

A review of Cold Comfort Farm

Stella Gibbons's 1932 comic novel *Cold Comfort Farm* has translated to film in at least two television adaptations with only varying degrees of success, and one might have not thought that the stage could do it any better justice. However this dramatisation of the story (by Paul Doust) turned out to be well able to stand on its own merits as a piece of live theatre.



The clever device of having Flora Poste taking the audience into her confidence in real time right from curtain up (very much demolishing the fourth wall) perfectly reflected the experience of her as narrator in the novel, and this key and almost continuous role was entrusted to Katie Saville, a very safe pair of hands indeed. Around her swirled a whole constellation of cameos of varying sizes, the Starkadders and others, all of them very well delineated. It would be unfair in such a large ensemble cast (though a judiciously smaller cast of characters than in the novel) to particularise, but one or two performances stood out, partly as a result of their ability to maintain the energy of their lines right to the end of the sentence and to avoid delivering their phrase ends upstage or to the floor.

Specially enjoyable was the delivery of some of Gibbons's satirical 'purple

passages' on the apron by a group of WI ladies in the manner of a Greek chorus. The busy wedding-breakfast dénouement, where everyone's story is rapidly brought to a satisfactory close (even Aunt Ada Doom's – almost) could have been delivered with greater structural tightness, but that may be a shortcoming of the script.

Production values were high, the single set simple but evocatively detailed, the costumes well-researched and positively glamorous in the case of some of the ladies, and the scene changes, lighting and effects (the exploding clock was a delightful case of the pathetic fallacy) were slickly executed – the Players seem to be very high-tech these days!



Altogether this was a very impressive and entertaining presentation of a most satisfying dramatisation, and the Players are to be congratulated for offering such a successfully spirited rendition of this rural satire before a semi-rural audience.

Stonesfield Common

Cattle have been on the Common since early October, eight cows and six calves. We have been fortunate that the river hasn't flooded, enabling the flood meadow to be grazed right down, something we weren't able to do last year.

As I write this the meadow has now been flooded. The calves were weaned and taken back to the Agricultural College at the end of October leaving just the mums. They in turn will go back to the college in the next few weeks to be TB tested. They may come back after Christmas.

The volunteers have been working on the perennial task of cutting back invasive blackthorn and hawthorn, and will be attempting to control old man's beard, also known as traveller's joy.

Brook Lane limestone meadow & surrounds

Highlights for the year

A cuckoo heard and seen 25 April, the flowering of meadow clary and pyramid orchids, common blue butterflies laying eggs on birds foot trefoil (no common blues were recorded in Stonesfield for the 2024 Big Butterfly Count). In July the glowworms and night-time moth recording. The snails when the rain finally came back. Wax caps, red and yellow in October. A close encounter with a vole when trimming the meadow. With the early November warmth, self-heal flowering, a low-growing blue and purple flower. You can see the meadow has been trimmed: we have left areas to provide a mosaic of habitats for wildlife over the winter; the uncut areas join so wildlife can move in some safety. The cut areas are about two to three inches high to reduce damage to wildlife overwintering in the top of the soil and stems of the plants.



Over the year we have continued to reduce the old man's beard that has taken root on the meadow and have scattered limestone meadow seed (from Cotswold National Landscape) in areas with bare soil, with some help from the rabbits.

Moths

We'll continue to record moths over the winter, much more sedate than the hurly-burly of the summer. Moth recording started in April – by the end of October we had recorded 165 species on the meadow and 252 species in total with surrounding areas (gardens, allotments and the Common).

Moths have declined about 40% since the 1960s. They are important food for bats, birds, spiders and other mammals. Importantly they are essential pollinators.

Knowing which moths we have on the meadow gives us information on the plants essential for the moth larvae that can then inform the ongoing management for the

meadow and surrounds. All results are sent to the national recording centre.

Gardens

These are important habitats for moths, ideally without any chemicals and with areas for wildflowers and some untidy areas. Many flowers are visited and pollinated by moths: honeysuckle, summer jasmine, campions, lavender, evening primrose, mint (look out for the mint moth flying during the day), tobacco plant, to name a few.

We do have some limestone meadow seed, thanks to the Cotswold National Landscape who harvest the seed. Do get in touch if you would like some for a wildflower area in your garden. For more on gardening for moths try this website

Butterflies have a fluttering flight and don't have the speed of moths. Both have forewings and hind wings. The difference is that butterflies have two distinct independant wings and moths have the two wings coupled together giving them more power in flight. Most moths can also fly in the rain, their wings are angled like sloping roofs and the wings have small

scales that overlap and are hydrophobic. Wind is a problem but mild rain isn't.

Hopefully the weather next year will be more favourable. Over the winter we will be arranging an information board ready for the spring.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

The Parish Council met at the Village Hall on 5 November 2025. Cllr L.Bate sent apologies. Present were Cllrs U.Rice (Chair), C.Renshaw (Vice Chair), D.Brown, P.Lowe and S.Powell, together with the Clerk.

County Councillor's Report: Cllr Andy Graham reported progress on plans for a new surgery in Woodstock, with the NHS supporting the development and several sites under consideration. Work also continues on upgrading street lighting in historic areas to reduce glare and improve energy efficiency. He noted that free 'bleed kits' are available for parishes to keep with defibrillators, funded through his Councillor Priority Fund. Local flooding issues at Laughton Hill are being investigated. Cllr Graham also highlighted Oxfordshire County Council's new knifecrime awareness campaign in partnership with Thames Valley Police. [See other information in his own report below.]

District Councillors' Reports: Cllr Genny Early updated members on the draft West Oxfordshire Local Plan, which proposes around 18,000 new homes by 2043. Stonesfield is classed as a Tier 3 'large village', allowing for small- to medium-scale development. She encouraged everyone to take part in the consultation, which runs until 23 December 2025. The plan can be viewed online at: www.westoxon.gov.uk/localplan2043

Cllr Tim Sumner reported that £3.5 million is being invested in upgrading local leisure facilities and that regeneration work in Carterton is progressing well.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr P.Lowe reported that the steering group continues to make steady progress. The Basic Conditions Statement is complete pending a response from WODC, and the Consultation Statement is almost finished. The group will soon submit documents to WODC and will be choosing an independent examiner.

Finance: Payments were approved, including cleaning and graffiti removal from the bus shelters. Expenditure authorised under the Clerk's delegated powers was ratified.

Clerk's Report: The Clerk reported that the new council website is under development and that a preview link will be shared with councillors once available. A contractor has been appointed to complete the cleaning and graffiti removal of the bus shelters, which was scheduled for completion during late October and early November. Work on the draft budget is progressing, and councillors have been asked to send any suggestions or amendments, including indicative figures, to the RFO before the December meeting when the final version will be approved.

Notices informing residents of the change of meeting venue have been displayed on the noticeboard and social media. All correspondence has been responded to, with important updates circulated to members.

The Clerk also shared information from OCC regarding temporary road closures and 'No Waiting' restrictions for resurfacing works on the B4022 between Hailey and Finstock, which took place from 13–17 November. In addition, the Clerk reported communication from the organisers of the Wilderness Festival about expanding the Local Tickets and Bursary Scheme to include Stonesfield. A full list of parish postcodes has been provided to ensure all residents are covered.

Parish Council Logo: It was agreed that a graphic designer will be asked to produce designs for a new Stonesfield Parish Council emblem based on ideas reflecting the village's character. These will be brought to a future meeting for consideration.

Biodiversity Policy: Cllr U.Rice reported that the Biodiversity Policy is nearly complete and will be circulated once finalised. Councillors discussed a few remaining sections, and it was suggested that the policy be cross-checked with the Neighbourhood Plan to ensure consistency.

Purchases: It was agreed that the Stonesfield Pub Group will apply for a grant towards a 360° video and audioconferencing device, which will enable the Clerk to attend meetings remotely in bad weather or illness. The Council will have access to the device when needed.

Working Groups and

Representation: Cllr D.Brown was added to the Glebe Working Group. However, as the Council currently has only six members, working groups will be suspended temporarily, with all projects

handled by the full Council. The Chair will make initial contact with the Village Hall, Playing Fields and Stonesfield Community Trust before appointing Council representatives.

Maintenance: The Council approved advertising for a self-employed, zero-hours maintenance operative. Work will include minor village maintenance such as noticeboard repairs and painting railings.

Meeting venue: It was confirmed that future meetings will be held at the Village Hall.

Budget 2026/27: Councillors will review the draft budget and send suggestions or amendments, with indicative figures, to the RFO before the December meeting, when the final budget will be approved.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on Wednesday 3 December 2025 at 7pm in the Village Hall.

The draft Neighbourhood Plan is ready for submission to WODC

You may recall that on 3 September the draft Neighbourhood Plan was unanimously approved by the PC for submission to WODC. All residents' comments on the original draft had been taken into account and the Plan adjusted accordingly. For example, it now includes new sections on the issues facing young people, which had been raised by a number of residents, and also on health and wellbeing. The proposed Local Green Spaces have been adjusted from those originally proposed (two were removed

and two were subdivided). This adjustment set out to balance the objections received and the high level of support the Local Green Spaces gained from residents in the Village Survey.

The steering group has now completed, and provided to the Parish Council, the two final documents which must accompany the draft Plan. The Consultation Statement sets out everything done to consult the village on the Plan, and the Basic Conditions Statement gives the detail of how the Plan conforms with all the relevant legislation and guidance. Once the Parish Council are satisfied with them, the Clerk will submit the draft Plan and accompanying documents to WODC.

WODC will give publicity to where the Plan proposal can be inspected and how representations may be made about it. After the time allowed for representations (6 weeks minimum) WODC will send it and the representations received to an Independent Examiner (IE). The IE will consider all the relevant documents and report to WODC, proposing any modifications he thinks appropriate.

WODC will review the proposed Plan and the IE's report and may require the Parish Council to make changes. If and when WODC is content with the modified Plan it will be put to a village referendum, organised by WODC, which will need a simple majority of residents in order to be 'made': the technical term used when the Plan is accepted as a legal document which must be taken into account on all future planning issues relating to Stonesfield within the lifetime of the Plan. That will correspond with the life of WODC's Local Plan, which currently applies till 2031 but

which is being updated and is likely to apply until 2043.

The time frame for these final stages of the process is out of our hands, and could be lengthy, but we will of course keep the village informed, both here in *The Slate* and on the village website. Meanwhile, it is good to know that the steering group has met its original estimate of how long it would take to compile the Plan (four years: work started in January 2022) and has delivered it to the Parish Council on time.

From our County Councillor's report

Woodstock: Doctors' surgery - real progress has been made towards delivering a new surgery for Woodstock. The GPs have developed a specification for a new surgery building. Work is underway to draw up outline plans for it. Viable funding models to deliver it are being reviewed and finalised. If progress is maintained, we could expect planning permission by late summer 2026 and a new surgery to be opened by the end of 2028.

Wootton by Woodstock: Designs are being drawn up for an appropriate bus shelter to replace the bus stop at Judds Garage on the A44, with costings to the parish council for consideration to mitigate the lack of weather protection and support the many villagers who travel to Woodstock and Oxford. Improvements to the highway configuration on the A44 in this area is at a design stage to alleviate the accidents that historically have taken place at this junction and progress is being made.

Combe: Pleased to see the highway improvements in Combe with restoration of green verges happening, making the village safer and more looked after.

Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum

At the moment, the Museum is hosting a powerful new exhibition of artwork by Level 3 Art & Design Students of Abingdon & Witney College. The exhibition, open until 9 December, marks 80 years since the end of the war and since the liberation of Bergen-Belsen concentration camp by Allied forces. The exhibition forms part of the museum's wider commemoration of the Holocaust and the Oxfordshire Yeomanry's role in liberating Bergen-Belsen.

The project has seen students respond to deeply personal stories and artefacts from the museum's collection - among them, those of Holocaust survivor Naomi Kaplan and Oxfordshire Yeomanry soldier Arthur Tyler. Arthur was approached by Naomi and wrote letters to her family in the US, eventually leading to her reuniting with them, and the start of a new life in Houston, Texas.

Through creative interpretation, the students have produced thought-provoking works that explore memory, loss, hope, and resilience - offering a new generation's response to this historic event.

Naomi dedicated much of her later life educating on the holocaust and the dangers of discrimination, leaving a legacy which continues to this day through the Holocaust Museum Houston and now in the UK through Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum and projects like this one. Letters from Liberation stands as a poignant testament to the power of art to bridge generations, connect communities, and highlight history's most vital lessons. Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum would like to thank the Warren family (Naomi's

descendants) for their support of its arts and educational programmes.

The Museum will close to visitors after Friday 19 December, and will re-open to visitors on 22 January 2026 following a seasonal closure. We look forward to bringing you news of our plans for the New Year.

Building Regs and Home Extensions - Part 2

There are two ways to comply with Building Regulations requirements: a Full Plans application or a Building Notice application.

With a Full Plans application, a complete set of construction drawings is submitted to the local Building Control authority, after which Conditional Approval is given. These approved drawings form the documentation and schedule of works that builders quote from and form the basis of your contract with the builder. The builder then constructs the job with regular Building Control Officer inspections to ensure work follows the drawings, issuing a Final Certificate upon completion confirming the work meets Building Regulations requirements.

The Building Notice procedure was introduced as a quicker, more flexible alternative to Full Plans. A building notice doesn't require drawings but requires the builder to inform the Building Control Officer at specific work stages for inspections. The builder must be confident the work will meet requirements—if not, work must be re-done. Building Regulations application fees vary with local authorities but Building Notice fees are higher than Full Plans fees.

With Building Notice applications, because no formal plans are checked beforehand, there's a greater risk of non-compliant work. Errors may only come to light during construction, leading to delays, additional costs, or enforcement action. It can also cause problems when selling the property as mortgage lenders and solicitors usually ask for clear documentation showing that work was carried out lawfully. Properties approved under a Building Notice may face extra scrutiny or delays. Homeowners, assuming Building Notice approval guarantees compliance, may later discover work is substandard or illegal, requiring further work.

While a Building Notice can provide faster, more flexible compliance routes, it carries significant risks. Lack of pre-approved plans can result in delays, enforcement actions, and additional costs. While it can save time at the outset, the risks are considerable, especially for less experienced builders. The Full Plans procedure remains the preferred and more reliable method.

Peace to men of good will. (Luke 2:14)

Peace takes time, effort, commitment, willingness to understand and listen, but in Christ we have the perfect model of the gift of peace given to all humanity at that first Christmas.






