

Swifts can take a while to switch on to boxes so this is very encouraging and in this instance patience and the perseverance of call playing has paid off.

Insects were in plentiful supply and young swifts were fledging from mid-July in some cases.

On still, late summer evenings some of the flying displays were really spectacular.

It should be noted that previously recorded nest totals were around eleven to thirteen so to this point with the increase in sites it's been a success story. Thanks to everyone who has been involved.

With the continuing issues swifts face nationally there will always be work to do to help secure the future of Stonesfield's swifts

Dinner by Donation update

It has been great to meet and feed so many of you over the last three months of 2025. You might be wondering what it's all about... Well, it's a sort of Secret Supper Club based at my house in Brook Lane. I've got a big dining table, the sofas go up on blocks to table height and somehow I manage to squeeze up to 18 people in for a three-course dinner! Did I mention I like to cook??

The guests arrive with a bottle or so of plonk (or not plonk). They mingle and

chatter till I yell that dinner is about to be served. Three courses arrive as and when they are ready. More chatter, more vino (they don't call me CookaholicKate for nothing!). It's all very relaxed, no taxis needed, no dress code, although wellies in Brook Lane are recommended! I'm often asked about payment which is entirely up to you, but I would say as a guide the average has been £28 per person (so maybe £25 as a minimum). It is ALL going to supporting local Community groups.

We have involved Stonesfield Scouts and they have earned badges for table laying, meet and greet, table waiting and LOTS of washing up! We've supported the Scouts raising £1,350 over three events for the next stay away.

So what's next? I am now a registered food venue and have a 5-star rating from the Food Inspector.

I will be holding monthly dinners throughout 2026, and we will be supporting Stonesfield Pre-school, Friends of Stonesfield School (FoSS), Chrissie's Owls, Lunch Club, Emergency Food Aid.

Politics & local affairs

Stonesfield Parish Council

Website Stonesfield Parish Council have created a website dedicated to Parish Council business. This will be found at www.stonesfield-pc.gov.uk/ The village website, www.stonesfield.online will continue, but without Parish Council information. This site will be maintained by *Stonesfield Slate* volunteers. If you originally subscribed to www.stonesfield.online for email updates you will continue to receive these unless you choose to unsubscribe, which you can do at any time by clicking on the links within the email.

January meeting The Parish Council met on 7 January 2026 at the Village Hall. Councillors discussed a range of local issues affecting the village, with updates from County and District Councillors, working groups, and Blenheim Estate.

Planning and Development There were no new planning applications to consider at this meeting. However, the Council continues to monitor the proposed Combe Road / Manor site development closely.

County and District updates County Councillor Andy Graham reported progress on several projects, including plans for improvements at Judd's Garage Junction, which may include traffic lights, pedestrian facilities, speed reductions, and improved bus shelters. Consultation is also under way on proposed changes to Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Services, and the Parish

Council will be submitting comments. District Councillors provided updates on Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) payments, which will begin for new planning permissions approved after 31 January 2026. A portion of these funds will come directly to parish councils for local infrastructure projects. Information was also shared about the Oxfordshire Local Nature Recovery Strategy.

Neighbourhood Plan The Neighbourhood Plan has reached an important milestone, with WODC now processing the Regulation 15 draft. A Regulation 16 consultation is now underway [see separate piece p13 - editor]. The Parish Council agreed to begin exploring the feasibility of affordable housing in the village, working with Community First Oxfordshire.

The Common and Parish Land

Councillors approved a programme of works on the Common, including repairs and replacement of gates, pollarding of willow trees along the riverbank, and clarification of repairs to cricket pitch fencing. Quotations will be sought, and specifications for the work will be prepared. The Council also agreed to explore options for rabbit-proof fencing at the allotments, including discussions with Blenheim Estate and possible grant funding.

Finance and Grants Routine payments were approved, including reimbursements for Remembrance wreaths and equipment servicing.

Two grants were awarded:

- £355.90 to the Pub Group for a shared 360° video-conferencing device, which will also be available for Parish Council use.
- £250 towards churchyard grass cutting and maintenance, recognising the churchyard as a valued village asset.

Blenheim Estate update Blenheim Estate reported a £2,500 donation to the village pre-school, strong uptake of commuter travel passes, and ongoing liaison regarding events and traffic planning. Duck shooting has ceased, and steps are being taken to improve communication around shoots. Work to replace gates and stiles at Stocky Woods is expected soon, and a decision on the proposed solar farm is anticipated in May.

Next meeting The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 4 February 2026 at 7pm. Residents are always welcome to attend.

Neighbourhood Plan

Stonesfield Parish Council has submitted the Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan to West Oxfordshire District Council which can be viewed by entering 'Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan' in the search bar at www.westoxon.gov.uk.

The 6-week statutory Regulation 16 consultation on the Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan is open for comments from Monday 12 January to 5pm on Monday 23 February 2026. We invite your comments about the draft Stonesfield Neighbourhood Plan within the above consultation period. Please email planning.policy@westoxon.gov.uk before 5pm on 23 February 2026.

If you don't have a computer or smartphone, you can use the public computers at the village library. Staff there will help you locate the site.

The published Neighbourhood Plan on the WODC website has been amended to take account of as many of the comments received between February and May 2025 as possible. Where comments fell within the remit of the Plan, changes were made, including significant additions on young people and wellbeing. All feedback from last year's consultation has been published. We encourage everyone to read the amended Plan – it's important that as many residents as possible write to the District Council with comments; in support as well as with objections.



From our County Council

Household Waste Recycling Centre booking system

Oxfordshire County Council are introducing a new booking system to help reduce queues, ease traffic on nearby roads, and make visits to the Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC) quicker and easier.

From the 14 January 2026 you will need to book a time slot to visit an HWRC. To book, you need to select your site, specify the type of waste you are bringing, and the date and timeslot. Bookings can be made up to two weeks in advance or up to 30 minutes before you visit (subject to availability).

Once you have booked your visit:

- You will receive a confirmation email with all the details you need, ensuring everything is clear so you have no surprises on the day.

On the day:

- You will need proof of address to show you are an Oxfordshire resident and are eligible to access the HWTC's for free. This can be a driving licence, council tax or utility bill.
- Please sort the recyclable items in your waste before you arrive on site. This will help speed up your visit and help Oxfordshire to recycle even more.
- If you are unable to sort everything before you set off, don't worry, there will be sorting areas available on site to make this easier.
- The onsite team will greet you when you arrive, direct you to a bay and will answer any questions to help you recycle as much as possible.

Who likes a nice warm toasty car on a frosty morning? Thieves do! As temperatures drop, we're seeing more drivers leaving their cars running on the driveway to defrost while they get ready inside. Unfortunately this creates the perfect opportunity for opportunistic thieves, who actively look for unattended unlocked vehicles with the keys still in the ignition. Moreover, many keyless cars can be driven away if the engine is already running, even if the key fob isn't inside the vehicle. So a thief could jump in and drive away – the car will not automatically shut down. It takes just seconds for someone to jump in and drive off, and in many cases insurance won't cover the loss if the car was left running unattended. So please, don't make it easy for them. Stay with your vehicle while it defrosts, use de-icer or a scraper, and make sure your car is fully secured before walking away. Stay safe, stay warm, and stay with your car.

Driving in fog

In foggy conditions, visibility is already reduced. Driving without headlights makes it much harder for other motorists, cyclists and pedestrians to see you - increasing the risk of serious collisions.

Please remember:

- Always turn on your headlights in fog, rain or low-light conditions
- Use dipped headlights (not full beam) to avoid dazzling other drivers
- Slow down and increase your following distance

A small action can make a big difference. Let's all do our part to keep the roads safe.

Stonesfield Primary School

Happy New Year everyone! It feels like only yesterday that I wrote my very first entry for the *Stonesfield Slate*, yet here we are four months on – and what four months it has been. So much has happened at Stonesfield School, and as we start a new year I wanted to take a moment to reflect, update you, and say a heartfelt thank you.

Autumn term was full-on in every sense. In October 2024, Ofsted judged the school to be *Requires Improvement*. Shortly afterwards, between February and May, a number of families chose to leave, and our pupil numbers dropped to around 70. Unsurprisingly, this created a great deal of uncertainty and anxiety for many of our remaining families. A significant part of our work since then has been about nurturing trust, offering reassurance, and creating hope during a challenging time.

My role as Executive Headteacher has been largely strategic. I have deliberately stayed out of the day-to-day operational running of the school, which has been expertly led by Aisling Hill, our Head of School. Our roles are very different, but equally rewarding, and we work closely together with a shared vision for Stonesfield.

Moving a school out of *Requires Improvement* demands real focus on processes, systems, robust action plans, and clear strategies for improvement. I am confident in saying that the support and challenge from our governors and the local authority have helped push us to a much stronger place.

Staffing has been a huge priority. Since July, I have appointed a Head of School, a Year 5/6 teacher, a Year 3/4 teacher (who was sadly later deployed to Scotland), an Early Years teacher, a new Business Manager, and a new cleaning company. We are now at full complement, with a talented and committed team firmly driving the bus towards our destination of *Good*. Staff morale has improved dramatically, with positivity and stability now the norm.

Teaching and learning have also seen significant development. We have introduced new pedagogical approaches, written a new School Improvement Plan, established a clear monitoring cycle, and produced a Teaching and Learning Handbook. Many policies have been rewritten, the learning environment has had a complete overhaul, and expectations are high and consistent.

Communication with families and the wider community has improved hugely. We have a new website, a refreshed and redesigned newsletter, and regular opportunities for parents to come into school, see learning in action, and give feedback. We are once again involved in our local community and have re-established strong links with neighbouring, larger schools.

Our curriculum has been rewritten, and new assessment practices have been introduced. A major piece of work has focused on behaviour and classroom expectations, and I am proud to say the school is now beautifully calm, orderly, and

purposeful. We have also appointed an incredible music teacher who teaches every class; the standard of performances in the church and at community events has risen notably and is a real source of pride.

Inclusion remains central to our work. We have written our Inclusion Code and are working closely with the Mulberry Bush Specialist School to deepen staff knowledge and confidence across a range of areas. Recent advisory visits have confirmed the significant progress we are making, though we know there is still work to embed and refine this term.

As you can imagine, all of this progress has come at a cost. The loss of families has placed the school into a deficit budget, and if we were to lose any more pupils, the risk of closure would become very real.

Stonesfield is a wonderful village, and it needs a thriving school at its heart.

So, my plea as we begin this new term is for your continued support. If you have skills you can offer, grants you know of, time you could give, or ideas to share, please do get in touch. It truly does take a village to raise a child – and with your help, we can ensure Stonesfield School continues on its positive journey.

Thank you, as always, for your support and belief in our school. Here's to an exciting term ahead.



Nature notes

Citizen scientists and Guardians for the Evenlode river

What a great start to the new year: a cormorant was seen flying low along the Evenlode river immediately followed by an iridescent kingfisher in the sunshine.

We know that the Evenlode is in trouble and is not the river she can and should be. I find it helpful to think of the three waters that flow in our environment impacting the Evenlode river.

Firstly the water in the sky held by the clouds flowing over us. The heat of climate change evaporates more water into clouds so we get more intense rainfall. We can see

the effect of heavy rainfall as the Evenlode turns brown with silt from run-off into the river and the natural floodplain fills up. We can't get across the bridge.

The excess silt clogs up the river rushing downstream and settles on the river bed. Our sewage treatment plant (Finstock) can't cope with too much rain water and has to release raw sewage into the river. Near the river the floodplain has additional run off which can have nitrates and phosphates. Sewage sludge sold to farmers as a fertiliser is more concerning and contains a cocktail of environmental toxins including forever chemicals. It is hoped that Defra's Environmental land management schemes can support our farmers in caring for river floodplains.

Secondly there is the water that flows underground. If the floodplain is full, walk the Common; go down to where the slope joins the floodplain and watch the underground water emerging. The concern is more in the hot summer months as the river flow reduces, abstracting water can impact the flow of the river and then the wildlife.

The third water flow is the Evenlode herself as she flows by and through us. This is where citizen scientists and guardians are fully involved.

The Evenlode river is 45 miles long with a catchment area of 166 square miles before she joins the Thames at Cassington. In 2024 citizen scientists did 820 surveys from 160 sites on the Evenlode. The Environment Agency did 173 surveys at 18 sites. This gives you some idea how important citizen scientists are and the monitoring we do.

We have a small team in Stonesfield and are looking for anyone who would be interested to meet us, see what we do and consider joining us for as much or as little as you like. We test for nitrates, phosphates, turbidity, low phosphate, e-coli and riverfly invertebrates. We report on the river into national and local databases.

The cormorant and the kingfisher know there are some fish in the Evenlode; this is confirmed by the Environment Agency who monitor fish at 33 sites on the Evenlode by electro fishing. Their records have seen a diminishing population of fish since 1990. There are still brown trout in the river, mainly in the headwaters (Kingham, Daylesford, Oddington, Chadlington stream). Two sites near Stonesfield were surveyed in 2024 (Ashford Mill, Lower Ridings farm): both

had a 'good mix of species' including one pike at each site. As an apex predator pike are a positive sign for the river. During riverfly invertebrate surveying we do catch smaller fish not seen by electro fishing. A better size for the kingfisher.

Having the builders in - Part I

How to find a reliable builder

The next step is to get quotes and appoint a builder. At design stage, I always recommend obtaining a budget cost estimate before submitting a planning application. This gives you a benchmark to compare tender prices and negotiate more effectively.

Start by compiling a shortlist of builders through recommendations from friends, family, or neighbours who have undertaken similar projects. Look for contractors with experience in extensions and alterations and who understand UK Building Regulations. Cross-check recommendations with the Federation of Master Builders (FMB), NHBC, and Companies House to confirm the business is registered, financially sound, and has a good trading history. Online platforms like Checkatrade, Rated People, and MyBuilder can help identify names, but use them cautiously. Always dig deeper by searching online with the contractor's name alongside terms like 'complaints', 'court case', or 'scam'.

Aim to invite at least five or six contractors to tender, knowing that only half may respond. Provide identical tender packs, including the approved drawings, the schedule of works, and a covering letter. In your letter, ask for a fixed-price quote, copies of insurance certificates, details of trade memberships, and Health and Safety

policies. Set a deadline—typically 4 to 6 weeks—and ensure builders can visit the site. Keep a record of who came and when.

When tenders are returned, don't just look at price. Consider timescales, availability, and how carefully they reviewed the project. Exclude any who failed to visit the site. From there, you'll likely narrow it down to two or three contractors. Ask detailed questions about site management, waste disposal, and how they handle neighbour concerns. Carry out financial checks to confirm solvency, and verify Public Liability, Employers' Liability, and Contractor's All-Risk insurance. Request references, visit past projects, and speak directly with clients about workmanship, communication, and reliability.

Many homeowners rely on the tender drawings and schedule of works plus any agreed duration and payment terms as the basis of the agreement. However, you may prefer a formal building contract, such as the JCT Homeowner Contract or one from the Federation of Master Builders, for extra security.

With the contract signed and the builder appointed, you're ready to begin.

From the Rector – Lent

Ash Wednesday falls on 18 February this year, and marks the beginning of the Christian season of Lent. After the death and resurrection of Jesus, the first Christians prepared for Easter with no more than a few days of fasting, but by the year 325AD the observance of Lent as a penitential period of forty days was well established. The choice of forty days followed the examples of Moses, Elijah and, of course, Jesus himself in fasting for that period. For those of us today who enjoy deliveries from Sainsbury's or frequent visits to the Co-op, the idea of spending six weeks deliberately 'going without' seems hard to comprehend. In the first few hundred years the fast was very strict, often with only one meal a day being eaten, and all meat, fish and dairy disallowed. In Europe, this strictness was relaxed after the 8th century, when fish and dairy products were gradually permitted, but even in the 15th Century it was expected that nothing would be eaten

until noon. At the start of Europe's Reformation, the Reformers publicly rejected the fasting which the church required, and some let it be known that they ate sausages in Lent as an act of defiance. Thereafter the people of Europe were divided about fasting (and much else) for several centuries. In the Church of England any kind of fasting is entirely optional, and in 1966 the Roman Catholic Church ruled that strict fasting was only required on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Christians have 'observed' Lent in different ways, but all Christians agree that outward devotions are only symbols of the desire to be in a spiritual state of humility and openness for the celebration of Easter.

Times have changed, and old religious practices and customs are no longer widely followed here. Yet we are as aware as ever that Easter is about God's grace, and the gift of abundant and eternal life in Jesus, the Saviour. So how might we appropriately prepare to remember this today? In our time, few people fast for religious reasons, but what, I wonder, can we each do to prepare our hearts and lives to be receptive to the message of life, to spiritual grace at Easter? I suspect there are many options, and perhaps the best will involve acts of kindness or generosity to others, because unless we can be truly generous to one another, it will be hard for us to accept that God's gift of abundant life in Jesus Christ has been given to us so freely.

Good Intentions

'Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters.' Colossians 3:23

By now in February all those new year resolutions might have fallen away; we may have had every good intention to behave differently, filled with strong motivation, but sustaining the effort is often too much. The difficulty is that motivation, as an emotion, can fluctuate and vary. However, an intention is more about the deliberate aim with action and a focus and an articulated outcome and therefore perhaps more achievable.

As Christians our motivation is about aligning ourselves with God's purpose, but to achieve that is how we live our lives as the journey to accomplishing that. Good intentions can require deep self-examination about motive. We can see in the Old and New Testaments the recognition of balancing the tension between what we want and what God may require of us and how that is demonstrated through behaviour:

'A person may think their own ways are right, but the Lord weighs the heart.'

Proverbs 21:2

'I the Lord search the heart and examine the mind, to reward each person according to their conduct, according to what their deeds deserve.' Jeremiah 17:10

Our motivation lays the groundwork for our intentions, which in turn become actions. It serves as a reminder that while we may aim to do good, the motivation behind those actions matters substantially. The Gospels help us to learn how our

intentions are often judged not only on their outcomes but on the heartfelt motivations.






