The Club was the brainchild of Kevin McShane who was the first Chairman, Vice Chairman was Bernard Youngs, the Secretary was Selina Smith, and the Treasurer was Dave Holloway.

The building took a year to construct at a cost of £55,000, raised by fundraising activity as

well as grants and interest free loans from Committee Members.

We are a member's club with both social and sports members. With the club's recent refurb and extension to the patio area overlooking the play park, we have a lovely family feel. Your sporting needs are covered, whether that's joining a team or just having fun. We have a mixture of sports channels on the large screen for special events, a dart board, pool table, Aunt Sally and dominoes. Covering the social side, we have competitions, live music, bingo, quiz, the pizza man and other fundraising events. We have a bit of something for everyone!

Mary Gilson - A thank you

Mary Gilson 1928 - 2025: our mum moved to Stonesfield in 2019. It was a chance for her to live near family again after a happy retirement to Yarnton with Dad who had died in 2013. Our fortune was to move to a village with 'heart' and 'character'. Mum was born in the Black Country, in Wednesbury and it wasn't long before she was making contacts with neighbours and village life. One of her first personal contacts was Margaret, also born in Wednesbury, whose friendliness towards her was much appreciated. She used the library, the Post Office, the shop and of course as a lifelong member, attended the Methodist Chapel, enjoying being able to walk to service on Sunday even at 95. Wednesday lunch club at St James' became a regular date: village transport, legendary lunches, outings and helpful advice ensured she felt valued and comfortable in the community within a short time.

After 5 years, she needed 24 hour care and thus moved to a local care home, but continued to stay in our thoughts by being on the St James' weekly prayer list and because of the numerous kind, frequent enquiries from villagers and of course, catch up visits by the family to share in this difficult demise. Her death was peaceful, her life full and our family most grateful to all of you for the kindness, the support and the messages and cards we have received since. Of course we miss her, she was a gem.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

July Report

Planning: No objection was raised to the planning application at Stonesfield Manor, Combe Road.

Neighbourhood Plan: A detailed report from the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group was received and agreed.

Finance: £70.02 was approved for replacement defibrillator pads at the St James' Centre.

A Parish Council PayPal account was approved, with a £300 spending limit under the Clerk's delegated authority.

Committee & Working Groups:

Membership of the HR Committee and all working groups was confirmed.

Owl Video Device: The Council declined to purchase an Owl video conferencing device at this stage, but will review again after winter.

Bins: The Council approved the installation of a dual bin by the shop, with servicing costs agreed.

Community Orchard: Work is progressing, with a 5-year working plan to be produced.

The Common (Cricket Pitch

Fencing): Urgent fencing work was approved. The Council agreed to proceed with a metal post option, with installation to be carried out as part of a college student project.

Village Hall Hedges: The Council confirmed responsibility for a section of hedge by the car park. It was agreed that hedge cutting should continue annually, alternating sides. Further information on who should carry out the work will be gathered before arrangements are made.

Clerk's Report: AGAR submitted; Meadow Clary survey success noted; traffic regulation and flood fencing noted; new Clerk phone number operational; shop grant project noted.

September Report

Village maintenance: A new bin has been installed by the shop. Hedge cutting at the Village Hall and grass cutting contracts will be reviewed in October.

Neighbourhood Plan: The revised Neighbourhood Plan was approved. The Steering Group was thanked for its thorough work, warmly applauded by all present.

Finance: Payments were approved and a new Multipay Card agreed.

Parish Councillor resignation: Cllr J Huband has stepped down and was thanked for her service.

External Audit: The annual review of the Council's accounts for 2024–25 found no major issues. Minor improvements were recommended for future years, including clearer publication of audit notices.

Clerk's update: The Council formally confirmed the end of the Clerk's probationary period, with a pay increment awarded. Councillors thanked the Clerk for her hard work and support to date.

Parish Council approve draft Neighbourhood Plan for submission to WODC

The Neighbourhood Plan steering group worked tirelessly over the summer to analyse feedback following our public consultation process that took place March – May this year. We logged and considered every single comment we received from residents, landowners and statutory consultees, including WODC. We then amended our original draft in the light of these comments and submitted the revised draft to the Parish Council for their approval.

On 3 September, at their regular monthly public meeting which was attended by the steering group, the draft Neighbourhood Plan was unanimously approved by the PC for submission to WODC.

The steering group will now write the two documents which must accompany the draft Plan – a Consultation Statement (setting out everything we did to consult the village on the Plan) and the Basic Conditions Statement (setting out how we have conformed to the relevant protocols). We aim to complete this work by the end of October. We will then submit the Plan and accompanying documents to WODC for approval. At this stage, a copy of everything will be on the website and in the library.

WODC will review the Plan and then send it to an independent Examiner for his/her consideration. WODC and the Examiner may seek further changes to the Plan which will require additional amendments. When both are content with the Plan it will then be put to a village referendum, organised by WODC, which will need a simple majority of residents in order to be 'made':

the technical term used when the Plan is accepted by all parties.

The time frame for the final stages of the process is out of our hands, and could be lengthy, but we will of course inform the village here in *The Slate* and on the website when we have anything to report.

Salt Cross Development: Net Zero Policy approved!

Salt Cross is a proposed garden village, consisting of 2,200 homes and employment space, and located north of the A40 across from Eynsham. The Net Zero policy for the Salt Cross Village development has been approved by the Planning Inspector after an earlier legal challenge. The policy, which aims to ensure that all buildings at Salt Cross are Net Zero carbon in operation, has been found to comply with national policy and to be 'sound' in other respects, subject to several modifications. It marks a significant achievement for the Council and places Salt Cross among the UK's leading developments in sustainable place-making. The Salt Cross Village development will form a substantial part of the housing to be built in West Oxfordshire, and sets high standards for new houses to be built and run. Youth Needs Development

James Edney, WODC Youth Development Officer, started in Feb 2025. His role was born out of the Youth Needs Assessment 2022, which heard from almost 4,000

young people across the district and identified barriers they faced accessing positive activities and issues they considered most important to them. A 'Have a Go' day in Stonesfield was developed in partnership with the YouMove team, as a launch activity from which to build more ongoing provision. The 'Have a Go' day was held on 19 August, for families with young children in the morning, and 11-18 year olds in the afternoon. YouMove ran 'Broken Bordz' (skating and scooters with ramps). Forest school, tennis, basketball, dominoes and story-telling were some of the other village activities on offer. Huge thanks go to everyone involved, and to Claire Renshaw and Julie Curran who organised so much.

What to do if you hit a deer

As we approach deer rutting season (September to November), the number of deer involved in vehicle collisions on our roads increases dramatically. If you find yourself in a collision with a deer, please take the following steps

- Ensure your safety Pull over to a safe location away from traffic and turn on your hazard lights.
- Assess the situation Check yourself and your passengers for injuries. If anyone is hurt, call for an ambulance immediately.
- Call 999 Call the police on 999 to report the accident. They will handle the situation with the deer and can provide assistance if needed. Injured

deer can be both unpredictable and volatile, and can cause further risk and harm to other road users.

4. Do not approach the deer - Injured deer can be dangerous, so avoid getting close to it/them.

Benefit Scam Alert

Please be aware of cold callers claiming to work with the DWP or other similar agencies. The DWP or any legitimate agency will never charge for benefit advice or request payment before helping with claims. If you receive a suspicious call, independently contact the DWP or the relevant agency using an official telephone number – do not use numbers given to you by the cold caller.

Wait at least 15 minutes before making the call as fraudsters may keep the line open and respond claiming to be the DWP or agency you are telephoning.

Never disclose any personal or sensitive information over the telephone.

Common methods of communication include telephone calls, text messages of emails that mimic official DWP correspondence.

Often these communications will:

- Inform you that payments are at risk unless you provide details such as bank details or national insurance number.
- Offer to apply for benefits on your behalf for an upfront fee
- Impersonate DWP staff to gain your trust and collect sensitive information.

If you suspect you have made a payment in response to such a scam call, immediately contact your bank and dial 159; the operator will direct your call appropriately.

Scams! When to hang up the phone!

Scammers are constantly inventing new and clever tricks to steal your money! Too many to mention! The safest thing to remember is this, if you hear any of the following (selected examples), hang up the phone.

Scammer: "You owe unpaid tax and will be arrested today." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "Go buy gift cards and read me the numbers." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "We're from your internet provider, let us access your computer." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "Don't tell anyone about this call, keep it secret." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "Press 1 to connect to HMRC/Bank/Police." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "This is your bank, your card has been cloned. We'll send a courier to collect it." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "We've noticed suspicious transactions on your account, you need to move your money to a saver account."
Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "Your Amazon/PayPal account has been hacked, give me your login details." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "Your computer has a virus, we'll fix it if you let us in remotely." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "We're offering you an exclusive investment with guaranteed returns." Hang up the phone!

Scammer: "Don't hang up, this is urgent!" Hang up the phone!

Remember: If you feel you need to check with your bank, use a different phone to the one you were contacted on! The

legitimate number is on the back of your credit/debit card. Never call the number the scammer gave you.

Cows with calves on the Common

It's that time of the year again when we get cattle on to the Common. Cattle are one of the best ways of maintaining the grassland and improving the Common. When cattle are allowed to graze freely they select different plants, and even different parts of the plant, to nibble or browse. Over time, this selective eating by the animals creates a varied structure within the plants and the habitat. It is this that helps create the right conditions for a wide range of plants, insects, birds, reptiles, and mammals to exist. The weight of the cattle also ensures seeds are pressed into the soil.

We want you to enjoy the countryside responsibly, especially now there are cows with calves on the Common.

(Information from the National Farmers Union)

- Cows are nosy and may come to investigate, especially if you have a dog with you.
- Don't panic or run if cattle follow you stay calm and walk quickly and quietly around the herd.
- Remember cows can be protective of their young. Never get between cows and their calves – go around the herd and rejoin the path as soon as possible.
- Keep your dogs close, under control, in sight and on a short lead around cattle.
- If you are threatened by cattle, release your dog so you can both get to safety separately.
- Dog poo can spread disease to cattle.
 Bag it and bin it there's a waste bin by the road gate.

If you aren't comfortable walking where there are cattle, there are many other footpaths nearby.

Thank you for controlling your dog while there are cattle on the Common and ensuring the gates are closed.

Nature notes

Red ribbons for the trees on the straight

The trees we have planted over the last three years (now one for everyone in the village) have struggled over the drought and we will review next spring for how many we may have lost. The trees planted on the straight are now entering their fourth year and look to have survived well. You may notice that we have marked most of them with a red ribbon to help keep them safe from the hedge trimming.

Some are already breaking the height of the hedge while others are still growing in the tubes. As you drive towards Blenheim the trees on the left had to be planted in the line of the hedge, so are less seen than those on the right as the highway's boundary is the ditch line. The trees that have done least well are the ones planted near existing blackthorn. The 30 oaks donated by Blenheim have done well as have the small leaf limes.

If you are the driver on the straight, please keep your eyes on the road.

Moths on the Brook Lane limestone meadow

We had another night time escapade in mid August thanks to Peter from Upper Thames moth group and we have now reached 153 species of moth recorded so far from March this year. There is a further escapade planned for early October.

The Actinic moth trap we have been lent will continue monthly through autumn and winter getting us to a full year's records by March 2026.

The river that flows through and with us


We are increasing the testing of the Evenlode water to include regular E-Coli sampling, this is done using specific cards, three are treated and then incubating for 24 hours (in an egg incubator). E-coli shows up as blue dots which indicate the level of E-coli in the river. When we have enough results a more detailed report will be written up in *The Slate*.

The Evenlode Catchment Partnership is having an in-depth analysis of the river going through Combe and we are supporting this monitoring of the site that is just up river from the Combe sewage works.

Stonesfield Cricket Club

As the residents of Stonesfield enjoyed a lazy Saturday illuminated by bright sunshine, August beckoned, signalling the last full month of the season. Both teams sat in promotion places but by the end of the month the 1st Xl's promotion aspirations more resembled The Labours of Sisyphus.

It was to be a long month haunted by the scares of player unavailability as one heavy defeat followed another. Confidence evaporated, a creeping sense of ennui enveloped the team followed by the Epiphany of a mid-table finish.

Field Close witnessed heavy defeats against Oxenford and Stanton Harcourt. Oxenford bowled out The Stones for a feeble 120 before chasing down the target for the loss of one wicket. Stonesfield collapsed from 80-1 to 141 all out against Stanton Harcourt, Fred Holloway (49) before the visitors cruised to 144-1 inside 26 overs.

Sandwiched between these results, a trip to league leaders Kingston Bagpuize witnessed Stonesfield's biggest defeat in their history, easily rivalling The Spanish Armada or The Battle of Flodden Fields. Bagpuize blasted their way to 283-9 in their 50 overs before bowling out The Stones for 60 in 16 overs. A 223 run morale crushing defeat.

The penultimate match at Charlbury resulted in another massacre, the game lasting slightly longer than it took The Duke of Cumberland's forces to defeat the Jacobites at Culloden. A much weakened team were bowled out for just 30 and a 166 run defeat.

The 2nd XI, selection affected by unavailability in the 1st XL, fared better.

They were indebted to Edward de Montjoie Rudolf as they were called on to enlist any number of waifs and strays from various parts of Oxfordshire to get 11 players on the pitch.

A Jordan Newman inspired victory at neighbouring Charlbury kept The Stones in second place. Despite Newman's 5-31, Charlbury posted a challenging 178-9 but Richard Walker (61) and Newman (52no) saw The Stones reach 181-4 with 12 overs to spare.

The visit of third placed Witney Mills loomed over The Stones. A blanket of fielders on the offside drew an alarming array of poor shots as a procession of batsmen looked sheepishly at team mates as they returned to the pavilion with alarming regularity. Mana Pandurangan spun his way to figures of (3-3) for the visitors as The Stones limped to 74 all out. Mills took just 77 balls to reach 75-2

There was no repeat of last year's acrimonious visit to Horley as the teams serenaded one another all afternoon, the only thing missing, a strolling guitarist. Andy Oliver (75) lead The Stones to a competitive 176-7 before taking (3-29) as Horley reached 150-9 at the close. A nod to Mrs Blake's homemade quiche which was undoubtedly the highlight of the day.

The 2's final home game followed, not exactly the Magnificent Seven, the team could muster only 8 players and as they took the field they must have known how Davy Crockett, and his small band of Texans felt as they faced General Santa Anna's army at The Alamo. It was more like zimmer frames at the ready than 'stand and deliver' as The Stones rolled out Neville Bainbridge 70+, David Burns 70+, two others stubbornly holding onto their

remaining tooth and the rest showing signs of atrophy. In a game reduced to 20 overs per innings Jack Sale with an excellent (48no) helped The Stones to 96-6. With gaps in the field wider than the Grand Canyon, Middleton Cheney scored freely and at one stage were 50-1 after 6 overs but a creditable fightback saw The Stones take 6 wickets before Marc Jordan sportingly dished up a couple of 'pies' allowing the visitors to reach their target.

The final games of the season see the 1's welcome Cumnor to Field Close whilst the 2's head to Shipton, both sets of players looking forward to the games with about as much enthusiasm as someone heading for a date with Albert Pierrepoint.

Stonesfield Gardening Club

Our talk in September was given by committee member Dr Lauren Daly who works as education officer at the Oxford Botanic Garden – always good to have home-grown experts to talk to us!

Lauren gave us a very interesting talk on the delights of carnivorous plants, with lovely photographs and videos. The definition of a carnivorous plant is specific – not only must they take in nutrients from dead prey, but they must also actively lure in, catch and digest prey. The plants that do this use colour, nectar and UV patterns to attract insects and they use snap traps, pitfalls, sticky secretions, suction or a lobster pot trap to capture the prey. They then digest them with enzymes and bacteria. All in all, very complicated and clever plants.

Plants include Venus Fly Trap, Sundews, pitcher plants (Sarracenia) and tropical



pitchers (Nepenthes). They are surprisingly easy to grow in our gardens (so she says!) with only Nepenthes needing to be indoors all the time.



They need bright sunlight, rainwater and peat-free or poor peat acidic soil. Most can happily be put outside in the summer but do need winter dormancy.

This month we will have a return visit from Mandy Bradshaw, the Chatty Gardener, who will be entertaining us with her wonderful photographs of gardens in the Cotswolds.

From the Rector - Sing Praise

The offering of worship to God has always been a defining characteristic of human communities. People of all faiths, ancient and modern, have used light, fire, water, dramatic action and ceremonial objects, as well as words, to awaken our sense of wonder and awe in the presence of God. But perhaps the most stirring element of worship in both the Jewish and Christian faiths is the use of music. We know that three thousand years ago music was used to praise God in Judaism, and the psalms were sung in the Jerusalem temple. The first followers of the risen Jesus sang hymns and spiritual songs together, and early Christians used popular styles of song both for worship and to share their trust in the God of universal love. Today, Christian music is a glorious expression of faith, an offering of worship and a custodian of

belief. It is cherished in plainsong chant and exquisite polyphony, traditional hymns and modern worship songs, as well as orchestral and choral settings for small groups or huge orchestras and choirs. The church is the guardian of this wonderful legacy and living worship, in the sublime chants of Thomas Tallis and William Byrd, the cascading beauty of Handel's Messiah, through the passionate hymns of the Wesleys, to modern worship music which communicates faith to the generations of our own day. New music is being composed for churches all the time, and in the Benefice of Stonesfield and Combe we benefit enormously from the contributions of musicians, composers and choirs, and from those with connections in the wider world of music.

One particular style of Christian music which has inspired many over recent decades originated in France, in the Taizé Community. Founded as a community of prayer and worship in 1940 by Brother Roger Schütz, Taizé is made up of around a hundred brothers from varied Protestant and Catholic backgrounds, from over thirty countries. Taizé attracts over 100,000 young people each year who camp around the central church for prayer, Bible study, communal work, discussion and worship. Its contemplative atmosphere is largely the product of its beautiful, meditative music, based on simple chants in multiple languages, alongside prayer and silence.

On Sunday the 12 October, between 5 and 6pm, we will be holding our own Taizé

service at St Laurence, Combe, which is for the Stonesfield and Combe parishes and is open to all. This special service will use candlelight, beautiful Taizé chants, readings and prayers. The Combe Church Choir (which has members from Stonesfield too) and the Combe School Choir will lead us, accompanied by a group of instrumentalists. Please join us!

Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth.

Worship the Lord with gladness; come into his presence with singing.

Know that the Lord is God. It is he that made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name.

For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.

May the Church always be a school of humility, welcoming all.

In his reflections before leading the Sunday Angelus in Rome on August 31, Pope Leo prayed that the Church may always be 'a school of humility' in following Jesus' example, as well as 'a home where all are welcome', where rivalries are set aside. He reinforced this message when he spoke to his fellow Augustinian Friars at their recent General Chapter (a worldwide meeting to elect a new Prior General) when he spoke of 'listening, humility, and unity'.

This focus on listening and humility is rooted in the teaching of St Augustine of Hippo, a 5th century philosopher and theologian from North Africa. After a tumultuous, but intellectually active early life, St Augustine was gradually drawn towards Christianity. St Augustine's

teachings on humility emphasise the importance of recognising one's limitations and the need for God's grace. He believed that true humility involves acknowledging our dependence on God and striving to live a life of service and love. St Augustine saw humility as a foundational Christian virtue, essential for following Christ and receiving God's grace. St Augustine saw humility as complete dependence on God with total submission to His will.

Jesus is that ultimate example of and template for humility, in which we are shown that path to freedom from sin and thus a life of true joy.


