#### I'm a Shareholder

#### From California to Stonesfield: A shareholder's visit to The White Horse

In late November 2020, I received an email from a friend who knows I'm a proud Anglophile. The message included a link to a Washington Post article titled 'Village Pours Itself into Mission to Save Its Last Pub, and Its Community'. I was immediately captivated. The article told the story of Stonesfield, a small Oxfordshire village that had rallied together to save its last remaining pub, *The White Horse*. Their mission was about far more than preserving a building - it was about protecting the heart of their community. I was touched and inspired. Within minutes, I visited the 'Back the White Horse' website and purchased shares.

For the next few years, I followed the project closely as the dedicated committee navigated the challenges of purchasing the building, completing the renovation, and preparing to reopen the doors of their beloved pub. Because I live in California, I could not physically contribute to the local efforts – no painting walls, baking cakes, or staffing fundraisers – I could only support them from afar. And I did, with hope and prayers. All the while, I quietly dreamed of the day I might visit in person.

That dream came true on 30 May this year.



I arrived in Stonesfield on a sunny Friday afternoon, a little nervous but mostly excited. When I walked through the doors of The White Horse, it felt both surreal and deeply familiar. I introduced myself to Craig behind the bar, then ordered a half pint of cider and a vegan sweet potato wrap. The sun was shining, so I headed into the garden and to find a spot to sit. I invited myself to join two welcoming women at a table – they turned out to be sisters – and we quickly fell into easy conversation. As more of their friends joined us, I felt a genuine sense of welcome and community.

The next day, I returned to the pub and spent several hours enjoying the garden. I chatted with a couple who had travelled extensively throughout the US, including along route 1 on the California coast. Later, I met Pete, a member of the pub committee, along with his wife Laura, their baby girl and dog. They shared stories about the long journey to save and reopen The White Horse, and I listened with wonder and appreciation for their dedication.

That evening, I came back once more – this time for dinner. I sat with Mark, another committee member, and we shared a delightful meal and great conversation. I enjoyed a delicious vegan pasta dish, but the real highlight was feeling so at home in this place I had once only known through email updates and photos.

My weekend in Stonesfield was pure joy. The village itself is like something out of a fairy tale – quaint, charming, and peaceful. And The White Horse exceeded all expectations. It offered not just excellent food and drink, but also a welcoming spirit and meaningful connections. It's extraordinary to think that an article and a link – shared with me nearly four years ago – led to such a rich and memorable experience. But that's the magic of this story. The White Horse is more than just a pub. It's a real-life example of what can happen when people come together with a common goal and a shared belief in community.



And now, I can proudly say, I've had a pint (well, a half pint) at *my pub*.

#### Bell ringing at St. James' Church

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June 28 saw a gathering of around 50 people at SJC for the annual Witney and Woodstock 'Striking Competition'. Strict rules are adhered to and ringers from seven towers competed. It was Stonesfield's turn to host the annual event (we didn't compete), which in practical terms meant preparing St. James' Centre to receive the competitors for the bring and share supper to follow the actual ringing, and providing welcome drinks on arrival and as it proceeded.

Ringers arrived from Combe, Church Hanborough, Freeland, North Leigh, Wootton, Witney and Woodstock. The teams converged on Stonesfield for a friendly, but definitely robust, competitive ringing of church bells, either ringing *call changes* or *a method* in turns, and being marked on the ability of both 'bands' and their 'captains' (conductors) to convince the judge of their precise and accurate bell ringing under pressure.

Ringing for Church Services and special events and to mark rites of passage like christenings, weddings, funerals, and to celebrate dates like New Year's Eve or the Coronation form the voluntary and extra duties of a competent bell ringer. In competition ringing, marks are awarded for different aspects of the ringing. In this case, the even and regular striking of all six bells was highly important.



The whole event was great fun, entertaining, an eye opener and another angle on one of the most challenging new interests of mine since moving to Stonesfield. The technique is crucial and requires learning and practising. Our church tower is a small, cosy one and the belfry houses a ring of six bells of differing weights, from the treble to the tenor. The June summer evening was perfect in terms of the glorious weather, the unique occasion, the skill and general atmosphere, not to mention the tasty and delicious range of food for supper which was gratefully enjoyed by all in either the hall or the beautiful garden of the Centre, overlooking the tower and churchyard.

Church Hanborough and Witney 'bands' were judged to be the joint winners of the call changes trophy, while Witney also won the method ringing trophy. The various factors necessary: skill, technique, training, experience and a dose of luck for those who topped the board, should not be underestimated - winning, although clearly important, did not dim the achievement of each participant. For those of us hosting, it was a unique, friendly event, which one day I'd like to 'strike' in. Personally, I'm grateful for the unexpectedly demanding opportunities and new horizons afforded by plunging into the world of campanology.

#### The egg lady has retired

Those of us who have been buying our eggs from the stand in Brook Lane will be very sad to learn that Joanna Browne has – very reluctantly – decided to call it a day. Her hens were being destroyed: eaten, she thinks, by foxes. The hens disappeared, usually overnight, one at a time. She mounted guard, secured the henhouse and fences and did all she could to protect them but the fox outwitted her (if indeed it was a fox). 'I just haven't got it in me to keep facing the daily loss, it is too upsetting', she told me.

Joanna has been keeping hens all her life. She started when she was about eight years old: chickens in the back garden were a feature of family life, and she has had them ever since. She came to Stonesfield about twenty years ago, and when setting up her hen house, thought 'how nice it would be to make people happy by selling the eggs'. At their peak, the flock numbered about 100 birds. Eggs were plentiful, and involved Joanna in a rigorously disciplined routine of early morning collections, seven days a week, plus weekly clean-outs. She even went to the trouble of hand-delivering them to loyal customers. In more recent years, the egg stand operated an honesty box. 'But it was never about the money; I just wanted to be of service'.

I find it most peculiar now, buying mine in a shop, and I miss the guaranteed freshness and wonderful taste of those laid in a field five minutes from my house. Thank you, Joanna, for all your hard work, and for those poached, fried, boiled and scrambled eggs, omelettes and cakes that the Brook Lane Chickens made possible for so many years. Stonesfield won't be the same without them.

#### North Leigh Roman Villa

#### **Open Days**

Enjoy the beautiful weather at one of North Leigh Roman Villa's FREE Open Days this summer. The volunteers have already welcomed approaching a thousand visitors to the site this year. There are new decorative panels to see in the Mosaic House, which will be open 11 am to 5 pm on the following weekends:

26-27 July

2-3, 16-17, 30-31 August

20-21 September

Set within a peaceful landscape on the banks of the River Evenlode, North Leigh Roman Villa is considered to be one of the largest villas in Roman Britain with a history of occupation spanning 5 centuries. At its most extensive in the early 4th century AD it included 3 bath suites, 16 mosaic floors and 11 rooms with underfloor heating.



Today visitors can imagine the villa's former richness as they walk through the rectangular footprint of its walls – but the mosaic house hides the real gem of a near complete mosaic floor. The mosaics form the floor of the villa's winter dining room and, as the only example in Oxfordshire still found in their original location, they give a powerful sense of the Villa's original opulence.

#### **Minecraft Competition**

We are launching a Free Competition, with support from Blenheim Palace, to come up with the most faithful recreation of how North Leigh Roman Villa would have looked when it was the centre of a large estate, created in the popular online game, Minecraft.

We're looking for a 1:1 recreation of the main villa building and its internal courtyard in the game, with a screen recorded video (no longer than ten minutes) shared to YouTube for judging purposes. The winner will not only be hailed as the best builder, but will receive a £100 prize, courtesy of Blenheim Palace. This reconstruction will also be used as an educational tool on site at the villa during Open Days. Runner up samples from a shortlist of five may also appear online and for a future display in our Custodian's Cottage.

Whether you're an expert Minecraft player or new to the game, we're providing all the resources you'll need to bring this 2000year-old site to life; included in the entry form: www.forms.gle hDgySG5yrcdgWWjy5.

Rome wasn't built in a day, but we're hoping this little slice of Romano-British life can be realised by you. The competition is open for a little over three months, 21 June - 29 September, with the winner and runners up revealed on our final Open Day on 29 October. Judging will involve site volunteers, English Heritage and Blenheim Palace.

#### New art exhibition: Act of kindness to a Holocaust survivor

From Saturday 9 to Saturday 30 August 2025, the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock will display a new exhibition created by local artists and inspired by the story of a simple act of kindness during the liberation of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in April 1945.

The Oxfordshire Yeomanry, a Territorial Army regiment serving as an Anti-Tank battery of the Royal Artillery at the time, was among the first to enter the Bergen-Belsen camp when it was handed over to British forces. Ordinary soldiers, they were not prepared for what they would find inside - camp survivors were starving while typhus was spreading rapidly, made worse by cramped conditions, poor sanitation and lack of clean water, as well as around 10.000 dead left unburied.

Camp survivor Naomi Warren, Polish and Jewish, was desperate to contact her surviving family having already lost many held at Auschwitz-Birkenau, and approached her liberators for help. Oxfordshire Yeoman Arthur Tyler came forward – he began writing letters to her uncle and sister living in Houston, Texas. This simple act of kindness would eventually see Naomi reunited with them;

ultimately settling and rebuilding her life in the US.

The new exhibition will combine artwork and film created in response to the story of Naomi and Arthur. The exhibition is the culmination of the *Lifelines* community art project which brought together a group of artists from diverse backgrounds. Inspired by this story, the work on display explores the themes of witnessing, kindness, vision and positivity.

This new exhibition will coincide with the Holocaust Memorial Trust's *80 Candles 80 Years* display, visiting the museum on its tour of the UK in the run up to Holocaust Memorial Day 2026.

The *80 Candles for 80 Years* project has involved 80 communities and organisations across the UK who have created unique candleholders, each one inspired by the life story of Jewish people murdered during the Holocaust, and other individuals targeted by the Nazi regime.

*80 Candles for 80 Years* will go on display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock from 12 to 30 August 2025.

#### Combe Mill: Models and Collections event

On Sunday 17 August we will be joined by local model clubs exhibiting their models of fairgrounds, train sets, tractors, buses, a Bluebird model and much more. We are also organising a display of classic motor cycles.

Combe Mill, a late 19th Century restored water mill on Blenheim Palace Estate by the river Evenlode, will have all machinery running 'in steam'. Volunteers will be on hand to explain everything. The tea room will be open, and also a BBQ, gift shop, tombola and raffle.

Come and browse the market stalls; bring the children along and they will enjoy it all.

The Mill is open 10.30 am to 4.30pm; last entries 3.30pm. Dogs on leads are most welcome, and parking is free. Adults  $\pounds$ 9.00, seniors  $\pounds$ 7.50, accompanied children free.

We are also open every Wednesday for a 'self-guided tour' with volunteers around.

## Politics & local affairs

#### From our District Councillors Mental Health Summit

Lattended a Mental Health Summit hosted by WODC this month, which showcased the support available from 13 mental health organisations in West Oxfordshire. This included talks by 'Tough to Talk' who work to reduce male suicide and break the silence surrounding men's crises and poor mental health. Our local mental health charity, Bridewell Gardens, who provide social and therapeutic horticulture in a working garden were also there. Turning Point, who have a hub in Witney, provide support for people with drug/alcohol addictions and their families. The Community Wellbeing team at WODC can provide more details of the services available locally.

#### **Evenlode Catchment Partnership**

I attended the July Combe meeting by the Evenlode Catchment Partnership, who are running a 6-month campaign to investigate the impact of Combe sewage treatment works (STW). In 2024, Combe STW discharged untreated sewage into the River Evenlode for over 2430 hours. The River Evenlode is designated by Thames Water as an 'ecological high priority site'! The sewage discharges increased by 486 hours from 2023, to win the ECP's second place in the 'Top of the Poops' awards. If you would like to get involved with the citizen science to measure the impact, please get in touch.

#### 3. Local Plan

WODC is preparing a new Local Plan covering the period up to 2041, to make sure that our planning policies and proposals are up to date and effectively tackle vital issues such as climate change, health and wellbeing, housing and the economy. Once adopted, it will replace the current West Oxfordshire Local Plan 2031, which was approved in September 2018. #### **More from West Oxfordshire** What you can put in your blue

#### What you can put in your blue recycling bin...

This an official update from WODC (dated 15 July 2025) for what you can put in your **blue lidded recycling bin**. This now includes **flexible plastics** i.e. plastic bags etc.

The WODC website is in the process of being redesigned to reflect these changes, hopefully as soon as possible to stop any further confusion. The most up-to-date and reliable information about what you can and can't put in your bins is available on the 'What to put in your bin' page on the website. Our printed and downloadable leaflets are currently being reviewed, as they don't yet reflect some recent changes.

Dry Mixed Recycling (DMR) means clean and dry items that can be recycled together in one bin. These items are sorted later at a recycling facility. It's important that they're not contaminated with food or liquids.

Typical items you can include in your recycling (blue lidded) bin are:

- **Paper and cardboard** like newspapers, magazines, and packaging
- **Plastic bottles, pots, tubs, and trays** – such as drinks bottles, yogurt pots, and fruit punnets
- **Metal tins and cans** including food tins, drink cans, and aerosols
- **Cartons** like juice or milk cartons, and tubes from products like custard or gravy granules
- Flexible Plastic bags like bags, bubble wrap and film

Please be aware that recycling rules can vary between councils, depending on the facilities they use.

What about flexible plastics?

Although it's not yet a legal requirement, all councils will need to collect flexible plastics for recycling by 2027. West Oxfordshire is already preparing for this. Our recycling contractor can currently accept some flexible plastics, but the national infrastructure for recycling them is still developing. **This means WODC can collect flexible plastics** in your recycling bin., although they can't yet guarantee that all of it will be recycled. **They encourage you to include it**, as separating it now helps them prepare for the future and supports the growth of recycling systems.

#### Free parking will continue

West Oxfordshire District Council has confirmed that parking will remain free in all Council-run car parks, as part of an updated parking strategy that sets out plans to improve parking across West Oxfordshire through to 2031. A recent review found that Witney currently has a good level of available parking, but in Burford, Woodstock and Charlbury, there is not enough space to meet demand.

The Council currently owns and manages 16 public off-street car parks across the district. While there is no legal requirement to offer parking, the Council wishes our car parks to support the residents and local businesses, and help our towns and villages remain welcoming to visitors. This provision will continue to be free of charge.

#### New affordable homes in Witney



A recent parking survey has shown that Marriotts Walk car park in Witney (Woodford Way, always intended for ultimate use for housing) is underused during the day. The District Council intends to bring forward plans to use the area for a development to offer one- and two-bedroom affordable homes for local people, which are currently in short supply. The location of this type of housing, close to local services, would be ideal. The Council aims to retain about 70 car parking spaces to meet overnight parking needs.

#### A new rail link?

An independent study for WODC has investigated the benefits to travel, the environment, housebuilding and the economy of reinstating a rail link between Carterton, Witney and Oxford. The report concludes that investing in a rail link would relieve pressure and congestion on the A40, as well as contributing to progress towards environmental targets.

## Funding available for community projects

West Oxfordshire District Council has pledged more than £114,000 to support community-led projects through its crowdfunding initiative, Westhive. This is enabling community organisations to unlock additional funding in a wide range of activities to enhance local services, spaces and support. Westhive has already allocated over £423,000 since 2023 for community projects. Current projects seeking support are in the areas of meeting recreational needs for people with health issues or financial difficulties, and restoring endangered natural habitats.

#### WODC's climate change strategy



West Oxfordshire District Council has approved the West Oxfordshire Climate Change Strategy that will help guide the district's transition to net zero emissions by 2050, while building resilience to climate change and accelerating nature recovery.

The Council has made significant progress in carbon reduction and is helping to accelerate the drive to net zero through energy advice services, targeted grant funding for low-income households, energy planning and building decarbonisation. It has cut its own emissions through reducing energy demand and has been named the top performing rural district in the UK following the release of the 2025 national Council Climate Action Scorecards.

The strategy, which runs from 2025 to 2030, outlines a net zero pathway for reducing carbon emissions across West Oxfordshire. It builds on the Council's ongoing commitment to tackling the climate and ecological emergency declared in 2019 and supports priorities set out in the Council Plan 2023-2027. Projects that contributed to this success included supporting vulnerable households to improve energy efficiency through the *Better Housing Better Health* programme, retrofitting council-owned buildings with low carbon heating systems and renewable technologies, and facilitating the planting of community orchards to enable community food growing, restore habitats for wildlife, and address climate change.

The Council also continues to deliver carbon literacy training to staff, as well as climate awareness training to council members. Furthermore, a Sustainability Impact Assessment Tool has been introduced to embed climate considerations into decision-making, ensuring Council operations are as sustainable as possible.

By acting to both reduce emissions and prepare for the impacts of climate change, West Oxfordshire is helping to create a stronger, greener future for the district and beyond.

#### Judd's Garage junction

Residents will be pleased to know that I met with OCC officers a few weeks ago on site at the junction of B4437 and the A44 (Duke of Marlborough Pub/Judd's Garage) with a Wootton parish councillor to consider the need for a safer configuration for the junction, which may also involve a new bus shelter as opposed to the bus stop which is inadequate for bus users particularly in wet weather. The officer team comprised of planning design team, highways engineers and me.



It was agreed that the team would start working on a design possibly including a traffic light option at the junction, reduced speed signs and other pedestrian safety options and this will be consulted upon in the next six months.

So, watch out for the consultation dates in future editions of *The Slate*, something is happening .....reducing accidents at this junction is a priority!

#### **Police performance**

Matthew Barber, the Police & Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley, has released the results of his second year. The key achievements include a 13% reduction in neighbourhood crime (vehicle, theft, burglary, robbery), and that the number of funded neighbourhood police constable posts more than doubled to 328 in 2025. Victim support was enhanced through the Victims First Hub, including support to over 1,700 domestic abuse victims, and knife crime was down by 7%.

#### Dogs in hot cars

Police have urged the message that with ever-rising temperatures, it is vital to be aware of dogs left in cars on hot days. Even with the windows partly open, a car can become a death trap within minutes; temperatures inside can rise so quickly that pets are at serious risk of heat stroke or death.

If you see a dog in distress in a hot car, please call 999 immediately; time is critical.

- Exterior: Put your exterior lights on a sensor
- Neighbours: Keep an eye out for neighbours

Most domestic burglaries are committed by opportunists. Criminals will look for homes that seem unoccupied, have little or no apparent security, have doors or windows left open, or homes where they think they won't be seen.

#### Nature notes

#### From Wild Oxfordshire... Share your wildlife sightings!

Everyone can play a part in submitting wildlife observations to local Environmental Records Centres. This is so that they appear on the 'official record' that is consulted by planning authorities and used by other parties to track changes in distribution and abundance.

As well as the value of the data submitted, keeping a systematic note of what you see on your walks and in your gardens adds extra interest and depth to the experience, and can help you to improve your identification skills.

A great way of easily logging records is via the iRecord website (iRecord.co.uk) or app, from which Records Centres like the Thames Valley Environmental Records Centre (TVERC) can extract data. You can also send records direct to TVERC to ensure they get them in a timely fashion – and see below for how you can contribute even if you don't get on with iRecord.

Local groups or parishes can provide focus to their efforts by setting up an 'Activity' within iRecord, whereby all records submitted by participants, within a designated geographical area or within specified window of time, will combine to form an easily accessible overview of what has been seen and where, including a species list.

However, you can, of course submit via iRecord observations from beyond the activity area, and historic observations (as long as you still have the relevant information to hand). For greatest efficiency, we recommend that anyone who is interested in contributing to this effort,

or perhaps already keeps records of observations but has not shared them, creates their own iRecord account and uses that to record their sightings, if at all possible. You can also attach photos to records to assist.



Once you have an account, you can find your group's Activity by searching Activities and the name of your group or parish. If it is a 'member-only' Activity, your application to join will need to be approved by the group's administrators before you can access the activity.

Your records are first validated (checked for location errors) and verified (checked for species identification errors) before they are entered into the TVERC database. This ensures that the data passed on to decision-makers is as accurate and informative as possible. The records are shared with local authorities in Oxfordshire and Berkshire, the Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust and the Environment Agency. They are also provided through data searches to local groups, parish councils, ecological consultants and researchers. The information is used:

• by planning authorities and developers to make informed decisions on the design and location of sustainable development

- to help farmers, landowners and conservation organisations manage land in the best way to enhance biodiversity
- by nature partnerships to direct wildlife conservation work
- by teachers, students and scientists for education and scientific research

The database currently holds over 5 million records, including over 1.1 million records of Protected and Notable species i.e. those that should be taken into account in planning applications. The vast majority of records in the TVERC database are collected by volunteers and local wildlife groups, showing just how vital your efforts are. So please, make your nature spotting count and submit your records to TVERC.

#### The Megalosaurus Society

#### Stonesfield Environment Group

#### **Brook Lane limestone meadow**

The Environment Group took on the care of the meadow in June 2024, initially developing a five-year restorative plan for the invertebrates, fauna and flora on the one-acre site. This was done in partnership with Wild Oxfordshire. The emphasis is on understanding which creatures live on and use the meadow, what are their requirements, and then developing a mosaic of habitats to allow the site to thrive.

The first year was focused on clearing some of the dominant shrubs that were starting to overgrow the limestone habitat. The work was developed with a number of specialists who gave their time and expertise to the meadow. The main work was clearing *Clematis vitalba* (old man's beard, OMB) that smothered most of the surrounding trees and much of the meadow; hence the large piles that were eventually burnt on site. We also removed most of the blackthorn, hawthorn, brambles and roses that were growing into the meadow. This allowed the site to breathe and the limestone meadow to start to re-establish itself.



This year there has been little direct management, so we could allow the site to show the effects of the previous year. We continue to pull the OMB out (it has runners just under the surface leading to a nodal point, and it is this point that needs to come out). The creeping thistle is also being removed as it flowers. (Don't dig the roots, as they split and you will have more creeping thistles next year.) We have woolly thistle (great for goldfinches in late summer) and stemless thistle, very close to the ground. Both favour the limestone habitat and will be left alone.

In mid-July the meadow is looking fantastic, considering the drought, and I hope you have been along to have a look. Today (10 July) I did a survey of the butterflies for 15 minutes, and recorded 65 butterflies from 12 species. The highlight was the eight common blue butterflies: in 2024 we saw none and none were recorded on the 'Big butterfly count' for Stonesfield that year. We have taken particular care of the bird's foot trefoil which is its larval food plant, so I am hopeful that the common blue will be breeding again on site.

It is easy to connect with what is going on in the day, but what about the night ??



Here we are past midnight in mid-June, on the meadow with a generator-powered moth trap (note that we release all moths back to the night). Peter Cuss from the Upper Thames Moth Group is on his knees and giving us great support, advice and the loan of an actinic moth trap.

Moths are very important pollinators, but moth populations are experiencing a steep decline due to habitat loss, pesticides and the climate crisis. The UK has 62 butterfly species and over 2000 UK moth species. The height of the moth season is from early June to late August.

Moths are a key group for our records in 2025, and we are getting great support from the Upper Thames Moth Group. Moth recording started in March and in four months we have recorded 112 species on the meadow area. Many of the moths rely on trees and shrubs; some are more specific. From those recorded so far, 11 species rely on grasses, 7 on bedstraws, 5 on nettles (the patch of nettles near the Evenlode seat will probably be staying), 4 on lichens (the Footman moths), 3 on bramble, 3 on OMB, 2 on bindweed, 1 on thistle and 1 on bird's foot trefoil. This is the detailed information that can help inform habitat protection and development. For more on Moths, the Upper Thames website is great: upperthamesmoths.co.uk.

This was also the night we saw the first glow-worm and we have since done a full survey for glow-worms on the common. Two glow-worms were seen on the Brook Lane meadow, and we have since seen five more. The presence of glow-worms adds to the complexity of habitats needed. A detailed review of glow-worms will come later in the year.

Many thanks to all who have given generous time and energy to the meadow. Please get in touch if you would like to get involved.

#### From the Rector: Nature

Over half of the world's population now live in cities, but with increasing urbanisation has come a deepening awareness of the benefits of spending time in nature.

There is nothing new in this. Poets have sung nature's praises, and artists have delighted in the chance to paint and draw in the open, inspired by the beauty of the natural world. In 1854 the American writer Henry David Thoreau wrote '*Walden; or, Life in the Woods,*' after spending two years in a cabin he built in woodland owned by his friend Ralph Waldo Emerson. The experiment was an attempt to return to a simpler life, a more spiritual life, through connection to the natural environment. In the USA it has inspired an appreciation of the great outdoors ever since, and has reinforced the Native American appreciation of the need for harmony between human beings and the world we inhabit. Today we are aware that contact with nature reduces human stress and anxiety, can improve depression, raise self-esteem and improve relationships.

In the Jewish and Christian traditions, understanding the power and beauty of nature has gone hand in hand with an appreciation of the one who made it. Our peace in nature connects us to our maker, whose creative power is inexhaustible. So in Psalm 104, the Psalmist says:

O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom have you made them all the earth is full of your creatures.

And perhaps the best-known Psalm of all begins with the words:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters. He restores my soul.

Jesus also encouraged his followers to look at the world of nature to reset their sense of who they are, and what their true needs might be. Instead of worrying about life, and about the future, he told his hearers to look at the birds, and the flowers growing wild around them, all of which are provided for by God, who loves us and will provide for us too. Here in Stonesfield it is such a privilege to be surrounded by the calming beauty and peace of nature. As we feel its power to heal, restore and refresh our bodies and minds, may we also know the spiritual peace of God, the creator and **Wednesdays** sustainer of all.

#### My cousin Lori Odhner

(www.caringformarriage.org) has been sending out short inspirational stories every single day for 20 years. She's agreed to me sharing extracts from a recent post she called *Open Door*. It was prompted by reflecting on the doors constructed for plays in her town – and since Stonesfield too has its own plays with stage crews, it seemed appropriate.

'The stage crew that creates scenery for every production amazes me. ... They have a history of building doors, which promotes the illusion of entrances and exits. One year the door got jammed in a performance and the actor improvised by walking around. I loved it. ... In church one time the topic was doors. One of the lingering free-standing entrances from back stage served as a prop. ...

#### Roman Catholic Worship Confession

The Sacrament of Confession holds a special place for Roman Catholics. Also known as the Sacrament of Reconciliation, it offers individuals an opportunity to seek forgiveness for their sins, reconcile with God, and begin anew. Through the act of confessing to God through a priest, Catholics not only express contrition for their wrongdoings but also receive spiritual guidance and absolution, reaffirming their relationship with the divine and with the wider Church community. This sacrament is both a deeply personal encounter and an act of faith, reflecting the Catholic belief in God's boundless, forgiving mercy and the transformative power of grace.

At the heart of the Sacrament of Confession lies the example and teaching of Jesus Christ. Throughout his ministry, Jesus extended forgiveness to those who sought it, offering words of compassion to sinners and inviting them to repentance and renewal. The Gospels recount moments when Jesus proclaimed, 'Take heart my son, your sins are forgiven', Matthew 9:1-2 ; demonstrating not only his authority to absolve but also his desire to restore and heal. Similarly, in Mark 2:5 we see Jesus offering forgiveness linked to healing 'My son, your sins are forgiven'.

Catholics believe that through the ministry of priests, Christ himself continues this work of reconciliation, making his mercy present in every confession. In approaching the sacrament, the faithful trust in Jesus' promise of forgiveness and his call to a life transformed by grace.

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


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
