield welcome'! The Stonesfield Food Group started with the intention of providing a 'warm space' at the height of the energy and cost of living crisis. Our first session back in December 2023 welcomed 25 people; the next week it was 55... and over a year later our weekly average is 70-80 meals cooked every week.

Our team also provides the delicious paywhat-you-feel lunch that runs alongside the quarterly Repair Café and raises funds that allow us to provide emergency food aid and supermarket vouchers.

We were asked to provide a café for the more senior members of our community. This worked well at the Village Hall but has come on leaps and bounds since Craig and Barbara have taken it on and now offer it at The White Horse. It's still free, it's still on a Tuesday from 3-4pm and it's still as welcoming as ever.

Our guests sometimes ask us how it is possible that the Tuesday night Social is free. We have been fortunate to receive funding for the Social from the start from WODC and The Communities Fund. Funding allows us to pay for the upkeep of the Village Hall, supply the craft materials for the kids' table and any additional food purchases needed over and above what we source from The Oxford Food Hub, which collects surplus food from restaurants and shops for use in community projects such as ours.

We certainly didn't imagine that it would be so much fun, that we would enjoy seeing the village come together, all ages, all eating, or crafting together and meeting up or making new friends.

Community

That got us thinking about the importance of feeling connected to the community. The happiness that comes from waving at new friends out dog walking or seeing their children on the way to school. Knowing that the village has created a really unique event, that is fun, warm, safe, environmentally-minded and sociable feels fantastic. We can help you get involved - we have funds for DBS checks for volunteers. can work out of the village hall as a venue, and supply the sports equipment to get something fun going. Join us in building Stonesfield's social and community activities – be at the heart of creating healthier, happier lives and a flourishing village.

Ruddywell footpath revived



Some of Stonesfield's finest residents turned out on a wet Saturday morning to clear the footpath down to Ruddywell, the original source of water to the Stonesfield Tap in 1897.



The summers of the early 1890's were long, hot and very dry and water was a scarcity. The village wells had repeatedly run dry, leaving villagers having to travel long distances for water. This all led to a keen need throughout the village for a public



water source and the matter was taken in hand by the Parish Council to devise a method of funding the installation of a village waterworks. The cost of £200 was met largely through public subscription with almost every villager providing support and, in addition, the Duke of Marlborough provided financial assistance as well as the bricks and gravel that were necessary to complete the works.

The site and footpath had become overgrown and neglected, but under the fallen trees and old man's beard we found the fresh shoots of wild flowers and bluebells. Hopefully it will not be too long before they bloom. Take a walk back into one of our most beautiful nature sites, tread softly and be quiet – you will be amazed at what you might see and hear.

A new landmark for Stonesfield?

Those who have visited the OUMNH's exhibition *Breaking Ground*, which focuses on William Buckland, Megalosaurus and other important fossils of Stonesfield, would have seen Poet Laureate Simon Armitage's poem *Megalosaurus* which the Museum commissioned to mark the bicentenary of the first scientific naming of a dinosaur.

The Committee felt that the poem was very special for Stonesfield and we have been granted permission, in principle, from both Simon Armitage and the Museum, to reproduce it for permanent public display in the village. It has been agreed with the trustees of The White Horse that the poem will be sited on the red brick wall which runs the length of the pub garden; this would provide a centre-village location which is accessible at most times of the day.

The Museum has now given the go-ahead and we can proceed with the design of the panel and obtain a quotation for its production. We will then start fundraising with the aim of installing the panel over the summer period when everyone can sit in the garden, read and admire! We very much hope that in due course this will come to be regarded as an important village landmark.

Hedge-laying around Stonesfield

Volunteers from Farmland Bird Aid Network have been rejuvenating a stretch of hedgerow adjacent to a Farmland Bird Aid Network feeding site, along Witney Lane. (Thank you to Ollie Stobo for permission.)



As well as food through the winter, birds need good habitat to nest in and raise their broods. Often, a thick hedge will provide good cover and the insect population needed to feed the young birds. We did some hedge-laving training a couple of years ago on the Oxfordshire Way which resulted in thickening up of the hedges, rejuvenating them and promoting regrowth from the base of the hedge. Many hedges are flailed each year and become 'gappy'. This does not provide such a good habitat for mice, birds and insects. A flailed hedge will remove the new growth, including fruits, berries and nuts - and many plants only produce berries on growth which is two years old.

When laying the hedge, we cut back the 'old man's beard', or 'traveller's joy', which can, if not kept in check, become too dense, swamp the other plants, and prevent growth of the structural shrubs and trees. Removal of the 'old man's beard' is done in the winter months, after the seedheads

have been eaten by goldfinch and other birds but before the spring flowers. Once the old man's beard and other material has been cleared, partial cuts are made in the stems which are then laid at a 45-degree angle to make a pleacher. Similar to when training climbing roses, stems are laid at an angle to encourage shoots to grow vertically, thus thickening up the hedgerow. It's cold but rewarding work - especially when the sun shines!

Fawler Toads

This year, my snowdrops are a good two, if not three, weeks later than usual. Whether this means that nature is late waking up from winter which will affect our toads, remains to be seen

Fawler toads come down from the fields to the north of Fawler and cross the main road in the centre of the village any time between the end of February and the beginning of April. They aim for the large pond in the field beyond the telephone kiosk and like warmish, moist conditions at dusk. In the past, they have been most active in March.

Because they crawl, not hop like frogs, they are easily run over by vehicles. We are hoping that Fawler's new 20mph speed limit will reduce the carnage this year but they still need our help and we do not have enough volunteers. Will you join us?

All we do is pick them up, put them in a bucket, cross the road and lift them out (gently, of course) once we reach the other side. There used to be many of us helping but most are now too old. Last year only two volunteers remained which really is not enough.

If you see the warning toad road signs, you'll know the toads are on the move. Please come and join us. It's for such a short time and is so worthwhile. Last year alone 400 toads were saved, but 89 were killed.

SAFER update

Drains on Laughton Hill

We have received confirmation that more drain descaling works will take place on 23-24 April 2025. We understand that the Highways Operations Manager hopes this will cure the longstanding 'water overflow' problem.

Repainting white lines outside the shop

Highways have identified the resurfacing of the road outside the shop as work commissioned by someone who has now retired. We have received confirmation from the Senior Officer (Highway Schemes) that he will arrange for repainting of the lines.

Pedestrian walkway on Pond Hill

Highways Senior Officer (WODC Area) emailed to say: 'I am hoping to be able to put down some coloured or textured surfacing on Pond Hill to denote a footpath, but early days yet and don't want to get your hopes up too much'.

Oxfordshire County Council

From your County Councillor

A summary of the work I have been carrying out on your behalf:

LCWIP Local Cycling, Walking Infrastructure Project

Consultation is now underway for this important project which owes much of its credit to the parish councils and those individuals and organisations working in partnership initiated through the Village Travel Network. Safer routes that link our communities with pathways and cycle ways which encourage active and healthier lifestyle balance opportunities is at the heart of this project. I am happy and pleased to have supported this partnership work and to further its development and implementation going forward.

Woodstock and Bladon: Doctors' surgery update

The next strategic meeting of the Doctors, ICB, OCC, WODC and Blenheim Estate will take place next month having completed the PID (Project Initiation Document) which will be presented to all the stakeholders. This will build on the other meetings that are currently taking place between the doctors and the ICB to determine the footprint needed for the surgery, the site location options, the funding and financing of the project involving Blenheim and the local authorities in terms of potential Section 106 options and the timeline to ensure the project can be secured with an agreed and realistic way forward.

Vision Zero Safety Project

As part of the Vision Zero safety project, a review of all speed limits on the A and B

road network which are outside the scope of the current 20mph programme are being reviewed. This will include the A4095 between Bladon and Long Hanborough and we have logged a request for a reduction to 40mph as part of this work. Because of the wide scope of the review, I'm afraid that at present I can't give any specific information on timescales, but we'd hope to be looking at the A4095 towards the middle of next year. For each route being reviewed, we will be sending local members and parish councils the draft proposals for comment ahead of carrying out the statutory consultation.

Councillor Priority Funds

The final awards to Wootton Parish Council for £2,000 towards the costs of providing a bus shelter will be made shortly having approved the award. No further monies are available until the start of the civic year for future projects.

New exhibition celebrates the work of Oxfordshire sculptor, Michael Black

A new exhibition entitled Michael Black: Chisel, Wood, Stone celebrating the work of this renowned local sculptor, is coming to The Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock this spring. This unique exhibition presents, for the first time, the life and works of the Oxford sculptor and celebrates his enduring legacy and artistic contribution. It will be on display from 15 March to 1 June. Entrance is free and donations are welcomed.

Flooding mitigation A4095 (Grove Road, Bladon)

Bunding undertaken by Blenheim has been agreed to take place next month and I will meet with residents and Blenheim on site the following week to explore further mitigation needed in respect of the recurring flooding to properties in the vicinity of Eagle Lodge and further down in the village.

Flooding investigation at Cadogan Park

Following a series of incidents, an investigation to determine the cause of flooding will take place this month, together with some gulley clearance and maintenance work.

Woodstock and Surrounding Areas Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP).

Residents and people who travel around Woodstock and surrounding areas are being asked to help shape a draft plan to make walking, wheeling and cycling easier, safer and more enjoyable around the town. Oxfordshire County Council is asking for views about what highway improvements are needed to provide Woodstock and neighbouring parishes with a high-quality active travel network. Improvements could include better cycleways or added pedestrian crossings to make it easier to access and move around the town. We want to make walking and cycling easier and more enjoyable for all in Woodstock and neighbouring parishes. This LCWIP seeks to put in place a plan to help achieve this so that as funding becomes available, we know what infrastructure is needed to provide Woodstock and the surrounding areas with a high-quality active travel network.

What is an LCWIP?

LCWIPs were introduced by the Department for Transport (DfT) in 2017, alongside their Cycling and Walking Investment Strategy (www.gov.uk/government/publications/cycling-and-walking-investment-strategy) as a framework with which local authorities can 'develop strategic plans to improve conditions for cycling and walking, in order to support increases in travel on foot and bicycle', by:

- understanding existing and future travel patterns, and the barriers and enablers to increasing cycling and walking
- identifying and mapping a recommended cycling network and core walking zones that will become the primary focus for infrastructure improvements
- creating a prioritised pipeline of enhancements to ensure infrastructure effectively supports growth in cycling and walking, and contributes towards meeting broader local goals' (DfT, 2017)

Council reaches out to households at risk of financial hardship to offer support

In a drive to support at-risk households across West Oxfordshire, West Oxfordshire District Council is running a project identifying households eligible for vital financial assistance and encouraging them to claim it.

LIFT is a data analytics tool that enables the Council to identify households at-risk of financial hardship that may not be claiming the support they are entitled to.

The pandemic, followed by the rising cost of living, has created significant financial pressure for many, and recent changes to Winter Fuel Payment criteria have made it more important than ever for eligible residents to claim Pension Credit.

The project is part of the Council's wider work to support residents facing financial hardship and ensure they claim the support they are entitled to, including the continuing Household Support Fund. The next phase will focus on helping households make the most out of their income, with the Council to continue to use LIFT to identify residents eligible for other forms of financial support and reaching out to them to make them aware.

If you think you may be eligible for Pension Credit and have not been contacted by the Council, please check your eligibility at www.gov.uk/pension-credit/eligibility or call the pension credit helpline on 0800 99 1234 or Age UK Oxfordshire on 0345 450 1276.

I'm a resident

I moved to Stonesfield last autumn because the right home turned up at the right price. Having left Oxford forty years ago, I went back looking for a place to live in the city but couldn't find anywhere I both liked and could afford. After several disheartening viewings, I realised that, fond though I am of it, I just didn't want to live in a city any longer and began to look outside the ring road.

When I came for a viewing the first thing that struck me about Stonesfield was that it isn't on the way to anywhere else, so all routes in have a winding, roundabout quality to them – even the straight is part of a detour round the back of Blenheim. In the nicest possible way, it has a feeling of being in the back of beyond. The heart of the old village is tucked away without the obvious green you find in most Oxfordshire villages; to discover it involves walking narrow twisting streets and it takes several exploratory outings to get the hang of the layout. Another immediate impression is that at most times of day there will be people out on foot and they aren't all dog walkers. Everybody says hello. Once I get drawn into conversations, particularly out walking the countryside, everyone's response when I explain I'm a newcomer is 'Welcome to Stonesfield'

Once I'd moved in I discovered The Slate invaluable for giving a sense of the village and everything that's going on. I've never lived anywhere that has such a wideranging and inclusive user manual to living in a community. Then there's The White Horse which genuinely feels both of and for the village. I'm intrigued by the history and still visible traces of Stonesfield's semiindustrial past; the archaeological legacy; the fact that there aren't any very grand houses here, that there's no adjacent estate or park with a high wall round it. Walking the local footpaths I'm struck by the contrast between the big open fields to the north and east of the village with the wooded slopes of the Evenlode valley to the south and west where I've discovered the walk across the meadows to the Roman villa. It's a surprise that there's no street lighting which adds to the sense of being different from suburbia, closer to the countryside, a bit less removed from a rural environment. You have to learn the habit of taking a torch when you're out after dark.

I arrived here at the beginning of winter when, on the face of it, short, cold, gloomy days make everything feel hunkered down as if waiting for the countryside to come back to life in spring. But there's lots going on in the village and it's not hibernating. The process of getting involved feels linked to the noticeably longer days, the appearance of the first spring flowers, the anticipation of better, warmer weather to come. I'm looking forward to it.

What is a Neighbourhood plan?

Neighbourhood planning is a way for communities to have


a say about the future of where they live and work. It gives them the power to produce a plan with real legal weight, that regulates development in their local area.

What is the Plan based on?

Two years ago, we surveyed village residents, asking what you like (and don't like) about living here, and what you would like to see improved.

Some 612 residents (aged 16+) gave us their opinions about everything from the countryside to road safety; village facilities to housing. A Housing Needs Assessment analysed housing availability and use in the village based on the survey and data from other local and central government sources. Village

Character and Landscape Assessments were commissioned from external technical experts. This research was used to draft the Plan in a way that helps ensure future village development is in line with your opinions.



The Village Survey conducted in 2023 had responses from over 60% of residents

What is in the Plan?

It is a thorough document, over 100 pages long, covering many aspects of life in Stonesfield. Importantly, and necessarily, it will become a document that the Parish and District Councils must have regard to when considering local planning applications.

The draft Neighbourhood Plan aims to enhance the community of Stonesfield and encourage economic activity, while ensuring housing is sustainable and meets the needs of the village. It seeks to enhance and ensure accessibility for all ages to community facilities, and of course to protect our beautiful countryside, and village character. It also recognises the need to address climate change at a local level, where we can.

To achieve this, the plan includes twenty-nine policies, focusing on housing and building design, landscape and

environment, transport and road safety, economy and amenities and historic character. There are also seven 'aspirations', which reflect some of the areas of improvement you highlighted in the survey. These cannot be covered directly by policies but could be addressed by one or more community action groups - similar to the Save the White Horse team. And the Plan has been written to ensure that ideas like these, that are aimed at specific benefits for the village, can still thrive.

Taken together, the Plan's aims, objectives, policies, and aspirations form a framework for Stonesfield over the next 5 years.

What do I need to do?

So, now it's over to you. From 15 March to 4 May you can tell us what you think of the draft Plan. Is this the way you want the village to develop? We have created a variety of opportunities for you to review the Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan and provide us with your feedback.

From the 15 March you can find the full document online here **https://stonesfield.online/neighbourhood-plan/** along with a feedback form to complete. In addition to the draft Neighbourhood Plan, we have also shared the research and supporting documents:

- Housing Needs Assessment

Or you can see printed versions of the Plan, supporting documents and the feedback form in the village library.

There will also be two opportunities – Saturday 15 March (10am-4pm) at the Village Hall and Tuesday 29 April (2-8pm) at the St James' Centre – to visit an exhibition, where you can see a large display of materials from the Plan and chat to members of the Steering Group which has put it together.

What happens next?

Your feedback from this consultation, known officially as Pre-Submission (Regulation 14), will be collated and reviewed. Revisions to the Plan may be needed.

It will then be submitted to West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC) for a two-stage review process, including independent examination by an examiner, to ensure that the Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan aligns with planning law and existing planning policies at district, county, AONB and national level.

Once it's been examined and approved, WODC will hold a Yes/No referendum to ask if Stonesfield residents wish to approve the final Plan. If there is a simple majority to approve the Plan, it will be adopted by WODC, and both Stonesfield Parish Council and WODC must then have regard to it when making planning decisions relating to Stonesfield.

The Stonesfield Environment Group

Last month we told you about the drafting of our five-year plan for the management of the Glebeland in the village, this being the focus of our meeting on 26 February.

Alongside things above ground, we continue to think and worry about the river. As you know, we faithfully do our small bit in testing our stretch of the Evenlode for the pollutants of nitrogen and phosphates and hope to start testing for the pathogen E. coli on a regular basis.

You may want a sense of how our small-scale activities fit into the broader picture. We all know that the water companies throughout the UK, legally, discharge untreated sewage into our rivers. They also discharge untreated sewage when they are not supposed to - these are termed 'illegal spills' or pollution events.

The Environment Agency monitors the performance of the water companies - they do not perform well. The most recent available data (for the year 2023, published in 2024), is as follows, with a 1–5 star rating:

- Severn Trent Water 4 stars, the same as the previous year
- United Utilities 4 stars, up from 3 stars
- Wessex Water 4 stars, up from 2 stars
- Northumbrian Water 3 stars, the same as the previous year
- Anglian Water 2 stars, the same as the previous year
- Southern Water 2 stars, the same as the previous year

- South West Water 2 stars, the same as the previous year
- Thames Water 2 stars, the same as the previous year
- Yorkshire Water 2 stars, down from 3 stars

Thames Water is amongst the two-star companies and is not improving. Thames Water is the country's largest water company and will run out of cash on 24 March 2025. A Financial Times' article in the last few weeks gave an update on the company's dire financial situation. When the company was privatised in 1989 it had no debt. Since then, a mountain of debt has been built, now standing at £14bn.

The company has been in the High Court in recent weeks to seek an emergency £3bn bailout. As part of the court proceedings, Thames Water's own CFO conceded its bill for the financial restructuring under the £3bn bailout would be a possible £600m in interest and fees to creditors and £200m in fees to lawyers and advisers. The ruling is expected shortly and there is a possibility that if the loan is rejected, Thames Water will enter Special Administration. In this scenario the company becomes administered by a Government-appointed special administrator. Some refer to this as temporary nationalisation but it does open up potential for a new model of public ownership suitable to water infrastructure. We await the High Court decision and the inevitable price rises.

From the Rector - Of the Earth

Having failed to make any New Year's resolutions in January, I have made one at the end of February: I have resolved to plant a flowerbed. Perhaps the sense that winter must surely end soon has stirred in me a desire to create something colourful which will bring joy throughout the rest of the year.

Despite the Bible's many references to the closeness between human beings and the rest of the created world, the church has not always taken a great interest in nature, focusing often on heaven and not on earth. But in the last few decades, as we have become more aware of the negative impact of human communities on the natural world, Christian theologians have at last spoken out about the importance of the earth which we share.

Earlier beliefs that wild nature needed to be subdued and controlled once went hand in hand with colonial ideas about other peoples needing to be brought under our domination. With the dismantling of European colonialism in the 20th Century, an awareness slowly emerged that the created world does not need our control either, but rather, needs our protection. Restrictions on the worst excesses of human greed, reckless overfishing, environmentally destructive development and pollution from industry and farming practices have slowly granted some protection to the land and the sea, animals and plants with which we share this life, and some protection for the water and air on which we depend. But today I have a deep concern, as do many others, that around the world these protections are under threat, as a new political attitude in the USA and elsewhere is being promoted, and is spreading in the corporate world, which sees nature not as something to be protected, or even to be controlled, but instead, to be plundered by the powerful.

The Christian (and Jewish) assertion that we are formed from earth, and therefore have a profound kinship with the earth, is now of vital relevance. In the Book of Genesis, 'adam' (man) was formed from 'adamah' (earth), a human made of humus. We belong to the earth more than the earth belongs to us. We are of the earth, not living on the earth. Like all living things we are moulded by the (metaphorical) hand of God, and animated by the same breath of life. I hope and pray that in the coming

months and years, Christians and all people of goodwill may ensure that our precious relationship with nature is allowed to flower and to flourish.

2025: A Jubilee of Hope

In December 2024 Pope Francis opened the 'Holy Door' in St Peter's Basilica to launch the 2025 Jubilee of Hope which ends on the Epiphany in 2026. A Jubilee or 'Holy Year' has been proclaimed by the Church since 1300 to offer Catholics opportunities for forgiveness and reconciliation.

Jesus said: 'I am the door' (John10:7) in order to make it clear that no-one can come to the Father except through him. 'This is the door of the Lord where the just may enter' (Psalm118:20). 'To pass through that door means to confess that Jesus Christ is Lord; it is to strengthen faith in him in order to live the new life which he has given us. It is a decision which presumes freedom to choose and also the courage to leave something behind, in the knowledge that what is gained is divine life.' (Matthew13:44-46).

Pope Francis explained the tradition of a Holy Door: 'In Catholic tradition, the Holy Door represents the passage to salvation - the path to a new and eternal life, which was opened to humanity by Jesus,' explained Pope Francis in *Spes Non Confundit* (Hope Does Not Disappoint), the papal bull officially proclaiming the Holy Year of 2025.

The theme of the 2025 Jubilee is that of Pilgrims of Hope in which we, as pilgrims, may encounter, with others or by ourselves, physical, spiritual or emotional places where we might find God. All over the world Catholics are preparing to go on pilgrimage: it might be to a local place of respect or veneration such as Walsingham in England, further afield to Lourdes or Fatima, others will go to Rome, but all will have in common a desire to encounter God more deeply in our lives through hopefilled prayer.

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
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
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
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
